(in my PERSONAL opinion as a Wikipedian and lawyer specialising in online privacy)

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- = this is NOT what the WMF thinks
 - = this is NOT what WMDE thinks

IP masking: Why I think we need it

- IP addresses are 'online identifiers', meaning personal data (art. 4(1) GDPR)
 disclosing IP addresses in the revision history falls under privacy law
- we are only allowed to disclose IP addresses insofar as it is 'necessary' for our purposes (fighting abuse, POV-pushing, etc.) (arts. 5(1)(c), 6(1)(f) GDPR)
 we are *not* allowed to disclose IP addresses where it is *not* necessary
- even though I have been a Wikipedian for over 15 years, I never used an IP address for my work I only used the information behind the IP address
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 - = we are allowed to disclose the IP addresses to those who need them

IP masking: What I think the solution could look like

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- Instead of an IP address, we would see some other form of pseudonymous ID.
- Multiple edits by the same user (even on different pages) would be assigned the same ID.
- Clicking on the IP address would disclose the usual information (country of origin, whether it is a static IP address belonging to an institution, etc.).
- Users with a legitimate interest (anyone involved in vandal fighting, POV hunting, etc.) would be granted a special user right to still see the IP addresses.
- In my opinion, this should work fine.
