Charles recd. a letter  
from Warren today  
George Morrill P.  
called into the shop  
this P.M.

Wednesday 26<sup>th</sup>

Got up at 3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> o'clock and  
went fishing with Levi  
Caught six pickerel went  
again in the A.M. and  
got six more. Went over  
to Father's new farm with  
Levi and got some chassies

and blackberries and  
looked up a lot of bricks  
at the Laddo place

Decided to buy a piece  
of land of Gathin, in  
the orchard

to build two buildings one  
thirty seven (37) by fifteen (15)  
two stories high, sixteen  
feet posts (16) to be framed  
raised, boarded, & shingled  
and the upper outside finish  
put on. The other to be the  
same length and twenty (20)  
feet wide and a recess  
of twelve feet in length  
and seven feet wide (Piazza)  
this part to be only boarded  
no trimmings or shingle  
George came from Jamaica  
Plain today sick  
Have written to E. A. H. this morn<sup>g</sup>

Friday 4<sup>th</sup> Aug. 1864

Went on to Bath this morning at five o'clock. At the village and looked at some lumber.

In the P.M. went to Smiley's mill and bought 126 feet of Chestnut boards for \$175 and 279

feet of clear Chestnut for \$55.58 and 20 1/2 feet of merchantable for \$30.7. Paid for the whole.

Then gathered and rode over to Clough's ville and from there to Arnold's mill and looked of some stock.

Clough's have been down to Mel. Howard

Hornley and got a Deeds blank Amount 10,40.

It has rained today



Saturday 5<sup>th</sup>

Pleasant. Rode with Gasher  
and George over to Mr  
Richardson's and Mr  
Chase's to get a job of work  
succeeded at Mr Rich-  
ardson's. Walked to  
Bossawen with George  
Rode in the car from  
Eyers to Courtland

At the mill in the P.M.  
and at the Engine Meeting  
at home in the evening

Sunday 8 July

On the grand Banks in  
Latitude  $44^{\circ}20'$  Longitude  
 $49^{\circ}30'$ , Have written one  
journal of one hundred and  
fourteen pages, started for  
the Banks May 14 and got  
on, in lat.,  $45^{\circ}18'$  in 7  
days but were blown to  
the North full two degrees  
further than we intended  
to have gone on in.  
Struck fish but the Capt-  
could not be contented  
to fish without company  
so started in pursuit of  
the fleet. Found the  
fish a number of times  
and found them so plenty  
that we got 499 in half a day  
but they were not large enough  
enough

To suit the Capt so we  
left them but it was not  
fish that he was after it  
was the fleet on the ground  
The Barkhane went three  
times and at last we  
found the fleet on the  
badly hollow. Here the  
Capt thought he had got  
half his fare as soon as  
he found the vessels  
for the Knew they would  
not stay unless there  
was a plenty of fish  
but in this place was  
very much mistaken for  
we have been here  
nearly three weeks and  
have got 15 or 200 fish  
what we have got are  
good ones tho. My  
opinion of the matter  
is that we shall not

get a fair of fish before  
our outfit is gone  
for man are complaining  
of their lack of wood  
and coal. The Capt of  
the Minnie Boyd says he  
brought four cords of  
wood and half a ton of  
coal and it may last  
him through or I had  
a good fire in the Cabin  
till night (9 o'clock)

Monday 9 July  
Stood Basewell up at the  
last night. Capt Low  
got 12 lb fish last night  
Avery at Gordon to  
work using the scull  
and if we get Capt's  
enough to bait the hook  
we shall set it tonight

Have got the scull set  
with about 200 hooks

Have got only 8 fish  
today and one Halibut

At the supper table we had  
a talk about loading Grank  
Book vessel with 1500 quintals  
of fish and Avery said that  
19,000 fish such as we have  
got will do it - but I told  
him that it take at least

30,000 and then went and  
asked the Capt how it was  
and he said it would take  
at least 30,000 to do it.

After that Avery said that  
there had been fish enough  
caught in the fleet to load  
any vessel that there is here  
and that we had had as-  
qued a pick as an organizer  
I have reckoned up how



man we had got - today and  
made it 125 by count - and  
there were 33 vessels in  
the fleet which would  
make 4125 fish which I  
told him I thought would  
be rather a light load for  
some of the vessels but I  
did not know but that it  
would be a load!!

Tuesday 10 July

All hands called to get  
heave in coals. Perry did  
not get out quite as soon  
as some of the rest and the  
capt spoke to him rather  
rough but it did not mar  
east his speed a single  
whit. So the Capt told him  
that any time this week  
would do, and that was

quiet enough to start his  
gun but he found that he  
I kept cool, Capt. and  
Gordon hauled in the screw  
-ll and got 1 fish!!!! Most  
of it was all in a bunch all  
I hid in a knot - Gordon  
stood on deck for the Star-  
-board watch and then  
called me when it was  
Avery's turn so I went to the  
gangway and called the Star  
-board watch and told  
them that I should not stand  
-nd the watch alone in the  
rain when it was not my  
turn and no fish either  
It was Avery's first watch  
but he told Gordon to  
ask me if I would not  
stand a little while and  
then call him, I stood

45 minutes (5 minutes  
more than my time) and  
called him (and when he  
came up, he was as mad  
as he could well be and  
said I had called him 5  
minutes before his time.  
I told him that I did  
not and he swore that  
I did, so we compared  
the time and I was right  
and he was wrong, which  
made him still more  
rily and to keep pace with  
him I said to him that he  
had called me before my  
time in my night watch  
a number of times, then  
he swore he would be  
damned if he had, but it  
was no use this time for  
I got others to look at the

so that if I was despatched  
I think they would know  
know. Well said the  
"By God you shall not be  
called again before your  
own people or no flesh"  
But this spot did not  
last long for it was not  
more than an hour before  
he told me if I would  
like to go on board of  
the Florida to take the  
Dory and go so I waked  
Hedwe up and we  
went on board and  
took dinner and had a  
sociable chat and a  
pressing invitation to  
come again at an time  
Capt Pandeygrass then  
at dinner said he had  
spoken vessels from all



parts of the bank and  
he could not find any  
one who had got any kind  
of a teeth now and hardly  
any one that believed there  
was any fish on the bank  
to fish today  
Gog and cabri all day

Wednesday 17 July  
Hauled in the seel and  
got one fish only and then  
hove up on shore and  
stood D. W. A. Small Capt.  
Pendegross made a good  
haul heaving his anchor  
this morning. His cable  
got hooked in to an old  
anchor and a lot of chain  
which he hove in proba-  
bly worth \$500 for the hook  
weighed 2 1/2 lbs

Sailed till noon on  
our course. Then tack-  
ed and stood West  
and at night hit  
up in sight of our fleet  
that we left in the  
AM. - Capt. Low aboard  
spoke the Abstract  
and the Juliet  
with 10000 fish & went  
from Hatteras since  
we hit up & have got  
5 Fish

Thursday 12

Got anchor and stood  
toward the fleet.  
Got our topmast into  
its place again and  
hoisted our Staggail  
Got into the fleet and  
spoke the Taylor Small

with - 25000 fish and  
The Abstract with - 10000  
The Beacon with - 13000  
and The Corner of Plymouth  
with - 18000. After we  
had got thro' the fleet  
the skipper ordered out  
the mastsail which was  
done in a hurry and bent  
on in double & quick time  
for we all expected that  
we were on our way to  
Quero or Green Bank  
but when we spoke the  
Corner with - 18000 Capt  
Thot he would by there  
so have two and three lines  
and get fish as fast as  
we could haul but as  
useful we drifted off  
off them then tracked  
the ship and tried to find

This spot again but  
could not find it -  
so let go on sandy  
bottom and got no  
fish. Got 7 fish

Thursday 18

Got only 4 or five fish  
in this berth - so got  
anchor and stood toward  
a school of whales but  
lost them in the fog  
so tacked ship and stood  
to the Westward and  
fell in with the John  
May with 1500 fish  
Capt told the May that  
he was killed for two  
months longer which  
takes me six days back for  
he told us when we stopped  
that he should not be gone



more than from two months  
to two and a half and I  
think that suits not sound  
much like four months.  
But before we sailed he  
told us that we should  
be gone from 2 1/2 to 3 1/2  
months. After we spoke  
the Major Capt Wood  
toward the fleet and  
bit up in the center of  
it and got a plenty of  
it - I had docked as  
the Capt. says. Spoke  
the Lake with 300 per day  
the Empire Spring with  
450 per day and 2150 since  
day before yesterday and  
the Lapham with 350 today  
Frank Cook aboard and  
Capt Low who lost his  
anchor this morning.

Friday 14

Capt Low aboard this AM  
and advised our Capt to  
leave up and go to the  
San E, so got hook and  
sailed till night and  
struck a flut of 7 sail  
and sailed advised  
it - two or three times  
(as usual) and bit up  
spoke the Plant of D.

Capt Joseph Young with  
14'00 had got 3,000 here  
since last Friday.

Found the Gloried the  
Mimi Boyd Pauline  
here so shall have  
a plenty of company tomo-  
row if it is not rough  
(but I hope it will be)

Capt of the Plant aboard  
got 13 fish today

Sunday 15 July  
Chowder, Chowder, Chowder  
I am sick of the name  
nothing but a heap of  
bones and a brook of  
slime!! Howe and I  
took the sun and got  
our latitude found it  
to be  $44^{\circ} 16'$ , Capt's Lord  
Bowin and young aboard  
young at the and removed  
our mainsail and slow  
ed it in the forepeak  
Howe are not to leave the  
ground Barr Head present  
and many a curse the  
Capt has got from some  
of the boys for paying us  
by pretending that he  
was going straight to  
Spind when he only inten-  
ded to keep us out of

idleness & bawling on  
the main-bail -  
I have felt real blue  
all day till Sam Curn  
and Charles Stabbarcum  
on board, then we  
turned too and had  
a good sing so that  
I feel pretty good  
now. They stayed till  
9 1/2 o'clock

Monday 15

Up this morn'g as usual  
and had a good pick  
so that at night we  
had 516 fish & Capt  
Curn on board brought  
Curn here up and gave  
us a short-bath & sold  
Capt Low. Some of the  
vessels have done as  
well as we today &



I have got more fish  
today than any day since  
we came out -  
103 fish today and nine  
that are gold-banded  
Had a horrid scrape  
with a Portuguese Man  
of War, one came floating  
along by my berth under sail  
and I went down to cuff it  
in, so to see if float in  
a pail of water but it fell  
on to the deck and I took  
it up and dropped it in  
to a pail and if a fellow  
ever got a hot dose it  
was me, for my hand  
was all covered with his  
slime and it burnt  
worse than fire a hundred  
times. I went below  
and soaked my hand  
in Rum and vinegar

and rubbed with salt  
and then it pained me  
till 9 o'clock at night  
(13 hours) about as much  
as I could bear so I guess  
I shall let such things  
alone in future

Tuesday 17

Got 42 fish before noon  
then got anchor and sailed  
in company with the Florida  
for the fleet that we left  
last week & could find  
scarcely any one who was doing  
anything today had done  
well for that last two days  
(from 400 to 1000 per day)  
Saw the Empire Spoby  
had got about 250 today  
Capt. Leun said the Mā,  
the fleet and the Capt

told us if the diet met  
back we would not, but  
stand directly for Quers  
and "thunk" to his own  
the next straight along and  
so here we, Glorielle  
came along side and asked  
if we should be over  
Mansard tomorrow told  
that we should if it was  
moderate, Pod fishes plenty  
but could not strike one  
A large shark lay along side  
of us for a while, Bany hit  
a piece of floating timber  
looked like a piece of  
a steamer's paddle. It  
was parted and  
there was a lot of Rudder  
fish under it, which  
we supposed to be grass  
like it was close aboard  
Our watch was 9 till 12 o'clock

Good of my drawers this  
morning felt good I hope  
per it is too warm to wear  
them now  
Course N. N. W.  
Miles

Wednesday W  
"Thick fog stray under  
stark calm and blowing  
a gale of wind from the  
eastward" thus said  
the sailors  
In our watch rather  
calm in AM

Have made a good  
run today but it has  
been off of our course  
Have made a "doth"  
Course N. N. W.  
Florida parted her  
staysail that she is



under our lee quarter  
our Capt got an  
observation of the  
Sattin  $44^{\circ} 36'$   
Miles

Thursday 19<sup>th</sup>  
Course N. by fresh sheet  
to N. N. W. at 6 o'clock  
Bent on our Mainsail  
and are running at  
a good rate. Had just  
been up and taken in  
the staysails spoke the  
Florida and got his Satt  
stick (as the Capt did  
not get an observation  
today)  $45^{\circ} 34'$ . Commenced  
to read a book today read  
nearly a hundred pages  
has been quite a pleasant  
ent-ty but we shall get

a sneeze before  
morning.

Friday 20 July

Had to take on the main  
sail entirely before 11  
o'clock the wind blowing  
a sneeze as I anticipated  
last night when I wrote  
Jerry had a squall with  
Avery and the Capt they  
told him that they would  
bat him over the head  
if he did not hold his  
tongue, and he told  
them to commence if  
they wanted too but they  
did come to blows.  
Rained in our watch  
all of the time (from  
11 till 12 o'clock) also

in our watch from  
I till 6 o'clock. Got  
the mainsail on to-  
day this morning after  
breakfast but I had  
to take it in before 9  
o'clock wind blowing so  
that we could not carry  
it. Parted the jib &  
sheet - bucket which  
left the jib all flying  
Howe helped me mend  
it again. At one P.M.  
I got the mainsail on  
again. An English or  
American Balm on  
our weather board at 11.  
Finished reading a book  
of 180 pages after dinner  
Brewell slept today.  
Latitude  $45^{\circ} 57'$   
Have too and caught 12

fish all hands  
I got only one fish  
A steamer in sight  
a very large one standing  
to the Eastward probably  
from Boston to Liverpool  
Law a Brig running off  
before the wind

The fish that we caught  
had on them a quantity  
of fresh Coplery which is  
very unusual on the  
Galens's Banks. We  
are in about 35 or 40 fath-  
oms of wine

Cleared off in A.M. and  
has been a splendid day  
sun out as pleasant  
as ever I saw it on  
land. Must go up and  
pump ship and then  
turn in. We are easy



my wholesale under a  
light breeze Course N<sup>W</sup> by  
South

Saturday 21 July  
Run off of Greenes Bank  
in the morning with  
Running West by South -  
then stood N by West -  
but did not get sounding  
till M. Caught about  
25 fish during the day  
and at 1/2 o'clock put  
up in about 30 fathoms  
of water and on St Peter  
Bank to windward of Greens  
bank as we supposed  
last night

Sunday 22  
Cloudy in the morning  
but soon clear and  
warm and continued so

Till night - Had the  
best wash this morning  
that we have had any time  
since we have been on  
board the vessel -  
After we had washed  
our necks we took the  
draw buckets and threw  
water - cold from the  
ocean - at each other  
as hard as we could  
and got as clean as  
could be - Sam. Lowen  
Levi Small and Sam.  
Huges, from the Florida  
on board of us more  
than half of the day, had  
a first-rate sily and  
chat with Court and  
gave him my name and  
P. O. address - They and  
Small tried to strike

Three swordfish that  
came around us did  
not get either of them  
one of them was about  
15 feet long & Howe Perry  
and Gordon took the  
Dory and rowed about  
3 miles and went on  
board of a little Grenada  
got drunk on whiskey  
staid aboard an hour  
and then came off  
Capt. Avey, Howe, and  
Gordon an evening the  
scrall tonight & take  
it all together it has  
been the ~~pleasantest~~ most  
most-pleasant day that  
we have seen since we  
left home.

St. Peter's bears N  
S. W. 60 miles

Monday 23

Got back this morning  
and drifted on to fish  
as fast as we could  
haul for a long time  
but the Capt had  
you on board of the  
Seabel with Capt  
Bowen so of course we  
could not anchor  
Got 64 however on  
drift at night but  
up and I have got  
57 more in all 121  
fish today and the  
whole of them would  
not make 20 good  
fish.

The Seabel sailed  
the same day that we  
did and had been  
on to all of the Banks  
but did nothing only



on Revere when he  
had got 15000 fish -  
and the Palapsee had  
got 8000. Pleasant as  
can be in

Tuesday 24 July

Called this morning  
at 3 o'clock and 10 minutes  
and had fish as fast as  
we could haul but  
they were so small that the  
Capt called all hands  
to get anchor before  
sunrise. I thought  
about 300 out of one kil  
had them salted on the  
the meal of them  
Under sail all day  
Have two several trials  
but did not find much  
Capt Court on board  
at supper, Have two,  
and got one large fish

and concluded to  
bite up. Found fish  
about twice as large  
as last night and as  
fast as we could haul.  
Took the chain from the  
anchor and now bite  
up without any at all.  
Commenced to count  
my fish out of my kid  
but the Capt said  
no for which he had  
reason unless it was  
because he wanted  
as few fish counted  
from my kid as possible  
for I think that I have  
got more fish than  
any one since we bit  
up, but any way to suit  
the company I  
74 fish today besides what  
is in my kid now.

Wednesday 25

As pleasant as it could  
well be yesterday and is  
so far today. Went  
adrift this morning we  
got our anchor and  
stood D. M. 40 fish  
on deck. I dished  
244 of them. Went  
on about 30 fathoms of  
chain to our anchor.  
Counted out 70 fish this  
morning.

Hove to at six o'clock  
and struck fish so  
bit up all standing  
but fish as fast as we  
could haul. Struck  
adrift and should  
the water about  $\frac{1}{2}$   
fathoms. My second  
watch with Perry from  
11 till  $\frac{1}{4}$  o'clock

Thursday 28 July  
Called 10 minutes  
before my watch this morn-  
ning. Have got 72  
77 fish today and last  
night. I labelled me  
a throat today in  
good shape and I got  
my lines spliced over  
so that they are not a  
pkin in length now.  
Howe and Avery had  
a regular spilt party  
Howe came up to  
windward though  
and Avery acknowledge  
ed that he was in  
fault. Concluded  
to make sail for  
Luzero. with the Florida  
at four o'clock, so got  
anchor, and laid our



course 80° by South - with  
a good breeze, good  
in staysail at 8 1/2  
o'clock, Watch and  
water commencing at  
9 o'clock. My walk  
from 11m. till 3 o'clock  
Latitude 46° 10' on  
board the Gloucester  
Rain and fog, last  
night. Pleasant  
enough today or at  
least would be if I  
were any where else than  
on a Bank cruise  
after Cod fish and not  
finding them

Friday 27

Sailed all night  
and early this morn  
ing saw a Pad on

Quere se had an  
course per it -  
Spoke the Pauline  
Capt - Hopkins with  
had been on the bark  
two or three days  
Spoke the Stung and  
ready with 14000  
fish - Spoke of Man  
blehead with 14500  
Next - the Oliver Branch  
of Yarmouth Nova Scotia  
of 10,000 Next - the  
Flavivine of Barristock  
with 400 Quinal had  
been on the bark  
only 4 weeks!! Next -  
the Emma M Russell  
of Marblehead with  
9000 Next - the  
Merriman with 13,000  
weeks on the Bark

Saurel with - 7000  
had been on the Bank  
5 weeks. I left the latitude  
of Manchester with  
5000 on the bank 3  
weeks, Bit up at  
7 1/2 o'clock with the  
tid running 50 knots  
per hour. I should think  
Run to windward of  
Quero and then  
laid a course due  
south and found  
36 sail at anchor  
but not one of them  
could catch a fish  
on board of their vessels  
all of them had their  
boats out so we went  
to work rigging our boats  
for fishing

Saturday 28  
Had good fishing at  
3 1/2 o'clock - I have  
got 94 fish today  
I have sett the scroll  
with about 400 hooks  
we cut the bail out  
of the Codfish -  
Schr. Ruzella of Orleans  
came down and spoke  
us had been on the  
bank on week found  
fish scarce - I had  
been with one far  
sold it for \$390 per  
Lunata - Capt asked  
how long we should  
stay on the bank our  
Capt said for twenty  
days!!! Well I guess so  
now I start on a  
three months voyage and



stay five months. <sup>1111</sup>  
Holds if you catch me  
on ship I thank you  
we'll be from W. I. I.  
This will be a  
breed in my opinion

Sunday 29

Look in, or rather  
overhauled the scull  
got 15 fish and two  
shellfish, Baked it  
and salt it again  
Washed on deck again  
This morning and then  
went on board of the  
Romero of Gloucester with  
Linn and slow took  
our letters with us for  
the purpose of sending  
them home by her as she  
had her fluro and stripe

at Mablehead and  
we supposed she was  
bound home in a  
few days. Found a  
good hearted and  
generous Skipper as  
well as crew he took  
our letters and said  
he would put them  
onto the P. O. at  
Mablehead as soon  
as he got on. Had  
10300 fish (5 1/2 quintals)  
and will sail as soon  
as he gets on M, more  
than for P. M. went  
aboard of the Salisbury  
Manchester - staid  
about 4 hours and  
took away several  
boxes and a lot of  
papers, presents from the



A bet with Capt  
Stephens that it was  
not a tin horn (of  
a 1/2 bush of Red Apples)  
I won the bet as it  
was an oar hollowed  
out and wound with  
a cord line. The Capt  
could make 7 open  
notes on it and they  
sounded like a quail  
flute. Got a bbl  
of peeps from the  
paid \$500 cash as  
the Capt did not  
like to take an order on  
the owners for so big  
an amount. Went  
aboard of the Perma  
and got a bbl of peeps  
paid \$800 gave an  
order on the owners



Engaged a Dory of  
the "Deke", Emma Knight  
One vessel sailed  
for home today and  
there are four more  
ready as soon as a  
pair of good foremen  
Hewer Gardner and  
I show the scull and  
got 2 fish!!!! Capt  
did the whole thing  
and the day that he  
slot it to. We  
unbent all of the hooks  
and show and myself  
take care of all of the  
Commenced fishing in  
boats today got 2  
fish a show gave with  
you tomorrow morning  
thruated all of the  
fish today & Capt

spoke for wood and  
water on board of the  
Rover today

Tuesday 31

Have tried the fish  
on the Skiff today got  
7 fish and haul a  
haul row of 4 or 5 miles  
to the fishing ground  
(out and back) have  
fished with one. We  
had a good sail the  
last time we came  
in. Quite rough so  
much so that we  
could not make our  
anchor hold on at all  
so went aboard and  
got the vessel under  
way and beat up to  
the Army Knight and

went aboard with  
Howe Gordon and  
Capt. Barriell G. R.  
Subwell on board as  
passenger to Marblehead  
His thumb was so sore  
that there was no hope  
of him & the boat  
did not bring home

The crew gave me a  
dozen Cod hooks and  
a haggul line. Howe  
got 1/2 a dozen hooks  
and a line better than  
mine. The A. Knight  
has been out 15 weeks  
and has got 17,000 large  
fish (about 750 yds)

We got 2 bbls of pogys  
and 2 bbls of water  
paid \$5.50 for the  
pogys per bbl

Capt- Bol in Day of  
the A.M. paid 1/2  
00 with pictures

August 12<sup>th</sup>

Went out in the  
skiff with Howe and got  
38 fish. Came in to  
breakfast and went  
again and got only 2  
Bol on at 11/4 AM,  
and Avery told us if  
we wanted to rest  
that we might dress  
down the fish which  
we did and then  
turned on to rest  
for we had rowed 5  
or 6 miles and were  
tired as Capt did  
not like it - because  
we did not go out.



again as soon as we  
got dinner & he  
called us directly to  
get anchor and work  
up to the fleet and  
a disagreeable time  
we held top 2. How  
told the Capt that he  
wanted his watch  
below as much as they  
did and swore he  
would have it - then  
commenced thru talk  
all around the board  
about being at home  
when he agreed to do  
we all told him that  
if he did not do as  
they agreed to that he  
must pay us for it  
(a reasonable price)  
but he swore he would

2

not say us a cent more  
if we have gone six  
months longer and if  
there was provision  
enough to be had he  
would never leave the  
bank till he had a  
load of fish just as  
sure as he was sitting  
on the little head  
Capt said he had  
rather have a crew  
of Nova Sealed men  
than such a dead  
set as he had got  
this year. I never  
heard such hard,  
abusive language as  
the Cape used, so  
we told him that we  
should go a hares on  
the load of fish if he

did not sit us on  
shore at the end of  
3 1/2 months from the  
23 of April (the time  
we shipped) but it  
was all of no use for  
the sword the more  
that we should stay  
on the banks as long  
as there was any thing  
to live on and if we  
did not hold our tongues  
he would go back to  
the General Bark.

We told him that we  
would get in the day  
our part of the wine  
and the 10 pipes our part  
has as to going on the  
skiff all of the wine we  
would not so he  
call the boys alongside

and told us to go  
out and fish in  
them so we started  
I got 17 large fish  
making in all 30  
fish today.

Two sharks came up  
and took all my  
hooks and leads so  
so I had to leave up  
and go aboard.

A schooner came along  
and the Capt. hailed  
her for the Don, went  
aboard and paid 32  
00 dollars for a 10 foot  
long



Thursday Aug 2  
So rough that we did  
not get out till near  
10 AM, only got 7 fish.  
I was sick this morning  
and the Capt. asked Goodell  
if he would not go in  
my room but he said he  
would not get into the  
dog unless he could get  
rid of all of the fish  
so I went - Broiled it  
again after dinner but  
I came back and found  
my sick, could eat  
no supper. Got up and  
threw a tub full  
of fish and washed  
down decks & fish  
today; I never saw the  
vesSEL well as it has  
the last 24 hours -

Friday Aug 3

So sick that I could  
not go out in my day  
today - Avey got 590  
fish this P.M.

Howe has not got  
in yet - we are afraid  
that he is lost  
Steward is singing  
the Bill and blowing  
the Horn for him  
to come aboard  
Have got only 1 bush  
all day

Saturday 4

Sick in my berth  
all day - The very best  
fishing day we have  
seen - The boats  
went out at 5 o'clock  
and laid till 9 o'clock

Buswell would have called it - a purple edge mines if he had been lucky - I love the loglet - Dory on the bows and took them all aboard - Only 2 fish today -

Sunday 5-

Came on to rain in my morning watch Capt called me and went below before he was relieved which is strictly against his own rules - I could hardly get on deck I was so weak that I could hardly walk - I have been growing

weaker all of the time  
since I spit blood  
last Friday afternoon  
Have been in my  
berth most of the day

Monday 6

Was not able to stand  
only 20 minutes of my  
watch last night &  
so called Levi to  
stand the rest of it  
Did not get up in  
the morning when  
called on. It has rained  
more or less all day  
and is blowing quite  
fresh as can hardly  
walk deck today

Tuesday 7

Was not called to



watch last night if  
I had been I could not  
have done it any way  
got anchor and sailed  
up into the fleet this  
A.M. have not been  
on deck more than an  
hour all day  
I've talked with the  
Capt about sending me  
home he said he would  
send me by the "Rough and  
Ready" (Capt Chandler of  
Board) which would  
sail next Saturday  
Cannot eat anything  
at all today, at least  
anything worth mentioning  
I am weaker  
than I was yesterday

Wednesday 8

Did not sleep scarcely  
any last night - and  
consequently feel bad  
enough this morning -

The sea is not as rough  
as it was yesterday  
P. M.

It is pleasant on deck  
but how little do I enjoy  
it; how can I enjoy  
what to me brings no  
prospect of happiness

Here I sit, stand, or walk  
with as the case may be  
with my limbs tottering  
under the weight of  
my light body and every  
day brings to my mind  
the comparison of degrees  
in the old Grammar *we  
weaker, weaker, weakest*

For three days from this  
hour I expect to be sailing  
toward home. But when  
that time comes I may  
have to wait — hour

Whatever this poor childhous -  
I've seen my fondest hopes decay

Thursday

Friday 9 Aug.

Out of my berth I part  
of the day - got back  
land stood into the  
fleet again - after  
I had turned in  
for the night - Capt  
of Hop Pond came  
along side and told  
us that Capt Chandler  
would sail tonight  
if the wind breised  
up and that I  
must go aboard

directly - If I calculated  
to go home I see I got  
my things ready and  
went - I worked with  
Capt. Gordon Howe and  
Lew - It was getting yiti-  
rough when we went -  
Capt. did not say a  
word about paying me  
for my work so I did  
not - I named it - To pin  
Turned in at 8 o'clock  
and tried to sleep but  
could not - All hands  
called to get anchors  
at 11 o'clock, after  
which part of the  
crew turned in  
but were called again  
to reef fore sail and  
take in jib, and  
if it had been on



boards of the Alvarado  
it would have been  
done in 1/2 of the time  
that it was here  
The crew were more than  
40 minutes getting out  
It blew a perfect gale  
and the sea came  
down in sheets so  
the crew had some  
excuse for not getting  
out sooner -

Again at 4 o'clock all  
hands they to take in  
boats and clear  
decks. Made out  
a bad night's work  
of it -

Friday 10

Went to the ad Rock  
and put the Gas  
pat a row of Sea and

a little piece of bread  
for breakfast &  
Went on deck but  
it rained so that  
I did not stop.

Spoke this A.M. Clark  
of Beverly bound to the  
Bank for a second  
year, undoubtedly  
best's presale and  
job. Course D. W.

This has been a hard  
days work for all hands  
Fanned in at Yachuck  
Got some old papers  
and read a little.

~~Patience~~ Saturday 11  
Sick, sick sick this  
morning. The wind  
blowing a gale this  
morning the same

as it has all the  
time since we started  
from the reef out  
of the Foresail at  
10 o'clock A.M. There  
in sight of a fleet of  
8 or 10 sail of vessels  
on middle bank  
We are now within 12  
or 20 miles of the S.E.  
End of this Island of  
and if the hauls around  
to the W. we shall not  
be able to get by the  
Island but it will  
be a hard beat off if  
we see shore if  
we get off of it at all  
The wind begins to rise  
and an occasional  
spat of rain - Lat. 44° 53'  
and 30 miles from the  
Island

Spoke this Robert-Bruce  
of Gloucester said the  
Island bore S.W. by S  
36 miles - Spoke an  
English cutter but  
did not understand  
the bearing of the Island  
said the distance was  
about 18 miles -

All day it has been  
all hands on deck  
to reef or take out  
reefs in the fore sail  
or reef the jib or  
haul down the  
lizard or put it up  
After supper all  
hands called to  
hold council about  
our course tonight  
Capt is very much  
pleas'd and I



do not know why we  
all should not be —  
The storm still  
continues and I think  
increases. It is certain  
that the vessel pitches  
worse and worse every  
minute. Twice I have  
crawled on deck and  
have shipped a sea  
each time. I was  
standing on the quarter  
when a sea came over  
my head breaking all  
like one, but I went  
below as soon as possible  
and took off my wet clothes

Sunday 12

The storm is over  
and the sea has nearly  
gone down, the sun

is shining brightly -  
Our course now is  
N. N. W. The weather  
began to moderate at  
a little past midnight -  
I think we are over the  
N. W. bar of the Island  
and it appears now I  
suppose about 2 by 3  
Sun mackerel jumping  
out of water this morning  
We have passed several  
vessels at anchor -

A year ago today I was at  
home and at Church not  
once dreaming that today  
I should be thousands of  
miles at sea so sick  
that I could hardly walk  
deck, but so it is!  
Then I was in the enjoyment  
of comparative health and

lived in anticipation of  
happiness beyond which  
there is but one step

What a difference in  
a mans circumstances  
a few short months will  
bring! but then these changes  
might occur to me as  
well as any one else for  
aught that I know

Perhaps it is my destiny  
I really begin to believe  
it is tho' predestination  
is not written in my creed  
Capt's orders now to bend  
on the main sail

The birds are flying over our  
heads watching the Sunday  
mornning exercise no  
doubt tho' they it sacrifice  
but then anything is deemed  
a work of necessity aboard of  
ship on Sunday!!

Clear and pleasant all day have been on deck more than half of the time. Have read 200 pages in "The Children of the Abbey". We had 0 pie's for supper. Manufacture here in a novel way the meat was pounded up instead of being cut and the crust was rolled out with a mangle on an old table. — We had a party in the Cabin with Mr. S. and James Corne of Mendocino. They stayed in the P.M.

Monday 13

Sail 44° 10' Long. 61° 31'  
Have had a pleasant



day with-moderate-  
winded-course Mr. D  
have been reading part  
of the day in "The History  
of the Abbey" - Capt has  
boarded at sea on the  
Mansail and she went  
off of the job - It is sun-  
ny now and  
looks like a stormy  
night - Dickerson  
and Jordan have been  
expressing games for  
my benefit -

Tuesday 14 Aug 56  
Got up this morning  
at 6 o'clock and went  
on deck and washed  
then went to breakfast  
The pain continued  
till about 1 o'clock M -

Locked ship at midnight  
and stood N. & N. W.  
with a good breeze  
I have finished "The Chil-  
dren of the Abbey" a  
book of 750 pages full of  
remarkable adventures  
all of which terminate  
"as usual" in an adventure  
called marriage (the height  
of happiness "so to speak" as  
Jonas says.) But then  
what is the use of reading  
of stories the incidents of  
which bring to mind  
the "dreams of other days"  
which alas! may too long  
be remembered.  
Lat. 43° 44' Long 69° 7'  
So we have yet 12 1/2 days  
to run before we make  
Cape Sables!

Have been on the  
wind all of the P.M.  
till about 6 o'clock

fair now our course

Sun set - real pleasant  
tonight - On deck  
till eight o'clock

Wednesday 15-

As pleasant - this  
morning as it was  
last night - At

E. S. under full sail  
Lat.  $42^{\circ} 40'$

Thursday 16

Pleasant as yesterday  
with a fair wind and  
good breeze - took the  
helm and kept it 1 1/2  
hours (from 7 1/2 to 9) could  
steer with a better asswell

as I could with a wheel  
At 9 o'clock I spoke an  
English schooner from  
Boston bound E by S.  
Hailed us for the distance  
from Sable Island, also  
to bearing - All hands  
scrubbing decks together  
with water and ashels  
At 11 o'clock spoke schooner  
Perseverance of Plymouth  
with 2800 of fish (and  
only a 50 ton vessel)  
Sailed to left - 2 hours

12 hours before we did  
with a fair wind, and  
on the S. W. part of the  
bank to be met at least  
125 miles the start - just  
saw a sun fish alongside  
this A.M. We are leaving  
the Perseverance a long

way behind will be out  
of sight - of her before  
tonight - if we have this  
breeze - Lat.  $42^{\circ} 30'$   
Long.  $83^{\circ} 30'$

Passed a  
kermaphodite Brig  
Bound to the Eastward  
The breeze so hard now  
that we cannot carry  
our staysail so have  
taken it in. Parted  
our main boom to lift  
Nickerson went  
aloft and sent down  
the block and Capt  
and Jordan spliced  
it. Thick and foggy  
at 8 o'clock and continues  
so (8 o'clock) The wind

Gooday 17

Strong breeze and thick  
fog

Shipped a heavy  
sea a 10/2 vessel

Very rough sea  
Fog has cleared off  
and sun is out



but clouds are scattered  
ground (5 o'clock) We  
had a nice shower at  
3 1/2 o'clock it lasted  
about 20 minutes -  
Capt calculated that  
we shall make the  
Isle of Shoals sometime  
tonight - Our course  
this P.M. has been by  
the wind (Dr. W. by W 1/2 S.  
S.W. by dead reckoning  
88° 13' - Capt did not  
get an observation  
this Morn Capt and  
Connor have had a  
real jaw this ev. at  
supper about eating  
saler and mostly meal  
(corn & rye) made into  
padding with a quantity  
of Saleratus and Molasses

It was a hard storm  
on both sides and a  
great many haul and

Quite moderate  
we have got on our  
Hapsail - Wind  
takes us W, N, W  
Pleasant sunset

Saturday 18

Last night was the worst  
night we have had  
some we have been  
out - At 1/2 o'clock  
all hands called to  
furl mainsail and  
in about 1/2 an hour  
called again to take  
in jib -

At 8 o'clock Salt and  
Liny worked up to  
Seng  $69^{\circ}31'$  Salt  $42^{\circ}52'$

This morning at daybreak  
we passed over Cash's  
ledge where we had  
the roughest trim  
that I ever saw

Probably the keel of our  
vessel was within  
3 feet of the rocks!!!

The breakers rose as  
high as our masthead  
and a sea broke just  
at the weather of us  
that would have  
thrown us on to our  
beam ends had it  
broke 10 feet farther  
to leeward!!! Cop called  
it a little the narrowest

chance that he ever  
saw. The water on  
Cassie's ledge is but  
20 feet deep.  
Aman. Her Brig  
Penobscot of Bangor  
came across our  
bow and Capt. Hallett  
fired for the bearings  
of Cape Horn but  
could not make  
him hear.  
Pleasant this morning  
Sea yet rough

At 1/2 past eleven.  
this A.M. as I was  
standing on the quarter  
deck talking with the  
Capt. I saw what I  
took to be land and  
asked the Capt. if it



was not, but he could  
see nothing so I just  
step'd into the main  
rigging and could see  
land as plain as day  
I took the helm and  
told Capt to see if  
it was not the highland  
of the Cape (by his reckon-  
ing he had ought to  
have made Cape Horn  
45 miles to the land)  
He came down in  
a minute and said  
I was right - for it was  
the backside of the Cape  
but he could not  
see how he came so  
far to the Southward  
I that it was the  
easiest thing in the  
world to account for

it - for we laid too  
under our foresail a  
long time last night  
when the wind first  
blasted to the N  
with the kite running  
to the Southward quite  
strong so it is the  
simplest thing in the  
world why we came 400  
miles to the Southward  
We made the land  
on our weather bow  
while steering S by S by E  
with the wind N by N  
so it was impossible  
for us to get around  
the point - (The land  
borne S by W distant  
about 12 miles) -  
We stood on to land  
and at 4 o'clock P.M.

tacked and stood S.W.  
by N. with the wind  
quite moderate —  
At 2 o'clock perfectly  
calm.

We carried away our  
staysail this P.M. all  
corn to sea —

I have seen the first  
land sunset tonight  
that I have seen  
for months and how  
much more natural  
it would seem if my  
feet were on shore  
but they are not there  
and <sup>with</sup> this weather  
will not be for a long  
time but I hope for  
a breeze and if it  
does not come I  
cannot help it

Got - Sunday 19

Got a breeze at 11 o'clock  
last night that carried  
us to the point (Grua)  
in good shape at 6 o'clock  
this A.M. Hutcheson  
Dickerson and Jordan  
left us of the point in  
a dog as it would  
save the distance  
for them

Anchored before any  
one had got to the  
shore. Came up  
in a dog with Capt.  
Mr. Dy and Mr. Doreau  
and went up to Frank  
Small and got in the  
went to Capt. Huppins  
and took breakfast and  
then stood toward  
Mr. Avery's to get my



skirt - and Brewell's  
offered to pay her for doing  
them up but she would  
not take a cent - and  
how in heavens name  
could she for I had not  
even the shadow of a  
penny about me. But  
she refused altogether  
and of course saved  
me from the mortifying  
acknowledgement  
that I was a poor  
devil ("so to speak" as  
Jonas says). Well here  
I am sitting alone  
under an all sheet  
making a plan that  
will get me to Boston  
without money - Strange  
world this for as long as  
a man has a plenty of

money he will have at  
least 3 friends in every  
house! But all of this  
is to no purpose for  
here it is one setback  
and I have had no dinner  
and the Lord knows  
when I shall get it but  
I dont - If I had an X -  
I would not ask a favor  
of any man but how I  
can get 1000 dollars  
is entirely beyond my  
comprehension unless  
I sell my watch or the  
cloths from my back  
O Knew!! who never  
saw a man so mean  
that he would not  
pay a fellow for fishing  
on Grand Bank but  
then he dont intend

to pay me if he did  
he would I have given  
me an order on the  
owners for the brass that  
I let Buswell have  
the last dollar to get  
home with, what about  
money or the love of it  
do!!!

Went on board at 3 P.M.  
and packed up my cloths  
and bot. went ashore to  
Mr Collins's store and  
am to sail with him to  
Provincetown tomorrow  
morning. Called on  
at Mr Frank Small's  
and should have taken  
tea there if Mrs. Stephens  
had not sent for me  
to take tea with her -  
Mr Small called on

a little while on the  
way, and asked me to  
walk out with him a  
little way. I told him  
in the morning that  
I had not got money enough  
to get home with, so he  
offered me ten dollars  
for that purpose which  
I was very glad to receive  
for if he had not let me  
have it I should have  
been under the necessity  
of selling my watch -  
I gave him an order  
on Capt. St. John's for  
1000 dollars but it should  
have been 1200 dollars  
for I owed him \$200 on  
account -

Got a letter from Constantinople  
dated May 11. On Jan. 18 we met  
left it and came of 3 small



Monday 20

Up at 5 o'clock and drank  
a cup of tea and sailed  
for Providence. We had  
3 passengers besides myself  
Arrived just in season  
to take the Schuylkill  
for Boston. Had a good  
passage. Paid at 18/2

and got to town at
