## PREFACE.

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In offering to the public a new, improved and abridged edition of his Catalogue, the Proprietor has adopted the plan of the London Horticultural Society; believing it to be the most convenient for the information of purchasers and others.

He has for the last twenty years, been engaged in the nursery business, during which period he has tested fruits, and retained in his collection only such as have proved of superior quality; in no case permitting trees to go out and fruiting them afterwards, as is often done; there are, however, some varieties recently imported, of celebrity in Europe, which he has worked before they have fruited. He has spared no expense or pains in procuring the best fruits of the different varieties both in Europe and America, and is now testing some hundreds of the old kinds, together with a great quantity of imported and seedling varieties. Many of our fine old varieties of apples have failed within a few years; so much so, that they are hardly worth growing; some other varieties must be brought forward to take their place, or our stock of apples will become worthless. The proprietor would most respectfully recommend to all persons that have an opportunity, to grow seedling fruits, for to this source we must look for varieties that will best suit our climate.

The Proprietor flatters himself that by a thorough and practical knowledge of his business, together with a large correspondence in Europe, with a fine tract of first rate land for nurseries, as well as by his personal attention to the engrafting and inoculating his trees, he is enabled to insure to his customers that his trees and plants are of the most select varieties, and true to their respective names. For the genuineness of the trees and plants sent out, he would most respectfully refer to those who have purchased of him, and fruited them for themselves.

In order to ensure valuable and healthy trees, seedling stocks are used to work upon, in all cases as far as practicable, and particularly for apples, cherries, plums and pears, none others are used; thus ensuring fine strong plants, and making much better trees than when worked on suckers, which is often done.

Many of the rare ornamental trees, shrubs, roses, carnations, strawberries, etc., etc., can be imported from Europe at a cheaper rate than they can be raised here. Importations are, and will con-

tinue to be, made annually. The time for transplanting fruit and forest trees, is November in Autumn, and March and April in Spring. April is the best time for transplanting evergreens.

Persons wishing extra large trees will please send their orders early in Autumn.

The prices of ornamental trees and plants have been greatly reduced, and those marked on this catalogue throughout are for moderate sized trees and plants only; larger sizes will be charged higher than the prices marked, in proportion to their size.

Trees and plants packed so as to carry to any part of the United States or Europe, for which a moderate charge will be made. No care will be spared in the shipment of all orders entrusted to him, but no responsibility will be incurred after they are shipped, as to their safe carriage or ultimate success.

Scions for engrafting, will be furnished at from 25 to 50 cents per dozen; buds for inoculating at from 50 cents to \$1.50 per hundred; grape cuttings at from 25 to 50 cents per dozen; but in no case will a single graft or cutting (if only one be ordered) be charged at less than the price of a plant of the same kind.

Terms—CASH, or a responsible reference in Philadelphia.

Wholesale dealers will find it to their advantage to call and examine his stock before purchasing elsewhere. A liberal discount allowed to such.

Many of the varieties are worked on dwarf stocks, and some new varieties, also recently imported from Europe, at 25 cents to \$1 each.

REMARKS.—Our climate is so well adapted to the growth of the Apple, that it will thrive in almost any soil, but a deep rich loam with a dry sub-soil, produces the best orchards and finest fruit. High and rolling land, almost unfit for the usual agricultural purposes, will grow excellent apple orchards, and frequently bear fruit when those in low grounds are killed by the late spring frosts. The distance for planting the apple varies from thirty to forty feet apart, as the elevation, soil, &c., is more or less favorable.

REMARKS.—The Nectarine should be kept well thinned, so as to have plenty of light and air to prevent the fruit from rotting on the tree. Being a smooth skinned fruit, the Curculio attacks it, perhaps worse than any other fruit grown in this section. It should be planted where the unripe fruit that falls can be swept from under the tree, or where hogs and poultry can pick it up. From 20 to 25 feet apart is the best distance for planting the Nectarine.

REMARKS.—The Peach is one of the most desirable fruits in the Catalogue. For beauty and fine flavor it stands almost unrivalled. It does very well any where south of the 43° of latitude, but will do best on a dry soil, well elevated. The tree is subject to several diseases, some of them very little known at present. It never succeeds well on the site of an old orchard, unless the ground has been cultivated from 10 to 15 years after its removal. From 20 to 25 feet apart is the proper distance for planting the Peach. At 20 feet apart it will plant about 100 trees to the acre.

## REMARKS UPON TRANSPLANTING.

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Many persons after procuring trees, crowd the roots into the earth within half the space they had before occupied, which injures the growth of them so much that it often takes two or three years for them to recover so as to be as good as when they were taken from the Nursery. Another practice is often adopted which is also very injurious to the growth of young trees, that is, to plant them in a sward.

In removing trees, the ground should be mellow, and not too wet.

The hole for a moderate sized tree, should be dug three feet in diameter, and from twelve to eighteen inches deep.

In all cases the hole should be sufficiently large to receive the roots without bending.

Before planting, take care to remove all bruised or broken roots with a sharp knife, by cutting clean from the under side, which will leave the roots in a state for shooting directly into the mellow earth.

When the tree is put into the hole, be careful to break the earth fine, and put it in the hole very carefully, observing to fill all the vacancies about the roots.

Shake the tree gently while filling in the earth, but take care not to draw up the tree while filling up, as that will give the roots nearly a vertical position, and is very hurtful to the growth of the tree.

When the hole is two-thirds filled, pour in two to four gallons of water; this will cause the earth to settle, and also fill all vacancies that may remain.

When the water has sunk away, fill up the hole and press the earth moderately around the tree; take care to leave a small cavity about the body of the tree, that the water may be more readily conducted to the roots.

Trees should not be planted more than two or three inches deeper than they stood before removing.

Young orchards, for the first ten years after planting, should never be suffered to lie more than one year in a sod at any one time.

**NOTE.**—The roses for sale on this Catalogue are all on their own roots, except a few Moss Garden and Perpetuals. Worked roses do very poorly in our climate, except when grafted in the root; and to have a good collection of roses that will stand well, they should be on their own roots.
