



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PREFACE.

It is with considerable diffidence that the family annals which compose the following pages are offered to the public. Beginning, about four years ago; with an attempt to trace, for his own satisfaction, a single branch of the family, the author has been induced, by his own increasing interest and the encouragement of others, to extend his labors to their present form. Although he has spared no efforts to secure accuracy and completeness, he has, nevertheless, labored under the disadvantages of limited time, entire inexperience in such matters, and negligence on the part of too many of those to whom he has applied for information.

To the gentlemen who have furnished portraits for this volume, and to all who have given their assistance in collecting the necessary statistics, the author respectfully presents his grateful acknowledgments.

EXPLANATION.

The families are arranged according to their respective numbers, and the number of each family is found directly before the name of its head. The same number is also printed in BOLD figures after the name of the head of the family, as it occurs in the list of his father's children.

As the numbers, in both cases, are arranged consecutively, any family or name, whose number is known, can easily be found.

The principal Abbreviations are:—b., born; m., married; d., died; unm., unmarried; s. p. (sine prole), without issue; dau., daughter; chil., children; rem., removed; res., resides or resided.

Those towns whose location is not indicated by the context, will be understood to be in Massachusetts.

THE CLARKS OF NEW ENGLAND.

The name of CLARK, in its various forms of Clark, Clarke, Clerk, Clerke, etc., is one of great antiquity, having probably been in use in Great Britain, as early as the eleventh century. Like all names which are derived from an occupation or employment, it was given to very many individuals whose families were entirely distinct.

In the fifty years succeeding the landing of the Pilgrims at Plymouth, many persons of the name of Clark left England and her sister isles for the New World. Some of these, like Richard Clarke, a passenger in the "Mayflower," left no children, but it was the good fortune of others to found families whose piety, intelligence, and ability have given to the name an honorable position in New England's history.

This book is properly restricted to the descendants of one of these immigrants, *Hugh Clark*, of Watertown, but it may not be irrelevant to begin with a brief sketch of the principal families of the name of Clark, which are now found in New England.

Of these families the most numerous is that which is settled in the valley of the Connecticut, from Bellows' Falls to Hartford, especially in Northampton and vicinity. Branches of this family are also found in Berkshire Co., and in the State of New York. Its ancestor in this country was Lieut. WILLIAM CLARK, who came from England in the ship "Mary and John," leaving Plymouth, England, March 30,

1630, and landing at Nantucket, now Hull, the 30th of the following May. He first settled in Dorchester, Mass., but removed to Northampton in the year 1657.

In 1857 Lewis H. Clark, of Sodus, N. Y., published a genealogical account of one branch of this family, descended from David Clark, of Northampton. Rev. Josiah Clark, of Northampton, is now collecting materials for a history of the descendants of Lieut. William Clark, and will be glad to avail himself of whatever information any member of the family may feel able and disposed to communicate.

There is a large family of Clarkes in the counties of Plymouth and Barnstable, Mass., descendants of THOMAS CLARKE, who came over in the "Ann," in 1623, and is supposed to have been the mate of the "Mayflower." This is an extensive family, and branches of it are found in all parts of New England. Its members usually spell their name with the final e.

Mr. Samuel C. Clarke, of Newport, R. I., is preparing a genealogy of this family, and any information relating to it will be gratefully received by him.

These three brothers, Carew, John, and Joseph, were among the first settlers of Rhode Island, and were all prominent men. From them are descended most of the Clarks of Rhode Island, many of whom have occupied high positions. Clarksburg, Mass., and Clarksville, Madison Co., N. Y., were settled by branches of this family.

The greater part of the many Clarks in Connecticut are descended from Capt. DANIEL CLARK, one of the first settlers of Windsor, Conn. He came from Chester, England, about 1640, with his uncle, Rev. Ephraim Huet. He was one of the leading men of Conn. for many years.

In Nath'l Goodwin's "Genealogical Notes," there is a sketch of this family. Miss Ann Clark, late of Northampton, was a descendant of Samuel Clark, the son of Capt. Daniel Clark, and compiled an account of this branch of the family, which has never been printed.

Dr. JOHN CLARKE, a celebrated physician of Boston, came from Newbury, Mass., about 1638. He married Martha Saltonstall, sister of Sir Richard Saltonstall; who died Sept. 19, 1680. He died Nov. 1664, ae. 66, leaving two children, John, whose family is given below, and Jemima, who married Robert Drew, of Boston.

His posterity, although comparatively few, have been highly distinguished. His grandsons, John and William, are buried in Copp's Hill burial ground, and their gravestones bear the much-abused coat-of-arms which is given in Bridgman's works, and elsewhere.

Mr. John Clarke Merriam, of Boston, a member of this family, has collected many dates and facts relating to it.

Scattered through the counties of Middlesex and Worcester and the south-western part of New Hampshire, we find a large family of Clarks, whose ancestor was SAMUEL CLARK, who was in Concord, Mass., about 1680.

In the History of Sherborn and Holliston, Rev. Abner Morse gives a sketch of one branch of this family, and states that its ancestor, Samuel, was the son of *Arthur*. On the other hand, in Savage's Geneal. Dictionary, he is said to have been the son of *Jonas*, of Cambridge. Neither of these statements is reliable.

Rev. George Faber Clark, of Stow, Mass., is engaged upon a history of this family, and would be happy to hear from any of its members.

There is another numerous and respectable family in the southern part of New Hampshire, descended from ROBERT CLARK, of Londonderry. He was a member of the Scotch colony in Londonderry, Ireland, and came to America, with several others, about 1725. They settled in Londonderry, N. H., which had previously been colonized by emigrants from the same place. In the histories of Londonderry and New Boston, N. H., full particulars of some branches of this family are given.

About the year 1718, JOHN CLARK came from Ireland with his sons, Matthew, Thomas, John, William, Samuel, James, George, and his daughters Sarah and Elizabeth.

Matthew and George settled in Colrain, Mass., and had families; their descendants are still living in the counties of Franklin and Berkshire, Mass. John went to Susquehanna, Pa.

This family was of Scotch origin, and it is not improbable that it was connected with the last mentioned family. In the year 1837, Miss Sarah Robinson, of Bennington, Vt., published a genealogical pamphlet containing a sketch of the descendants of Matthew Clark, from which the following facts are taken:

HUGH CLARK,

AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

Of the native place of our ancestor, HUGH CLARK, or the time of his emigration to America, we have no certain knowledge. He was born, according to his own testimony, about 1613, and the first mention of him, in this country, occurs in the town records of Watertown, at the time of the birth of his eldest son, John, in 1641. His wife's name was ELIZABETH, and he probably married her before coming to New England.

He lived in Watertown about twenty years, and here his three children were born. In legal documents he is called a "husbandman," and there is no evidence that he ever held any important offices, although his admission as a freeman,

Note. The coat of arms which is represented on the cover of this book is known to have been in the possession of Hobart and Samuel Clark about 1800. These were sons of Rev. Peter Clark, and gr. gr. sons of Hugh Clark. It is also in use at the present time in other our right to it. May 30, 1660, and to the Artillery Co. 1666, prove him to have held a respectable position. In 1666 he was appointed appraiser of the estate of Robert Hawes, of Roxbury, and it is from his signature attached to the inventory of this estate that the fac-simile here given, is copied. Of course the Honly, was written by him.

About the year 1660 he removed to Roxbury, and remained in that town or its vicinity until his death, which occurred in Roxbury, July 20, 1693. His wife died Dec. 11, 1692.

2. JOHN CLARK m. ABIGAIL ———, who died Jan. 2, 1682. He m. (2d) Dec. 18, 1684, ELIZABETH NORMAN, of Boston. He received from his father, Hugh Clark, in 1681, sixty-seven acres of land in Newton, then called New Cambridge, and moved thither from Roxbury the same year. This land was situated in Newton Centre, near the present site of the Baptist Theological Seminary, and his house was near Lyman St. His nearest neighbor was Joseph Bartlett. Adjoining their two estates there was a piece of land which was claimed by Bartlett, although Hugh Clark asserted that he had bought it of Thomas Woolson, a statement which has since been verified. As early as 1673 Bartlett attempted to build a house upon this land, but it was pulled down before completion, by Clark. One of the witnesses afterward testied that Clark said at this time, "yt he wd pull downe

houses as faste as ye af^{sd} Bartlett c^d putt them up." For this offence he was sued by Bartlett, and compelled to pay damages to the extent of £1, 14s., his father being surety for its

payment.

About 1688 he built at the Upper Falls a saw-mill, being the first to erect a mill on Charles river, within the limits of Newton. His homestead was afterward conveyed by his widow to her brother, William Norman, of Boston. He died in Newton, 1695. His will was proved March 25, 1695. It reads as follows:

In the name of God &c I John Clark of newtowne in the County of middellsex being under the afflicting hand of God by reson of sore sickness butt of perfect mind and memory praysed be God for it doe make and ordain this my Last will and testament In forme and manner folowing, that is to say first and prinseply I commend my soule into the hands of allmighty God hoping through the merit Death and pasion of my saviour Jesus Crist to have full and free pardon and forgiueness of all my sins and to Inherit euerlasting Life, and my body I commit to the earth to be decently buryed att the discression of my executors and executorrix hear after named, and as touching the disposing of such temporall estate as hath pleas'd God to bestow upon me I do giue and dispose thereof in maner folowing

first I will that my debts and funerall chargies shall be payed and discharg'd In maner following, that is to say I will that my tew sons John and william shall have and Injoy all my Lands att the River with y' is done upon it towards the saw mill, and all my meddow land lying near John Daniells, and thirty pounds in mony which will be to be payed in this spring where it is due by bils binding them to pay what

is yet behind as to yo purchas of the land att the Riuer.

secondly I will that my other debts and funerall chargies shall be payed out of my mouabell estate the rest and Residew of my estate to Remain in the hands of my executors and executorrix to bring up my small children untill the youngest of them shall com to the aige of fourteen years except any of my daughters should marry before which if they do then they shall have five pounds apese payed them as they shall marry and fifteen pounds apese when the youngest child shall com to fourteen year of aige.

thirdly I do give unto my deer and Louing wife all the Income of the rest and residew of my estate both housing and Lands and chattels what so euer dewring her naturall life except she should marry agine which if shee doe I giue unto her thirty pounds to be payed by my executors.

forthly I will that if my deer and Louing wife should be with child and have a sone ythen he shall Inherit all my housing and Lands after the death of or marriage of my deare and Louing wife paying to every one of my daughters twenty pounds apese, but if shee should bear a femall she shall be made equall with the rest of my daughters and the Remainder of my estate what socuer to goe to my tew sons John and william my executors with their mother my deare and Louing wife my executorrix to this my Last will and testament, and I doe hereby disannull and make uoide all former wills and testaments what soeuer.

In witness whearof I have hearunto sett my hand and seall this third day of January in the year of our Lord one thousand six hundred ninty foure and fine. So Rn Pass

He was admitted freeman in Roxbury, May 7, 1685. Mar. 20, 1693, he bought of John Nevinson, for £260, a house and a hundred acres of land in Watertown, and soon after moved with his family to Wat. This estate was at "King's Common," and his house stood on Mount Pleasant, near Clark St. in the present village of Belmont. He was a selectman of Wat. 1699 and 1700.

He died in Watertown, July 26, 1721, and was buried in the old gravevard near Mount Auburn.

Although as a pastor, Mr. Clark was faithful and devoted, his industry and application to his studies was so great that he became widely celebrated as one of the most learned theologians of New England. His reputation was such that he was frequently called upon to decide difficult questions, or to give his advice, and from his decision there was no appeal.

As a controversialist he was no less distinguished. In 1758 he had a long controversy with Rev. Samuel Webster, of Salisbury, Mass., on the subject of original sin. In this dispute both parties displayed great ability and learning, and much interest was manifested by the friends of each, and by the scholars of the day. He was chosen to preach the election sermon 1736; convention sermon 1745, and Dudleian lecture 1763. Several of his sermons and argumentative writings were published.

In his family, Mr. Clark was honored and beloved. The respect and obedience which he demanded from his children were readily given to one who united to the duties of a father those of a loving counsellor, and an affectionate and sympathizing friend. The obituary given below shows in what estimation he was held by his cotemporaries.

Mrs. Clark was an only child, and was known as "the heiress." Her strength of character and amiability of disposition well fitted her for the position in which she was placed. Soon after her marriage, her father, Dea. Peter Hobart, of Braintree, removed to Danvers, and lived near his daughter until his death, June 14, 1751, ac. 77. She frequently

enjoined upon her children that each must have among his children a *Peter* and a *Deborah*. How faithfully she was obeyed, the following pages will prove.

[From the Boston Chronicle of June 20th, 1768.]

To draw a compleat portrait of so eminent a divine, so accomplished a Christian as Mr. Clark is not easy. The strength of whose intellectual capacities, the extent of whose knowledge and his attainments in the divine life, are better conceived of by those who have had the happiness of an intimate acquaintance with him, than easily expressed.

Some out-lines of his character are as follows, viz:

He was born of worthy parents, in the year 1693. He early discovered an uncommon disposition to piety and devotion. He was early initiated in academical learning, having his education at Harrard college in Cambridge, where he commenced Bachelor of Arts in 1712, and Master of Arts in 1715. His thirst after knowledge and close application to the various branches of literature, laid a proper foundation for the study of divinity. He early devoted himself to the service of God in the gospel ministry, for which he was eminently formed. It pleased the Father of light to enrich him with many excellent gifts and graces, which upon his first appearance as a preacher, began to shine forth to the world. He was applied to from various parts of New England to settle with them in the ministry, but by the earnest invitation of the first parish in this town (then called Salem Village) he was prevailed upon to relinquish all other worldly prospects, and to take on him the pastoral charge of this church and congregation, to which he was ordained on June 5th, 1717. This day compleating 51 years: where he has continued beloved and esteemed by all good men to his dying day.

As a divine he was learned, pious and orthodox, well acquainted with all the branches of theology. He had a peculiar faculty in controversial and polemical divinity, and accordingly was applied to when occasion required, and the world has been favored with divers of his writings on controverted, but important subjects.

As a preacher, he was fervent, painful and laborious. His public discourses were calculated to enlighten the understanding, convince the judgement, and then to move the passions of his hearers. His many excellent printed sermons are full proof thereof.

His fervent desires of doing good while he lived carried him to an excess not to be imitated, or indeed commended. Many a time under

the increasing infirmities of the latter part of his life, he has wasted his strength, exhausted his animal spirits and swooned away in his pulpit.

In private life, as a friend, he was open hearted and sincere; as a companion, pleasant and engaging; as a father, tender and affectionate: and as a husband, endearing and kind. He had an heart ever ready, ever open to relieve the wants and necessities of mankind, and to do good as far as he was able to all that sought his assistance in temporal as well as spiritual matters. To the poor he was a liberal benefactor, and besides the charities he dispensed in his life-time, which will never be known to the world, he has left at his death a valuable legacy (in proportion to his estate) to the poor of the parish where he lived. He delighted to promote harmony among divided Christians; and was much made use of to this end. Being of no party spirit, he dearly loved good men of every denomination.

Being deprived of the pleasures of social life in a great measure, by an uncommon degree of deatness, he was led more into retirement, and to take greater pleasure in his study; and perhaps an habitual course of private meditations strengthened the faculties of his mind, and enlarged his understanding of divine things. This infirmity however was very grievous to his friends, whom it deprived of much profitable conversation they might otherwise have enjoyed.

Under his last confinement, which was of several months' continuance, he exhibited the most exemplary patience, humility and resignation to the divine will; and had it pleased the allwise God to have favoured him with the free and uninterrupted use of his reasoning powers, he would doubtless in his last moments have exhibited that joyful hope and humble confidence, thro' the merits of the Redeemer. of a future glorious unortality, which the general tenor of his life laid a foundation for.

His death is a loss not only to the people of his charge, but to the town and country in general. Besides a bereaved flock he has left five sons, and three daughters, with their numerous offspring, to deplore his loss.

His remains were interred last evening with becoming respect and decency, the ministers and gentlemen from the neighboring towns, and a great concourse of people attending the solemnity of his funeral.

The following epitaph is inscribed upon his tombstone in the old graveyard at Danvers:

Here lie intombed the Remains of The Revd. Peter Clark

For almost 51 years the Painful, Laborious and Faithful Pastor of the first Church in this town.

He was a Great Divine, well established in the orthodox Doctrines of the Gospel.

His writings on many important subjects will Transmit His name with Honour to Posterity.

An accomplished Christian: well experienced in all the Graces of the Divine Life.

The most exemplary Patience, Humility and Meekness were illustriously Displayed in his character as a Christian.

He was born March 12, 1693. Graduated at *Harvard College* in Cambridge in 1712. Ordained Pastor of the first church in this Town June 5, 1717.

He lived much esteemed and respected by men of learning and Piety and after a long life spent in the service of Religion, He died much lamented on June 10, 1768,

Mr. Clark was a man of strong character, and his reputation for ability and integrity gave him great influence in town and church affairs. He was selectman of Newton 1746, 47, 58, and Representative 1758, 59, and 1760. His house at Waltham stood on the present site of the Central House, and his estate of 112 acres included a large part of the most valuable land in Waltham.

Soon after the close of the French and Indian war he had occasion to visit Maine, and was so much pleased with the valley of the Kennebec that on his return he obtained from the Plymouth company a grant of land at the head of tide water, where the city of Hallowell is now located. In the spring of 1762 he embarked for Maine with nearly all the members of his family, a great variety of cattle, horses, &c., and the frames of two houses, with the workmen who were to erect them. He reached his settlement May 3, 1762, and on that day laid the foundation of the beautiful city of Hallowell. From this time until his death he was one of the most influential men in that part of the State, and took a leading part in the incorporation of Hallowell, and its subsequent improvement.

He died Jan. 1782, universally respected and beloved. His wife died a short time previous.

28. Rev. WILLIAM CLARK grad at Harvard College, 1759. In the summer of 1776 he was invited to preach at Dedham, and officiated there about a year. In Oct. 1768 he went to England, was ordained Dec. 21, 1768, by Rt. Rev. Dr. Terrick, Bishop of London, and returned to Dedham, June 1769. At the commencement of the Revolution he incurred the wrath of the citizens of Dedham and vicinity by his partiality for the Church and institutions of England, and by assisting two noted tories in making their escape.

Naturally quiet and retiring, Mr. Clark carefully avoided any interference in political affairs, but one with his sympathies could not hope to avoid the popular excitement. In the summer of 1777 he was seized and carried to Boston, and there closely imprisoned for ten weeks. By this treatment his health was permanently impaired, and he never fully recovered his hearing or his sight. He at length obtained from the General Court permission to return to Dedham, but was confined within one mile of his house under bonds of five hundred pounds. In December 1778 he again petitioned the General Court, and was allowed to leave New England. Accordingly

he sailed for England, and reached London Feb. 1779. He remained in London about fourteen years, and was granted a pension by the British government. On his return he tarried several years in Digby, Nova Scotia.

The last years of his life were passed in Quincy, Mass. Here, supported by a pension from the government to which he had remained faithful, he was enabled to enjoy the valuable library upon which he had bestowed so much care, and to devote himself to the scholarly pursuits which accorded with his natural tastes. He died in Quincy, Nov. 4, 1815.

Mr. Clark was distinguished for his zeal and fidelity as a preacher, and for the ability and sound logic which his sermons displayed. His small salary being entirely inadequate to the maintenance of his large family, he carried on a farm of considerable size, performing all the labor himself, yet his industry and his devotion to his pastoral duties were unceasing.

Living at a time when the office of a clergyman was made peculiarly responsible by the dangers and difficulties of the Revolution, his pen and his tongue were never wanting in support of his country's cause. His house was a favorite resort for the patriots of the day. Here John Hancock, Samuel Adams, and their friends, found a safe retreat, where they could, in security, form those plans which were to save their country, and gain new courage and wisdom from the connsels of their host. At the battle of Lexington his house was thrown open, and the wounded and dying were placed under the care of his family.

In later days, when the patriotic labors of such men as Mr. Clark had secured liberty and prosperity to their native land, the places of the old statesmen were filled by younger men, the ministers of the adjoining towns, or the students from the neighboring divinity school, who found in the venerable minister a wise counsellor and a trusted friend. He died in Lexington, Nov. 15, 1805. His wife died Apr. 6, 1789.

48. BENJAMIN CLARK settled in Bethel, Maine. He was taken prisoner, Aug. 3, 1781, by a party of Indians from Canada, who captured at the same time Jonathan Clark, his cousin, Eleazer Twichell and Nathaniel Seger. They were taken by the Indians to their settlement in Canada, which they reached after a painful march of fourteen days. Arriving there, they were met by British officers who gave for them a bounty of eight dollars each. According to Seger, who afterward published an account of his captivity, "Clark had completely taken the fancy of the Indians. They determined to make him their chief, and had already cut off his hair, painted him, and dressed him in an Indian dress." But they were not allowed to retain him.

They were then taken to Montreal, and lodged in the jail, where they were kept forty days, and suffered much from scanty rations, and from the vermin which infested their cells. From Montreal they were conveyed to an island of the St. Lawrence, about fifty miles above the city. Here they

remained until 1782 with one hundred and eighty others. In November 1782, Clark and his companions were released, and sailed for Boston. They landed at Castle William, Boston Harbor, and reached Dorchester the same evening. Seger says, "Benjamin Clark, my fellow prisoner and sufferer, and myself, went to Newton before we slept, to the great astonishment and joy of our friends and relatives. They had never heard a word from us since our capture in Bethel, until they saw our faces. We approached them as though we had risen from the dead. They could hardly believe their own eyes. It was indeed a joyful meeting, and we all rejoiced together with glad hearts. We tarried at Newton some time to refresh ourselves, and then returned to Bethel."

On his return to Bethel, he m. BETSEY MASON, of that town, who was born July 18, 1764, and died Jan. 30, 1846. He died Mar. 9, 1802.

Aug. 3, 1781, while he was working in the field with Nathaniel Seger and Eleazer Twichell, they were surprised and captured by a party of Indians from Canada. After taking them to Clark's house, and binding them, the savages proceeded to plunder the house, and to fasten their booty on the backs of their captives. Mrs. Clark, a woman of courage and resolution, hid her husband's watch in the ashes. When her necklace of gold beads was demanded, she boldly resisted, but one Indian stood over her with uplifted tomahawk, while another relieved her of her necklace and silver shoe buckles.

After thoroughly pillaging the house, the Indians set off upon their return to Canada, driving their prisoners before them, and instructing Mrs. Clark to remain in the house, if she valued her life.

At Shelburne, N. H., after three days' march, Clark was allowed to return, his captors probably deeming him too old to endure the long journey before them. Before reaching home he met another party of Indians, but contrived to avoid them.

He was engaged in the battle of Bennington, commanding a company of sixty men. In this battle he displayed great bravery, being the second to scale the British breastworks. He also took part in the defeat of Gen. Burgoyne, at Saratoga, 1777.

After the war he was elected to various town offices, being for many years town clerk, town treasurer, and selectman. He was justice of the peace from 1780 to 1820. In the year 1794 he was chosen representative to the N. H. legislature, and was reëlected to the same position for many successive years.

In politics he was a federalist. In religion he was a puritan. He entertained profound respect for the Scriptures, and was very regular in his devotions. He was a strict observer of the Sabbath. He was chosen deacon of the Cong. church in 1783, and retained the office until his death, although he voluntarily ceased to officiate some years before. He was a man of much influence in civil and religious matters, and, during the early part of his official life, was one of very few men in the town of his adoption who were regarded qualified to transact the business of the town.

He was very systematic. In accordance with the universal custom, he drank his daily drams. These were taken regularly at the appointed hours, each one measuring precisely quarter of a gill. He was temperate in all things, a characteristic which doubtless contributed to the prolonging of his life. He wore the ancient style of dress, including the breeches, the long stockings, and the knee and shoe buckles, and his head was adorned with the old fashioned cue. This costume he retained to his death. He died Oct. 14, 1826, ac. 83. His wife died Dec. 21, 1814, ac. 70.

The following sketch of the character of Mr. Clark has been furnished by one who knew him well:

The late John Clark, of Waltham, was the fifth of that name in regular descent, and it would perhaps be enough to say that he came worthily in a line of men so much respected, as shown by the offices of trust and responsibility which they successively held. The office of deacon in the only religious society then in Waltham, had been held by his wife's paternal ancestors for four successive generations. Mr. Clark's father was also deacon of the same society. Although repeatedly solicited, he would never himself be a candidate for that office, which he considered one of much importance and responsibility. He served the public for many years as selectman, assessor, and representative. He was a delegate to the constitutional convention of 1820, and was for a long time justice of the peace, and from his well known integrity, was called upon to give much of his time to the settlement of estates, and the care of property belonging to others. Governor Gore, who well knew him in the transaction of public business, used to call him "the honest man of Waltham."

Having in his early manhood been inclined to consumption, and never afterward being robust, his life was probably less active, and his retirement from public life earlier, than would otherwise have been necessary. As to his religion, he was for many years a regular and devout worshipper with the first society in Waltham, although the doctrines there taught were not always in accordance with his views. For the last fifteen years of his life he was a member of the Boston Society of the New Jerusalem.

OBITUARY.

Died in Waltham, April 2d, Mrs. Lydia Clark. Mrs. Clark was born in the same town, where she has always resided, January 8, 1769, and consequently lacked six days of being ninety-three years and

three mouths old at the time of her death. She was the oldest member of the Boston Society of the New Church, and we believe the oldest resident of her native town. She well remembered the battle in Lexington, the adjoining town to Waltham, which took place when she was six years old.

Mrs. Clark became a member of the Boston Society July 5th, 1835, at the same time with her husband, the late Mr. John Clark, and her youngest son. Five of her children had joined the same society previously. The five surviving children and eleven of her grandchildren, including all who are old enough to join it, are now members of the New Church; and all of her descendants, fifty-one in number, are within its pale and under its influence.

Mrs. Clark has been a diligent reader of Swedenborg, and of the periodicals of the church, and especially of the sacred scriptures, and was a constant attendant at the service of the church as long as her health permitted. She depended much on being present at the Communion, at the quarterly meetings of the society in Boston. The last of these occasions which she attended was that in October, 1861.

She retained her mental and bodily faculties to a remarkable degree till a few weeks before her death, when they gradually failed her, of which she was herself fully sensible. As she approached the close of her life, her state became more and more like that of a little child, till she passed quietly and peacefully away.

In 1824 he entered the wholesale dry goods business in Boston with Eliphalet Kimball, and subsequently with Lora B. Bacon, but being unsuccessful in this, and receiving an offer of the agency of the Merrimac Manufacturing Company at Lowell, he accepted the situation and removed to that city in 1830. This position he held for fourteen years, discharging its many and responsible duties in a highly efficient and acceptable manner; and on his resignation of the office, the overseers

of the several mills united in a letter expressing to him their warm appreciation of his services and character, accompanied with the testimonial of an elegant silver pitcher.

During his residence in Lowell, his public spirit, integrity, and good judgment secured for him the public confidence, and he filled many offices connected with the manufacturing, educational, and social interests of the place, as well as in the city government. On being chosen treasurer of the Great Falls Manufacturing Company in 1848, he resigned his situation at Lowell, and removed to Salem, where he died, without issue, January 28, 1851.

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The following brief extract is taken from one of the many obituary notices which were published at the time.

[From the Salem Gazette.]

The sudden decease of a man so universally esteemed and respected, is an event which we cannot record without some expression of the deep sorrow we feel. Every one who knew Mr. C., and is capable of reflection, feels a sense of personal loss. He was truly a blessing to our whole community. Salem will long mourn the loss of a most enlightened, upright, disinterested, and public spirited citizen, whose hand and heart were ready for every good work, and whose sound judgment, lofty integrity, and warm benevolence, made him a wise counsellor and efficient guide in all useful and charitable undertakings. He was distinguished by a rare union of virtues and talents, eminently fitting him both for study and action, for the enjoyments of literature and the affairs of business, for a judicious pursuit of his own interests, and a liberal dispensation of the fruits of his industry. He was alike remarkable for gentleness and energy, for modesty and firmness, for a frank avowal of his own opinions, and a delecte prepagation of the follows and opinions of others. delicate respect for the feelings and opinions of others. He possessed indeed a most estimable and lovely character, stamped throughout with various and genuine excellence. Rich in the gifts of intellect and literary taste, he was still richer in the virtues of the heart-in all those qualities that inspire affection and confidence.

About this time he joined the society of Friends, and was afterwards widely known as "the Quaker lawyer." He m. July 12, 1810, DEBORAH MORRIS FRANKLIN, dau. of Thomas Franklin, of N. Y. He died Mar. 2, 1840. Mr. Clark was distinguished not only for his great knowledge of the law, but also for his true worth and unostentatious piety. He was a valued and intimate friend of the late Daniel Webster, who placed much reliance on his advice.

He was a man of great literary taste. He was proud of his ancestry and family, and at one time commenced a genealogical history of the family, but from the pressure of other duties, and his distance from the principal sources of information, it was never carried much beyond his own direct ancestry. His MS., which was kindly furnished by his son, B. Franklin

Clark, Esq., has been of much assistance in the compilation of this part of the family annals.

136. WILLIAM CLARK graduated at Bowdoin College in 1810, with a well merited reputation for superior scholarship. In due time he entered the legal profession. To the discharge of its duties he carried a fitness rarely found in the young practitioner; — a discriminating knowledge of legal maxims derived from a thoughtful perusal of the older writers

upon jurisprudence; — a carefully digested and constantly increasing fund of moral and metaphysical principles; — and a great variety of useful learning gathered from all sources.

For many years the duties and responsibilities of professional life were met by him with energy and earnest purpose. The public trusts confided to him in County and State, indicated the esteem in which he was held as a citizen and legislator, and enabled him to employ his growing abilities in a wider sphere. But while engaged in the active services of public station and professional business, Mr. Clark was harassed by a disease which baffled all treatment, causing acute suffering to himself, and impairing the efficiency of his daily labors. The natural result was a gradual shrinking from the more weighty cares and burdens of public affairs. The circle of his efforts became more contracted,—his life more individualized. His thoughts were introverted, and the currents of his intellectual experiences turned aside into more private channels.

Mr. Clark married Aug. 2, 1818, ELIZABETH BODWELL MORSE, daughter of William and Tryphena (Whittier) Morse, of Hallowell; a woman of superior ability and great virtues. After nearly twenty years of uninterrupted domestic happiness, he felt her loss severely, and yielding to the full force of the blow, became less and less inclined to mingle with the matter-of-fact world around him; — more and more disposed to retire within himself. The remaining years of his life were spent mostly in seclusion, during which he occupied himself with his favorite pursuits. He loved to investigate abstruse points of law, and, occasionally, to discuss them with old associates of the bar; he studied chemistry, geology, mathematics, philosophy, and theology, and diversified these pursuits with experiments in the laboratory and work in the garden.

Thus busily, yet quietly, did this sorrow-stricken man—this intellectual and interesting recluse—descend into the vale of years. He died May 18, 1855, at the age of 66.

As a scholar, Mr. Clark was discriminating and thorough. He took great delight in pursuing his researches over the fields of classical and general literature, constantly widening his circle of information in all directions. The natural bent of his mind led him to draw from all sources for the accumulation of knowledge, and a retentive memory enabled him to preserve for ready use the results of his extensive reading and study. He was capable of deep research. While-in college a difficult mathematical problem was given him for solution. He might do it by any rule in the book or make a new one. He did the latter. He not only had intellect, but deep feeling, and could show that feeling in impassioned tones and language, and was capable of real eloquence.

As a lawyer, Mr. Clark ranked with his compeers among the foremost. His professional labors were characterized by undeviating integrity, a clear, intellectual insight, and a profound acquaintance with the aphorisms of the law. In the latter part of his life his learning and skill were often taxed for the arbitration of debated points. As a legislator, he was zealous and faithful. His immediate influence was great, and was exercised for the right, both in action and debate.

In his latter years it became evident that the trials of life had exerted a softening and benignant influence on a character which had been somewhat eccentric. All feuds, whether personal or political, were laid aside and forgotten. The scenes and interests of his once active life ceased to absorb his thoughts. The retrospect was lost in the contemplation of the future. The reflections of time were merged in the anticipations of eternity, and the most interesting as well as the most momentous ideas which can fill the human soul, were those which engrossed his attention as he drew near the confines of mortality.

The resolutions of the Kennebec Bar after the death of Mr. Clark, express a strong sense not only of his intellectual acumen, and great erudition, but of his kindness and virtues.

Miss Clark was a lady of uncommon gifts and acquirements, of a social disposition, simple in her manners, kind to the poor, ever sympathizing with the afflicted and suffering of all classes. In the latter years of her life her health was very delicate, but she was interested in the events of the day, and especially in the cause of peace and the anti-slavery society. She was fond of historical and antiquarian research, and a particular friend of the late John Farmer, Esq. In religious views she was remarkably catholic; admiring and loving all, of all classes and denominations, who possessed a humane and devoted spirit, but

she was not united with any in a religious profession.

A short time before her death, she prepared a paper, giving her "dying testimony,—being on the brink of Jordan. — against all those ministers and churches who have refused to pray for the slave." She directed that her funeral should be without parade, and without the ceremony of an officiating clergyman. Accordingly the services at the funeral were performed by her friends, Mr. Amos Wood and John B. Chandler.

The following remarks, made by Dr. Jacob Bigelow, before the Suffolk District Medical Society, are a fitting tribute to one so universally esteemed.

I rise, Mr. President, to interrupt the accustomed order of proceeding, by announcing an event already brought home, but too surely, to the knowledge of most of us, the death of our honored and beloved associate, Dr. John Ware. Within the last few months we have had occasion more than once to pay to distinguished members of our society, suddenly taken from our midst, the solemn tribute of our last regard. But never has a more general sense pervaded our professional community, of affection and regret, than that which now follows with sad and grateful recollections, the memory of a wise, faithful, friendly and blameless physician.

Dr. Ware was a surviving representative of a family long honored among us, and of whose pervading and influential reputation, his own character formed no inferior part. Commencing life as an obscure professional student and practitioner in a somewhat humble part of

the city, struggling for many years against difficulties, silently building the solid platform which was to sustain his future eminence, he at length became a man whom society needed, and whose claims and services it was not slow to recognize. He became a writer, a teacher, and for many years an extensive and laborious practitioner; and when at length his impaired health compelled him to forego a large part of his ordinary duties, he found in country retirement, in philosophic studies, in theological inquiries, and in the intercourse of his many friends, a solace congenial to his placid, unaspiring, rational, and truth-loving character.

During a lifetime, which considerably exceeded the average duration of human existence, he followed with unwavering devotion the path of conscientious duty. His kindly nature forbade him to speak ill even of those who crossed his path, and I do not know that he had an enemy.

The benignity of his temper, the impartiality of his reasoning, the clearness of his perception, the justice of his inferences, and the attractive language in which he conveyed his thoughts, caused his presence to be welcomed by the sick, and his counsel to be sought and respected by his professional brethren.

May we not say that he was most happy in consummating a beautiful life by what the ancients have fitly termed a beautiful death. His race was run, his peace was made, the mission of his life was truly, nobly fulfilled. There were tender ties that still bound him to earth, but these were lessening and loosening, and the time of the inevitable disruption was but too obviously at hand.

"Then with no fiery, throbbing pain,
No cold gradation of decay,
Death broke at once the vital chain,
And freed his soul the nearest way."

Let us preserve and cherish in our hearts the image of his recollected virtues. Let us strive, like him, to uphold the just, the honest, the truthful standard of our science and profession,—so that when we shall approach the termination, to some of us already not far remote, we may feel, like him, the sustaining consciousness that we have not lived in vain.

- He was fitted for college at the Boston Latin School. On leaving college, he determined to enter the medical profession. He began his studies under the iustruction of his father, with whom he continued until May 1854; when he went to Europe, where he remained until Sept. 1855, spending about six months of the time in Paris, studying in the French hospitals. On his return, he continued his studies with his father, and graduated at the Medical School in 1856, when he began the practice of his profession in Boston. In July 1857, he was appointed one of the district physicians of the Boston Dispensary. He was remarkably successful in his practice; which increased rapidly, as his father was intending to relinquish the profession to his son. On the breaking out of the war, he was one of the first physicians to enter the service of the Sanitary Commission, and continued in its service until the close of the Peninsula campaign in Virginia. He was subsequently appointed surgeon of the Forty-fourth Massachusetts Regiment, with which he left for the seat of war. On his arrival in North Carolina, his arduous labors and exposures to the unhealthy climate brought on a fever, of which he died, after a few days' illness. Such is the brief record of a life of stainless virtue, and of modest, wise, and effective devotion to the public service. His manly, thoughtful, earnest simplicity indicated all the ancestral virtues that were shining in his character. Few gave such promise of eminence in his profession. But one so wise, so virtuous, was well prepared to sacrifice his life in the service of his country.

In the death of Mr. Clark a widowed mother has lost a kind and dutiful son; dependent sisters and an only brother, an affectionate brother and a faithful friend; the first Christian Society, a valuable member and officer; and the community, an esteemed citizen. Though not a member of Christ's visible communion, noiselessly he exemplified, in his life and character, the essential principles of the Christian Religion.

Possessing a pure mind and a refined taste, he fully appreciated all that was beautiful and noble in moral conduct and action; while he discountenanced all that was low and vulgar in thought, word, and deed; and lived a life of sobriety, integrity and virtue.

In his business and intercourse with men, he was honest; in word, truthful; in demeanor, respectful; in conversation, frank; in manners, affable; and in character, irreproachable. In faith he was a Unitarian, but in his life he exhibited many of the christian graces; loving his own church and its services, he appreciated the advantages they afforded for the attainment of moral and spiritual knowledge and improvement.

He was a resident at Andover Theol. Sem. from Jan. 1839 to Aug. 1, 1839, when he was ordained and installed in the pastorate of the Cong. church at North Chelmsford, Mass., a position which he still retains.

Mr. Clark was an early friend of the great American Temperance Reform. He began to abstain from the use of distilled spirits, as a beverage, in 1827, and, a few years later, from all intoxicating liquors. He employed his personal and official influence in securing the adoption of the Maine Law by Massachusetts, and labored to make it efficient in preventing the sale of intoxicating drinks. Being thoroughly convinced that this law had proved "a failure and a disaster," he commenced, in 1864, a series of public efforts in behalf of a stringent license law, believing that the sale of intoxicating drinks cannot be prohibited, but may be so regulated, by law, as to promote the cause of temperance, of which he has been, for more than a third of a century, an earnest and consistent advocate. In his efforts in behalf of a regulating system, he has presented its claims before legislative committees, and has labored to educate the public up to his own views through the agency of newspapers and pamphlets.

She then resided for two or three years at North Chelmsford, Mass., with her brother, Rev. Benj. F. Clark; and at his home on the 7th of March, 1843, she was married to GEORGE F. GILLMORE, a lawyer, of Pittsburg, Pennsylvania, with whom she lived happily, discharging affectionately and faithfully all the duties of wife and mother and friend, until her death, which occurred February 13, 1865.

Mrs. Gillmore possessed a strong constitution, and was noted for the energy and earnestness of her character. She loved her home, and, while her husband was engaged in professional, editorial, and legislative avocations, that home was her care; and well and wisely it was ordered. Yet she found much time for benevolent works, and for such help as woman could give in the war for the Union.

It will perhaps afford the best view of her active Christian character, to make a few brief extracts from resolutions adopted, soon after her decease, by the teachers and scholars of the "Gillmore Mission School," which was named for her. They were published in the *Presbyterian Banner*, of March 1, 1865.

Whereas God in his providence has taken from our midst Mrs. Gillmore, who was to us a friend, a counsellor, and an example of all that was good and true:

Resolved, That while we bear testimony to her devotion in the cause of Christ, her more than motherly interest in each teacher and scholar, her heart of boundless benevolence, which sought out the poor and needy, and supplied their wants, we cannot doubt that our loss is her great gain.

—That we owe to her untiring efforts, under God, in large measure, the success of our Mission enterprise; it being through her earnest labor, assisted by others, that funds were raised to purchase the church in which our school is held; and that, in founding the "Industrial School," also, she "wrought a work of faith and labor of love."

—That in her death the church has lost a bright and shining member; the community, one who was foremost in every benevolent enterprise; and friends and relations, one who had a heart to sympathize with them in every trial, and rejoice with them in every joy.

Towards the last of her life she was thankful for any prosperity, mainly, as it seemed, because it gave means for more extended usefulness. And just when the fatal disease seized upon her, she was revolving in her mind new plans for works of benevolence and mercy.

Her last sickness of five weeks was painful; but she was sustained by her unwavering Christian faith, and cheered by the presence of friends, and comforted by the kind and faithful nursing of a favorite niece, Nancy D. Clark.

At her funeral, the crowded house of mourning, the thronged street, and the many tearful eyes, showed how the good and faithful are loved and mourned.

S. volunteers in the war of 1861, and was mustered into service under his command, June 13, 1861. He resigned this position, Oct. 14, 1861.

He was, at the breaking out of the war, in feeble health. Overtasked by the untiring and valuable assistance which he had given the state authorities in calling out and equipping the first men who left the state for the defence of the capital, and by his efforts to raise and discipline his own regiment, it was thought by his friends injudicious for him to attempt to take the field, but he yielded to the call of his country. His kindness and consideration for the men under his command made him a general favorite, while at the same time he maintained the strictest discipline. He was ardently attached to the state service, and has long had the reputation of being one of the best military instructors in all branches of the service. After his resignation of his position as colonel, he devoted his time to instruction in military tactics, and so high was the estimation in which he was held, that officers came from all parts of New England to avail themselves of his tuition.

He has also held high positions in many public and private societies. In one of these, the "Republican Liberty Guards," a military association comprising about forty thousand persons, he held the office of Major General in chief.


