### ORANGE CROP SHORT

Walter Richardson of 911 East Broadway, who informed the Evening News a few weeks ago that the navel orange crop in Glendale and vicinity was only about 40 per cent of normal, says this has been confirmed by more than one authority recently. He says the Valencia crop shows some shortage, but not very much and the fruit is not as large as usual. The same can be said of grapefruit. Tangerines are being grown more and more each

year in Glendale and vicinity and are becoming quite common in the markets and fruit stands. Mr. Richardson declares that not enough care is given to citrus trees to insure regular and abundant crops. He contends and says he is upheld by large growers that the trees should be fertilized once a year and irrigated once a month regularly. He places great stress on regular irrigation. Trees should be pruned as needed and kept free from scale to insure greatest production.

## AMERICAN NEGRO

REV. HAMPTON HAWES TELLS OF NEEDS AND CONDITIONS OF HIS RACE

The Sunday School room of the Presbyterian Church was filled to its utmost Wednesday when Rev. Hampton Hawes of the Westminster Colored Church of Los Angeles spoke at the last meeting of the School of Missions. Rev. W. E. Edmonds conducted the regular prayer meeting at 7:30 and at 8:30 Rev. Hawes took charge speaking on "My People," and in a very interesting and instructive manner placed before his hearers the needs and conditions of his race. He said there were over 12,000,000 negroes with no schools to attend and startled his hearers with the remark that during the war when colored troops were examined it was found that 90 per cent were illiterate and could not write their names. Before receiving their checks, however, they were forced to learn to sign their names and at the close of the war nearly every one expressed a desire to secure an education, proving by several illustrations that the negro is anxious for an education, in many cases more so than people of other races. He made the remark that if the negro was good enough to fight for us he should be good enough to vote with us. Rev. Hawes is American born and gives the Presbyterian Church credit for his education and as he expresses it is "a product of the Presbyterian Church." He impressed his hearers with the imperative need for more schools, churches and better paid ministers, as well as better traveling facilities for his race and closed with an urgent appeal on behalf of the colored people in our land. Following his address the girls of the Westminster Sunday school served punch and wafers and a happy social hour was enjoyed. This meeting closes the School of Missions which has been in session for the past five weeks following the regular prayer meeting. During the evening Mr. Quall rendered a cornet solo.

## THE OLD GOSPEL

EVANGELIST ROOT DENIES RECONSTRUCTION IS NEEDED FOR MODERN LIFE

Notwithstanding stormy weather, the attendance on the evangelistic services at the Christian Church is still very good. The subject Thursday night was: "Do we need a new gospel for this age?" The speaker said:

"Reconstruction, and 'the new order of things' are terms heard frequently since the war, but does the gospel need reconstructing? No; Jesus is the same He always was. His terms of atonement are the same, His plan of salvation the same, and the power of His gospel is as strong as ever. The same standard of Christian living still prevails and the world demands it of the church. Fads and fancies please for a time, but the people demand of the ministry that it preach the same pure gospel that the apostles presented. We do not need a new gospel, but we need a ministry on fire with zeal in presenting the old gospel which 'is the power of God unto salvation for all that believe'."

## PROFITEERS STILL DEFIANT

It has become grim war between the potato profiteers, of whom the chief is George Shima, a Jap, and the consumers and so far the profiteers have not given an inch. On the contrary they have defiantly raised the wholesale price in the last few days so that in many places the best potatoes have to sell for ten cents a pound. The refineries have advanced the wholesale price of sugar a cent a pound recently also, and another government inquiry has been ordered. So far such inquiries have invariably been followed by further raises in price. Glendale dealers are holding their retail prices at the very lowest possible figures, in most cases these being slightly above the wholesale prices.

## SMOKELESS SCHOOL

PORTLAND, Ore., March 26.—Smoking means suspension at the Benson Polytechnic school here. Superintendent C. E. Cleveland is determined to keep the institution smokeless, so far as tobacco is concerned. Four youths who smoked on the school grounds have been suspended. Cleveland himself doesn't use tobacco.

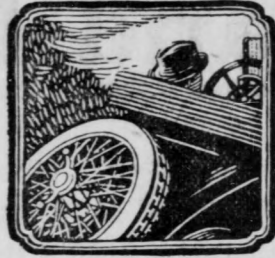

**SAYS IS "FIRED"**

DR. FAY C. DAUGHERTY, MUCH-TALKED-OF MINISTER, WELL KNOWN IN GLENDALE

The recent action of Dr. Edgar Fay Daugherty, pastor of the First Christian Church of Los Angeles, in considering himself "fired" because the official board went over his head and granted a church letter to a retiring member after he had refused to do so on what he regarded as scriptural grounds, is attracting wide attention and comment, especially wherever the preacher is known. One of such places happens to be Glendale, where live two ministers who have been closely associated with Dr. Daugherty ever since he came to California from Vincennes, Ind.—Rev. Clifford A. Cole, 132 South Kenwood, pastor of Glendale Central Christian, and Rev. Arthur W. Higby, 715 North Louise, pastor of Broadway Christian church, Los Angeles. And Dr. Daugherty has been heard by many others of our city, as he delivered a very forceful address in the High School auditorium during the war, in advocacy of one of the great drives for funds. He says he has not the slightest animosity toward any member of the official board or the church, but that his action was a thoroughly conscientious one and in accordance with his practice ever since he has been in the ministry, as a protest against the laxness of churches in granting letters to members who are not worthy of the commendations which form a part of the made-to-order church letter.

**PAY TAXES IN GLENDALE**

Gentlemen:

At the suggestion of Supervisor Jonathan S. Dodge this office has arranged with City Manager Watson for the payment of taxes by the citizens of Glendale for a limited period of time, from April 15th to April 19th inclusive, at the office of City Treasurer J. S. Stauffacher in the Glendale City Hall, during the hours between nine and twelve a. m. and one and three p. m. Subsequent to the above dates payments must be made in the usual manner at the Los Angeles office.

Tax bills for properties within the City of Glendale only can be procured at this time and place, and these only by providing the deputies with a complete description of the properties for which the tax bills are desired. If possible the old tax bill should be brought. Payment may be made, however, upon any property in the county for which the taxpayer has in his possession tax bills for the current year's taxes. Persons tendering payment for the second installment of taxes should present the first installment receipts to be receipted for the final payment.

This arrangement is in the way of an experiment and it is hoped that the citizenry of your city will quite generally avail themselves of the opportunity of paying their taxes in their own home town, thus avoiding the congestion at the general tax office in Los Angeles, as well as working to the advantage of the county service. The success or failure of the plan depends upon two things: (1) adequate publicity given to the plan by the local papers of the City of Glendale, which undoubtedly will receive your very hearty co-operation; (2) whether the citizens will avail themselves of this opportunity in sufficient numbers to justify the continuance of the plan in future years.

**EDUCATION TO BE FORCED**

Figures obtained in the draft show that one in twenty of the young men called upon to serve in the war could not read or write. They showed that this state was in a less enviable position than those eight states where there are compulsory educational laws.

After July 1 of this year California will come under the provisions of the new part-time compulsory educational law, a measure designed to force at least the rudiments of an education upon the youth of the state.

Under the provisions of the measure every high school at which there was an attendance of fifty or more students during the school year 1919-1920 is required to establish and maintain part-time classes for all persons between the ages of 16 and 19, in 1920, and between 16 and 18, in 1921, who live within three miles of the school. The classes are to be held between the hours of 8 a. m. and 6 p. m. and must provide suitable instruction for the various individuals who apply. All persons of the ages mentioned are required to attend these classes for at least four sixty-minute hours each week for a period of thirty-six weeks. Persons who are employed must obtain from the principal of the high school a permit to work. The parent or guardian who fails to send such pupils to these classes becomes a violator of the law and is punishable by a fine or imprisonment or both. Any firm or person employing such pupil who has not a permit to work is subject to a fine or imprisonment or both.

The administration of the new plan is to confront the school authorities with a new problem. The state board of education has already called a conference of representatives from all parts of the state, and classes are to be opened to instruct the teachers who are most fitted for the work. It is estimated that 95,000 pupils will be reached in 1920.

with a felony can demand a separate trial. It has been the object of the I. W. W. to block the wheels of progress as much as possible and by demanding separate trials make the prosecution cover months.

"If we are successful in convicting the organization and this jury finds that it is an unlawful organization, then any man that belongs to the organization and carries an I. W. W. card will be liable to arrest even without committing any overt act such as burning a haystack or putting phosphorus in a mill, driving spikes into logs that go through mills thus destroying machinery, or sticking thumb nails in oranges when working in an orange orchard, or driving copper tacks into the trees. All those are overt acts.

"The witnesses who have been testifying, John Dymond and Elbert Coutts, are ex-members of the I. W. W. organization who have finally seen the light and are now testifying for the state, and not only in this trial. They have also testified at Stockton, Fresno and Oakland. They were what is known as 'sabcats,' a term they applied to members who committed these depredations. If a man committed one act they said: 'The sabcat has a kitten.' If he committed a series of acts they described them as 'kittens.' They were also known as 'black cats' and 'sabateurs.'"

When asked if the men testifying were not putting themselves in great personal jeopardy, Mr. McLaren smiled and said: "No more so than any of the rest of the people connected with the trial. The I. W. W. do not like me and have said that I am employed by the interests—by the merchants' or manufacturers' associations; but that is not true. I have never been employed except as an officer of the law.

"I consider that the I. W. W.s have been a very serious menace, particularly in Southern California during the past year because they have been spreading propaganda and sending delegates here to preach their doctrines in a very quiet way and getting into their organization all the men at all inclined to sympathize with their beliefs. When a man once gets in and has paid his dues, he is very apt to follow the teaching. They are not now preaching as much from the soap box as they did, because the authorities are looking after them closely, but they are working under cover more, in parlors and homes, which is more

dangerous. On the streets at night they get hold of the dissatisfied.

"At the present time they are preaching the soviet form of government, claiming it is the only true form of government. They have no morals; they believe to a large extent in free love and a great many of them never marry the women they live with.

"The penalty, when convicted under criminal syndicalism, is only 2 to 14 years in the penitentiary. I do not think it is enough, and believe the government will have to be more drastic. When an alien is

convicted of some overt act of criminal syndicalism he can be deported by the government, but for our native citizens there is only the penitentiary punishment.

You know the government stands a lot before it takes action, but when once it starts it never lets up. Then there must be some overt act before the government takes up the matter. I have now under observation a number of people whom I believe to be as bad as some who have been deported, but they have been wise enough to keep out of the clutches of the law and the only thing to do

is to wait until they overstep and then gather them in."

According to Mr. McLaren the I. W. W. welcomes all the Ishmaels of the world. It establishes camps practically under the walls of our state prisons and grabs the prisoners as they are liberated before any sane or good outside influence can get hold of them. It is the Mephistopheles of the century and at the same time is the futile protest against organized society of the weaklings too lazy to work who would rob both capital and labor of their honest earnings.



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
