Thirty seven (37) by Sixteen 16
two stories high, sixteen
feet posted (16) to be framed,
raised, boarded, & shingled
and the upper outside finish
put on. The other to be the
same length and twenty (20)
feet wide and a recess
of twelve feet in length
and seven feet wide. Payed
this part to be only boarded,
no trimmings or shingle.
George came from Jamaica
Plains today sick
Have written to E. A. H. this eve.

Friday 4th Augt 15th

Went home to Bettie this morning at five o'clock. At the village and looked at some lumber.

From the 2nd No. went to Smiley's mill and bought 126 feet of Chestnut boards for \$1.75 - and 279 feet of clear Chestnut for \$5.58 and 205 feet of merchantable for \$3.07 Paid for the whole. Then gathered and rode over to Clough's mill and from there to Arms' mill and looked at some stock.

Tonight have been down to Mabel Steeves' Herley and got a Deed blank. My amount 10,40. It has rained today.

Saturday 5th
Pleasant. Rode with Father
and George over to Mr.
Richardsons and Mr
Chase's to get a job of work
succeeded at Mr Rich-
ardson's. Walked to
Bosswen with George
Rader in the cars from
Glynn to Comstock.

At the mill on the P.M.
and at the Engine meeting
at home in the evening,
Deed Blanket 02
Bought Westfalls of
timber of Father per lot .50

Sunday 6th

Went down to bathe in
the morning and at
meeting all day. May
weather here this morn
Went in to the woods
after meeting got back
and went to the five

lumber. At Colby's mill
and at Mr. Goss' saw
some lumber 1 1/4 inches
thick worth \$30,00 per
thousand. Saw Mr

white pine

Have got the scall set
with about 200 hooks
Have got only 26 fish
today and one Halibut
At the supper table we had
a talk about loading Frank
Cook vessel with 15000 pounds
of fish and Avery said that
19000 fish such as we have
got will do it but I told
him that it take at least
30000 and then went and
asked the Capt how it was
and he said it would take
at least 30,000 to do it.

After that Avery said that
there had been fish enough
caught in the fleet to load
any vessel that there is here
and that we had had as
good a pick as anyone else
I have reckoned up how

many we had got - to day and
made it 125 by count - and
there were 133 vessels on
the fleet which would
make 4125 fish which I
told him I thought would
be rather a light load for
some of the vessels but I
did not know but that it
would be a load!!

Tuesday 10 July

All hands called to get
heave in coles. Perry did
not get out quickly as soon
as some of the rest and the
capt spoke to him rather
rough but it did not men-
ace his speed a smile
while so the Capt told him
that any man this week
would do; and that was

well enough to start for
garnet because that he
kept cool. Capt. and
Gordon hauled in the screw
-it and got 9 fish 1!!! Most
of it was all in a bunch all
tied in a knot. Gordon
stood on deck for the Star
-board watch and then
called me when it was
Avery's turn so I went to the
gangway and called the Star
-board watch and told
them that I should not go
-and the watch alone on the
train when it was not my
turn and no fish either.
It was Avery's first watch
but he told Gordon to
ask me if I would not
stand a little while and
then call him as I stood

45 minutes (5 minutes
more than my time) and
called him back when he
came up he was as mad
as he could well be and
said I had called him 5
minutes before his time
I told him that I did
not and he swore that
I did, so we compared
the time and I was right
and he was wrong which
made him still more
rily and to keep pace with
him I said to him that he
had called me before my

Fog and rain all day

Wednesday 11 July

hove up an iron and

Anchor and stood toward
a school of whales but
lost them in the fog

he was fished for two
months longer which
takes me eight a boat per
day told us when we stopped
that he should not be gone

more than from two months
to two and a half and I
think that does not sound
much like four months.

I get only one fish

P. O. address, Avery and
Small tried to strike

Three swordfish that
came around us did
not get either of them
~~one~~ of them was about
15 feet long as Howe Perry
and Gordon took the
boat and sailed about
8 miles and went on
board of a little French
galley boat on whisky
staid aboard an hour
and then came off —
Capt. Avery, Howe, and
Gordon are saying the
scall tonight — Take
it altogether it has
been the ~~pleasantest~~ most
most-pleasant day that
we have seen since we
left home.

Monday 23

Got hooks this morning
and drifted on to fish
as fast as we could
haul for a long time
but the Capt had

could not anchor

fish today and the
whole of them would
not make 20 good
fish

The Seabel sailed
the same day they are
due and had been
on to all of the Banks
but did nothing only

had got 18000 fish -

got 8000, Pleasant as
can be.

Tuesday 24 July

Called this morning
at 3 o'clock and 10 minutes
and had fish as fast as
we could haul but
they were so small that the
Capt. called all hands
to get anchor before
sunrise. I hauled
about 800 out of one kick
had them salted on the
meal of them.
Wander sail all day
Covre two several times
but did not find much

and got one large took

and concluded to
bite up. Found fish
about twice as large
as last night and as
fast as we could haul.

Wednesday 25

morning.

Rose two as six o'clock
and struck fish so
bit up all slumbering
bat fish as fast as we
could haul. Stuck
adrift and shov'd

Thursday 26 July
Called 10 minutes

to make sail for

an hour, and laid our

a good breeze. Took

had a good sail the
last time we came
in. Quite rough, so
much so that we
could not make our
anchor hold on at all
so went ashore and
got the vessel under
way and beat up to
the Amy Bright and

went aboard with
Howe Gordon and
Capt. Carrick G.R.
Bushnell on board as
passenger to Marblehead.
His thumb was so sore
that there was no hope
of him able to fish
so he had to go home.
The crew gave me a
dozen Cod hooks and
a flagful line. Howe
got $1\frac{1}{2}$ dozen hooks
and a line better than
mine. The A. Knight
has been out 15 weeks
and has got 17,000 large
fish (about 4500 lbs.)
We got 2 bbls of eggs

Went out in the

again and got only 9

for we had rowed 5
or 6 miles and were
keen as Capt. did
not like it because
we did not go out.

again as soon as we
got dinner so he
called us directly to
get anchor and work
up to the fleet and
a disagreeable time
we had to get home
told the Captl that he
wanted his watch
below as much as they
did and swore he
would have it - then
commenced hurling
all around the house
about being at home
when he agreed to go
We all told him that
if he did not do as
he agreed to that he
must pay us for it
(a reasonable price)
but he swore he would

not say us a cent more
if we ever gone six
months longer and if
there was provision
enough to be had or
would never leave the
bank till he had a
load of fish just as
soon as he were setting

neither have a crew

not go out till near

no supper, Got up and

Tuesday 7
Was not called to

watch last night if
I had been I could not
have done it - any way
got anchor and sailed

on deck more than an
hour all day -
Have talked with the
Capt about sending me
home he said he would
send me by the "Rough and
Ready" (Capt Chandler of
Grand) which would
sail next Saturday
Cannot eat any thing
at all today, at least
anything worth mentioning
I am weaker
than I was yesterday

Wednesday 8

Did not sleep scarcely
any last night - and
consequently feel bad

and an occasional
spat of rain - Lat, $14^{\circ} 35'$
and 85 miles from the
Island

Spoke this Robert Bruce
of Gloucester said the
Island bore S.W. by S
36 miles - Spoke an
English sailor but
did not understand
the bearing of the Island
said the distance was
about 18 miles -

All day it has been
all hands on deck
to reef or take out
reefs in the foreail
or reef the jib or
haul down the
tjantail or pull it up
After supper all
hands called to
hold council about
our course tonight
Capt is very much
frightened and I

do not know why we
all should not be —
The storm still
continues and I think
increases. It is certain
that the vessel pitches
worse and worse every
minute. Twice I have
crawled on deck and
have shipped a sea
each time. I was
standing on the quarter
when a sea came over
my head breaking all
over one, but I went
below as soon as possible
and took off my wet clothes

Sunday 12

The storm is over
and the sea has nearly
gone down, the stern

is shining brightly.
Our course now is
N. N. W. The weather
began to moderate at
a little past midnight.
I think we are over the
N. W. bar of the Island
and it bears now I
suppose about S by E
Two mackerel jumping
out of water this morning.
We have passed several
vessels at anchor —

A year ago today I was at
home and at Church not
once dreaming that today
I should be thousands of
miles at sea so sick
that I could hardly walk
deck, but so it is.
Then I was in the enjoyment
of comparative health and

lived in anticipation of
happiness beyond which
there is but one step
What a difference in
a man's circumstances
a few short months will
bring, but then these changes
might occur to me as
well as any one else for
aught that I know.
Perhaps it is my destiny
I really begin to believe
it is, tho' predestination
is not written in my crud
Capt's orders now to hand
on the mainsail
The birds are flying over our
heads watching the Sunday
morning exercises now.
You be thinking it sacrilegious
but then anything is deemed
a work of necessity aboard of
ship on Sunday!!!

Clear and pleasant - all day have been on deck more than half of the time have read 200 pages in "The Children of the Abbey". We had 0 p's for supper. Manufactured free in a novel way. The meal was powdered up instead of being cut and the crust was rolled out with a hamisphère on an old table. — We had a sup in the Cabin with Mr. Sly and James Conroy Minded the staysail in the P.M.

Monday 13
Lat. $44^{\circ} 10'$ Long. $61^{\circ} 31'$
Have had a pleasant

day with moderate
wind - course N by E
Have been reading part
of the day in the cabin
of the "Abbey" - Cape has
dropped at rest on the
mainsail and she has
off of the jib - It is run-
ny now and
looks like a stormy
night - Dick Kinson
and Jordan have been
spinning yarns for
my benefit -

Wednesday 14 Aug 55
Got up this morning
at 6 o'clock and went
on deck and washed
then went to breakfast
The rain continued
till about 1 o'clock M.

Gocked ship at midnight
and stood W.S.W.
with a good breeze
Have finished "The Chil-
dren of the Abbey" a
book of 750 pages full of
remarkable adventures
all of which terminate
"as usual" in an adventure
called marriage (the height
of happiness "do to speak" as
Forbes says!) But then
what is the use of reading
about the misfortunes
of which bring to mind
the "dreams of other days"
which a last! may too long
be remembered.

Salt " 43° 44' Long 63° 7'
So we have got $12\frac{1}{2}$ days
to run before we make
Cape Sables!

Have been on the
wind all of the P.M.
till about 8 o'clock
The wind hauled
around so that it is
fair, now our course
being W 60° or W 1/2 S
Sun set real pleasant
tonight - On deck
till eight o'clock

Wednesday 15th
As pleasant this
morning, as it was
yesterday - At
7 1/2 o'clock spoke the
Ship John Hancock
from St. Johns on
Soy " 44° 10' Standing
E.S.E. under full sail
Sail " 42° 40'
Out of 1800 fish on board

of the Rough and Ready
James Nickerson has
caught - 3,890.

Plenty of Black fish
playing around our
bowls today.

Salt $42^{\circ} 44'$ Long. $84^{\circ} 14'$
Since yesterday we have
not made more than
10 miles westing -
Most of the time it -
has been dead calm
so that our course
has been N.W. by north
have sailed in the
gravelly bay, some water
very warm and as
pleasant as it has
been warm -

Cook went over board
to swim this P.M.
Capt washed in a

boat full of water on
deck & I have seen
3 ships today &
Sun set as clear
and warm tonight
as I ever saw it at
home but long days it
will be yet before I shall
see a home sunset

so what's the use of thinking
about it -

Cape Sables bears lies
to the N. 45 miles and
to the W. 60 miles now

Thursday 15

Pleasant as yesterday
with a fair wind and
good breeze. Gosh the
helm and kept it $1\frac{1}{2}$
hours from $7\frac{1}{2}$ to 9 I could
steer with a tiller as well

as I could with a wheel
At 9 o'clock spoke an
English ship from
Boston bound E by S.
Hailed us for the distance
from salt island also
its bearing - All hands
scrubbing decks today
with water and ashels
At 11 o'clock spoke scho
Perseverance of Plymouth
with 28,000 fish (and
only a 30 ton vessel)
said he left Quero.

12 hours before we did
with a fair wind and
on the S. W. part of the
bank so he had at least
125 miles the start - just
saw a sunfish alongside
this A.M. We are having
the Perseverance a long

way behind will be out
of sight of her before
night - if we have this
wind. Lat. $42^{\circ} 38'$
Long. $83^{\circ} 58'$

Passed a
hermaphrodite Brig
bound to St. Cathar.
It blows so hard now
that we cannot carry
our staysail so hard
taken in. Parted
our mainboom topgall
Dickerson went
aloft and sent down
the block and Capt
and jibgall spliced
it. Thick and foggy
at 8 o'clock and continuing
so (8 o'clock N) the wind
has started so that our
course is now S. E. W.

middle of N by E as
our course is when
the wind is fair -
Have been talking on
the-Bible in the cabin
this evg. all sum to
believe the whole of it
as it reads and no
one knows more than
they claim

Wednesday 17

Strong breeze and thick
fog

Shipped a heavy
sea at 10th o'clock
which knocked in
shiny on side nothing
serious tho'

Very rough sea
Fog has cleared off
and sun is out

but clouds are scattered
ground (5 o'clock) We
had a nice shower at
8 $\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock it lasted
about 20 minutes -
Capt. calculated that
we shall make the
Isle of Shoals sometime
tonight - Our course
this P.M. has been by
the wind (N. W. by N $\frac{1}{2}$ W.
long. by dead reckoning
88° 13' - Capt. did not
get an observation
this M^o. Capt. and
Connor have had a
real feast this wth, at
supper about eating
soak and mostly meal
(corn & rice) made into
pudding with a quantity
of Salad and Potatoes

It was a hard storm
on both sides and a
great many hard and
large words were said
- few which would
not look well on paper

With moderate
we have got on our
Slopsail - Which
takes us N, S, E, W
Pleasant sunset

Saturday 18

Last night was the worst
night we have had so
soon we have been
out At 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock all
hands called to
furl mastsail and
in about $\frac{1}{2}$ an hour
called again to take
in jib

At 8 o'clock N Solt and
Loy worked up to
Lat $59^{\circ} 31'$ Solt $42^{\circ} 52'$

This morning at daybreak
we passed over Cosh's
ledge where we had
the widest room
that I ever saw

Probably the heel of our
vessel rode within
3 feet of the rocks!!!

The breakers rose as
high as our masthead
and a sea broke just
at the weather of us
that would have
thrown us on to our
beam ends had it
broken 10 feet farther
to leeward!!! Cap called
it "a little the narrowest

chance that he ever
saw it. The water on
Casper's ledge is but
26 feet deep.

At noon, Mrs. Brig
Penobscot of Bangor
came across over
board and Capt. Haleick
firing for the bearings
of Cape Horn but
failed not make
him hear.

Pleasant - This morning
Sea quite rough

At 1/2 past eleven.
this A.M. as I was
standing on the quarter
deck talking with the
Capt. I saw what I
took to be land and
asked the Capt. if it

was not, but he could
see nothing so I just
slip'd into the main
rigging and coul'd see
land as plain as day
I took the helm and
told Capl. to see if
it was not the heighland
of the Cape (by his reckon-
ing he had ought to
have made Cape Town
45 miles to the Navel)
He came down in
a minute and said
I was right - for it was
the backside of the cape
but he coul'd not
see how he came so
far to the Southward
I thought it was the
easiest thing in the
world to account for

it - for we sailed too
under our fore-sail a
long time last night
when the sun first
started to the N —
with the kite running
to the Southward you'll
see so it is the
simplest thing in the
world why we came 400
miles to the South.
We made the land
on our weather-bow
while steering S. S. E.
with the wind N. W.
so it was impossible
for us to get around
the point — (The land
alone by 88, distant
about 12 miles) —

We stood on to land
and at 4 o'clock P.M.

locked and stood N.W.
by W. with the wind
quite moderate -
At 5 o'clock perfectly
calm.

We carried away our
frysail this PM all
torn to rags -
Have seen the first
land sunset tonight
that I have seen
for months and how
much more natural
it would seem if my
feet were on shore
but they are not there
and ^{with} this weather
will not be for a long
time but I hope for
a breeze and if it
does not come I
cannot help do-

Gal- Sunday 19
got a breeze at 11 o'clock
last night that carried
us to the penel (Yerri) in
good shape at 6 o'clock.
Then A.M. Hutton's
Nickerson and Jordan
left us of the penel in
a dory as it would
have to be the distance
for them.

Arrived before any
one had got to the
shore. Came up
in a dory with Capt. C.
Mr. Ig. and Mr. Derrig
and went up to Frank
Smalls and I got my cloths
Went to Capt. Hutton's
and took breakfast and
then stored forward
Mr Avery's to get any

Shirt and Beawells
Offered to pay her for clavin
them up but she would
not take a cent - and
how in heavens name
could she for I had not
even the shadow of a
penny about me. But
she refused altogether
and of course saved
one from the morifying
acknowledgment that
I was a poor
devil ("as to speak it as
Jonas says). Well here
I am sitting alone
under an all sheet
maturing a plan that
will get me to Boston
without money - Strange
world this for as long as
a man has a plenty of

money he will have at
least 3 pieces on every
house! But all of this
is to no purpose for
then it is one o'clock,
and I have had no dinner
and the Lord knows
when I shall get it - but
I don't - If I had an X -
I would not ask a favor
of any man but now I

cash get 1000 dollars
is entirely beyond my
comprehension unless
I sell my watch or the
clothes from my back
O Knewt!! who ever
saw a man so mean

me an order on the
owners for he knew that
I let Buswell have
the last dollar to get
home with, what went

Went on board at 3 PM

of selling my watch —

I gave him an order

have been 1200 dollars
for I owed him \$2,000 on
account —

Got a bill from Constantine

Monday 20

Up at 5 o'clock and drunk
a cup of tea and soufflé
for breakfast. We had
3 passengers besides myself
Arrived just in season
to take the Dehurata
for Basirī. Had a good
passage. Paid at 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ and
and got to town at
3 $\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock. A part of the
way we made 12 knots
per hour. Fare 1.40

Then came directly to






