

Insurance Soars. New York, June 4.-News of the sinking of American vessels by Ger-man submarines off the New Jersey Coast caused marine insurance rates to advance 1,400 to 3,900 per cent. here to-day. London, June 3.—The military cor-respondent of the British Wireless Ser-vice writes as follows concerning the operations on the Western front: operations on the Western front: "The Germans still show their great-est pressure on the western flank of the Aisne salient, their efforts yester-day being again on the front between Solssons and Chateau Thierry. Their progress, however, has not been very marked, and their advances have been more in the nature of local movements. "During the past forty-eight hours, too, the resistance has been of a sev-ere and punishing nature. Trying Violently to Get Decision Before American Masses Reach Front

New Phase. New Phase. The situation can not yet be said to have reached a position of stability, but the evidence suggests that the first impulse of the offensive, which has carried the Germans forward so far, is coming to an end, and that they must now enter upon the phase of the fight-ing in which the full cost will have to be paid for every mile of progress. "In the advances on the Somme and the Lys the speed of the attacks were checked, and the great offensive move-ments forced to expend themselves in expensive and, on the whole, useless encounters, as the Allied reserves came more and more into action and the form their lines of supply. The same constitues probably hold good in the present case, and the Germans are meeting the reorganized strength of the Alles at the time when their first momentum is diminishing." Washington, June 4.—A recent Allied air raid on Cologne caused the death of 146 persons, the State Department was informed to-day. About 159 were injured. The people of Cologne, the Department's advices said, were thrown into a state of "most absolute panic."

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THE BATTLE'S PROGRESS.

The impression of the military authorities in Paris is that the German drive has been blocked and that Foch now has the situation well in hand. Premier Clemenceau's paper says the French command feels sure of the future, as the Allies now are fighting with forces virtually equal to those of the enemy and other important reserves are approaching from the west and north, 'making possible a complete re-establishment of the balance of manpower. There is nothing inconsistent with that view in the gains the Germans are making here and there between the Oise and the Aisne. They continued to make progress at various points in Pieardy for weeks after it was apparent that their. opening drive had missed its mark. From now on the Germans will have to pay dearly for every yard. they gain.

American troops are now fighting on the crucial western front of the new salient and also are standing with the French south of the Marne. Thus the army of the United States is becoming more and more a factor in the struggle and probably before long will be heavily engaged. Every week should see fresh thousands of these troops put into the line, thus enabling the commander-in-chief to conserve the manoeuvring reserve which he is known to have and which the Germans are trying to make him exhaust. The American unit now taking part in the heavy fighting between the Oureq and the Marne appears to have acquitted itself admirably, throwing the enemy back in a spirited counterattack at Neuilly Wood. These fresh troops should show up to good advantage, particularly in attack, in which their youth, fresh morale and initiative will count for much.

The Germans plainly are trying to do to the French army what they failed to do to the British army-to destroy it. Up to the commencement of the present offensive the French forces .had not been involved in heavy fighting this year, and while important French units took part in grim struggles south of the Somme and in Flanders, Foch has kept the bulk of Petain's army on its main front, particularly on the vital front between the Champagne and the Vosges. The enemy failed to break up the British army-as Captain Persius in The Berliner Tageblatt reminds his readers no foe has ever done-and now is attempting to destroy the army of France. Meanwhile, Haig is being given time to strengthen his lines and to restore his reserves, although how long that respite will be is problematical. Indeed, the next blow on the front held chiefly by the British army may not be struck by the Germans at all.

GIVING THE FACTS.

Shortly after taking office Premier Clemenceau gave the assurance that the Government would publish all the facts of the military situation which could be disclosed without actually helping the enemy, The French War Office bulletins of the present fighting show that this undertaking is being faithfully carried out. They are noteworthy for their frankness, fullness and clearness.

But while the French authorities report frankly the enemy's progress they remain cheerful and confident. Indeed, scarcely a message comes from Paris, whether it be from grim old Clemenceau, who fears nothing and nobody and will never suppress the truth no matter what may happen, or from That is the cult of the reactionary who cannot ISLAND RAILWAY SUBJECT trust the people, who never seems to realize that the public is able to think for itself and knows as much as the average Government official of what is at stake. No war effort is advanced by making out an unfavorable situation to be worse than it is; nobody is going to forget that his father, son or brother is fighting, or has heroically given his life on the bat-

fighting, or has heroically given his life on the bat-tlefield, and become indifferent or careless because he or she is assured that the situation is not fatal and is likely to be redeemed by the gallantry and skill of the whole-souled optimists at the front. That is why Clemencean, whose passion for truth and honesty has caused the overthrow of numer-ous Governments since he helped to bring about the Third Republic in 1870, gives a cheerful and en-couraging but accurate report of what is going on

It is probable that the undersea boat which is operating off the American Atlantic coast belongs to a new type of cruiser-submarine upon which it is known the German builders have been engaged for a year or more. Recently the naval correspondent of The London Times described these vessels as be-ing over 300 feet and fitted with powerful arma-ment. Their special characteristics are their greater displacement, their much heavier armaments, increased deek space and deek height, better accommodation and a more numerous crew, with certain modifications of structure which en-able the boats to descend to a greater depth. They were fitted with greater propulsion than surface steam engines and have a higher speed, probably as much as eighteen knots. as much as eighteen knots.

The armament is believed to consist of two five-point-nine-inch guns, but this does not appear to have been definitely identified. As to the cali-

bre of the heaviest guns, there are no mechanical obstacles to the installation of even those of heavier weight. It is probable the turrets and top sides are armored, and if they have double hulls they may to some extent be protected against the explosion of depth charges. It was doubtless intended that the greater depth to which they can submerge would carry them under the ming-fields. It is pointed out, however, that increased displacement carries certain disadvantages. These cruising submarines must need a greater depth of water to manoeuvre in, and cannot have relatively more endurance in action, owing to the need of replenishing fuel.

And it is France which is suffering most in this war; her permanent casualties are over 3,000,000; twenty thousand of her cities, towns and villages, and practically all her iron and coal fields are in enemy's hands; the glorious cathedral city of Rheims is a pile of ruins, representing more material damage alone than has been inflicted upon this whole Empire, and the noble Amiens cathedral is falling to the shells of the Hun. Paris is under daily bombardment and is only forty-five miles from the tip of the advancing enemy wave. Yet in time such as this it is from Paris that the most reassuring news comes.

It is unnecessary to deceive, depress, or try to frighten, a liberty-loving people to make them fight.
