TROUBLE IN STRIKE REGION.

Battalion of Troops on Duty at Lansford, Where One of Strikers Was Shot. (Associated Press.) Lansford, Pa., Aug. 19.—With all its rights out, the train bearing General Cobin and his staff and the first battalion of the 12th regiment, under Major Gearhardt from Shenandoah, steamed quietly into this town just before daylight today. After a consultation lasting about ten minutes between General Cobin and Supt. Snyder, of the Lehigh Coal & Navigation Co., with regard to a suitable location for a camp, the battalion disembarked and in a few minutes was marching to the baseball park situated on the western edge of the town. The strikers were worked up to such a pitch of excitement last night over the shooting of Sharp, one of their leaders, that it was feared an outbreak would occur this morning. It was thought likely to have the soldiers near at hand. During the day it is the intention to transfer the battalion to Mantia park, about midway between Lansford and Tamaqua, and to pitch camp. The people of Lansford were much surprised when they awoke today and found a battalion of soldiers here. The soldiers came at the request of the sheriff of Carbon county. Contrary to expectations, no attempt was made by the strikers to march to Newington, and no demonstration of any kind was made either here or at Newington. The killing of Sharp is discussed on every street corner today. The strikers denounce it as an unprovoked and cold-blooded murder, but the deputies and coal company officials declare the shooting was done in self defence.

PHAETON SAILS FOR SCENE OF TROUBLE

HIGH-HANDED ACTION OF THE COLOMBIANS Trying to Compel Agents of British Steamer Ecuador to Carry Troops to Isthmus. (Associated Press.) Panama, Colombia, Aug. 19.—The British cruiser Phaeton left here hurriedly on Saturday, and it was believed that she sailed for Buenaventura in the department of Cauca. 'Inquiries made by the correspondent of Associated Press regarding the warship's departure show that serious international complications may arise at Buenaventura, while the Colombian authorities have been endeavoring to compel the agents of the British steamer Ecuador, owned by the Pacific Steam Navigation Co., of Liverpool, to transport troops to the Isthmus. It was at the request of the Pacific Steam Navigation Co. that the Phaeton left Panama for Buenaventura. At Buenaventura the Colombian government has assembled 2,000 troops, under General Velasco, intended to reinforce the army in this vicinity, and the government officials of Buenaventura threatened to compel the steamer Ecuador, which was at that port, to transport these reinforcements to Panama. The agents of the line, however, refused to embark the troops, and appealed to the company's representative



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NANAIMO NOTES.

Laying New Water Pipes—More Men For Copper King Mine—Troy Aerial Tramway. (Special to the Times.) Nanaimo, Aug. 19.—The arrival of more piping from Victoria has led to work being resumed upon the line connecting the new dam with the present water reservoir. There will be about three carloads required to complete the work. This has now been promised to be forwarded at once, and the water-works committee expect to have all completed in a few weeks' time. At present no lawn sprinkling is allowed in the city. The Coronation Mining Company, of this city, with its constantly increasing value, are this morning sending down more men to work in the mine, C. P. King. The company are very enthusiastic with regard to the Troy aerial tramway is now in place and the carriage is now expected to commence within about two or three days. At Ladysmith the switches at the E. & N. railway are completed, and the order is being rushed on the shipments. Work is being rushed on the smelter proper. Work is said to have been resumed at No. 1 Extension mine, where the contract was to have been resumed in drawing the pillars. The men are to work at \$3 a day on company work. This is the same wages as offered by the parties making the contracts. THE POPE'S HEALTH. Showed No Signs of Fatigue After Reception of Visitors. Rome, Aug. 17.—The Pope is in such good health that it is thought not necessary to suspend the Sunday audiences, as has hitherto been the custom, in order to give the Pontiff strength for a fatiguing ceremony such as the Name day reception of today. Dr. Lippini, the Pope's physician, insisted, however, on limiting the number of guests to 200 instead of the usual 500. His efforts to obtain invitations to the Name day reception were so persistent, and came from such high quarters, that the Pontiff, hearing of them, overruled his physician's advice and had an additional hundred guests included. The innumerable letters and telegrams of felicitation received by the Pontiff included communications from Emperor Francis Joseph, of Austria, and King Alfonso, of Spain. The communication from the King of Spain was the first massive sent to his father by King Alfonso since his coronation. The Pope held the receptions in his private library. He showed no signs of fatigue. FIRST STAGE OF RACE. American Yacht Utopia Reached Cherbourg Ahead of Other Boats in Cup Contest. (Associated Press.) Cherbourg, France, Aug. 19.—The American auxiliary steam yacht Utopia, A. J. Armour, arrived here first at 2.18 p. m. today in the sailing match from the Nab lightship, off the coast of England, to this port and return, for the Coronation Cup presented by the Earl of Crawford. TWO MEN SHOT. They Were at Work Near Colliery at Scranton, Pa., When Wounded. From Amherst. (Associated Press.) Scranton, Pa., Aug. 19.—Michael Connolly and Ernest Crossman, both of whom were employed about the colliery, were shot from ambush today, presumably by strikers. Crossman was so badly injured that it was necessary to amputate his right foot, and Connolly's condition is considered as serious. The men were working on a wire cable near the breaker when the bullet struck him. Crossman's head was hit by a bullet and he was killed. Connolly was shot in the leg and arm and a range of shot striking Connolly's shoulder. Some of the shot hit him in the face. AMPHION CONTRACT AWARDED. Esquimaux Marine Railway Company the Successful Tenderers For the Work. H. M. S. Amphion is to have permanent repairs made at Esquimaux. What these are has already been outlined in the Times. The contract for the undertaking has been awarded to the Esquimaux Marine Railway Company, the sum mentioned in connection with the trans-shipment being \$17,000. The other two being from the Albion Iron Works and the Marine Iron Works. The amount of these were \$15,000 and \$25,000 respectively. The work is one of the most important which the naval authorities have authorized to be done here in several years. It will involve the removal of a large number of plates from the ship's bottom, the straightening of some and the renewing of others. The work has been in the dock for the purpose of having a survey of the injuries made, but came out this morning to allow of the blocks on which she rested being raised about a foot. She will go back in the dock this afternoon. THE COMING FAIR. Space Much in Request—Preparations Being Made for the Aquarium. Preparations for the fall show are in full swing. Applications for space are being made, and it is anticipated that all will be taken some time before the fair is held. The aquarium will be made in a factory, and the special price for the building to be the largest on record. Taking every thing into consideration, the indications are that the show will be most successful. It is being made to have sufficient space to handle all the various exhibits. The stock judges will be present, as usual, by the government. The aquarium will be a new attraction, and endeavors will be made to make it as novel and interesting, as well as instructive as possible. It was finally decided to carry this project through a few days ago. Five mirrored glass cases, under construction. These will contain fresh fish of various kinds, among which will also be exhibited, as well as sea shells. Widow Commits Suicide by Taking Carbolic Acid - British Journalists Start for the West.

Quebec, Aug. 18.—The dry goods firm of Richard & Beaudry, of this city, failed on Friday last, and it now transpires that J. E. Beaudry, the financial member of the firm, has been missing since Tuesday.

Hullifax, Aug. 18.—James Mortimore, wife of Chief Justice McDonald, died to-day aged 78. She was the mother of Lady Herbert Tupper.

Torontonian Dead. Toronto, Aug. 18.—W. Eckhardt, a veteran Torontonian, is dead.

Injunction Dissolved. Falconbridge to-day gave judgment dissolving the injunction granted some time ago in the case of Jamieson v. Mackenzie & Mann, Plaintiff, who, as a contractor built an elevator for defendants at Port Arthur, is suing them for \$27,000, and sought to have defendants restrained from making changes on the elevator.

Hog Cholera. London, Ont., Aug. 18.—Hog cholera is prevalent in this district, and several valuable herds have been killed by order of the veterinary surgeons during the past week. It is estimated that over 400 hogs already have been destroyed.

Instantly Killed. Woodville, Ont., Aug. 18.—John Brown, of Essex, was struck by a fast-express and killed.

Buried in Sand Pit. Winnipeg, Aug. 18.—Robert and Harold, the young sons of C. R. Rankin, Killarney, Manitoba, were killed by a cave-in at a sand pit yesterday.

Madame Melba. Madame Melba, the great vocalist, passed through Winnipeg on Sunday morning on route to Australia.

Preparing for Railway. Work has been started cleaning up the old right-of-way on the Hudson's Bay line, now controlled by the Canadian Northern. The line will be run through to Lake Manitoba.

New Hotel. United States capitalists will build a half million dollar hotel in the city.

Cattle From States. A herd of 10,000 cattle from Mexico and 4,000 from Colorado are being brought into the Cypress Hills country, in Assiniboia and Alberta.

Accidental Shot. Cassel Maxwell, of Holland, Manitoba, accidentally received a rifle bullet in the stomach while handling a gun. He may die.

Minister's Visit. Montreal, Aug. 18.—Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick, minister of justice, will visit British Columbia next month.

Former Engineer Dead. E. P. Hannaford, for many years prior to 1866 identified with the Grand Trunk railway as chief engineer, died suddenly about noon to-day. Since 1866 he had lived a retired life. Mr. Hannaford was one of the best known railway engineers in Canada, and under his regime many of the largest works on the big railway were carried out.

The Visiting Journalists. The British journalists were given an excursion over the Montreal harbor to-day in company with Mr. Tarte, minister of public works, and left for Toronto to-night on the way to British Columbia.

Both Perished. St. John, N. B., Aug. 18.—To-day at Midway, N. B. county, N. B. Oliver Gough, a well known farmer and his wife were burned to death. Gough lit a fire on his farm and went to the barn, leaving wife and daughter asleep. The daughter was aroused by the fire and arose to find the house in flames. Gough rushed back to his wife's room to save her, but both perished in the flames.

Premier Ross Has Failed for Home - Interviewed Regarding New Lines of Steamers.

Toronto, Aug. 18.—An Evening Telegram London special cable says that Premier Ross of Ontario, has sailed for home. In an interview he said that within a year the Australian and Canadian steamship lines will be working under a cooperative system. This would benefit the Empire more than strenuous competition. The new South African steamship service, Mr. Ross said, would probably mean the early inauguration of a fast mail service between England and Canada.

SENSATIONAL SUICIDE

Breaking Off of Engagement Believed to Have Led to Man Ending His Life.

Newport, R. I., Aug. 18.—R. R. Remington, of New York, committed suicide by shooting in the reading room on Bellview avenue here this afternoon. Mr. Remington was engaged to marry Miss Van Allen, daughter of James J. Van Allen, of this place. It is thought that his wife's despondency over some months of a private nature, but his friends do not know the conditions. It was announced recently that his marriage to Miss Van Allen had been indefinitely postponed.

Mr. Remington was about 40 years old, and was at the head of the Remington Advertising Agency, a New York concern. He had been staying at the La Forge house, from which he took a walk early this afternoon. He went to the reading room at about 2 o'clock, and was in the library alone when he fired two shots from a revolver, aiming at a spot between the eyes. The bullets penetrated the brain and death is thought to have been instantaneous.

"The report of the suicide caused a great shock to the summer residents in this city, to whom Mr. Remington was well known, as he had been closely identified with all the social world here for the last seven or eight years. His engagement to Miss Van Allen had been broken off a few months ago, and it is generally believed that there was a definite engagement between the young people up to within the last three weeks, when it was broken. Since then Mr. Remington has been very gloomy and despondent, although when asked about the engagement he stoutly affirmed that he was to be married in the fall. He left the city about a week ago, breaking up his arrangements here and sending away all his effects. Last Thursday, however, he suddenly returned to Newport. He had frequented the reading room, which is the leading club of Newport, and a general lounge for the men of the summer colony, but had kept aloof, and it seemed to be his desire to be left alone.

CHANGES IN COMBINE Likely to Follow the Retirement of Charles M. Schwab.

New York, Aug. 18.—The retirement of Charles M. Schwab from the presidency of the United States Steel Corporation is now unanimously accepted as determined upon, notwithstanding recent official denials and present resistance in official quarters to confirm the report. President Schwab's impairment of health is the reason for this action. In well informed circles it is believed that his retirement will be followed by extensive changes in the membership of the organization. The succession to the presidency is a matter of surmise only, and if it has been decided upon no intimation has been made on the subject. There are many positions of importance in the United States Steel Corporation now held by persons who are there on account of personalities with Mr. Schwab. President Schwab would pass to James G. Thompson, the first vice-president of the corporation. Other rumors have pointed to H. C. Frick.

STRIKER SHOT

Killed During a Fight Between Miners and Deputies.

Nesquehoning, Pa., Aug. 18.—In a clash between strikers and deputies here to-night, Patrick Sharp, a striker of Lonsford, was shot and killed almost instantly by a deputy. The shooting occurred in a saloon, and the strikers were not fired upon by other persons being injured, and the town is now quiet.

THE HAZELTON'S MISHAP.

George Cunningham, of K. Cunningham & Son, owners of the steamer Hazelton, which met with a mishap on the 7th inst., is hourly expected news by telegram from the north reporting that the vessel has been successfully towed. The story of the accident, which occurred on the coast of British Columbia, has been greatly magnified. In the first place she is not lying in nine feet of water, for her nose is up on the bank of the river, where she had poleed to take on wood. About two miles farther up the river the bell cord broke, and the steamer in swinging around a rock touched. No damage was apparently done, and the steamer passed along with little interruption. At the place where she now lies a stop had been made to take on wood. A few cords were cut, and the steamer went down very quickly, as though the extra weight had strained the injured portion, and while her bow remains on the bank the stern is deep water. That she will be floated by Mr. Cunningham has not the slightest doubt. The Hudson's Bay company, he states, very kindly placed the Mount Royal at their disposal for the carrying of men and material to the scene of the wreck, and work was to have begun before he had left for Victoria.

DISMANTLED VESSEL SIGHTED.

A cablegram has been received by the Merchants' Exchange, San Francisco, from Nagasaki that seems fraught with the possibility of a tragedy of the sea. The British steamer Lundenhall, arriving at that port from Sourabaya, Java, reported sinking the German barque 'Sip' in latitude 24 N., long. 120 E., on August 8th, partially dismantled and in a crippled condition. A moderate gale was blowing at the time, and that night by 12 o'clock it had increased to a typhoon. The question naturally suggests itself: Did the sailing vessel survive it?

CONVENTION OF THE LORD'S DAY ALLIANCE

Will Be Held Near End of the Month - Delegates Desired From All Points.

H. J. Knott, secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance of British Columbia, has received the following self-explanatory communication from Mr. McBeth, Vancouver, president of the Alliance:

A convention of the Lord's Day Alliance of British Columbia will open in the Y. M. C. A. hall, Vancouver, on Friday, Aug. 22nd, at 10 o'clock p. m. This will also be an evening session. The Rev. J. G. Shearer, field secretary of the Alliance for all Canada, will be present. Mr. Shearer, who is making a tour of the West, is to hold conventions at Vancouver and Nelson for the Kootenay country, and it is hoped that as a result of all these conventions something definite will be done in the way of securing legislation to conserve the Lord's Day as a day of rest for every worker as far as possible. By decision of the committee the question of jurisdiction referred to in a former circular letter has been in a large measure settled, and the provinces have jurisdictional powers in the matter of legislation upon this subject.

AN INSURANCE GAMBLE.

The barque Baroda, now at San Francisco, represents rather a peculiar problem to insurance speculators. Word has just been received that the English underwriters would pay her as a constructive total loss. In other words, they will have to make good the risks they took on her as they would if she had been wiped out of existence by wreck, fire or the perils of the deep.

The Baroda is the vessel that was lost last month in the straits for Port Jackson and toward to San Francisco. She stranded on August 20th, 1901, nine miles south of Coquille river, while bound for Victoria. The vessel was a 400-ton steamer, and was carrying a full cargo of miscellaneous Oriental freight, but, as usual with all C. P. R. liners, Victoria consignments were taken on Vancouver to be there transhipped back to this city. The Athenian encountered line weather throughout the greater part of her trip.

It was another race nearly the whole distance, and no one could pick the winner until the very finish. The Canadians propose to put the boat club of Montreal to the test in a race of the respective merits of the canoes. The Canadians were congratulated on their victory by the victors to-day, and throngs of people along the shore cheered the victors to the finish.

ANXIOUS TO ENLIST.

Time Expired Soldiers Tell of Reports that United States Wanted Men For Philippines.

London, Aug. 18.—Time expired South African soldiers have been the victims of a curious delusion which is causing the officials of the United States embassy considerable annoyance. Former British soldiers, who have served against the Boers, have been applying in numbers at the embassy for enlistment in the American army in the Philippines. They all tell the same story, saying a report was in circulation at Cape Town and Durban that the United States was enlisting ex-British soldiers for service in those islands. At the London embassy it is stated that applicants have already been turned away greatly disappointed.
