SULTAN HELD PRISONER IN PALACE BY INVADERS

NATIVES GATHER TO WELCOME ROOSEVELT

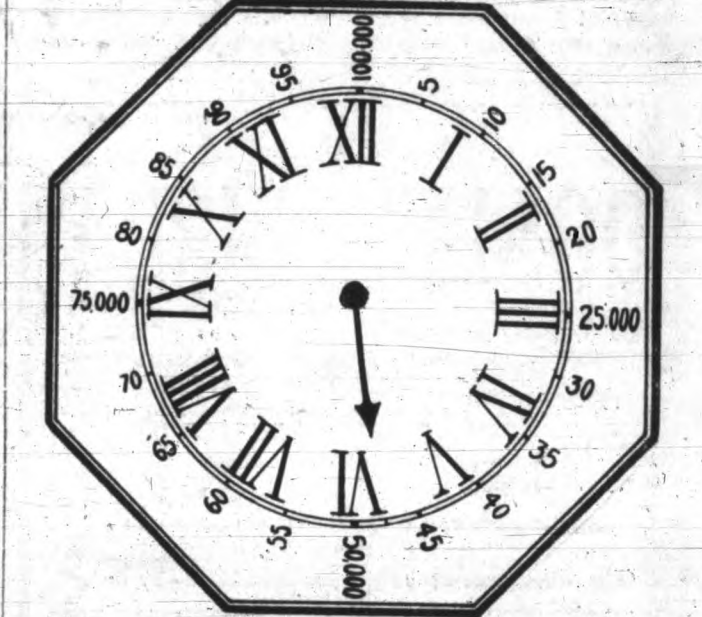

REDUCTION IN EXPENDITURES

PRESIDENT TAFT SUPPORTS SENATE Administration Favours Reform in the Methods of Appropriations.

Washington, D. C., April 19. — In speaking on the tariff bill, Senator Aldrich this afternoon declared that the appropriations by congress in the last year show an "unprecedented extravagance," and asserted that they could have been reduced \$50,000,000 without impairing the efficiency of the government machinery.

"In the work of making the necessary reductions of expenditure and reforming the methods of appropriation to which the senate is pledged, I am authorized to say that we have the earnest support and co-operation of the president and the administration," declared Aldrich.

The senator estimated that the revenue for 1910 from the senate tariff bill passed on the importations in 1907, would be \$360,000,000. He said additional revenues, because of the restrictions on undervaluations, are expected to amount to \$5,000,000. He estimated that the senate bill would bring a total increase of \$13,000,000. Aldrich said the proposed 2 per cent. Panama bonds would not bring par value in the market. He recommended that the interest be 3 per cent. He opposed the imposition of an income or an inheritance tax and other special taxes as "unjust and unnecessary." He pledged that the bill be given a trial before resorting to special taxation.

Aldrich declared that the fact that there will be approximately 4,000,000 more people in the United States in 1910 than there was in 1908 will cause a natural increase in importations and revenues. He said that the result to the depression of business since the autumn of 1907 stocks of goods now are low. He predicted that the era of prosperity which started March 1st will continue "with the enactment of wise legislation." He calculated that by June 1st there will be an available treasury surplus, over the necessary working balance, of \$94,000,000, including \$74,000,000 which the treasury is entitled to receive for reimbursement for Panama canal expenditures. He declared that by the end of the fiscal year of 1910 there will be a surplus of \$49,000,000.

In making this estimate he said that he assumed that canal bonds would be sold at intervals to reimburse the treasury and that they now are available for that purpose. He said that further legislation, however, is necessary to secure this result, and asserted that it will be necessary to change the character of the bonds which may be issued.

AIRSHIP FLIGHTS IN CALIFORNIA

Number of Aeronauts Will Visit Coast During Summer.

Los Angeles, Cal., April 19.—That San Francisco is to be the centre of trial experiments in the United States is the opinion of Roy Knabenshue, the aeronaut. Knabenshue has shipped his big airship with the balloon "United States," owned by Dick Ferris during the spring months.

"California is the best possible field for further experiments," said Knabenshue. "I know of about twenty eastern enthusiasts who are planning to come to the coast to begin operations during the summer."

Knabenshue will make his flights from San Mateo, where special grounds are being constructed for him.

INDIANS HAVE NO TITLE TO TIDELANDS

Two Railways May Now Close Deals for Property at Tacoma.

Tacoma, Wash., April 19.—Federal Judge Hanford yesterday handed down a decision in the United States court invalidating the claims of Attorneys E. P. Grosscup and Chas. Bedford, for the Puyallup Indians, to the tidelands at the south end of Commencement Bay, valued at \$6,000,000. J. M. Ashton and Wm. Jones now hold the title to the land on purchase from the state. Recently, however, railroads have bought this property for terminals.

Grosscup and Bedford produced old treaties under which they held the Indians had title to the lands and secured the sanction of the government to start suit to oust the present holders.

Judge Hanford decided that the Indians have no claim to the property as the national government never had any title to the shore lands, but was merely the trustee for the state.

The decision is expected to cause at least two transcontinental railways to close deals for the property.

Under the settlement reported between the governments of Holland and Venezuela in the matter of the disputes between the two countries, the latter agrees to give the same fiscal treatment to the islands of the Dutch Antilles as is accorded the West Indian islands, and to pay the sum of \$4,000 damages on account of Dutch vessels captured in the spring of 1908. The Netherlands engages to prohibit the importation of arms into Venezuela, and to return the captured vessels and coast guard vessels.

MURDER AND SUICIDE

Monterey, Mexico, April 19.—After stabbing his bride, to whom he had been married only a month, Francis Copardo to-day in an insane rage, dipped his hands in her blood and wrote sacrilegious sentences on her body. He was taken to jail where he eluded the vigilance of his guards and hanged himself.

SOCIALIST FAVORS JAPANESE IMMIGRATION

Declares Exclusion Would Harm Condition of Working Classes.

Seattle, Wash., April 19.—There is much discussion and considerable indignation in labor circles here to-day because of the statements made by August Gilhaus, Socialist-Labor candidate for president last fall and the nominal head of the party on the Pacific coast, who in a speech at Columbia hall last night, denounced the anti-Japanese agitation in the west, declaring that to keep out the Japanese would harm rather than help the condition of the working class. Workmen can secure their freedom, he declared, only by economical, industrial and political organizations.

"We have nothing to fear from the Japanese workman," Gilhaus declared, "had the people who are urging this exclusion proposition half as much spirit as the Japanese in California; they would have earned the right to cut themselves Socialists."

"I saw Japanese laborers down there packing oranges, and a number of them struck four times in one day, returning to work at an advance of a quarter of a cent a box. These are the kind of people the American Federation of Labor and the Debs Socialists want to exclude from our shores. The federation took up the cry to force the laborers and the Debs party to get the votes."

FIND BABY'S BODY.

Oakland, Cal., April 19.—Entering a restaurant operated by a Mexican woman and depositing a bundle on the counter, Wm. Snull, a carpenter, announced yesterday that he wished to sell some meat. The woman, scenting a possible bargain, opened the package which was gone up in a newspaper, and turned from it with a scream on discovering it to contain the body of a newborn babe.

Snull was closely questioned by the police and declared that he had found the bundle in a lot and, being satisfied by a glance that it contained meat of some kind, decided to sell it. He did not know until the package was opened in the restaurant what it actually contained. The tiny body was without clothes or wrappings of any sort and the police have little hope of discovering its parents.

FATALLY WOUNDED IN PASSION PLAY

Actor Who Insisted on Being Nailed to Cross Dies From Injuries.

Mexico City, April 19.—Word has reached this city of the death of Tibuclo Zambrano, an Aztec Indian, as the result of wounds sustained during the presentation of the passion play which forms the main feature of the yearly celebration of Holy week in the town of Tuxpan. Zambrano impersonated Christ in the presentation of the crucifixion. Presumably maddened by the religious frenzy into which the participants had lashed themselves, he insisted that he be nailed instead of lashed to the cross, according to the usual method. Crazy by excitement, those in charge complied with the demand. Nails were procured, and Zambrano was nailed hand and foot to the cross. News of the affair soon reached the authorities who quickly dispersed the mob and conveyed the victim to his home. He died a few hours later in great agony, lock jaw having resulted. The Tuxpan Indians are said to be the last descendants of the once powerful Aztecs.

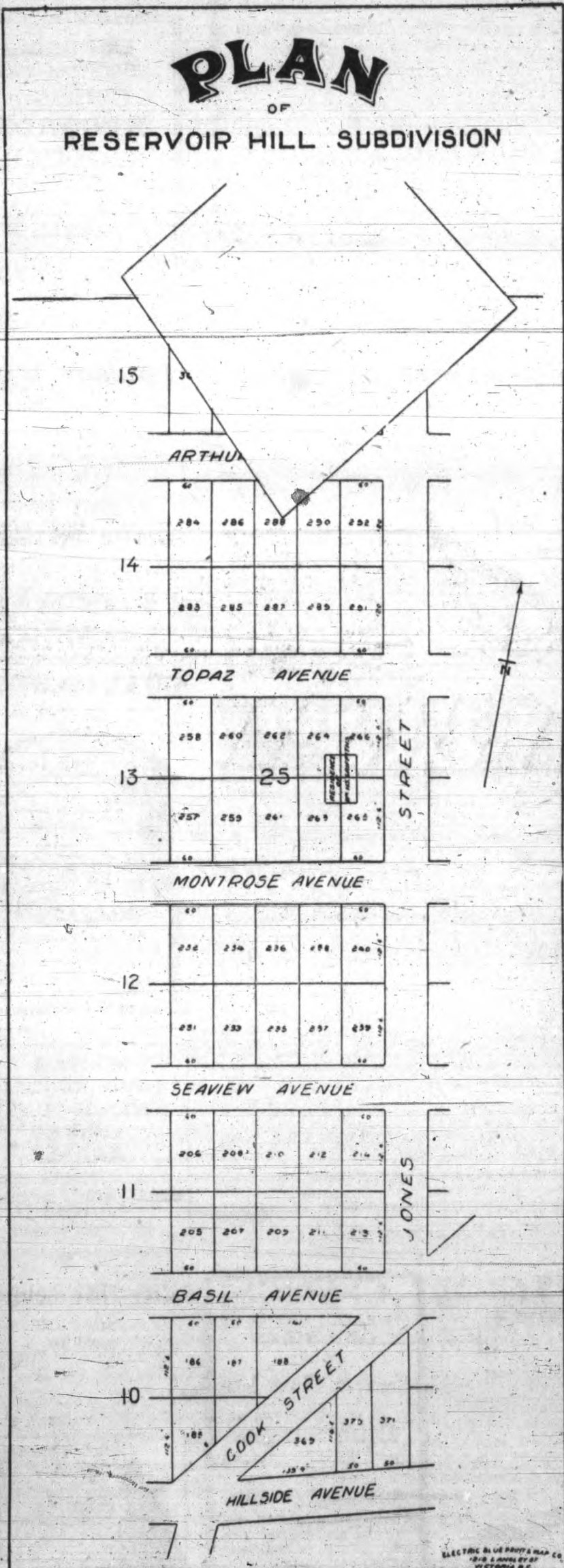

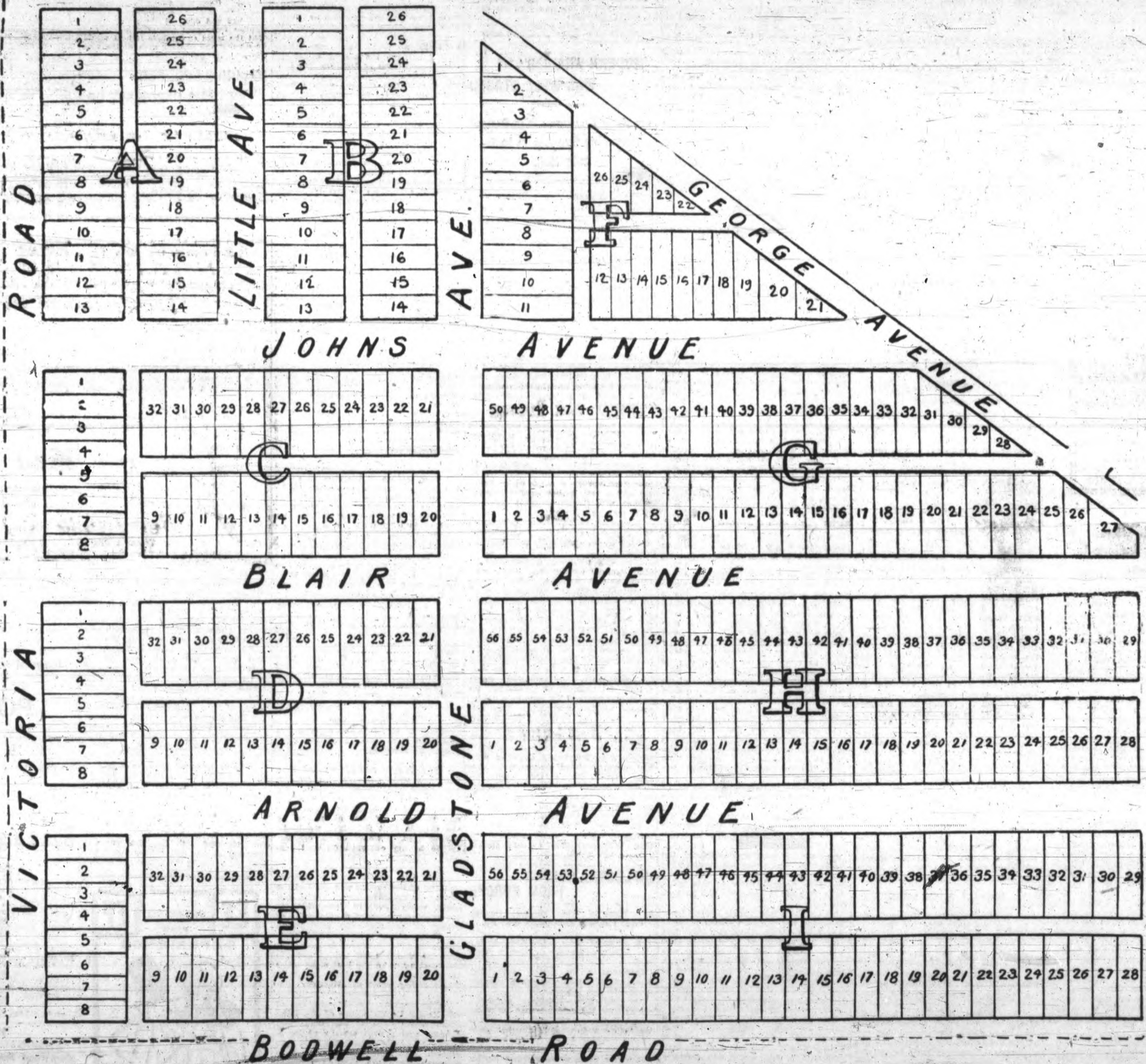

Troy, N. Y., April 20.—A terrible wind storm struck Troy and vicinity yesterday afternoon. Roofs were blown off buildings, plate glass windows were wrecked, and in some places residences were blown into the roadway.

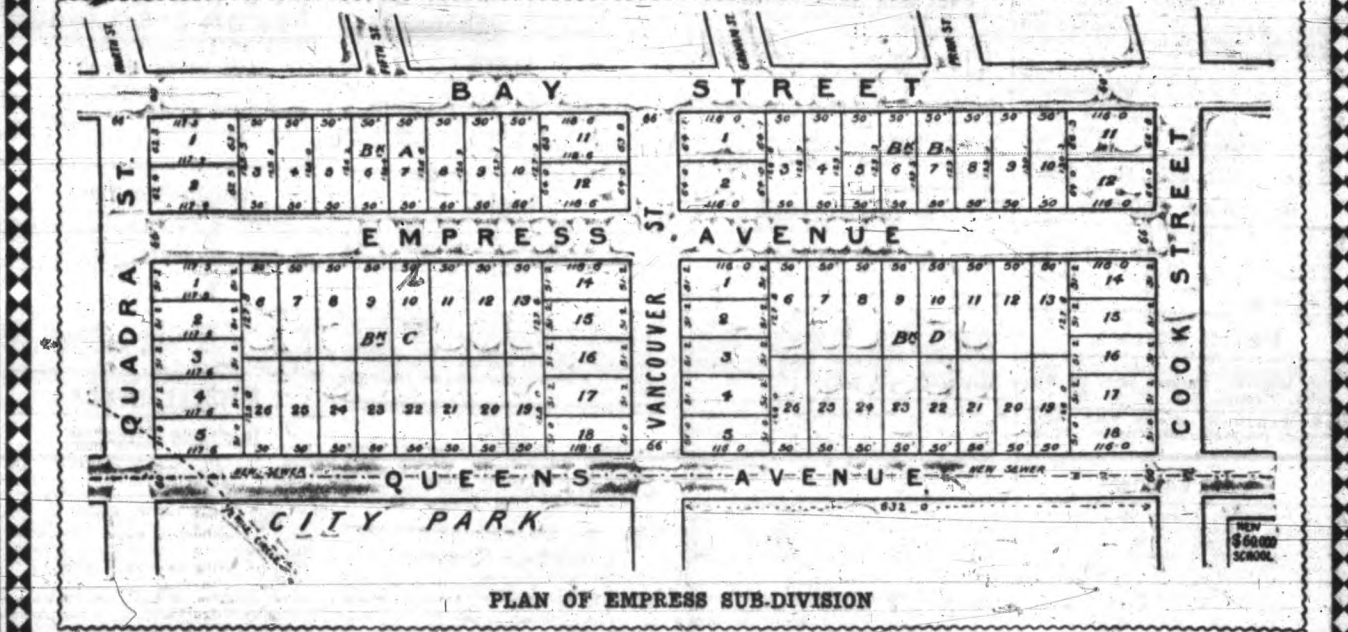
Rails for about three miles of road have been delivered at the Fraser River Lumber Company's camp, this being a third of the whole length.

ANTARCTIC EXPLORATION.

Dr. Bruce Has Organized Expedition Which Will Set Out in 1911.

Dr. Bruce, of the Oceanographical Laboratory, who, six years ago, made a notable expedition to the Antarctic, and two years ago to the Arctic, has organized another Antarctic expedition, which will set out in 1911, according to the Edinburgh correspondent of the London Daily News.

The estimated cost is £50,000, and the expedition will be complementary and supplementary to the work of the Scottish National Antarctic and other recent Antarctic explorations. The plans include extensive oceanographical work in the South Atlantic and the Weddell and Biscoe seas, the mapping of the coast line of Antarctica to the east and west of Coats Land, and an investigation of the interior of the country. The ship will carry thirty-six men, including six scientists. The vessel is to be provided with all the most modern oceanographical equipment, and prepared to work in depths exceeding 3,000 fathoms. Several motor sledges, light and easy to handle, as well as ponies and dogs, will form part of the equipment.

Dr. Bruce, after setting up a winter station in or near Coats Land, will disembark the ship, which, after refitting at Capetown or elsewhere, will proceed to New Zealand. The following season the ship will proceed to McMurdo Bay or King Edward Land, in order to lay out caches for and await the arrival of Dr. Bruce, who intends to attempt to cross the Antarctic Continent from Coats Land to McMurdo Bay, or possibly King Edward Land, where the ship will await the explorers.
