

## Josephine Baker

Josephine Baker (born Freda Josephine McDonald, naturalised French Joséphine Baker; 3 June 1906 - 12 April 1975) was an American-born bisexual French entertainer, French Resistance agent, freemason[1] and civil rights activist. Her career was centered primarily in Europe, mostly in her adopted France. She was the first Black woman to star in a major motion picture, the 1927 silent film Siren of the Tropics, directed by Mario Nalpas and Henri Étiévant.[2]

During her early career Baker was renowned as a dancer, and was among the most celebrated performers to headline the revues of the Folies Bergère in Paris. Her performance in the revue Un vent de folie in 1927 caused a sensation in Paris. Her costume, consisting of only a short skirt of artificial bananas and a beaded necklace, became an iconic image and a symbol of the Jazz Age and the 1920s.

Baker was celebrated by artists and intellectuals of the era, who variously dubbed her the "Black Venus", the "Black Pearl", the "Bronze Venus", and the "Creole Goddess". Born in St. Louis, Missouri, she renounced her U.S. citizenship and became a French national after her marriage to French industrialist Jean Lion in 1937. [3] She raised her children in France. "I have two loves, my country and Paris", Baker once said, and she sang: "J'ai deux amours, mon pays et Paris ".[4]

She was known for aiding the French Resistance during World War II. [5] After the war, she was awarded the Croix de guerre by the French military, and was named a Chevalier of the Légion d'honneur by General Charles de Gaulle. [6]

Baker refused to perform for segregated audiences in the United States and is noted for her contributions to the civil rights movement. In 1968, she was offered unofficial leadership in the movement in the United States by Coretta Scott King, following Martin Luther King Jr.'s assassination. After thinking it over. Baker declined the offer out of concern for the welfare of her children.[7][8]

Maždaug vištos dydžio, apie 900–1400 g svorio. Skiriamasis požymis – kraštinės uodegos plunksnos ilgesnės už vidurines, ryškiai raudoni antakiai, kurie sudaryti iš pailgų odos karpelių. Pirštų šonuose rudenį išauga raginės ataugos – šukos; pačios kojos apaugusios plunksnomis.

Patelė rusvai pilka, jos uodega šiek tiek iškirpta. Tuo ji skiriasi nuo kurtinio patelės ir baltojo tetervino. Jaunikliai panašūs į patelę, bet blankesnių spalvų.



- Improve the discoverability of your archival content
- Tag your content, in multiple languages
- Cross-reference creators and works with Wikidata
- Visualise your collection




# Structured data on Commons

Media files on Wikimedia Commons can be catalogued with multilingual captions and concepts, e.g. with the recorded species object in Wikidata.

This makes the files discoverable regardless of which language users, in Commons and on Google (which indexes Commons), search in.

## Wikidata as a data hub

If you connect a term in a vocabulary or entry in an authority to the corresponding Wikidata objects they will also be connected to the term or record in the other vocabularies that the Wikidata items are also connected to.

An institution that does this type of cross-referencing with Wikidata is the <u>Library of Congress</u>.



## Wikidata for tagging

With objects in Wikidata – objects representing people, places, periods, persons, topics, subjects and so on – being highly multilingual and interlinked with formal vocabularies and authorities they make for excellent controlled "tags".

As an institution – especially one serving multiple language communities – you can use Wikidata objects to bridge differences in language and make your archives and collections more discoverable across languages.


Finnish broadcaster <u>Yle</u> uses tags from Wikidata to improve the discoverability – across languages – of their content.

## Analyse and visualise with Wikidata

The <u>Wikidata Query Service</u> uses SPARQL to allow users to create complex queries and export or visualise the results of the query.

Some GLAMs, like the National Library of Wales, systematically use the service to analyse and find patterns in their collections.
