ENEMY'S DRIVE FOR PARIS BROKEN UP BY FRENCH TROOPS

WITH ONLY ONE SCHOONER'S CREW MISSING, U BOAT RAID OFF COAST OF U. S. FAILED OF ITS OBJECT

French Capital Is Shelled Again by Big German Weapons

FRENCH RETOOK VILLAGE AND LOST SOME GROUND, BUT, AIDED BY U. S. TROOPS, FOILED ATTEMPT ON MARNE

Enemy's Plans Apparently Was to Sink Troopships Soon After They Had Left American Ports; Failed to Destroy Any; Sea Being Scoured for Enemy Craft

ISLAND RAILWAY SUBJECT TAKEN UP VIGOROUSLY BY PREMIER WHEN IN OTTAWA

PRESENCE OF U. S. TROOPS BEING FELT

German Battalion Which Had Crossed Marne Was Hurlled Back After Suffering Heavy Losses; Americans Threw Enemy Back North of Neuilly Wood

Washington, June 4.—The Navy Department officials believe the German submarine or group of submarines that sank probably more than ten American vessels off the Atlantic coast is on its way back to its base and that for the time being the danger is over.

Following on an extremely busy and eventful session the Hon. John Oliver, Premier of British Columbia, went to Ottawa on April 24, spent an equally busy time in the national capital and in other cities of the East, and returned to his office in the Parliament Buildings this morning.

Splendid Counter-Attack at Neuilly Wood; Aided French on Marne

Paris, June 4.—The French have stopped the German drive toward Paris, it now may be safely said. As was forecasted when the offensive began, it lasted just eight days. The enemy movement is now splitting up into a series of battles for positions in which the French have the advantage of terrain.

Warships, submarine chasers and aeroplanes were scouring the seas to-day in search of the enemy craft. The navy officials threw a veil of secrecy over their movements, however, and requested the newspapers to make no mention of their whereabouts.

Of vital interest to the people of Victoria and Vancouver Island generally is the prospect of construction work on the island section of the Canadian Northern Pacific Railway.

London, June 4.—American troops are fighting alongside the French in holding up the new German rush and already have begun to make their presence strongly felt.

Paris, June 4.—Between the Oise and the Aisne the Germans last night were prevented from making any progress, says to-day's official statement.

Now that it is believed all the 340 passengers and crew of the passenger liner Carolina have been accounted for, the possible death toll from the raid narrows down to the crew, number unknown, of the schooner Samuel W. Hathaway, of Boston.

RISKING ALL IN ATTEMPT FOR PARIS

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ONLY ONE U BOAT INVOLVED IN RAID

Germans Racing Against Time as Allies Throw in Reserve Forces

ARTILLERY MOVED QUICKLY BY FRENCH

Rushed to Decisive Points; Reserves Put in Line; American Share Increases

Belief Grows at Washington Attacks Were Work of Lone Raider

London, June 4.—The German advance on the Aisne sector seems to be developing into a race for Paris and recalls the race for the sea after the battle of the Marne.

Desperate fighting developed at many points on this front last night, which resulted in the enemy making advances at a few points, notably in the region southwest of Soissons, where he is trying to batter in the tip of the Allies' salient.

Paris, June 4.—The success of the French high command in getting artillery to the front at telling points in the path of the advancing Germans was the subject of satisfied comment in the lobbies of the Chamber of Deputies last night.

Germany's attempt to carry her submarine warfare to the United States and thereby check the increasing flow of troops to France and put fear into the hearts of the American people will be retroactive. This became apparent to-day as Government officials and the public viewed in a calm light the latest visitation of the "maldit flat" which, based on what is believed to have been the purpose of the German war heads, was a complete failure.

The Premier had many interviews with the Hon. Dr. Reid, Minister of Railways, and with Premier Borden on this particular subject as well as with other members of the cabinet. It was only lack of time and lack of knowledge of the true conditions which prevented a more comprehensive investigation on the part of the Premier.

As regards the situation on the main battlefront—the newspapers hold the view that the process of stabilization ahead has begun. The balance between the respective forces, indeed, is believed to be nearly re-established, enabling the French to inflict heavier and heavier losses on the enemy.

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Officials pointed out that with only a small loss in tonnage, the result of the raid will be negligible. The chief purpose of the German raiding party, it is believed by officials, was to sink transport ships after the troopships had left their home ports, the activity of British and American destroyers having made hunting in the old grounds on the other side of the Atlantic too unprofitable.

From the point of view of necessity to tap the timber in the Nitinat section Mr. Oliver is more convinced than ever on his return that his programme followed out at Ottawa was the correct one, since the extension of transportation beyond Sooke means the more rapid removal of aeroplane spruce and timber for shipbuilding.

**YESTERDAY WAS DAY
OF VIOLENT FIGHTING**

French Gains on Aisne-Marne
Salient Counterbalanced
German Gains

London, June 4.—The line north and south of the Ourcq, east of the Forest of Villers Cotterets was the scene of the heaviest fighting Monday on the Aisne front, said the Reuter correspondent at French headquarters in France, writing last night. The German gains were counter-balanced by French gains and the situation was more hopeful.

"To-day," continued the correspondent, "the fighting has been hardest along the eastern edge of the Forest of Villers Cotterets and southward between the Ourcq and Marne Valleys. The thick mass of forest offers great opportunity for the development of the German tactics in an advance by infiltration."

"The Germans attacked in the morning with two divisions, one of which, the 25th, was entirely fresh. The fighting was terrific, centring around the villages of Longpont, Corey, Faverolles and Troesnes. Before Longpont the Germans failed, Corey was taken by the Germans and re-taken by the French.

"Faverolles was the scene of a desperate German assault which ultimately was successful, but Troesnes and Corey, despite repeated attacks are in the hands of the French. Our counter-attacks kept the Germans constantly in check and enabled the line of villages in front of the forest to be maintained. The 25th German Division, however, relieved the First Guards Division, which had suffered heavily."

Infantry Exhausted.
"South of the Ourcq the fighting is obstinate. Toward evening, however, the battle diminished. In violence, probably because the German infantry

was exhausted by the many hours of battle in the terrific heat.

"On the whole the enemy has nothing to show for his day's work. The only change in the battle line east of Chateau Thierry is the drawing in of the German line around Rheims."

"This line, beginning at St. Leonard, on the Aisne-Marne Canal, passes through rifle range on a hill immediately east of Rheims. Thence it goes through Betheny, to the north, and Trois Fontaines, on the northwest, and runs southward between the suburbs of St. Brice and the city itself to La Paubette. None of these places, except St. Leonard, is more than a mile away from the city. The Germans now have an armed circle almost three-fourths of the way around the city."

Checking Enemy.
With the French Army in France, June 3.—Via London, June 4.—(By the Associated Press).—The Allies now are checking the German armies everywhere. Terrific struggles took place to-day when fresh German divisions entered the line between the Ourcq and determination to enter the forest of Villers Cotterets. The town of Faverolles, on the edge of the forest, was retaken by the Allies after the most desperate fighting in which the French displayed the utmost heroism against superior numbers.

Choisy Hill, north of the Aisne, near Choisy-au-Bac, was the scene of some terrific fighting. The height changed hands five times and eventually was carried in an assault by a battalion which had distinguished itself at Douaumont in the defence of Verdun.

A cavalry corps executed one of the most brilliant performances of the war by marching 160 miles and immediately joining the hottest part of the battle line, where it fought off enemy attacks, causing heavy losses to the enemy.

**BANK LEGISLATION
IN UNITED KINGDOM**

London, June 4.—In the House of Commons yesterday Rt. Hon. Andrew Bonar Law, Chancellor of the Exchequer, said the Government proposed to introduce legislation to carry out the recommendations of the committee on bank amalgamations.

In the meantime, he added, a committee would be set up to advise the Government as to the desirability of any schemes of amalgamation which might be proposed.

**WILL NOT FORGET
SHELLING OF PARIS**

Allies Will Bear Attack on
Corpus Christi Day
in Mind

London, June 4.—(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency).—Replying to questions in the House of Commons regarding the agreement by the Government to the request of the Vatican that British aviators should not bombard Cologne on Corpus Christi Day, Rt. Hon. Bonar Law stated that the appeal of the Vatican had been received by the Anglo-French Governments and the reply in terms already announced had been sent after consultation and in agreement with the French Government. The staff of the Air Ministry also had been consulted.

"The action of the Germans in shelling Paris despite our undertaking will not be forgotten in the event of any similar appeal being made in the future," the Chancellor stated.

Mr. Hill asked whether the Germans undertake that their aircraft used in protecting back areas would not be used for bombing our hospitals and troops on Corpus Christi Day?

Mr. Bonar Law replied that the Air Ministry had been of the opinion that German aircraft would not be so used, if only because the notice was too short for an expedition to be made.

Replying to further questions, Mr. Bonar Law said the decision had been taken by the War Cabinet after full consideration of all relevant facts. Mr. Carr-Gomm: Was the attention of the Vatican directed to the Whit Sunday air raid on London and the Good Friday bombardment of Paris?

Mr. Bonar Law: "No. Obviously the Government would have been fully justified in view of the Whit Sunday raid in refusing altogether to consider the appeal. It seemed a peculiar example of German mentality that such a request should have been submitted by the Germans after what had occurred, but although it was an impudent request it does not follow that it was an unwise British decision."

Rt. Hon. Herbert Samuel asked: "Were the Germans asked reciprocally to spare places behind the Anglo-French lines?"

Mr. Bonar Law: "No. Had we made such a request it would have implied that we were making a bargain. We were not making a bargain, but doing what we thought right."

Frederick Whyte asked: "Has the Vatican made any representations to Germany regarding the bombardment of Paris on Good Friday?"

Mr. Bonar Law: "We are not aware that the Vatican has done so, but we have drawn the attention of the Vatican to the bombardment of Paris on Corpus Christi Day."

**CROPS ON PRAIRIES
AHEAD OF AVERAGE**

Warm Weather Will Produce
Exceptionally Good Growth,
Reports Indicate

Winnipeg, June 4.—The official weather bulletin issued here to-day indicates that the temperatures throughout the prairie provinces have been higher in the last twenty-four hours, the average being well above sixty degrees. There was a good rainfall in many parts of Manitoba during the night.

Warmer weather only is required to insure good growth of the crops, as rain has been general throughout the west.

The C. N. R. to-day issued its weekly crop report, which indicates that with few exceptions the crop conditions are excellent along the lines of that railway. Only one or two points report lack of moisture. Reports from 260 points are embodied in the Canadian Northern statement, out of which 157 report plenty of moisture, little damage from frost and grain showing up well. Seventy-four districts have suffered, more or less from frost and cold winds, but in every case the grain will recover itself without the necessity of re-seeding. Five points report conditions very unsatisfactory and wheat acreage will be seeded to coarse grains.

Western Canada's 1918 crop is still ahead of its average season, and with the advent of warm weather there is every prospect of an exceptionally good growth.

**MADON, FRENCH AIRMAN,
BAGGED TWENTY-EIGHT
GERMAN AEROPLANES**

Paris, June 4.—Twenty-eight aerial victories are now credited to Lieut. Georges Madon, the French aviator who early in the war landed by mistake on Swiss territory and was interned, but made his escape. The Lieutenant recently recovered from long illness and, returning to the front, began to wreak havoc among the German aeroplanes.

**DUTCH VESSELS TO
LEAVE FOR STATES**

The Hague, June 4.—The German authorities, after long delay, have granted safe conduct for the steamship Zijdijk and Hector. They will sail for the United States next Tuesday under an arrangement by which the United States will permit vessels now in her ports to sail for Holland with grain and flour on the conditions that ships of similar tonnage proceed simultaneously to the United States.

**RECRUITS CALLED
FOR IN IRELAND**

Dublin, June 4.—The Lord Lieutenant issued a proclamation last night asking for 50,000 voluntary recruits and thereafter 2,000 to 3,000 monthly to maintain the Irish divisions.

The proclamation was issued as an opportunity for Ireland to avoid the application of the conscription law passed by Parliament. The text of the proclamation follows: "In pursuance of our promise we now make our offer, which, if successful, will ensure that Ireland will play her part fully and freely in the world struggle for liberty.
