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TRADE EXPANSION MEANS PROSPERITY

EVERY VOTER KNOWS THAT THE more trade Canada can do with the rest of the world the more prosperity this country will enjoy. The Conservative Party obviously stands for the restriction of trade with the rest of the world.

Mr. Meighen and Dr. Tolmie, for instance, would abolish the British preference and put imports into Canada from Britain on the same level as imports from foreign countries. They would show no more consideration for articles from Britain than they would for the German or French article. It is nothing to them that as a result of the reduction of the duty on British imports to this Dominion the trading account between Canada and Britain for the last two years alone gives us a favorable balance of no less a sum than \$437,000,000. Mr. Meighen and Dr. Tolmie would curtail this business by adopting a dog-in-themanger policy. They would say to Britain: "Unless you give us a preference we will not give you a preference." Incidentally, be it noted, the Conservative leader and his party's organizer used to tell us by every sort of inference that the Tories alone demonstrated the real Imperial spirit."





HARBOR NARROWS WILL

Channel Past Hospital Rock Will Be Widened by Additional Fifty-five Feet, It Is Announced; Har-bor Dredging Now Under Way to Be Extended to Deepen Channel Further Upstream Too.

A decision by the Federal Department of Public Works to im-prove the harbor here at a considerable cost is implemented to day by the calling for tenders for the removal of a further section of fifty-five feet from Hospital Rock, and also by the announcement that harbor dredging in progress will be further extended. The effect of both plans will be to give a wider and deeper channel to the harbor basin and also a greater clearance for lumber ships

To The Times this morning J. R. Forde, district engineer of the Department of Public Works, told of the improvements in store

Public Works, Post Office Building.

The last work done at the site of Hospital Rock was in the years, 1921 and 1922, when extensive operations removed dangerous outcroppings of the 47ock for about 160 feet. The rock is mushroom-shaped and though little shows on top it spreads out to a considerable area on the bottom. It is now proposed to widen the gap by a further fifty-five feet, glving a clearance of 215 feet over the condition of the channel in 1921.

The work is costly by virtue of the formation of the rock and its position in relation to the settled districts, making blasting difficult.






