Gold in Plenty

A Letter Received From the Land of Gold at the Yukon's Mouth.

Terrible Sufferings of Prospectors During the Winter-Lumbar Scarce.

A letter received by Ralph Hubbard from Cape Nome, the new gold fields at the north of Norton sound, under date of December 11th, 1898, says:

This is now the depth of winter, and such a winter I never want to see again. The hardships at this place have been terrible, and I can not begin to tell what we all have suffered, just for the sake of a little yellow metal that may do us more harm than good after we get it.

Several have died from scurvy and many have had disease now.

The wood that we have to burn for firewood is very short and small; really it is nothing but brush, and it is so scarce that we have to be very economical with it.

The claims are hard to work, necessitating a great deal of ditching and draining and changing the course of the water.

Every one here has claims and all are making arrangements for a large lot of working next summer, hoping to clean up enough to let them quit the country before they get here for another winter.

On Saturday evening telegrams were received by newspaper men in the city from Halifax papers asking for further information regarding those who are known to the goldfields.

The Hague, June 10.—At today's meeting of the Brussels conference section of the conference Major-General Sir John Ardagh, of the British High Commission, declared that Great Britain could not bind herself to sign a convention drawn from the Brussels conference of 1874, but must reserve the right of judging of the necessity or expediency of abiding by the stipulations of that conference.

TROOPS FOR SOUTH AFRICA.

A Large Number Have Already Been Despatched—The Alleged Conspiracy.

London, June 10.—Politicians who have closely followed the affairs of the Transvaal and Mr. Chamberlain's attitude with respect to them, are fully satisfied that the colonial secretary's statement in the House of Commons on Thursday meant that Sir Alfred Milner had exhausted every diplomatic resource to effect a reasonable settlement of the matter in dispute, and that it had been proved finally that President Kruger was irreconcilable.

Every steamer sailing for South Africa has carried fresh troops, and quantities of munitions of war.

The British troops in South Africa number 11,000 men, commanded by the veteran Major-General Sir William Francis Butler, who has been in command in South Africa since 1888.

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Stewart River, April 8.

ROSSLAND.
On Friday night the Masonic hall was destroyed by fire. While going to a fire at the War Eagle ore bins, caused by burning brush on Saturday afternoon, the chemical fire engine was trying to turn the corner of Columbia avenue. The crowd promptly righted the machine.

YMIL.
The special constables at the Ymir mine struck work the other day, objecting to manual labor, as that did not come under the heading of police duties. The miners here are very quiet and orderly, but are determined not to accept less than the standard union wage, \$3.50 for the eight-hour shift.—News-Advertiser.

NEW WESTMINSTER.
A man by the name of Lee was brought into the city by Constable Hughes, of Mission City, on Thursday. He was taken to the Columbia hospital, where he died on Thursday afternoon. Chief McPhie, of the police department, has given notice to all owners of wooden buildings inside the fire limit that the same must be removed before July 15th.

Frank Odlin, who, as previously reported, died of cholera at Soda Creek, was born at Point Roberts in 1864. At the early age of 17 he was captain of the Reliance, owned by the Canadian Pacific Navigation company and had been running on the Fraser up till 1895, when he accepted the position of captain of the Klondike transportation boat called the Schwatka, which was named between Vancouver and the Yukon.

The ranges in the neighborhood of Kamloops are looking better than they have done for years. Cattle owners are about to come out of their pens, and judging from present appearances, will not be disappointed. Cattle and horses on the ranges are in excellent condition.

W. J. Curry, Nanaimo's well known dentist, is about to take up his residence in Kamloops. His wife's health necessitates her removal to the dry belt, and so Dr. Curry is disposing of his business and other interests in Nanaimo with the intention of settling in Kamloops as quickly as possible. Mrs. Curry came up from Nanaimo last Sunday, and is now out at Nicola lake. Dr. Curry expects to be here within two weeks.—Inland Sentinel.

The Kamloops Hotel Co. have purchased a site on Main street for their proposed hotel. The company hope to have the building underway in the course of a few weeks.

VANCOUVER.
At Friday night's meeting of the Trades and Labor Council Bro. Williams, for the building committee, recommended the purchase of the two lots on the southwest corner of Pender and Hamilton streets, adjoining the foot of the public buildings in the opposite block the lots can be secured for \$4,000 cash. The committee suggested that the council ask every member of the different unions in the city to donate one day's pay, as a free gift for the purchase of the site. It is estimated this would yield \$5,000, leaving \$1,000 to be raised by gifts from funds or the liberality of those who could give more than one day's pay. The committee was decidedly of the opinion that the purchase of the site, and the building operations were commenced. If this was done it would be an easy matter to borrow say \$6,000 at 6 per cent, to put up a good building (brick), two stories high, the ground floor to consist of three stores, or, if desired, a corner store and suites of offices, facing on Pender street, with a good dwelling house facing on Hamilton street. The upper story would consist of one large hall, capable of seating about 500 persons; two smaller halls for motion pictures and a committee room, with lavatory. The committee firmly believed that such a building, situated on the spot indicated, would yield a revenue from the start and in a few years would pay off the principal.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Works it was decided, in reference to the sewerage question, that directions be given to the city solicitor to prepare a by-law for submission to the electors to borrow money for the construction of two sewage sewage tanks, one on Monks Pleasant and the other in Prior street section on the lines of the recommendation of the mayor and engineer, according to the scheme in vogue in Champlain, Ill.

Justice Drake in passing sentence remarked that the jury had taken the view that the prisoner was not guilty as a thief but that he was guilty of not making entries in the railway company's books, which as a servant of the company it was his duty to enter. This was a criminal offence, but as the prisoner had his ground, and had given the railway officials every assistance in their investigation of the accounts, he would take this into account in passing the sentence which he was bound to impose in the interests of society. The sentence was that he be sentenced to fifteen months imprisonment in the provincial jail at hard labor.

Sinclair pleaded his age and his family of six small children as reasons for a lenient sentence. Justice Drake said that he could sympathize with the prisoner's family very much and added that he had received a very strong petition. The prisoner, however, had an opportunity of expressing himself and saying anything in mitigation of his crime, but he did not take advantage of it. He could not close his eyes to the fact that the prisoner had placed every obstacle possible in the way of the prosecution and in preventing his own return to this country. So far as the evidence went, large sums of money had been traced into the hands of the prisoner and had never been traced out. Justice Drake concluded by saying that he could not allow consideration for the prisoner's family to interfere with the administration of justice and under the circumstances he would sentence the prisoner to two years in the penitentiary.
