

OUT OF THEIR PLACE.

WILL LEARN CHINESE

Belgian Writer Declares That Women Ruin Business.

Englishmen Preparing to Invade the Celestial Empire.

Realize That the Very Commercial Life of England Depends on Ability to Hold the Trade of Future.

One of the results of the troubles in China is the formation in London of classes for the study of the Chinese language. These are promoted by the China association, which has begun work successfully. It is hoped that the effort will devolve into a large scheme, probably in connection with the University of London.

Hitherto it has been almost impossible to learn Chinese thoroughly in this country, owing to the small supply of Chinese teachers. There are no such instructors save the few already employed by the China association.

"The merest common sense would teach one," says the London Globe, "that, when the trade of the vast Chinese empire is fully at the disposal of the merchants of the world, the country whose agents are not able to communicate with the people in their native tongue will be at a terrible disadvantage. To England it will be a matter of life and death that her commercial travelers should be able to speak Chinese."

Paris and Berlin correspondents announce the formation at the French and German capitals of classes in the consular services of the two countries. Russia has a decided advantage in this respect, as most of her representatives in China speak the vernacular and were selected on that principle.

LIVES IN MAGNIFICENT STYLE

Vast Personal Expenditures of the Head of Defunct Globe Corporation.

Few millionaires in England or other countries live in such princely style as Whitaker Wright, the moving spirit in the collapsed London and Globe group. In London he has a miniature palace, in Park lane, in the drawing-room of which is a copy of the famous cabinet Du Roi of Louis XV. It took three years to complete, and cost many thousand pounds. At Godalming he owns a country seat worthy of Monte Cristo, which 600 workmen are now engaged in beautifying. It contains costly fountains and statuary brought from Italy. Wright's stables alone cost a small fortune. They have upholstered oak and leather settees and polished gun-metal fittings, while valuable paintings and bas-reliefs adorn the stalls. His private yacht is fitted up with sumptuous luxuriance. Everything he owned had to be of the best. To gratify this desire there was no stint in expenditure.

Want the United States Congress to Act on Constitution This Session.

Home-Discipline Society Organized to Oppose White Caps at Whiting, Ind.

The H. D. S., or the Home Discipline society, has just been instituted in Whiting, Ind., as an offset to the threatening letters received from the white caps by citizens who are notorious for making their homes miserable. Wife-beating has increased so much that it has become almost an epidemic, and there is talk of reviving the whipping post.

The members of the H. D. S. argue that they have scriptural and ancient authority for castigating their wives and children whenever they deserve castigation, no matter how they annoy the neighborhood. One member of the society has cut three gashes in the head of his three-month-old infant, and denuded his wife of a handsome head of hair by pulling it out by the roots, and has escaped arrest as his wife fears to appear against him. Drastic measures will be taken according to the threatening letters if the H. D. S. continues its tactics.

BELIEVE IN WIFE-BEATING.

Home-Discipline Society Organized to Oppose White Caps at Whiting, Ind.

Dr. Horatio Rubens, one of the commissioners appointed by the war department to revise the Cuban code, has arrived in Washington after many months' absence in Havana. According to Dr. Rubens, it is the hope of the Cuban constitution-makers that they will complete their work in time for the United States congress to act upon the constitution during the present session. If it shall appear conclusively that there is no hope of obtaining this last result, then the work of the convention probably will proceed with more deliberation.

The most difficult problem which yet remains to be solved, according to Dr. Rubens, is that of suffrage. The leaders seem to be pretty closely divided between the two broad propositions of absolute free suffrage and restrictions based on educational and property qualifications.

COXEY TO ESTABLISH COLONY

Scandinavian Quarry Workmen to Have a Government of Their Own.

"Gen." J. S. Coxe, the famous commonweaver, has brought 35 Scandinavians to Masillon, O., from Castle Garden and will provide them with employment in his quarries north of that place and homes in the vicinity.

The foreigners will live apart from the other workmen, will have a government of their own formed in accordance with Coxe's idea and will be given every opportunity to improve themselves. Coxe intends to establish schools for their children.

The commonweaver declares he was forced to adopt this plan by his failure to secure a sufficient number of workmen to operate his quarries. It is an experiment, and if successful he says he will found other colonies.

JEWELS DISAPPEAR.
