There is now exhibiting at the Exchange the heading and some of the staves of a tobacco hoghead, exported from this city to Berman, and then returned. The weight of the whole, which does not comprise nearly all the pieces of which the hoghead was composed, is, we are informed, upwards of 350 lbs. The heading is of solid oak more than six inches in thickness. It is to be hoped that the author of this fraud may be found out and punished. His name ought to be gazetted throughout the Union.

We submit the following copy of the letter received by Messrs. Frey & Co. from their correspondents, which has been politely handed to us. BREVIER, 27th October, 1830. Messrs. Frederick Frey & Co. New-Orleans. Gentlemen:—The Amalia, Capt. Harenburg, will bring you several bottoms of tobacco hogheads, which we send you to serve as a proof of our complaints; they are all of the Catalonia's cargo; amongst which, we have found a great number of similar hogheads, which, it appears evidently are made on purpose to deceive. Several of the hogheads of which we have to complain, bear the mark "NUN VALLEY." It is high time that your, and other respectable houses, should take efficacious measures to put an end to such fraudulent practices, which destroy all confidence, and injure the business with your place in a very scandalous manner. We expect indeed, that you will induce those planters to make some indemnification, which we consider to be the only way to repair their honor.

We are respectfully, gentlemen, Your obedient servants, D. H. WATKINS & Co. CONGRESSIONAL. WASHINGTON, Feb. 19. The Senate were chiefly occupied on the bill making appropriations for the support of government in 1831. It was finally laid on the table.

In the House of Representatives, Mr. Buchanan moved that the Committee on the Judiciary be discharged from the further consideration of the bill concerning contempts of court. The hour elapsed. The various appropriation bills, considered a preceding day, were read a third time, and passed. Upon the one for the improvement of harbors, a long debate ensued. It was passed, upon a division of yeas and nays, by a vote of 139 to 52. The bill for the adjustment of the Fourth Auditor's accounts, was also passed. After which, the House proceeded to the consideration of private bills, many of which were acted upon.

GEN. JACKSON AND MR. CALHOUN.—The Norum Organon of Saturday, otherwise called the Washington Globe, comes out very warmly in favor of its patron, the President of the United States, and equally so against the Vice President. The ex-Organon, otherwise called the U. S. Telegraph, has an excellent leaning towards Mr. Calhoun, and will, most probably, in a few days, open its batteries against the Globe, and the master of the Globe. Affairs are now rapidly tending to a crisis which has long been anticipated. Gen. Jackson and Mr. Calhoun no longer draw in the same harness. They have separate interests to promote, and I will henceforth pursue them separately. Both, we have no doubt, will be candidates for the Presidential office; and it will be a chance, if while they are contending for the prize, it is not picked up by a third person. From the article in the Globe, above referred to, we quote the following passages: The first impression upon our mind, is one of wonder, that a man possessing Mr. Calhoun's tact and prudence, should have brought a subject of this nature before the public. The only point in this discussion, except such as Mr. Calhoun has himself created, is altogether personal.

What have the public to do with Gen. Jackson's and Mr. Calhoun's opinions of each other? Are they called upon to decide whether Mr. Calhoun was guilty of duplicity or not? General Jackson says he was. He says he was not. Whether he was or was not, does not now concern the public. Mr. Calhoun's publication, therefore, was wholly uncalled for. It is a fire-brand wantonly thrown into the republican party. Mr. Calhoun will be held responsible for all the mischief which may follow.

It was rumored before the appearance of this publication, that it would not be an attack on the President. But it is impossible, we think, to view it in any other light. The President and Mr. Calhoun were directly at issue in a private correspondence. That issue the latter has carried before the public with the avowed object of seeking the verdict of the people. If this be not an arraignment of the President at the bar of public opinion, it has no motive or meaning. P. S. The above was intended for yesterday's paper, but was excluded by the press of other matter. The United States Telegraph, received since it was written, contains more than two columns in reply to the Globe, and in vindication of Mr. Calhoun.

Havre, January 14.—A letter from Paris written by a person connected with the embassy of a power of Europe, announces as a positive fact, the death of DON MIGUEL. This information was brought to Paris from London by an express. Don Miguel, it is stated, was poisoned.

Extract of a letter, dated St. Thomas, January 14, 1831. The power of Paez is on the wane. They write from Caracas that Cora and Carora have pronounced for the Liberator (not knowing of his death), and that in Las Llanas, a guerrilla of 2000 men has put itself in motion for the same object. Gen. Marino has marched against them. In the mean time the expulsions continue, and among the banished are the Arch Bishop of Caracas, and various other ecclesiastics of rank. Sr. Vargas, a member of the Venezuelan Congress as you know, being asked if it was certain that some persons had written to North America and Europe that the hatred and bitterness against Bolivar is general in Venezuela, replied to me, "No assertion could be more erroneous." You may rely upon it that the personal enemies of Bolivar in Venezuela, do not exceed 50; and that the mass of the people are decidedly in his favor. His name is a lust; and I hope that his influence, and the moderation and confidence with which he has acted of late will lead, shortly, to the union of the Republic, and the establishment of a durable organization. But even if Bolivar should die, continued Sr. Vargas, the union would still be effected, for the Venezuelans are already convinced that the separation is not expedient, and the Congress which is to meet in March, will decree in accordance with their wishes. Sr. Vargas will return in a few days to Caracas.

[From the Times Private Correspondence.]

Count Pozzo di Borgo, the Russian Ambassador, attended by a numerous suite, at half-past twelve o'clock this day repaired to the Palace Royal, where he delivered to the King in the name of his Majesty, the Emperor of Russia, a letter from the Emperor Nicholas to the King of the French. The Count, I understand, an old personal acquaintance of his Majesty, and his reception was of the warmest and most cordial kind. The Emperor desired his Ambassador to assure the King of his most favorable attachment, as well as his strongest desire to co-operate with him in maintaining the general peace of Europe. Pozzo di Borgo was afterwards received by the Queen and the younger branches of the Royal Family. The King has also received recent communications from the Austrian Court, which breathe the spirit of peace; and all those who have confidential access to the Palace are desired by the Royal Family to disseminate the assurance that there is the best reason to believe that the peace of Europe will not be disturbed. The Duke de Montemart will set out for St. Petersburg to-morrow. I have before me a bundle of private letters of the latest date from the north of Europe. They are of the 24th ult. from St. Petersburg, and of the 30th from Warsaw. The Emperor remained in his capital when the former were written, but was himself, as well as his Guards, in marching order, and ready to start at a moment's notice; he was bent upon the reduction of Poland by force of arms; nevertheless, several of the private letters hint that a strong expectation prevailed at the Russian Court that the Emperor's proclamation to the Poles would at once extinguish the insurrectionary spirit and leave room for pacific negotiation.

It must, however, inform you, that by the Warsaw letters, no such result is apparent; on the contrary, the Autocrat's proclamation has been torn and trampled under foot. Persons are, at the present of their lives, forbidden from proclaiming it, and the inhabitants, both of town and country, were assembling with all kinds of weapons to advance to the frontier and offer resistance to the threatened attack, and the cry was, not to wait till the advanced guard of General Diebitsch had obtained any footing on the Polish territory. I ought to mention to you, that nothing can exceed the activity with which Marshal Soult is repairing the shattered military establishment of France, refitting her arsenals, and recruiting and combining all her martial resources. It is not unappreciated certain occurrences which have furnished observation, he has made an extensive contract for military supplies to an immense amount in London. These must of course be known to your Government, as I believe arms cannot be exported from England without a treasury licence. Large supplies of stores have likewise been conveyed back from Algiers. All these efforts are, however, considered as the fair and just precautions of a great nation, and not as indicating any intentions at variance with the avowed policy of the French Government. They are, nevertheless, looked upon by the young military spirits of this nation as the forerunners of the trumpet sound for which they burn, and which would again send them forth to bear their tri-colored flag into the seat of the old monarchies.

Extract of a letter dated LAUREN, Jan. 12, 1831. Venezuela appears to be consolidated more and more every day. So that no more fears exist of new disturbances. All communication with Bogota is entirely broken off; but by private accounts we know that Gen. Urdaneta is much harassed by Lopez and Obando from Popayan. The members of the new Constituent Congress of Venezuela have been elected, and the election of President has fallen on Gen. Paez, which it is thought will contribute to the consolidation of the new States. N. Y. Jour. Com.

Extract of a letter addressed to a Commercial house in this city. HAVRE January 19. Business generally becomes gradually more animated. The sales of cotton without the last ten days have acquired more importance, but without any improvement in price—nor do we expect any under present prospects. A good deal of business has been done in ashes.—A heavy cloud still hangs upon this country, owing to the convulsed state of Belgium, Russia and Poland; and we greatly apprehended a war as the result of this state.
