ELEVEN WERE DROWNED WHEN BOAT CAPSIZED

Fourteen Saved After Disaster Overtook Pleasure Craft in Florida Waters
Heavy Sea Hampered Rescuers; Some of Those Saved Were Injured

Melbourne, Florida, Oct. 12.—Eleven members of a party of tourists were drowned when the pleasure boat Clara B. capsized while attempting to turn in a rough sea just outside Sebastian Inlet yesterday. The others of the party, which numbered twenty-five, were rescued late yesterday.

TWO-PARTY FIGHTS IN SEVEN OF B.C.'S FEDERAL DIVISIONS

Three-cornered Fights For Commons Oct. 29 in Six Constituencies

One Four-party Test; Fourteen Dominion Members Are to be Elected

Vancouver, Oct. 12. (Canadian Press)—Of the fourteen federal constituencies in British Columbia, there will be two party fights in 7, three-party battles in six and a four-party contest in one on October 29, according to party nominations to date. There may be additions to the list before official nomination day, but it is doubtful.

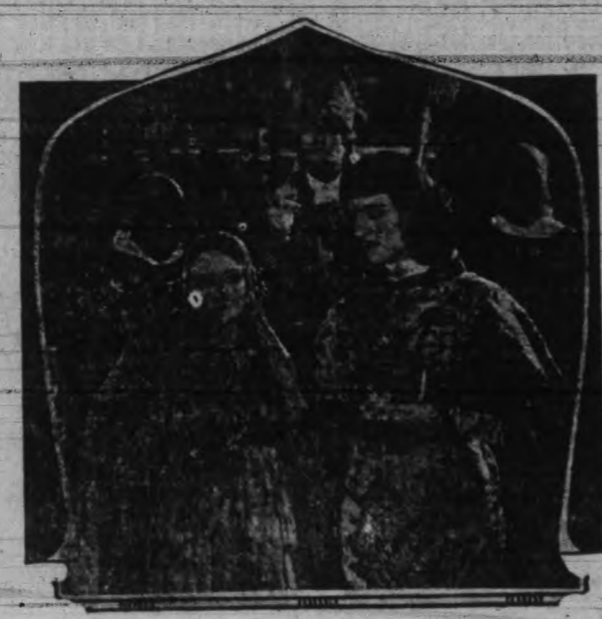

More Gold Quartz Found on Marmot

Stewart, B.C., Oct. 3.—(By Mail)—A. R. Casey, who has been prospecting in the Marmot River section, reports the discovery of a gold-bearing quartz vein on the south side of the river, nearly opposite the forks. The vein appears to be a true fissure, running from three to fourteen inches in width, cutting through the granodiorite formation and traced on the surface for about 1,000 feet. An assay obtained gives \$110.50 in gold and \$3.55 in silver, a total of \$114.05 per ton. Casey also found another vein, from which no assays were taken, and which remains to be prospecting.

Gold Leaf Now Made By Electro-Chemistry

(From The Jeweler's Monthly)

Electro-chemistry has now entered the field and a new process recently invented promises to make gold leaf far less expensive. Upon a ribbon of thin silver a film of gold is electrically deposited from a solution of gold and potassium cyanide.

The silver ribbon, with the gold on its upper side, is then laid upon a celluloid band and immersed in a bath of nitric acid. This eats away the silver, which is later recovered, and leaves the gold leaf on the celluloid band. There it is washed in alcohol and the warm air from electric fans blows the gold leaf from the celluloid and slides it between protecting leaves of paper.

For thirty centuries gold leaf has been made in one way and the yellow metal that is used on store windows and office doors is identical with that which gilded the throne of Pharaoh. Small crumbs of gold placed between layers of parchment, called gold-beaters' skins, were beaten interminably with mallets. As the gold spread under the blows it was cut, put between more skins and laboriously beaten again for days and weeks until one grain of the precious metal, weighing about one five-hundredths of an ounce, became an almost impalpable sheet of forty square inches. The cost of the labor greatly outweighed the cost of the gold.

GISH SISTERS OFFER GREAT STORY OF "ROMOLA," FILMED IN ITALIAN SURROUNDINGS

Company Spent Nine Months Abroad to Get Atmosphere for Wonderful Spectacular Picture Opening at Dominion To-night.

Acclaimed as being the most beautiful picture yet produced, "Romola," the latest Lillian Gish production, opens at the Dominion Theatre to-night. New York critics were tremendously enthusiastic over "Romola" at its premiere, pointing out the fact that artistic worth had been combined with romance and thrills in perfect fashion, and their favorable verdict was borne out in the very successful run of the film at the George M. Cohan Theatre at two-dollar rates, and in special runs in other cities.

"Romola" is a film version of the famous novel by George Eliot which tells of the exciting life of the Florentines in the days of Savonarola. It was directed by Henry King, who was responsible for Miss Gish's previous offering, "The White Sister," and was financed by Inspiration Pictures, Charles H. Duell, Jr., president, Metro-Goldwyn is the distributor.

Some Important Names: While Lillian Gish is the star of "Romola," there are many familiar, and important names in the cast. Dorothy Gish appears in one of her inimitable roles, this time a little peasant girl. It is the first time the sisters have been together in a production since "Springs of the Storm," and once again their contrasting styles are brought out to full advantage—Lillian's limp sadness which bursts out into great dramatic fits, and Dorothy's whimsical caperings that turn into tragedy later.

Ronald Colman, who has appeared in a number of successes lately, including "The White Sister," "Tarnish," and "Her Night of Romance," is the hero. William H. Powell has the difficult role of Tizio, the young man who won the affections of both the peasant girl, Tessa, and the scholar's daughter, Romola, and proceeded to make himself unworthy of either. This is considered one of the most fascinating villains in all literature.

"Romola," like "The White Sister," was made in Italy, right on the spot called for in the novel—Florence. Indeed, Lillian Gish and the players in her support so steeped themselves in the history and atmosphere of the time and place that they really captured the spirit of the brilliant renaissance of which Florence was the source and so long the centre. The company spent nine months abroad.

The incident of the pirate attack on a sailing ship of 1492 was taken off the Bay of Leghorn, which is the port of Florence. Not only did the director, Henry King, have the advantage of authentic scenes, but he obtained the assistance of a number of famous Italian actors, as well as hundreds of natives for the scenes requiring vast crowds.

MADE GREAT SHOWING: As a result, the enthusiasm of the extra becomes apparent in the finished picture, and this, coupled with the tremendous sets, built to represent portions of the city that have now become modernized and could not be used, make this production one of enthralling beauty—un surpassed of its kind.

But beauty is only one feature of "Romola." This novel is considered one of the great romances of all time, comparable to Shakespeare's "Romeo and Juliet," and its transference to the screen has only heightened the love interest and brought many an additional thrill to the twists of its dramatic story.

SIX WERE KILLED IN TORONTO SMASH: Toronto, Oct. 12.—Six Toronto residents were killed last evening when the Canadian National Railway International Flier from Montreal to Chicago struck a motor car containing two families just west of Scarborough Junction, at the St. Clair Avenue crossing a few miles from the city.

Those killed were: Arthur Nicolls, forty-nine; his wife, Rose, forty-five; their four-months-old daughter, Shirley; Alfred Mould, aged thirty-five; his wife and their daughter, Ruth, twelve. The only survivor, Hilda Mould, another daughter, aged four, is in a hospital suffering from brain concussion.

INDIAN HANGED IN STATE OF ARIZONA

Killed Aged Taxi Driver; Arizona Refused to Share in the Execution

Prescott, Ariz., Oct. 12.—Threats of vengeance, appeals to President Coolidge and the refusal of the State of Arizona to participate in a hanging by lending a scaffold for the occasion failed to bend the will of the Government, and George Dixon Suljname, twenty-six-year-old Walapai Indian, one-time star athlete at Haskell Institute and also at Sherman Institute, Riverside, California, was hanged near here on Saturday for murder.

Suljname walked unflinchingly to the scaffold and delivered a ten-minute speech in which he explained why he had slain Albert M. Cavell, aged Prescott taxi cab driver, led in the singing of sacred songs and then dropped to his death with as much bravery as any Indian in song or story.

Suljname, said to be the second Indian to be executed by the Government in the history of its regime over the red men, said his love for an Apache Indian girl had led him to kill Cavell. The Apaches, he said,

resented a union between their beautiful squaw and a Walapai. THREAT DIVERTED

The Walapais made every effort to save Suljname. They threatened to visit tribal wrath upon the white men if the execution took place and several of them took to the hills to prepare for an attack. They were rounded up and warned, however, and no demonstration accompanied the execution.

A few days ago they appealed to President Coolidge. Attorney-General Sargent later advised them the President would not commute the sentence. Doomed to a white man's penalty, Suljname considered his spirit to be the white man's God. He received several Christian ministers during his last days. His body was surrendered to his father. It will be buried with full tribal honors.

MAN HAD REVOLVER NEAR JAIL; SEIZED

Salem, Ore., Oct. 12.—While watching for liquor "plants" on the prison lawn here last night prison officials and deputy sheriffs nabbed a man giving the name of Nages Sorbus, Portland, in the act of hiding a .38 calibre revolver. The man declared he was hiding the gun for one of the prisoners, but did not name the convict. He admitted he had visited the prisoner during the state fair and a check is being made on the visitor's register in the turnkey's office.

LEGAL ATTACK ON GASOLINE TAX IN STATE OF WASHINGTON

Tacoma, Oct. 12.—Attacking the state gasoline tax on the ground that it is unconstitutional and demanding \$2,250,000 in damages, which sum they assert the state has illegally collected from Washington motorists since 1921, owners of auto freight lines brought suit in federal court here to-day against State Treasurer W. G. Potts.

The complaint charges the plaintiffs "have been compelled to pay the tax solely as a tribute or exaction for passage by their motor vehicles on the public highways, to wit: a toll." The Federal Government, it is pointed out, by the act of July 11, 1916, already provides aid to states in the construction of highways. This act was amended on November 5, 1921, to provide that "all highways" constructed or reconstructed under the provision of the act shall be free from tolls of all kinds. MENNONITES GO TO MEXICO FROM PRAIRIES

Winnipeg, Oct. 12.—The last batch of the German Mennonite colony which is migrating from Western Canada to Mexico will be transferred to their new homes as soon as their holdings on the prairies are disposed of, according to J. F. D. Wiebe of Herbert, Sask., who is directing the trek from the Canadian end.

"Since we obtained the concessions in 1921, comprising 200,000 acres of land in Mexico, more than 6,000 German Mennonites, who are conscientious objectors, have settled in Mexico. They had a fairly good crop this year and their stock operations have been successful," Mr. Wiebe declared.

"The Mexican Government," he added, had honored its side of the bargain and lived up to the terms of the concession. The newcomers were permitted to have their own schools and churches, where the German language was spoken exclusively. The settlers were also permitted to manage their own internal affairs and were exempt from military service.

In Mr. Wiebe's opinion, the exodus from Canada hardly represents a loss in population. Incoming Russian Mennonites, he pointed out, were taking over the land.

The last members of the audience had just quit the building when the fire was discovered.

PAPER IS MADE OF STRAW ON PRAIRIE

Edmonton, Oct. 12.—As the result of successful products from waste straw, which have been conducted under the direction of the Alberta Government, efforts are now being made to interest capital in the proposal to establish manufacturing plants in the province.

Government officials express confidence in the success of such an enterprise, and state the results of the experiments made to date have been of the greatest importance, not only to the farmers, but the general industrial development of Alberta.

A special report on the experiments has been made by Trade Commissioner Stutchbury to Premier Greenfield, covering the following points:

- 1. Availability of straw within an economic radius. 2. Availability and cost of coal. 3. Availability and cost of sulphur and sodium sulphate. 4. Railway facilities and freight rates. 5. Labor conditions. 6. Water and sewage facilities.

This report, together with all technical data, is being placed at the disposal of capitalists who are interested in the development of the new industry.

FUR EXHIBIT

Munro of Revelstoke, manager-in-charge of the exhibit of Canadian furs at Wembley Exhibition, has been appointed by the Canadian Manufacturers Association to represent the Canadian fur trade at a similar exhibit at the South Seas Exhibition, which is to open next month in Dunedin, New Zealand.

"DUKE OF SWAZI" MAY CONFER TITLES

"His Grace," Honored by King Buno, Supervising Realty Holdings on This Continent

James A. Cavanagh, world-wide realty operator, who recently arrived here at the Empress Hotel from Honolulu to look after his realty holdings in Victoria and Seattle, has

been created Duke of Swazi. It was made known here to-day.

After investigating realty conditions here, Mr. Cavanagh is leaving for Florida, where he has extensive holdings. Realty conditions here, he says, are now more satisfactory than they have been since the outbreak of the war and he predicts the next big boom will soon strike this Pacific Northwest area. He has important interests in South Africa and Honolulu, which he has just been visiting.

Mr. Cavanagh told how he was created Duke of Swazi on his visit to Africa, where he acted as the representative of a big life insurance company insuring the lives of African royalty.

"After all the preliminary formalities, the exciting moment came when

I was to be taken to the imperial court of the Kaffir King to be granted a personal interview with His Majesty in order to explain the life insurance proposal to him to cover the life of the royal personage," Mr. Cavanagh said.

"I had provided a dog-cart stocked with champagne, King Buno's favorite beverage, and accompanied by my friends, I started for the palace. On our arrival at the royal kraal we were received by chief councillor and interpreter Alpheus, who informed His Majesty of our coming and ushered us in to the august presence of the King, who greeted us pleasantly, and, on being presented by Alpheus and informed of my business, shook hands and welcomed me in the Kaffir tongue.

"After the champagne was ac-

cepted I talked through the interpreter to such good effect that the King agreed to take a policy of an amount that would cost annually in premiums \$2,500.

"He refused to pay his first premium in cash, but was willing to barter sixteen of his wives, the average value of each wife being equivalent to ten bullocks.

"By this time the champagne had so enlivened His Majesty's spirits that Alpheus took the opportunity of reminding the King of his power to honor a foreign citizen with a title. Then the black monarch solemnly raised his hand and repeated in the Swazi tongue: 'I, King Buno of the Swazi nation, proclaim you, James A. Cavanagh, by our royal right the Duke of Swazi, and further do grant you full power to confer titles upon

any person whom your grace may see fit to honor.

"The day following His Majesty signed the concession, which was written on royal parchment. "Before we left the august royal presence the Queen Regent, Mother of King Buno, came in and demanded 'ponzolo' (a gift), which I immediately offered in the shape of a flask of gin. Her Majesty applied her lips to the 'ponzolo' and emptied it at one draught. At this time we thought it wise to make our adieu and left the palace with all haste and with my new title.

"Mr. Cavanagh, as His Grace the Duke of Swazi, said that, empowered as he was by the King, he was considering applications to confer titles on a few chosen subjects in this democratic country, no consid-

eration of money or profit being entertained.
