AN AFRICAN TRAGEDY.

(How a British Officer Was Killed and Eaten by Black Cannibals.)

Eastern papers have published full details of the killing and eating, on the Congo, of Captain Maurice Bell who was in the service of the Free State. The particulars, which are supplied by Lieutenant F. J. Andrew, a Scotsman, in the Belgian service, who was with Captain Bell, and has lately returned to England from the Upper Congo, invited, are as follows; On January 18 last Captain Bell, having been ordered down the river from his post at Gambuya, a station on the Aruwima, some miles in the interior, to Basoko, at the confluence on the Congo and the Aruwimi, left the latter place on an expedition against certain Aruwimi tribes living four days journey from the river. The expedition was commanded by Commandant Van Wert, who was accompanied by Lieutenant Giertsens (a Scandinaviau), Captain Bell, and 150 black troops, It so ject was to prevent the tribe descending upon the peaceful villages on the main Congo River. 

Now, the knowledge of the reading of these died out with the decline of Egypt, and "hieroglypics" became a synonym for everything that is mysterious.

This was the famous "Rosetta stone." This inscription was copied and circulated among scholars, and after long and ingenious efforts the alphabet of the hieroglyphics was made out; so that now these carvings are read with ease and certainty and a new flood of light has been thrown on the history of ancient Egypt.
