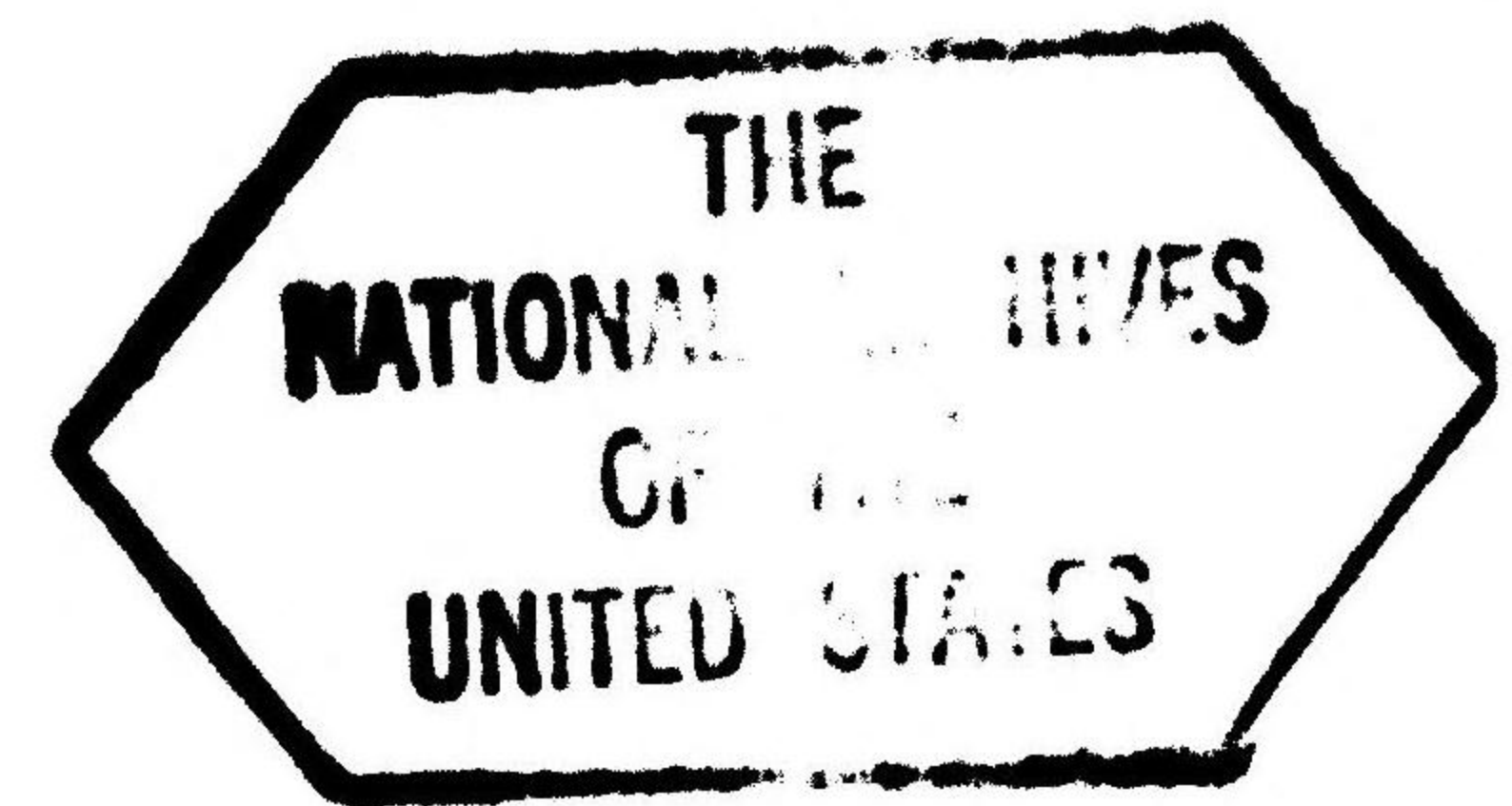

d. Civil Jurisdiction - OD 31

1. Japanese Courts divested of civil jurisdiction in claims against United Nations Nationals or organizations who are accompanying the occupation forces, but retain jurisdiction of claims by such persons against Japanese.

THE MISSION OF LEGAL-GOVERNMENT DIVISION  
OF  
MILITARY GOVERNMENT

1. The mission of the Legal-Government Division in Military Government is to contribute its part in the accomplishment of the Potsdam Declaration and the Post Surrender policies as directed by higher authorities.

a. The Potsdam Declaration; 26 July 1945, in part states:

"There must be eliminated for all time the authority and influence of those who have deceived and misled the people of Japan into embarking on world conquest, for we insist that a new order of peace and justice will be impossible until irresponsible militarism is driven from the world.

"Until such a new order is established and until there is convincing proof that Japan's war making power is destroyed, points in Japanese territory to be designed by the Allies shall be occupied to secure the achievement of the basic objectives we are here setting forth.

"The Japanese military forces, after being completely disarmed, shall be permitted to return to their homes with the opportunity to lead peaceful and productive lives.

"We do not intend that the Japanese shall be enslaved as a race or destroyed as a nation, but stern justice shall be meted out to all war criminals, including those who have visited cruelties upon prisoners. The Japanese Government shall remove all obstacles to the revival and strengthening of democratic tendencies among the Japanese people. The freedom of speech of religion, and of thought as well as respect for the fundamental human rights shall be established."

b. The Post Surrender Policy (19 June 1947) effecting Legal-Government as stated in Section III, Political, in part states that "disarmament and demilitarization are the initial tasks of the Military Occupation and shall be carried out with determination. Japan is not to have any.....secret police organizations.....or gendarmerie, but may have adequate civilian police forces. Persons who have been active exponents of militarism and military nationalism will be removed and excluded from public office and from any other position of public or substantial private responsibility. Ultra-nationalistic or militaristic social, political, professional and commercial societies and institutions will be dissolved and prohibited. Obstacles to the revival and



strengthening of democratic tendencies among the Japanese people shall be removed..... The judicial, legal and police systems shall be reformed as soon as practicable to conform to policies set forth herein and it shall be the duty of all judicial, legal and police officers to protect individual liberties and civil rights."

2. Any advice given, decision or action taken by legal-Government personnel should be made with the foregoing policies in mind and be a contribution to the accomplishment of the mission.



RESPONSIBILITIES  
(F)  
LEGAL-GOVERNMENT DIVISION

1. The areas in which Legal-Government must assume responsibility for advice and action toward accomplishment of the mission of the Occupation are:

a. Japanese Constitution (Effective 3 May 1947). Sovereignty, or the right to rule, resides in the people and is expressed through representatives elected by and responsible to the people. The Constitution is a basic document of government from which governmental agencies derive their authority and limitations and to which the people look for protection of human rights based upon the experience of the victorious powers.

b. Japanese laws. Japan as a feudalistic monarchy had developed into a police state, dominated by an oligarchy of militarists, bureaucrats and family business concerns in which the masses of the people had been economically exploited, politically terrorized, and individually suppressed through rescripts, laws, ordinances, directives and customs promulgated without consent of the masses. These laws and directives which are in conflict with new laws and the spirit of the New Constitution must be ferreted out and repealed. New laws and new democratic procedures must be encouraged.

c. Japanese Courts. The legislative, executive, and judicial branches of government formerly centered in one person, the Emperor. The present government separates the three basic branches into independent operational units responsible to the people. The Supreme Court is the highest judicial organ in the state and has final power in passing on the constitutionality of the laws and orders. The court officials, formerly government officials, must adopt the attitude of public officials. The court structure and procedure must change from that of a governmental organ furthering the state's interest to one giving justice and maintaining a workable balance between public welfare and individual freedom.

d. Governmental Activities. An intelligent, responsible and efficient local government is necessary for a successful representative state government. Therefore, Legal-Government divisions at lower Military Government levels have an interest in local autonomy and the many interests in local government and especially in the fields of legislation, public safety, public finance, and political activities.

e. Purge (except teachers). As a preventative measure, those persons who shared in and who were responsible for Japan's pre-war policy must be removed and kept from positions of influence.

f. Political Parties and Elections. One of the most important features of the New Constitution and of successful representative government is the citizens' right to choose and to dismiss their public officials in a legal manner.



g. Public Safety. The preservation of life and property, the punishment of criminals and the preservation of civil liberties become real and vital affairs at the local levels because at this level the citizen has intimate contact with the government. The police officials of a given area must be responsible to the citizenry of that area. The secret police system must be abolished. Militarism to be abolished in toto, and civil liberties must be guaranteed.

h. Entry and Exit to and from Japan. The forced movement of population prior to and during the war years must be allowed to correct itself in accordance with the will of the individual in an orderly and legal manner so as to cause the minimum of confusion and disruption of the economy.

i. Military Occupation Courts. Legal-Government Division will stand ready to assist courts of the occupation and to aid in the transfer of cases to the Japanese courts as directed by higher authority.

j. Special Investigations. In the evolution of the Japanese political, legal, and governmental functions to conform to new laws and new policies of the new order, Legal-Government Division will conduct such special investigations as are assigned and which are uncovered from time to time.

2. Legal-Government is responsible for a cooperative attitude toward and for close liaison with other divisions of Military Government and with other units of the Occupation Forces.



FUNCTIONS  
OF  
LEGAL-GOVERNMENT DIVISION

1. Functions of the Legal-Government Division in discharging responsibilities to accomplish the mission are as follows:

- ✓ ✓ a. Stimulation and encouragement of the reconstruction of Japanese governmental, judicial and political structure along democratic lines.
- ✓ ✓ b. Surveillance over the Japanese courts in the exercise of criminal jurisdiction to insure compliance with existing regulations.
- ✓ ✓ c. Surveillance over the Japanese court procedures to develop a procedure in accordance with democratic traditions.
- ✓ ✓ d. Surveillance over sentences imposed upon Koreans and certain other nationals or stateless persons who have a peculiar status.
- ✓ ✓ e. Surveillance of police reorganization to insure compliance with spirit of decentralization laws.
- ✓ ✓ f. Encourage the Japanese public officials and servants in the performance of their duties as servants of the public and not as government officials. *Pub. Info Officer can be helpful in giving info*
- ✓ ✓ g. Maintain surveillance over the Japanese police to insure the protection of civil liberties of the people, especially in matters of arrests, searches and seizures.
- ✓ ✓ h. Maintain surveillance over the police departments to insure no militaristic developments or unlawful instruction.
- ✓ ✓ → j. Maintain records of political parties, strength, organization, platform and activities in order to advise others on developments and trends.
- ✓ ✓ k. Exercise surveillance over elections to insure the free and unhampered exercise of the franchise by citizens eligible to vote.
- ✓ ✓ l. Observe and report on activities of the prefectural, city and town officials to ascertain their problems and opinions on governmental matters.
- ✓ ✓ m. Check instructions and ordinances promulgated through Japanese channels with the directives received through military channels to ascertain the interpretations placed on them as well as the degree of compliance by local officials.
- ✓ ✓ n. Exercise surveillance over the purge program and activities of the purges when they appear to be influencing political developments.



o. Operate customs, immigration and quarantine services (in cooperation with Public Health Division) in areas having a maritime or aerial port.

p. Process claims against the United States.

q. Maintain records on confinements ordered by military personnel and processing of Japanese coming under authority of LOFCA.

r. Maintain a file of Official Gazettes and act as legal advisor to other divisions of Military Government. *Local Occupation Force Court Authority*

s. Maintain surveillance over the activities of Japanese procurators to insure a speedy and fair trial.

t. Encourage Japanese officials in administration of Japanese tax laws as a part of the program to combat inflation and as training of the Japanese citizen that his government must be supported by him.

u. Legal-Government officers will advise other divisions of Military Government in the administration of laws affecting them and will assume the initiative in surveillance of law enforcement agencies when violations are brought to light.



## PRIORITY OF ACTIVITIES

1. A high priority must at all times be maintained on those activities contributing to the discharge of major responsibilities of the Legal-Government Division. Within this category are (a) development of democratic processes, (b) protection of civil liberties, (c) abolition of feudalistic practices, and (d) close liaison with Japanese government units and extralegal associations to encourage and to develop a sense of individual responsibility in governmental affairs.

2. From time to time certain segments of activity will assume first priority temporarily. Elections and political party activities have first priority in periods immediately prior to, during, and shortly after general elections. The same general rule applies to tax collections near the end of the fiscal year. Reorganization of some branch of the Japanese government following the promulgation of a law effecting a major change in the Japanese political economy will give that activity a first priority. Others, such as repatriation, smuggling, blackmarketing, central government agencies, delayed trials, prolonged confinements and party reorganizations have at one time or another held first priority.

3. The operating priority for any given period of time is regulated by letter instructions commonly called the "Three Months Plan" and transmitted to Military Government units by letter, file AG 310.1-BA, Headquarters I Corps, subject: "I Corps Military Government Plan for the Period \_\_\_\_\_"



## INSPECTIONS AND REPORTS

### 1. Inspections.

a. Legal-Government officers will make periodic inspections of detention houses, jails and prisons. A report of the inspection will be retained in the headquarters making the inspection. A special report will be submitted only when a major discrepancy, one which cannot be rectified at local levels, is uncovered.

b. Legal-Government officers will inspect Police training schools to insure that military and Kendo training are not given. The results will be summarized in the Monthly Activities Report, Annex A.

c. Inspections will be made periodically of courts, procurators offices, legislative assemblies, police offices, fire stations, ports of entry and customs houses.

d. Any Japanese institution on which a "lead" has been received indicating an illegal activity will be inspected, investigated and action initiated.

Here are some answers to matters discussed on my last visit of March 14th.

1. According to the high Procurator here, Mr. Kanno, the local procurator has full authority to proceed with an Anti-tax League prosecution. There is no requirement that he must seek authority from higher levels although he may do so because of his uncertainty.
2. On the "Press Code" violations SCAP has instructed the Supreme Procurator that, the latter, will grant permission in all cases for a prosecution. The Supreme Procurator was told that it was the desire of GHQ that full freedom be accorded the press hence the control is lodged in Tokyo.
3. I am to receive a weekly report on the progress of the prosecution of the 17 Kuwana Koreans from Mr. Kanno, the high procurator.
4. There is no provision for deportation of a Korean convicted in a Japanese Court. However, upon conviction a request could be sent to SCAP thru channels for such action and deportation would unquestionably be granted.

Section I - Local By Laws (Leg)

1. Reference: Ltr, SCAP, dtd Dec 48, subj: "Legal Comments, Section II." The following is quoted for your informations.

2. Local By-Laws

"Reports recently have reached Legal Section, SCAP of the enactment of a number of new prefectural and local by-laws about whose constitutionality or legality grave doubts are expressed. Specifically, these have been in the field of restrictions on rights of assembly, and in the imposition of criminal penalties for prostitution. The borderline between Local and National legislative authority is extremely uncertain at the present time, and it would appear that issues of legality or constitutionality must first be determined on an ad hoc basis until such time as generalizations are possible. Although the issue of constitutionality or legality is in every case a matter for the decision of Japanese governmental authorities alone, and is not a proper issue for direct intervention by either SCAP or Military Government on that basis alone, nevertheless the occupational interest in this problem goes very deep. If it should develop that clearly unconstitutional legislation is being enacted in quantity, or that there are many instances when locally enacted legislation is not being properly enforced by National procurators on the basis that it contravenes Diet statutes the development of additional or more suitable institutions of government may be necessary. For example, the suggestion has been made that it may be desirable to establish prefectural procuratorial organizations which would enforce violations of local laws. Also the question of what limit should be placed on the power of local assemblies to include penal provisions in by-laws is ripe for reconsideration. For the purpose of such inquiries, Legislation and Justice Division, Legal Section, requests from Military Government Teams such information as can be conveniently supplied in regard to acts of dubious legality. If convenient, copies of any local legislation of this category should be forwarded to this Division. Any comment or recommendations of the reporting Local Military Government Team, or any background information as to the circumstances under which the enactment occurred will be welcomed."





1. In further clarification of above-mentioned references, information has been secured to the effect that the SF Form 71 for annual leave is not necessary when such leave is less than three (3) days. The time sheet will be initialled by the individual concerned for sick leave, annual leave, or leave without pay not in excess of three (3) days, unless such leave is at the end of a pay period, in which case a Form 71 must be completed. Under no circumstances is an SF Form 71 sent to Eighth Army with the time sheet, but in accordance with par 7f (4) of reference 1 above, it "will remain in operating official's office".

2. Any sick leave used in excess of amount of sick leave accrued will automatically be charged to leave without pay unless individual concerned specifically requests that it be charged to his accrued annual leave.

3. The same instructions apply to preparation of the Foreign National Time Sheet, except that it is prepared monthly instead of bi-weekly. All Foreign National Time Sheets must be clearly stamped "Foreign National" and must be in Hq Eighth Army by the 7th of each month.

Every person who violates this section shall be summarily discharged from the Government employ.

(b) (As changed by C 3, 16 Aug 46) The acceptance by an officer of contributions or gifts from persons not in the Military Establishment or in the employ of the Government in recognition of services rendered or from firms, or their representatives, with whom the officer has negotiated as an agent of the Government is prohibited.



SECTION I. Tax Surveillance Teams' Assistance  
to Tax Officials

A.

1. The tax offices are now starting to attach property of persons who have not paid their personal income tax for the past fiscal year which ended 31 March 1948.

2. It is recognized that this is essentially a matter for the Japanese however never before have they been required to carry out the full provisions of their tax laws, therefore they now need assistance in carrying out these penal provisions.

3. It is highly desirable that during the initial phases of the tax officials' program to attach such property that the tax surveillance team in each prefecture make itself available for assistance in such attachment by being present at the time the attachment takes place but to take no active part in the attachment.

4. As this program continues you will find that you can diminish the amount of time given to it and finally leave the matter entirely in the hands of tax officials.

B.

1. It is recommended that tax surveillance teams make it known to the tax officials that the officer in each team is available to speak to the workers of the tax offices at any time that they desire him to do so.

2. Points to stress are: Praise the progress that has been made during the past fiscal year, discouragement of absenteeism tactics, notification that firm action is to be taken in case such absenteeism tactics continue, encouragement in the starting of the tax collecting program during the next fiscal year.

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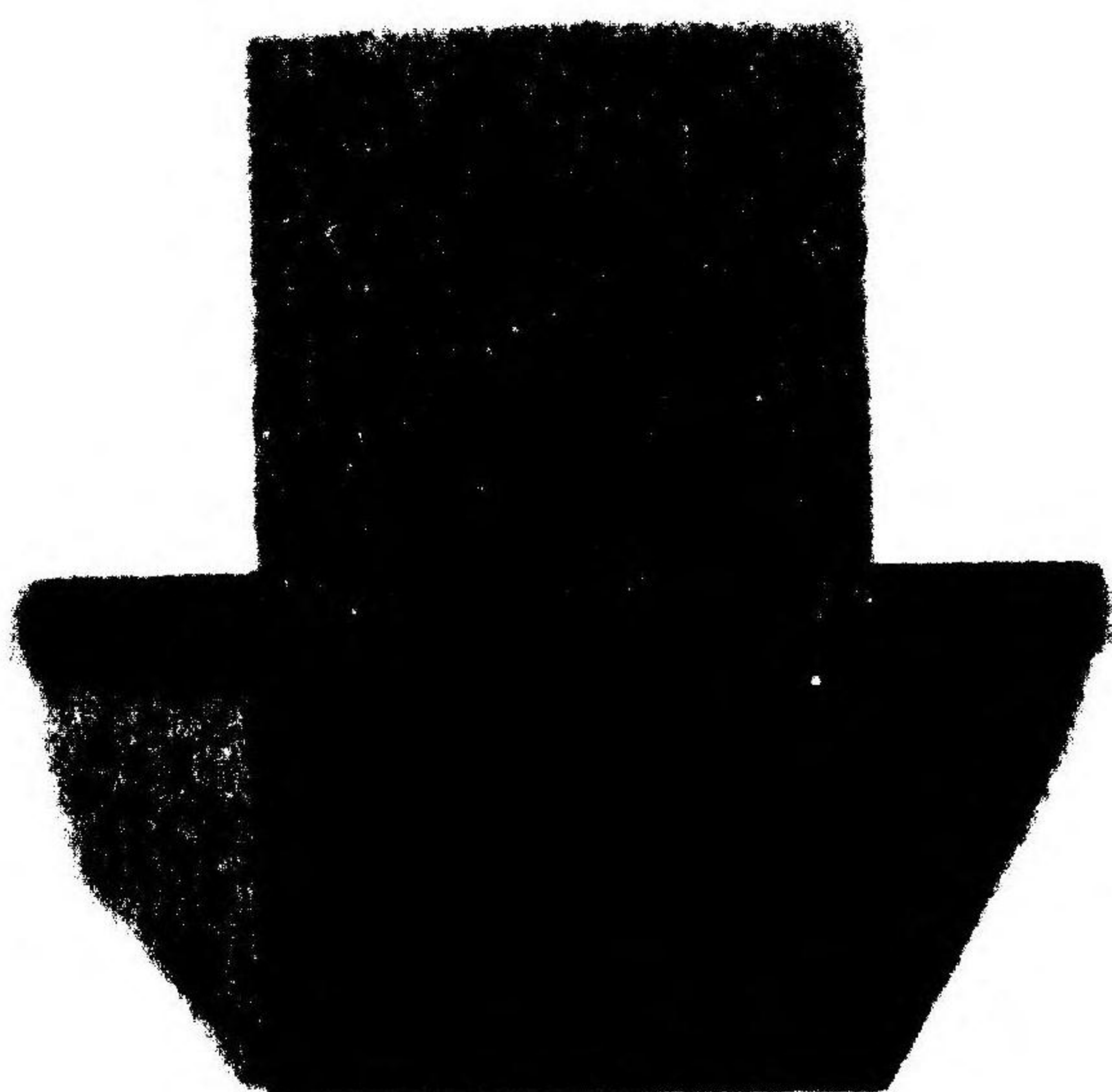

REPATRIATION

1. Rescissions: All publications in conflict with the contents contained in this operations memorandum are rescinded.

2. References:

a. SCAPIN No 4287/a, file number AG 014.33, 6 August 1947, subject: "Medical Examination of Repatriates for Protection of Patients with Syphilis."

b. SCAPIN No 6146/a, file No AG 014.33, 8 October 1948, subject: "Conditions aboard Repatriation Vessels and in Repatriation Reception Centers."

c. SCAPIN No 1966, file number AG 130 (18 Jan 1949) SCAPIN, subject: "Property Individuals are Authorized to Carry on Entering and Leaving Japan."

d. SCAPIN No 927/17, file number AG 370.5, 9 March 1949, subject: "Repatriation."

3. Repatriation is a responsibility of the Japanese Government and will be carried out by the Japanese, under the surveillance of the Occupational Forces, in accordance with SCAP directives to the Japanese Government. The supervision of repatriation is a command function and will be the responsibility of the commander within whose area repatriation centers are located.

4. Within this headquarters, the G-3 Section will exercise general staff supervision over repatriation functions.

5. Division Commanders will be responsible for:

a. Supervising Japanese officials in the maintenance of law and order within repatriation centers operating in their areas.

b. Supervising Japanese officials in the maintenance of adequate standards of sanitation within repatriation centers operating in their area.



- c. Supervising Japanese officials to insure compliance with medical inspections, quarantine procedures, currency and security regulations, and all functions as set forth in existing SCAP directives and Eighth Army Operational Directives pertaining to the processing of repatriates.
  - d. Supervising Japanese officials to insure that adequate fire prevention measures are taken in repatriation centers operating within their areas.
  - e. Making a daily report to SCAP on repatriation activities within their areas when active repatriation agencies are located therein.
  - f. Forwarding shipping dispatches immediately upon the departure of each ship from ports in respective zones by radio (priority) to SCAP as action addressee and to Commanding General, Eighth Army, and Commanding General, I Corps, as information addressees. An information copy of shipping reports will be sent to the controlling authority of ports of entry giving a complete breakdown of passengers and other pertinent information.
  - g. Providing necessary allied guards upon request of the Japanese Government to add prestige to Japanese guards aboard repatriation trains in the respective areas. The number of guards so provided will be left to the discretion of the local commander.
  - h. Providing relief for guards aboard repatriation trains traveling from other areas and furnishing messing and billeting to these guards while awaiting return to their own organizations.
  - i. Furnishing US guard personnel aboard outbound repatriation ships when requested by the Japanese Government, such requests having first been approved by this or higher headquarters.
6. Military Government personnel will support division commanders in repatriation functions by:
- a. Maintaining liaison with repatriation officials within the Japanese Government to insure compliance with provisions of SCAP directives to the Japanese Government.
  - b. Advising division commanders and higher headquarters on matters pertaining to repatriation.
  - c. Maintaining contact with repatriation centers through frequent visits and other available means, also by maintaining liaison with local Japanese repatriation officials in order to advise center commanders.
  - d. Inspecting repatriation trains at points of origin, within I Corps zone of responsibility to insure that:



- (1) The Japanese repatriation officials cause an inspection to be made of repatriation trains for sanitary conditions, sickness among repatriates, and supply of food and water.
- (2) The best available facilities are prepared for the US Occupational Force train guards.
- (3) No repatriation train leaves the exchange point until provisions of 1 and 2 above have been complied with and corrective measures taken when necessary.
- (4) Liaison is maintained between Japanese officials and the RTO at exchange points and destinations in matters pertaining to schedules and delays of the repatriation trains.

c. Furnishing Military Government Public Health Officers or port quarantine officers who will be responsible for surveillance of Japanese quarantine activities and sanitary procedures on incoming and outgoing repatriation ships in compliance with existing SCAP's.

7. The use of US Occupation Forces, in a supervisory capacity, to insure that the Japanese carry out SCAP directives pertaining to repatriation, will be held to a minimum number necessary to insure compliance.

8. Direct communications between adjacent units to insure notification of train arrivals is authorized.

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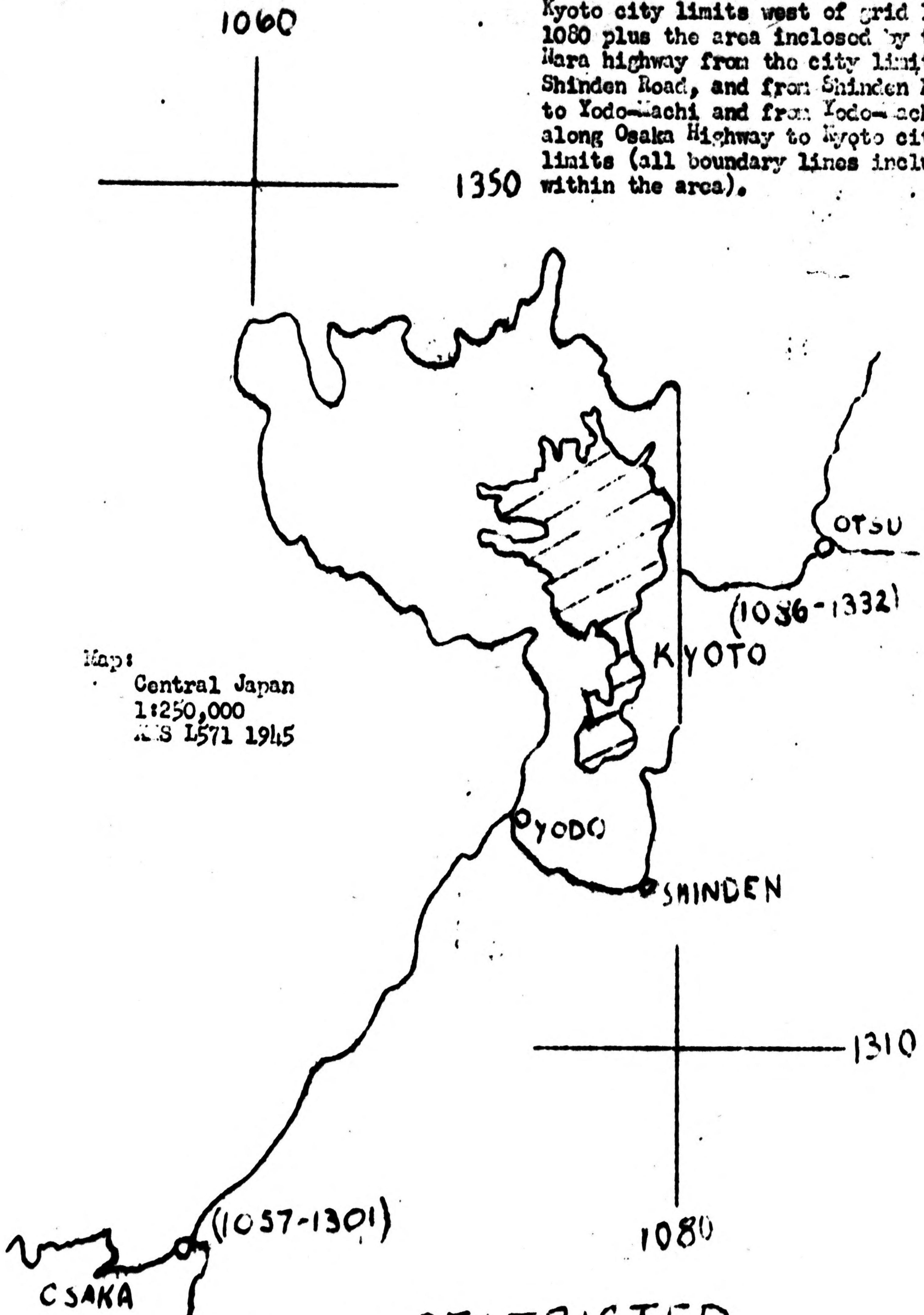

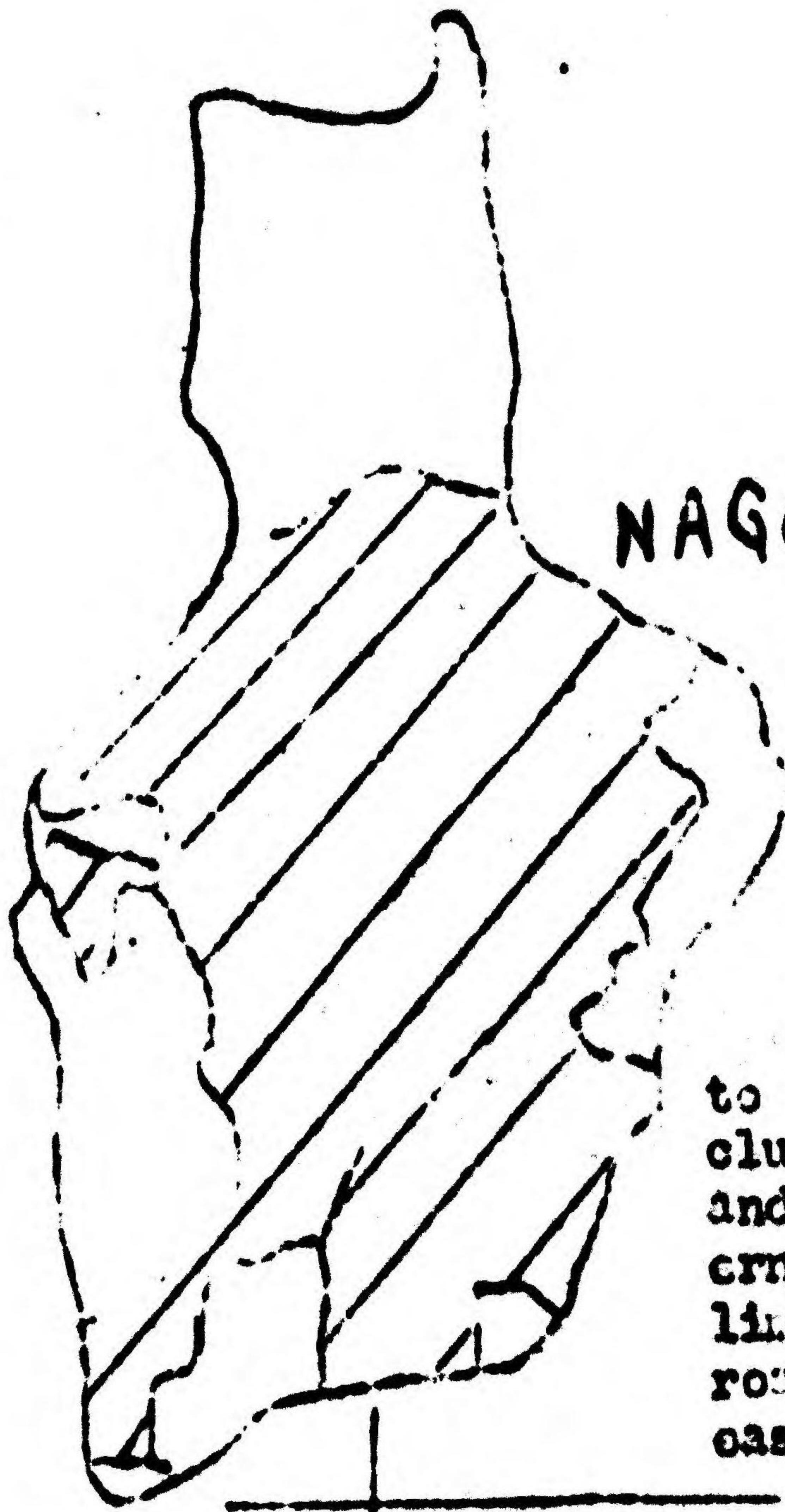

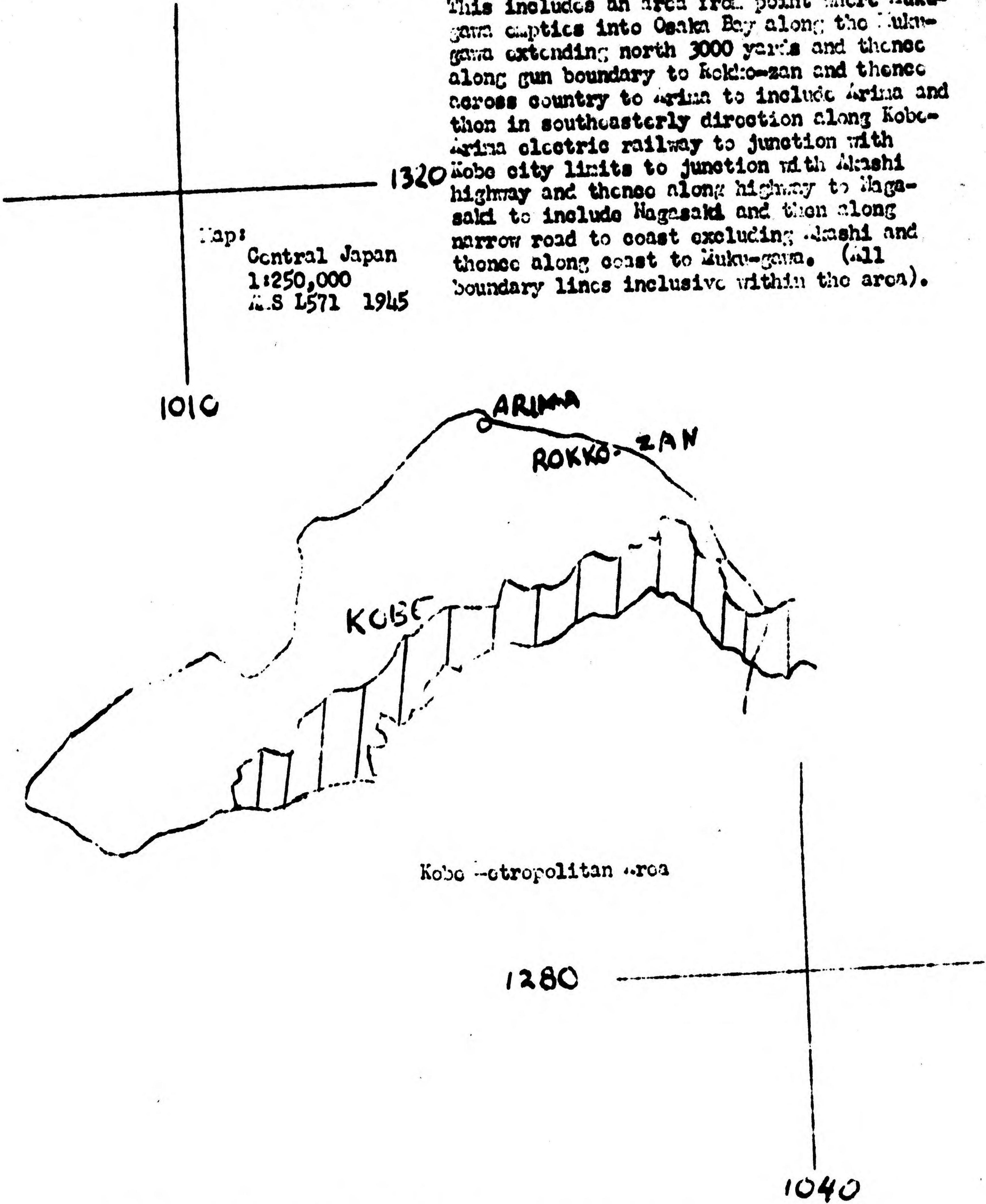

**PREVENTION OF BLACKMARKET ACTIVITIES BY MEMBERS OF THE  
CREWS OF MERCHANT VESSELS**

1. Rescissions: Operations Memorandum #16, dated 27 October 1947 and Change 1 thereto.

2. References:

a. Paragraph 2, Inclosure 3 to Annex 1 to Administrative Order Number 25, Headquarters I Corps, dated 25 August 1947.

b. Circular 26, General Headquarters FEC, dated 10 March 1947, Subject: "Prevention of Black Market Activities."

3. Responsibilities:

a. In order to prevent black market activities, the Commanding Generals, 24th and 25th Divisions, will be responsible for surveillance of the members of crews of merchant vessels other than Japanese registry docking in their respective areas of responsibility, except in the ports of Kobe and Nagoya. The Commanding General, Kobe Base, is responsible for the port of Kobe. The Commanding General, Fifth Air Force is responsible for the port of Nagoya.

b. The Transportation Section, I Corps, will notify Divisions of the expected time of arrival of merchant vessels other than Japanese registry in port in their respective areas.

c. The Japanese government is responsible for the control of crew members coming ashore from vessels of Japanese registry.

4. Restrictions:

Crew members will not be permitted ashore from merchant vessels if they have in their possession:

- a. More than one package of cigarettes
- b. More than one bar of candy.
- c. More than one package of chewing gum
- d. Any alcoholic beverages.

- e. Any United States Currency.
- f. Any food other than prepared food that would be justified by length of shore leave granted the individual.
- g. Any fire arms or other weapons.
- h. Any hunting knives (pocket knives will be limited to three-inch blades).
- i. Any medical supplies.
- j. Any excess wearing apparel or other salable merchandise.
- k. More currency of any nation other than yen than they might reasonably be expected to need for subsistence and lodging for their period of shore leave.

**5. Instructions:**

- a. Personnel assigned to surveillance of the crews of merchant vessels will, upon arrival of a vessel in port, contact the master of the vessel and insure that he has full instructions concerning restrictions in paragraph 3 above, also with regard to the activities of his crew members while ashore.
- b. Personnel assigned to the duty of surveillance of merchant vessel crew members may be authorized to wear an arm band marked "Port Military Police" while in the execution of the surveillance mission.
- c. Port authorities are responsible for making available to the master of a ship, exchange for authorized currency required by his crew members when coming ashore.

**6. Coordination:**

The actions of personnel assigned to the duty of surveillance of the crews of merchant vessels will be fully coordinated with the local Military Government authorities.

3. Repatriation is a responsibility of the Japanese Government and will be carried out by the Japanese, under the supervision of US Occupational Forces, in accordance with SCAP directives to the Japanese Government. The supervision of repatriation is a command function and will be the responsibility of the division commander within whose area repatriation centers are located.

4. Division commanders will be responsible for:

- a. Supervising Japanese officials in the maintenance of law and order within repatriation centers operating in their areas.
- b. Supervising Japanese officials in the maintenance of adequate standards of sanitation within repatriation centers operating in their area.
- c. Supervising Japanese officials to insure compliance with medical inspections, quarantine procedures, currency and security regulations, and all functions as set forth in existing SCAP directives and Eighth Army Operational Directives pertaining to the processing of repatriates.
- d. Supervising Japanese officials to insure that adequate fire prevention measures are taken in repatriation centers operating within their areas.
- e. Making a daily report to SCAP on repatriation activities within their areas.
- f. Forwarding shipping dispatches immediately upon the departure of each ship from ports in respective zones by radio (operational priority)



to SCAP as action addressee and to Commanding General, Eighth Army, and Commanding General, I Corps, as information addressees. For ships bound for Korea, the Ryukyus, and other allied ports an information copy will be sent to the controlling authority of these ports giving a complete breakdown of passengers and other pertinent information.

g. Providing necessary allied guards upon request of the Japanese Government to add prestige to Japanese guards aboard repatriation trains in the respective areas. The number of guards so provided will be left to the discretion of the local commander.

h. Providing relief for guards aboard repatriation trains travelling from other areas and furnishing messing and billeting to these guards while awaiting return to their own organizations.

i. Furnishing US guard personnel aboard outbound repatriation ships when requested by the Japanese Government, such requests having first been approved by this or higher headquarters.

5. Within this headquarters, the Military Government Section will coordinate repatriation functions with the AC of S, G-3.

6. Military Government personnel will support division commanders in repatriation functions by:

a. Maintaining liaison with repatriation officials within the Japanese Government to insure compliance with provisions of SCAP directives to the Japanese Government.

b. Advising division commanders and higher headquarters on matters pertaining to repatriation.

c. Maintaining contact with repatriation centers through frequent visits and other available means, also by maintaining liaison with local Japanese repatriation officials in order to advise center commanders.

d. Inspecting repatriation trains at points of origin, within I Corps zone of responsibility to insure that:

(1) The Japanese repatriation officials cause an inspection to be made of repatriation trains for sanitary conditions, sickness among repatriates, and supply of food and water.

(2) The best available facilities are prepared for the US Occupational Force train guards.

(3) No repatriation train leaves the exchange points until provisions of 1 and 2 above have been complied with and corrective measures taken where necessary.



(4) Liaison is maintained between Japanese officials and the RTO at exchange points and destinations in matters pertaining to schedules and delays of repatriation trains.

c. Furnishing Military Government Public Health Officers or port quarantine officers who will be responsible for surveillance of Japanese quarantine activities and sanitary procedures on incoming and outgoing repatriation ships in compliance with existing SCAPL.S.

7. The use of US Occupation Forces, in a supervisory capacity, to insure that the Japanese carry out SCAP directives pertaining to repatriation, will be held to a minimum number necessary to insure compliance.

8. Direct communications between adjacent units to insure notification of train arrivals is authorized.

MILITARY POLICE AND MILITARY POLICE INVESTIGATORS.

1. Rescission: Operations Memorandum Number 6, Hq I Corps, dtd 27 February 1947, Subject: "Criminal Investigation."

2. The purpose of this memorandum is to define the function and responsibilities of the Military Police, Military Police Investigators, and Criminal Investigation Detachments.

3. Military Police

a. The primary duties of military police are to protect the health and welfare of personnel within the command, to prevent violations of laws, orders, and regulations, to report violators, and if necessary, to take them into custody.

b. Military Police will be outstanding examples of discipline, efficiency, military bearing, courtesy, and neatness. High type and qualified personnel will be selected, and whenever practicable, will be mature, of sound judgement and possessive of common sense.

4. Military Police Investigation Section

a. Military Police (not Criminal Investigation Detachment) will be used for the purpose of conducting investigations of vice and moral turpitude, minor criminal offenses, misdemeanors, accidents, and other investigations as may be assigned by the Provost Marshal or Commander.

b. Military Police Investigators will not conduct investigations which are normally the duty of Criminal Investigation Detachment personnel (reference: FM 19-20), Counter Intelligence Corps, unit commanders, inspectors general, or investigating officers appointed under Article of War 70.

c. Military Police Investigators will wear the prescribed uniform in the performance of their duties.

d. The investigation, apprehension, and prosecution of Japanese and foreign nationals alleged or suspected to have violated SM directives or to have committed other crimes or offenses which involve occupational personnel, or property and the solution of offenses presumed to have been committed by occupation force personnel, either against each other or against Japanese nationals, is the responsibility of all commanders. Those cases involving Japanese and the use of Japanese resources should be coordinated with military government. Crimes by Japanese which do not come within the above will be investigated and prosecuted by the existing local Japanese police agencies.

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e. The 22nd Criminal Investigation Detachment with station in Myote is placed under the operational control of the Provost Marshal, I Corps.

f. Detachments of the 22nd Criminal Investigation Detachment are available to Commanding Generals, 24th and 25th Divisions, upon request to assist in the investigation of major crimes.

CONTROL OF TRAFFIC IN POISONOUS BEVERAGES

1. Rescissions: Operation Memorandum No. 15, this headquarters, dated 15 October 1947.
2. References: Operational Directive No. 50, Headquarters Eighth Army, dated 17 May 1946. SCAPIN - 871, dated 9 April 1946.
3. Division commanders will be responsible within their respective areas for the control of traffic in poisonous beverages. In the execution of this function they will:
  - a. Assist the prefectural authorities in making inspections of all distilleries, producers, wholesalers, and vendors of intoxicating liquors to insure that poisonous beverages do not become available to occupation force personnel.
  - b. When any suspected poisonous liquors are found, immediately seize such liquors and cause them to be tested for tolerances as provided in inclosure #1 of this directive. If it be determined by appropriate laboratory tests that such liquors are poisonous, they will be turned over to the Japanese police and destroyed.
  - c. Institute the prosecution of personnel for the possession or sale of liquors found to be poisonous under Operation Directive #29, Headquarters Eighth Army, dated 11 March 1946.
  - d. Institute through TI & E and PIO information covering the danger of consuming poisonous liquors procured from unlicensed dealers.
  - e. (1) Make frequent inspections of "on-limits" installations selling intoxicating beverages of Japanese origin to insure that all bottles are properly stamped with lot number and are approved by testing authorities.  
(2) Remove from sale immediately beverages bearing no lot number or one reported as not meeting standards.
  - f. Publish a list from time to time of intoxicating beverages by brand or trade name which are approved for purchase and consumption by occupation forces.
  - g. At frequent intervals pick up samples from approved distilleries and producers and have them tested in United States Army laboratories in accordance with procedure outlined in inclosure #1.

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4. Provost marshals of Kyoto and Nagoya Metropolitan Areas will perform the duties prescribed in Paragraphs 3 a, b, c, d, and e.

5. The I Corps Surgeon in the Kyoto Area and the Surgeon of the 5th Air Force in the Nagoya Metropolitan Area (by agreement) will perform the duties as prescribed in paragraphs 3 f and g, above.

6. In order to facilitate commanders' control of traffic in poisonous beverages, Military Government will:

a. Require each prefectural government to register and regularly inspect all distilleries, producers, wholesalers, and vendors of intoxicating beverages in its prefecture and enforce provisions of SCAPIN - 371.

b. Require that each prefecture maintain an adequate laboratory for testing beverages. Frequent inspections will be made of this laboratory to insure that analyses of samples are performed as outlined in inclosure #1.

c. Require prefectural authorities to submit a report of all distilleries, producers, wholesalers, and vendors in each prefecture to be used as a guide for spot checking such establishments for compliance with directives cited in Paragraph 2.

d. Require that all distilleries and producers of intoxicating beverages number each lot of beverages produced, labeling the lot number on each bottle so that the testing authority may place an official stamp on each bottle of an approved lot.

e. Report any lots reported to them by Japanese Government that do not meet the standards outlined in Operational Directive No. 50, Headquarters Eighth Army, 17 May 1946, to the surgeon and the provost marshal of the area concerned.

f. Require prefectural government to give publicity through Japanese channels to:

(1) The provisions of Japanese laws prohibiting sale of traffic in any poisonous beverage.

(2) The punishment provided by Japanese law for violation.

(3) The fact that such offenses are also punishable by provost court.

7. Sale of alcoholic beverages to occupation force personnel will be made only from inspected distilleries or licensed prefectural stores selling package liquors acquired from those distilleries or establishments duly licensed by Japanese authorities to dispense liquors.



8. Division commanders and the Kyoto and Nagoya Metropolitan Area Provost Marshals are authorized to close any place of business violating the terms of this directive and to supervise the destruction by Japanese police of all liquor found on the premises. Such places of business will be permitted to reopen only with the approval of the commander closing them.

9. Reports of violations of this directive will be forwarded to this headquarters.

JANUARY 1948

"METHODS OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE ANALYSIS"

Place 50 ml of whiskey in a distilling flask, add 50 ml water, mix, and using an efficient condenser, slowly recover 50 ml of distillate.

TESTS TO BE PERFORMED ON DISTILLATE:

Methanol:

To 5 ml of sample add 2.5 ml potassium permanganate 2%, 0.2 ml conc sulfuric acid; let stand three minutes. Add 2 ml 5% oxalic acid, 1.0 ml sulfuric acid, and shake until decolorized. Add 5 ml of Schiff's reagent, let stand 1 hour. Read against standards prepared simultaneously with the unknown and containing 0.4, 0.6, 0.8, 1.0 and 1.2 mg. methanol/ml in 5 cc of a 45% solution of ethyl alcohol in water. These are most easily prepared by diluting the appropriate quantity of a stock solution containing 2 mg. methanol/ml of 45% ethyl alcohol solution to a total quantity of 5 cc., using 45% ethyl alcohol as the diluent.

(Schiff-Elveve Reagent. - Dissolve 0.5 gm basic fuchsin in 200 ml hot water, and cool. Dissolve 6 g. sodium bisulfite in 100 cc water. Add fuchsin solution to bisulfite solution, and quickly add 10 cc conc HCl. Q. 500 cc. Let stand until solution is a pale straw color; store in amber bottle. Will keep for two to three weeks).

Acceptable liquors are liquors with less than 1.0 methanol/ml.

Aldehydes:

Make 1 : 100 dilution of distillate. To 5 cc of diluted liquid add 0.25 ml Schiff-Elveve solution. Place in incubator at 37° C for ten minutes. Acceptable liquors will be colorless, or have a very faint pink color. Definite pink or violet color is not acceptable, (Sensitivity - 1 : 5000 on diluted distillate).

Ketones, acetone, isopropyl and tertiary butyl alcohols:

To 2 cc of distillate add 3 cc distilled water and 10 cc mercuric sulfate T. S. (Denige's reagent); heat in boiling water bath for 3 minutes. No precipitate forms in three minutes if liquor is acceptable.

(Mercuric sulfate T. S. - 5 gm yellow mercuric oxide in 40 cc distilled water. Add while stirring 20cc conc sulfuric acid, add 40 cc distilled water; let stand until dissolved).

Sensitivity - 1 : 1000.



### Phenols:

To 3 ml distillate add 2 ml Millon's reagt. Heat in water bath for three minutes. Acceptable solution will have no color.

(Millon's reagt. - Dissolve 50 gm mercury in 50 cc conc nitric acid. When solution is complete add 100 cc distilled water).

### Chloral hydrate:

To 3 ml of distillate add 1.5 cc Kessler's reagt. Heat to boil. Chloral hydrate gives a bright red precipitate in a clear green solution. Acceptable liquors contain no chloral hydrate.

(Notes: Orange or grey precipitates are due to aldehyde and/or alcohols, and will be disregarded).

(Kessler's reagt. - See T. S. 227).

### Cyanides:

To 3 ml of distillate add 5 drops NaOH; add 3 drops ferrous chloride (sat.). Heat to boil, add excess 10% sulfuric acid; add 5 drops ferric chloride (sat.). Cyanides give intense blue precipitate. Acceptable liquors contain no cyanides.

### Fusel Oil:

Mix 20 cc of whiskey with 20 cc of distilled water and shake the mixture with 10 cc of ether. Allow the mixture to stand until separation takes place. Separate the ether layer and allow it to evaporate spontaneously on a watch glass. The residue has no disagreeable or irritating odor.

### Heavy Metals:

Evaporate 10 cc of whiskey to 5 cc and dilute with 10 cc of distilled water. Acidulate with 5 drops of HCl and add 5 cc of hydrogen sulfide T. S. No precipitate is formed before or after rendering the mixture alkaline with ammonia T. S.

(Hydrogen sulfide T. S. - Saturated aqueous solution  $H_2S$ . Pass  $H_2S$  through cold distilled water. Keep in small amber bottles. Should have strong  $H_2S$  odor and form precipitate of sulfur with ferric chloride.

Ammonia T. S. - 395 ml ammonia water (approx 1000 cc).

### Alkaloids:

Acidulate 10 cc of whiskey with 5 drops dilute HCl. Evaporate to 5 cc. Dilute with distilled water to 10 cc and filter. Add a few drops of mercuric potassium iodide T. S. (Lloyd's reagt.) The mixture develops no precipitate.

- (3) Chloral hydrate.
- (4) Cyanides.
- (5) Heavy metals
- (6) Aldehydes in amounts in excess of 0.20 mg/ml or 0.02 per cent.
- (7) Ketones in excess of USP standards for whiskey.
- (8) Fuel oil, in excess of USP standards for whiskey.

2. Responsibilities:

- a. In order to prevent black market activities, the Commanding Generals, 24th and 25th Divisions, will be responsible for surveillance of the members of crews of merchant vessels other than Japanese registry docking in their areas of responsibility, except in ports of Kobe and Nagoya. The Commanding General, Kobe Base, is responsible for the Port of Kobe. The Provost Marshal, Nagoya Metropolitan Area, will be responsible for the Port of Nagoya.
- b. The Transportation Section I Corps will notify Divisions and the Provost Marshal, Nagoya Metropolitan Area, of the expected time of arrival of merchant vessels other than Japanese registry in port in their respective areas.
- c. The Japanese government is responsible for the control of crew members coming ashore from vessels of Japanese registry.

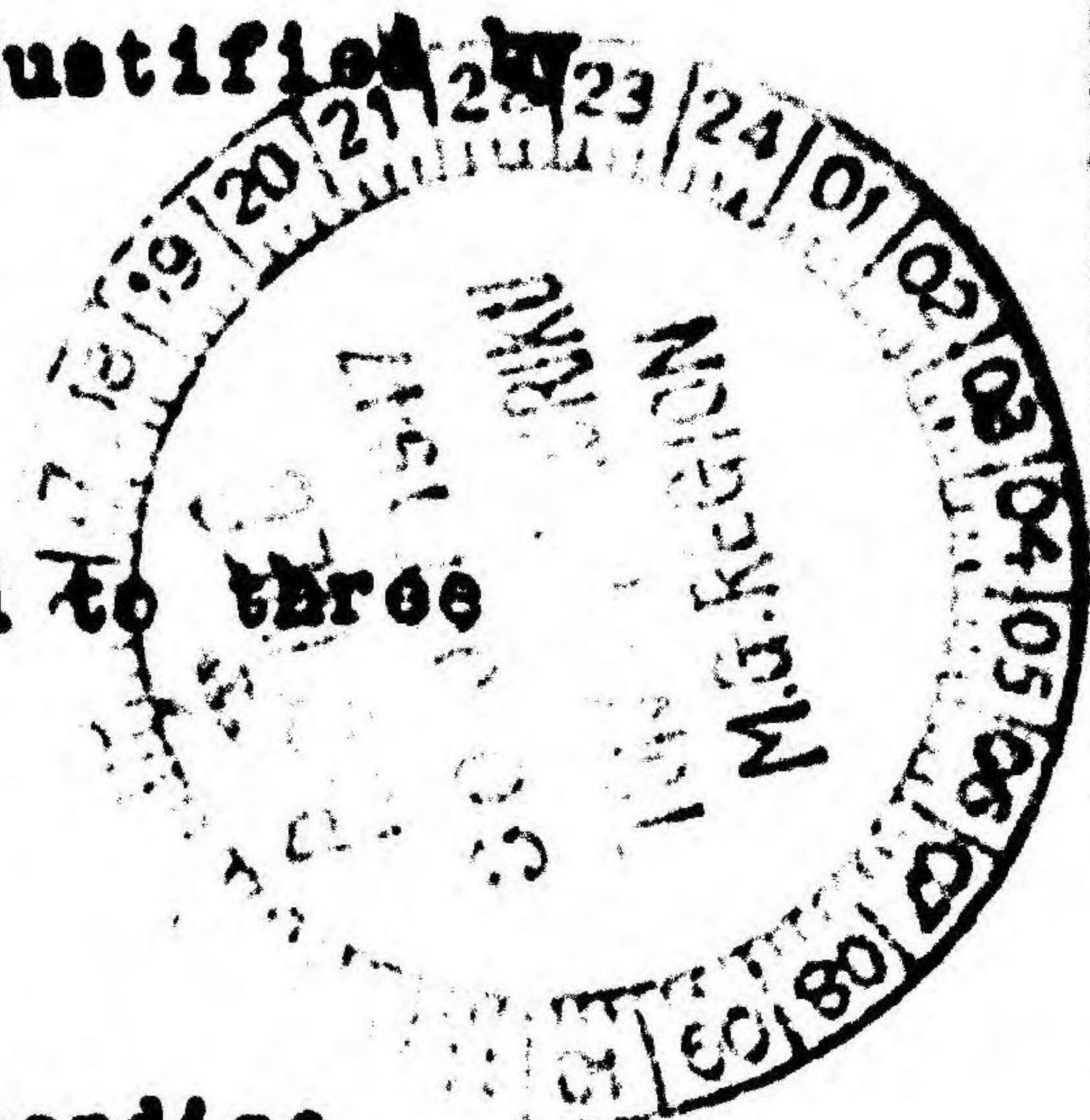
3. Restrictions:

Crew members will not be permitted ashore from merchant vessels if they carry:

- a. More than one pack of cigarettes.
- b. More than one bar of candy.
- c. More than one package of chewing gum.
- d. any alcoholic beverages.



- e. any currency of any of the United Nations.
- f. any food other than prepared food that would be justified by length of shore leave granted the individual.
- g. any fire arms or other weapons.
- h. any hunting knives (pocket knives will be limited to three inch blades).
- i. any medical supplies.
- j. any excess wearing apparel or other salable merchandise.



4. Instructions:

- a. Personnel assigned to surveillance of the crews of merchant vessels will, upon arrival of a vessel in port, contact the master of the vessel and insure that he has full instructions concerning restrictions in Par 3 above, also with regard to the activities of his crew members while ashore.
- b. Personnel assigned to the duty of surveillance of merchant vessel crew members may be authorized to wear an arm band marked "Fort Military Police" while in the execution of the surveillance mission.
- c. Port authorities are responsible for making available to the master of a ship, exchange for authorized currency required by his crew members when coming ashore.

5. Coordination:

The actions of personnel assigned to the duty of surveillance of the crews of merchant vessels will be fully coordinated with the local Military Government authorities.

CONTROL OF TRAFFIC IN POISONOUS BEVERAGES

1. Reference: Operational Directive #50, Headquarters Eighth Army, dated 17 May 1946.

2. Division commanders within their zone of responsibility will:

PM -

a. Assist the prefectural authorities in making inspections of all distilleries, producers, wholesalers, and vendors of intoxicating liquors to insure that poisonous beverages do not become available to occupation force personnel.

PM -

b. When any suspected poisonous liquors are found, immediately seize such liquor and cause it to be tested for tolerances, as provided in paragraph 2, c, of this directive. If it be determined by appropriate laboratory tests that such liquors are poisonous, they will be turned over to the Japanese police and destroyed.

IC. Surg

c. From time to time, issue lists of intoxicating beverages (by brand or trade name) which are approved for sale to the occupation forces within their respective areas.

PM -

d. From time to time, inspect establishments approved for selling intoxicating beverages to the occupation forces to insure compliance with this directive.

IC. Surg

e. Insure a uniform system of testing alcoholic beverages using procedure enunciated in above reference.

IC. Surg

f. Designate and supervise Japanese laboratories within area of responsibility in which analysis of alcoholic beverages will be made.

IC. Surg

g. Examinations of alcoholic beverages will normally be done by Japanese medical laboratories. Unit surgeons and Provost Marshals may request such tests be made in U. S. Army laboratories and general hospitals.



PM -

- h. Institute the prosecution of persons for the possession or sale of liquors found to be poisonous, under Operational Directive Number 29, Headquarters Eighth Army, dated 11 March 1946, subject: "Establishment of Military Occupational Provost Courts."
1. Institute extensive publicity through TI & E and PIO agencies covering the dangers of consuming poisonous liquor and purchases of liquor from black market or unlicensed dealers.
3. Military Government units will:
  - a. Require the prefectural authorities of each prefecture to submit a report of all distilleries, producers, wholesalers, and vendors of intoxicating liquors within the prefecture, and require the prefectural authorities to inspect all such establishments.
  - b. Require the maintenance by the Japanese of laboratories to be used for testing intoxicating liquors, and inspect such laboratories to determine if tests are being properly made.
  - c. Require the prefectural authorities to furnish reports of any violations of Headquarters Eighth Army Operational Directive Number 50, immediately upon detection.
  - d. Require the prefectural authorities to give publicity, through Japanese channels, to the provisions of Japanese laws prohibiting and punishing the possession, selling or trading in any poisonous beverage, and to give further publicity to the fact that such offenses are also punishable by Occupation Courts.
4. The following actions will be taken in Kyoto and Nagoya Metropolitan areas:
  - a. The area Provost Marshal will perform the duties detailed in sub paragraphs a, b, d and h of paragraph 2 above.
  - b. The TI & E section and PIO section, I Corps, will institute extensive publicity covering the dangers of consuming poisonous liquor and purchases of liquor from black market or unlicensed dealers.
  - c. The Surgeon of I Corps will perform the duties detailed in sub paragraphs c, e, f and g of paragraph 2 above.



5. Sales of alcoholic beverages to occupation force personnel will be made only from inspected distilleries or licensed prefectural stores selling package liquor acquired from these distilleries, or establishments duly licensed by Japanese authorities to dispense liquor.

6. Division commanders and the Kyoto and Nagoya Metropolitan area Provost Marshals are authorized to close any place of business violating the terms of this directive, and to supervise the destruction by the Japanese police of all liquor found on the premises. Such places of business will be permitted to reopen only with the approval of the commander closing them.


7. Reports of violations of this directive will be forwarded to this headquarters.

8. Rescission: Operations Memorandum Number 13, this headquarters, dated 29 May 1946, is rescinded.

d. The CG, Base Command, will establish and maintain Special and General Provost Courts for the City of Kobe and Hyogo Prefecture.

1. Inclosure 1 expresses the policy of this headquarters on the subject of the requirement of notice by the Japanese of proposed parades, demonstrations and assemblies.

2. This inclosure will be copied verbatim and incorporated in a letter which Military Government Team Commanders will send to the Governor of the Prefecture in which they are stationed, through the local liaison office. Local authorities will, at the same time, be informed that this letter ~~re-~~ cinds any previous requests by the Occupation Forces for similar information.

3. Reports of action taken by the Japanese will be submitted in the semi-monthly Military Government activities report

"1. In order to fulfill properly the mission of the Occupation Forces it is necessary that notice be given of anything which might interfere with the traffic control or coordination, safety control and health of the Occupation Forces and all persons and property for which such Forces are responsible.

"2. Parades and assemblies and large outdoor meetings are some of the things which, unless known in advance, interrupt traffic and communication and under certain conditions are apt to infringe on the safety control and health of persons. It is my duty to be aware of any of these large gatherings so that the necessary arrangements may be made to avoid the interruption of traffic or endangering the health or safety of individuals. We must insure uninterrupted traffic for the vehicles of the Occupation Forces at all times.

"3. It is therefore required that you give advance notice of gatherings of 500 or more people, and parades of ten or more vehicles in order to insure that the Occupation Forces' activities will not conflict with such authorized parades or assemblies. Accordingly, it will be necessary for the Forces to be notified three days in advance of any such meeting or parade, so that plans may be coordinated.

"4. If this information is not available to you, it is suggested that you might follow the practice in many American cities in which it is required that the persons holding parades and assemblies notify and have prior approval of the police departments before they may proceed. This is done purely to insure that the community may continue its normal business without interruption and that, where necessary, traffic may be coordinated so as to avoid interruption and adequate fire prevention may be arranged.

"5. It is therefore requested that you inform this headquarters at least three days prior to any parade or assembly, of the size mentioned above, of the following:

- (1) Name of organization or organizations participating in the parade, demonstration or public assembly.
- (2) Name of person or persons accepting responsibility for the conduct of the parade, demonstration or public assembly.
- (3) Number of individuals expected to take part in the parade, demonstration or assembly.
- (4) Proposed route of parade or demonstration or location of assembly.
- (5) Time of parade, demonstration or public assembly.

"6. Nothing in the foregoing is intended to impair the exercise of the democratic privilege of public assembly, provided such parade, assembly or public demonstration is conducted in an orderly manner and does not conflict with activities, traffic, health and safety of the Occupation Forces.

"7. In case the proposed assembly or parade conflicts with Occupation Force projects, you will be promptly notified. In the absence of such notification, you may assume that there is no conflict and that no further coordination with Occupation Forces is necessary."

SCAP Memorandum for the Imperial Japanese Government, AG 014.12 (16 Jan 46)CG (SCAPIN 605), dated 16 January 1946, subject: "Armament of Police Forces in Japan", provides that the Japanese Civil Police are authorized to carry pistols in the performance of their duties, as deemed necessary by the Japanese Government, subject to the provision that the total number of pistols available to the Japanese Civil Police Force shall not exceed the strength of the Japanese Civil Police Force authorized by SCAP.


4. All Japanese Civil Police authorized to carry pistols will have in their possession, at all times when authorized to carry such pistols, a certificate properly filled out and authenticated. The form of this certificate shall be as shown by Inclosure #1.

5. It shall be the responsibility of Military Government to supervise the operations of each Prefectural Police Department in:

- a. Promptly and properly issuing said certificate.
- b. Maintaining appropriate and adequate records and rosters, listing each certificate issued and showing to whom it was issued, and describing the pistol covered thereby.
- c. Maintaining an adequate system for retiring said certificates when the holder thereof is no longer authorized to carry a pistol, and for insuring that police only have such certificates in their possession when authorized to carry firearms in the performance of their duties. (BA)

CIVILIAN MOTOR VEHICLES

Memorandum 73/1, this headquarters, subject as above, dated 25 July 1947, is rescinded, and the following substituted therefor:

"2. Operator permits:

a. Motor Vehicle Operator's Permit, WD AGO Form 9-74 (old GO Form 7360), will be issued by the Area Provost Marshal, and will be in the possession of each driver, military or civilian, when driving a privately owned motor vehicle. The following are eligible to receive operator's permits:

- (1) Military Personnel.
- (2) D. A. Civilians.
- (3) Dependents of 1 & 2, above, who have attained the age of 18 years.
- (4) Dependents of 1 & 2, above, between the ages of 14 and 17 years inclusive, upon presentation of a statement signed by parents or guardians, requesting the issue and stating that the minor concerned is proficient and responsible in the operation of a motor vehicle and that the parents or guardians will assume full responsibility in case of accident or violation of traffic regulations on the part of the minor driver. Under no circumstances will permits be issued to persons under 14 years of age.
- (5) Servants of persons operating privately owned motor vehicles may be issued O.G. Form 7360 (Motor Vehicle Operator's Permit) upon presentation of a statement signed by the vehicle owner requesting the issue and stating that the owner will assume full responsibility in case of accident or violation of traffic regulations on the part of the servant driver and that the servant driver has satisfactorily completed the driver's examination as prescribed in WD AGO PTT-565.



Memo No 73/1, Hq I Corps, dtd 8 Jan. 1948, subj: Civilian Motor Vehicles.

b. Motor Vehicle Operator's Permits will be issued to United States personnel under the following conditions:


- (1) Upon presentation of a current operator's permit issued by any state, territory of the United States or by the District of Columbia.
- (2) Successful completion of examination prescribed for motor vehicle operators in WD AGO DPT-565, modified by the deletion of the physical aptitude portion and such other portions as are not deemed applicable, except that the examination will ascertain that the applicant has reasonable vision and hearing to assure safe driving.
- (3) O.C. Form 7360 may be issued to operators of privately owned vehicles who have passed the complete examination prescribed in WD AGO DPT-565. Operators who have completed the modified examination may be issued O.C. Form 7360, but indication will be made thereon that the driver is not authorized to operate military or naval vehicles.

c. Permits may be suspended or revoked by the Area Provost Marshal when such action is warranted. A driver who is not in possession of his faculties, especially in regard to sobriety, will not be permitted to operate a vehicle.


