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us and then bring them back to their to-be-enlarged institute.

Jackson is urbane and friendly (single). He has some private means - \$3000 would be ample.

Dr. John McFie is 30 years old, married to an American (possibly separated) (M.D. Cambridge). Now with Zangwill at Queen's Square. Zangwill would not want to lose him. Willing to work as a psychologist. Not basically an experimentalist. Popular, he is a good mixer. Not first class in research. (Jackson would give more for our purposes.) Not a perfect appointment for us.

Malcolm Piercy, 27, married (Psychologist). He went to Cambridge and was with Bartlett. He is a thoughtful and competent experimentalist. He works on autonomic changes after leucotomy. Piercy will go far. He is more thoughtful and independent than Jackson, but diffident and of doubtful transplantability, a point to bear in mind if any consideration is to be given to having him participate in the work in the United States.

If a more serious person is wanted than Jackson, then Davis is best. Aubrey Lewis knows who the ablest people are.

September 21, 1951. Marly-le-Roi - SHAPE. I talked with Colonel Redmond Connolly, Chief of Security for SHAPE. He said he thought Colonel E. B. Nichols, Chief of Security for Europe would like to sit in on our conversation. I talked a little of the possibilities inherent in old and new drugs and asked: "Do you recognize drugs as a threat to security, supposing they could be used on, say, a physicist in the United States to make him indiscreet?"
