

OK Polio Interest Stays High

Final results of the highly successful campaign to immunize the population of Cleveland against polio have been reported to the leaders of the Bay Area's K. O. Polio program scheduled to begin September 23.

Sim Menoorsky, a report on the first day of the polio vaccination program in the Dallas-Fort Worth epidemic area confirms the finding of Cleveland doctors that all age groups are anxious to cooperate in wiping out the crippling disease.

Dr. Edward B. Shaw, head of the Bay Area Medical association committee, sponsors of the K. O. Polio campaign, announced to his committee members today that 91.3 per cent of the Cleveland population—or approximately 1,500,000 people—turned out for the last of three inoculations of the oral vaccine.

This was an insignificant decrease from the 93 per cent who participated during the first phase of the program. Dr. Shaw pointed out, indicating that there was little loss of interest on the part of the public during the 12 weeks the Cleveland program was conducted.

Three doses of Sabin oral vaccine, given approximately six weeks apart, are required to immunize against the three types of polio.

In 23 Texas counties, including Dallas and Fort Worth, well over a million people were inoculated against type 1 polio virus in less than 8 hours on July 29. When the program is completed there, medical officials expect to have given the vaccine to a higher percentage of the population than the history-making Cleveland effort achieved.

The goal for the Bay Area K. O. POLIO program is to provide vaccine for 3,500,000 people, or a minimum of 90 per cent of all residents in San Francisco, Alameda, Contra Costa, Marin, Santa Clara and San Mateo counties.

Mrs. Varian's Will Filed

REDWOOD CITY — Mrs. Winifred H. Varian, widow of inventor Sigurd F. Varian, left a large part of her estate to charity, according to her will, which was filed for probate in superior court here.

Mrs. Varian was found dead in her Menlo Park home July 11. Her husband was killed last October in a plane crash off the coast of Mexico, leaving an estate valued at more than \$3,000,000.

In her will, Mrs. Varian bequeathed one-eighth of her estate, but not less than \$375,000, to her daughter, Mrs. Lorna V. Van Linde of Menlo Park.

The same bequest was made to her son, John O. Varian of Bradley. A like amount, less \$100,000, was left to her brother, Victor Hog of Hamilton, Ontario, and his family.

Two-thirds of the remainder was left to the Sigurd F. and Winifred H. Varian Charitable Foundation, to benefit charities selected by the executors of the estate. The remaining one-third was left in equal shares to her son and daughter and their families.

Income for County 2nd In State

Californians reported an adjusted gross income of \$31,353,154,000 on 1960 state personal income tax returns, State Controller Alan Cranston announced today.

San Mateo residents reported \$1,113,563,250 as their total income for the year. This brings the average-per-return to \$5580 in the county, and made San Mateo the second richest county (per tax return) of the state's 58 counties.

The state total represents a \$1.6 billion, or 5.4 per cent increase over the previous year.

Cranston, chairman of the Franchise Tax Board, said the 1961 calendar year report of the board shows 4,254,462 returns were filed. Of these, approximately four-fifths, or 3,331,973 were taxable. (Single persons earning less than \$1500 a year and married persons earning less than \$3,000 are not required to file returns.)

Cranston noted that the state's average adjusted gross income per taxable return was \$8448, compared with \$8364 the year before.

Marin county topped the list with an average of \$9953 per taxable return. San Mateo county \$9350 was second and Santa Barbara county was third with \$9101.

Marin also ranked first in the amount of tax assessed per taxable return with \$106.84. The statewide average was \$77.52.

Los Angeles county accounted for 1,721,815 returns—about 40 per cent of the total.
