ESQUIMALT DRYDOCK JAPANESE LINER HAS **VALUABLE CARGO LIST**

For Victoria the principal articles of import were 775 packages of rice, 650 of sugar and large consignments of porcelair, canned goods, soy and general merchandise. For Seattle there were over 18,000 packages of tea and large quantities of beans, porcelain, matting, camphor, bone meal, rice and similar commodities.

On May 1 what is probably the first ocean telephone call station was opened for public use. This is in Platte Fougere lighthouse on a rock lying about one and a quarter miles to the northeast of Guernsey, Channel Islands. The lighthouse, which has no keeper, is fitted with a powerful fog signal, worked from shore by means of a submarine cable. In a fog ships creep up guided by the fog horn and drop anchor near the lighthouse until the fog lifts sufficiently to enable them to take the narrow channel to the harbors of Guernsey. In such case any pilot or ship's officer by climbing the lighthouse can ring up Guernsey telephone exchange and report his ship.

The telephone is reached by climbing a 42-rung ladder to the platform outside the lighthouse doors. Before he can leave the ladder the pilot pushes open a trap door which covers the manhole in the platform. The arrangement is such that the pilot cannot open the lighthouse door to reach the telephone until he has shut down the trap door over the manhole. The act of opening the outer lighthouse door connects the telephone fitted out-

the trap door over the manlois. Itself of the connects the telephone fitted outside the inner door of the lighthouse which is kept locked. Only one wire in the cable is available for the telephone, and even this wire is required for other purposes, and closing the door after using the telephone connects up several tell-tale devices. The lighthouse door cannot be left open by forgetfulness because the pilot must close it before he is able to lift the trap door in order to resch the ladder. rder to reach the ladder.

Accordingly, immediately on hearing of the outbreak of war, Roberts gathered together a force of a few regular soldiers, and four times as many traders and voyageurs and Indians (two hundred and twenty-five all told) and set sail in the brig "Caledonia," lent by the North West company for the purpose. With this force he appeared at Michillimackinac very early in the morning of July 17, 1812, and demanded the surrender of the fort. The American commander, not having heard that the nations were at war, was taken completely by surprise, and surrendered without any attempt at resistance. This important post was held by the British throughout the war; and Roberts' success had a most encouraging effect on the Canadians.

Charles Roberts, captured 'Mackinaw 101 years ago to-day, and thus won victory for the British at the very beginning of the war, and that without firing a gun. The fort at Mackinaw fell into the hands of the British in their conquest of Canada, but in 1796 was turned over to the United States, in compliance with the treaty of peace. At the outbreak of the war of 1812 it was garrisoned by a small force of American troops, commanded by Lefut. Forter Hancks. When Sir Isaac Brook, governor of Upper Canada, received news of the declaration of hostilities he lost no time in adopting offensive measures. He dispatched orders to Capt. Charles Robertz then in command of Fort St. Joseph, on an island forty miles northeast from Mackinaw, to attack the latter place without deorty miles northeast room adactantw, o attack the latter place without deay. Roberts had only a small force, and summoned to his assistance the employees of the Northwestern Fur Company and the neighboring Indians. Company and the neighboring Indians. On the sixteenth of July he embarked with a motley force of white and Indians, in bateaux, canoes and boats, with two six-pounders, conveyed by the fur company's brig Caledonia, and set out for Mackinaw. In the meantime Lieut Hancks, although he had not heard of the declaration of war, became suspicious, and dispatched Capt. Daurman to spy on the Eng.ish. On the way he met the hostile flottilla and was made a prisoner. The Americans were taken by surprise when the fleet reached Mackinaw on the seven-

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St. Alexius, whose festival is celebrated to-day, won canonization and immortality by deserting his bride withing an hour after his wedding, and, forsaking fortune and an honored name, devoting himself to poverty, piety, and prayer.

The parents of the saint were among the greatest of the nobles of the Rome of the fourth century. The family held wast estates and magnificent palaces,

of the fourth century. The family held e vast estates and magnificent palaces, and to these Alexius was the heir. Alexius was betrothed to the beautiful daughter of another prominent Roman of family, and the wedding was a brilliant affair. While the guests were feasting, and all were merry and gay, the bride groom slipped away, leaving his bride and parents to mourn him as the victim of foul play, or as suddenly gone mad: Alexius made his way to Edessa, in northern Mesopotamia, now the city of Oorfa or Urfa, then famous as an Oriental seat of Christian learning, with many schools of theology and hundreds of monasteries. Alexius became a beggar and solicited alms at the gate of Our Lady's church in Edessa. In the meantime his father sent men in all directions to search for him. Some of them visited Edessa, and, passing Alexius at the gate of the church, gave him alms and did not recognize him. Soventeen years passed and Alexius. "his sanctity miraculously manifested," is sought obscurity in flight. He boarded a vessel bound for Tarsus, which was driven by contrary winds to Rome. In the city where he had once been numbered among the great, Alexius, the mendicant, passed unnoticed. His father was still living, and Alexius, without revealing his identity, begged from him a mean corner of the palace for shelter, and the crumbs from his table as food. Mocked and derided by his own slaves, the saint thus passed seventeen years, when death ended his self-imposed martyrdom. 
