Additional Instructions for the Lombard Bank.

THE Bank is authorized to make an issue of Promissory Notes on loan, not exceeding in amount the sum of three hundred thousand Spanish Dollars, on the following Conditions.

1.—The Notes are to be issued on the Mortgage of Houses and Lands exclusively, such Mortgage being admitted to an extent not exceeding half the value of the same, according to the valuation of the Magistrates, with four approved securities, and the loan to be subject to an interest of nine per cent per annum, payable half yearly in silver.

2.—The Notes will bear an interest of six per cent per annum, payable half yearly in silver, and they will be discharged at the Lombard Bank when presented, but in that case no interest due for a broken period less than six months will be paid thereon.

3.—They will be drawn out for even sums from fifty to five hundred Spanish Dollars in form as follows:—

No. **Good for Spanish Dollars** —

The Director and Members of the Lombard Bank do promise to pay to Mr. _____ or Bearer, the sum of _____ Spanish Dollars of 66 Stivers each, in lawful coin of this Colony, Bank Notes, Certificates, Treasury Notes, or other representatives of specie in circulation, by authority and sanction of Government, together with the interest thereon, at the rate of six per cent per annum from the date hereof, and on the security of the Estates Mortgaged under the Publication of the 1st November 1813. BATAVIA the day of 1813

4.—The loans may be recalled and the Mortgage foreclosed at any period that may be determined on by Government, provided six months notice thereof be given, and in default of payment the property will be sold to the highest bidder for silver Money.

5.—In the event of a Loan being paid off when the Notes may bear a discount, they are to be received according to the proportionate value they may at the time bear to Silver or other lawful coin in the Market, and whenever the Notes are withdrawn from circulation, they will be paid off by priority of date.

6.—The Bank is restricted from granting further acknowledgments in the form directed by the instructions dated the 1st March 1813, except in exchange for such as may be now in circulation, and whenever any Pledge or Mortgage already granted under the instructions of that date may fall in, it can only be renewed on the terms now fixed, and all Notes issued by the Bank in future must bear the form directed by these instructions. The object of Government being to relieve the community in general, all future Loans to be made by the Lombard Bank, are to be limited to the Sum of Twenty thousand Spanish Dollars to any one Individual.

7.—The Promissory Notes now authorized to be issued are to be classed and numbered according to a plan and regulations to be approved by Government, and each Note is to be signed by two Commissioners and countersigned by the Director or Cashier of the Bank, unless otherwise directed by authority of Government, of which due notice will be given.

Ampliatie op de Instructie van de Bank van Leening.

DE Bank van Leening wordt by dezen geautoriseerd om op bekeening, bankbrieven in omloop te brengen, tot een bedrag niet te bovengaande, de som van drie honderd duizend Spaansche Dalers, onder de volgende voorwaarden:

1.—De voorschietingen in Bankbrieven zullen by uitsluiting gedaan worden onder verband van Huizen en Landeryen, een montant niet te bovengaande de helft van dezelve

waarde, ingevolge de taxatie van den Magistraat, en op vier goede borgen, en tegens betaling van 9. per cent s'jaars, die om de zes maanden zullen moeten worden betaald in zilver geld.

2.—De Bankbrieven zullen interest doen van 6. per cent s'jaars, betaalbaar om het half jaar in zilver geld, en de gedagte Banknoten zullen op vertooning van dezelve in de Bank van Leening worden afgelost, doch in dat geval zullen geene verloopen interesten, voor een gebroken tydvak van minder dan zes maanden daarop worden betaald.

3.—Dezelve zullen uitgegeven worden in ronde sommen van 50 tot 500 Sps. in voege als volgt:

4.—De beleeningen zullen kunnen worden opgezegd en de verbanden vernietigd, ten allen tyden door het Gouvernement te bepalen, mits de aankondiging daarvan geschiede zes maanden te voren, en zal het pand by gebreke van betaling, aan den hoogsten biedende zilver geld verkocht worden.

5.—Ingeval het pand afgelost wordt, op eenen tyd dat de Promesses rahat doen, zullen dezelve ontrouwen worden tegen de waarde welke zy in vergelyking van het zilver of andere wettige munt in omwandering, zullen hebben, en wanneer zy dus uit de omwandering zyn gebragt, zullen zy ingevolge hunne dagtekeningen worden afbetaald.

Het is de Bank ontzegd om in het vervolg, overeenkomstig de instructie van den 1ste Maart 1813, Banknoten uittegeven, als alken ter verwisseling van de thans in omwandering zynde Noten, en wanneer eenig pand of hypotheek gegeven op grond van de voorschreven instructie, mogt komen te vervallen, zullen zy eenlyk hernieuwd kunnen worden op den voet van de nu gemaakte bepaling, en zullen alle nota of promessen van de Bank, in het vervolg uittegeven, moeten ingerigt zyn naar de hier bovengemelde form.

Het oogmerk van het Gouvernement zynde om de ingezetenen in het algemeen te gerieven, zoo zullen in het vervolg, de te doene beleeningen van de Bank van Leening aan eenig byzonder persoon hoe ook genaamd niet hooger mogen belooopen, dan Twintig Duizend Spaansche Dalers.

De Bankbrieven, welke nu op order van het Gouvernement, zullen worden uitgegeven, zullen geclasseerd en genummerd worden overeenkomstig daartoe te doene en door het Gouvernement nader goedtekeurene voordragten, en zal iedere Bankbrief getaekend worden door Twee Commissarissen, en gecontrasigneerd door den Directeur of Kassier van de Bank, ten ware het Gouvernement hier omtrent anderszins mogt beschikken, wanneer daar van behoorlyk kennis aan het algemeen zal worden gegeven.

Proclamation.

THE Honorable the Lieutenant Governor in Council, advrting to the present state of the Currency circulating in Batavia, is pleased to direct that from and after this date the Lombard Bank Notes which have been or may be issued under the Instructions of the 1st March 1813, and of this date, be accounted legal tender in all Transactions of individuals according to the proportionate value the

same may at the time bear in the Market to Silver or other lawful coin, at which rate they will be received and issued at the Treasury and Public Offices of Government; a right being reserved to require the specific performance of covenants and contracts which may have stipulated heretofore or may hereafter stipulate any defined mode of payment.

That in order to ascertain with precision the rate at which these notes circulate, it will be the duty of the Magistrates to report, in each week to the Secretary to Government, the average rate for the week past—which rate will regulate the receipt and issue from the Treasury and Public Offices for the week ensuing.

The rates so fixed are to be published in the Government Gazette, and to form a guide for the Officers of Government in all Transactions in which these notes are concerned.

That no person may plead ignorance of this Proclamation, the same is directed to be published in the English and Dutch languages in the Government Gazette, and to be translated into the Native languages, and affixed at the usual places in Batavia, Samarang and Sourabaya.

ZYNE Excellentie, den Heere Luitenant Gouverneur in Rade, in aanmerking genomen hebbende den staat van het thanste Batavia in omloop zynde Geld, heeft het behaagd te bevelen, dat van en na Dagtekening dezes, de Noten van de Bank van Leening, welke ingevolge de Instructie van den 1ste Maart 1813 en van die van hedigen datum zyn of zullen worden uitgegeven, aangemerkt zullen worden als een wettige Munt, in alle transactien van Particulieren, tegen de waarde, welke zy op het tyd stip, in vergelyking van het Zilver of andere gewettigde Munt in circulatie, zullen hebben, en tegen welke prys zy in de Gouvernements Kassen, Ontvangen en Uitgegeven zullen worden, behoudende een ieder het regt om een getrouwe naarkoming te vorderen der Overeenkomsten of Contracten, waarby een zekere bepaalde wyze van betaling gestipuleerd is of nog te stipuleeren zal worden.

Ten einde met nauwkeurigheid van de waarde verzekerd te zyn, welke deze noten in de omwandering hebben, zoo zal het de plicht van den Magistraat wezen om alle weken aan den Secretaris van het Gouvernement optegeven, hare middelbare cours in de gepasseerde week, en naar welke cours s' Gouvernements Kas en ander Kantoren, zich in den ontvangst en uitgave van hetzelfde in de volgende week zullen reguleeren.

De aldus bepaalde cours zal in de Gouvernements Courant worden bekend gemaakt, ten einde tot narigt te strekken van alle Gouvernements Ambtenaren, in alle Transactien in voorges: Banknoten.

Proclamation.

CONSIDERABLE inconvenience resulting from the uncertainty which exists with regard to payments made in Spanish Dollars, Ducatoons, and other foreign coins, in consequence of the fluctuation of their value in the Market, the Honorable the Lieutenant Governor in Council is pleased to direct, that Spanish Dollars, Ducatoons, and other foreign coins shall, from and after the 1st of January next, be received and issued at the Treasuries and other Public Offices of Government according to their proportionate value at the time with the Java silver Rupee, which is to be considered the standard silver coin of the Island; except in cases which may have heretofore stipulated, or which may hereafter stipulate any specific mode of payment.

The Market price of Spanish Dollars, Ducatoons, and other foreign coins in circulation, will, in consequence, be inserted in the Quarterly Price Current published in the Gazette; the same being calculated in Stivers according to the standard above mentioned, and such Price Currents will form a guide for the Quarter ensuing to the Officers of Government in all transactions in which these coins are concerned.

That no person may plead ignorance of this Proclamation, the same is directed to be published in the English and Dutch languages in the Government Gazette, and to be translated into the Native languages, and affixed at the usual places in Batavia, Samarang and Sourabaya.

ORDERS OF GOVERNMENT.

The Honorable the Lieutenant Governor in Council deeming it essential to the purity of the Public Service, and in conformity to the practice of all well regulated Governments, that the principal Officers of Government should neither engage in Commercial Speculation themselves, nor otherwise exercise the influence possessed by their official situations in favor of any Individual engaged in Trade, so as to impress in any manner upon the minds of the Inhabitants of the Country that the public interests are concerned therein, he is pleased to direct that the undermentioned Officers of Government be restricted from engaging in any Trade or Commercial Speculation, and that they do take an Oath to that effect on their entrance into Office.

Secretaries to the Government. Presidents and Members of the Courts of Justice. Presidents and Members of the Revenue and Commercial Committees. Residents at Native Courts and their Assistants.

Residents of Districts and their Assistants, Collectors and Deputy Collectors of Revenue and Customs, and their Assistants. Store-keepers and Deputy Store-keepers.

Superintendants and Deputies in the Forest, Coffee and Salt Departments.

Such of the above mentioned Public Officers as reside in Batavia and its Environs, will attend at the Council Chamber for the purpose of taking this oath and subscribing their names thereto, on Monday the 15th instant.

The Residents at the Courts and of Districts respectively will take the earliest practicable opportunity of taking the same in the presence of the Court of Justice at Samarang or at Sourabaya, and having administered it to the Public Officers serving within their jurisdiction in the offices above mentioned, they will transmit a list thereof for the information of Government.

ORDERS VAN HET GOVERNEMENT.

ORDERS BY GOVERNMENT.

The Honorable the Lieutenant Governor in Council is pleased to direct that the following Orders and Regulations be published, for the general information and guidance of the parties concerned.

1.—All Europeans, whether British, Dutch or Foreigners, who are at present residing on this Island, are required to transmit a Report of their Names, Country, Occupation, Place of Residence, &c. agreeably to the following form.

Form of the Report.

Table with 6 columns: Name, Country or place of birth, Date of arrival in this Island, Place of residence, By what authority residing in the Island, Present occupation, Remarks.

2.—A similar report is required from the Descendants of Europeans, whether born in the Colony or now residing therein.

3.—Such persons as are in the Military Department of the service, are exempted from the operation of this Order.

4.—The Reports above required are, in the Western Division of the Island, including Cheribon, to be sent to the Office of the Secretary to Government, on or before the 20th instant.—In the Samarang Division including Solo and Djocjocarta, they will be sent to the Resident of Samarang, and in the Sourabaya Division they will be transmitted to the Resident of Sourabaya.—By these Officers a list will be forwarded to Government, on or before the 1st of December next.

5.—All persons not having reported themselves as above stated by the periods specified, will be liable to be placed in personal restraint.

6.—Europeans or Descendants of Europeans arriving at Batavia, are required to report their arrival either personally or in writing at the office of the Secretary to Government within 24 hours after their arrival—in failure of which they will be apprehended by the Police.—Their departure is in like manner to be notified.—This regulation however is not intended to affect those persons residing in the Environs of Batavia who may occasionally proceed to Town and return to their Estates.—It extends to any one coming or going beyond the Town and Environs of Batavia.

7.—Officers of Government arriving at Batavia on public Duty, are directed to report their arrival and departure.—The Civil Officers will report at the Secretary's Office, the Military Officers will continue to report to the Town Major, as directed in General Orders of the 6th March 1812.

8.—In like manner all persons included in the 6th Paragraph, arriving at any part of the Island, whether on duty or otherwise shall report their arrival and departure to the local Chief Civil Authority, and it shall be the especial duty of the Resident to report the same to Government by the next post, in order that an exact Register may be kept in the Secretary's Office of all persons residing or present in the Island.

9.—The Residents, Magistrates, and other local authorities, are further charged and enjoined to cause these Orders to be published and explained to all persons who are now, or may arrive within their respective jurisdiction, and to see that the same be strictly carried into execution.

ORDERS VAN HET GOVERNEMENT.

De Heer Luitenant Gouverneur in Rade heeft goedgevonden te gelasten, dat de volgende Orders en Reglementen gepubliceerd worden tot generale informatie en narigt van de geenen, wien zulks moge aangaan.

1.—Alle Europeanen, het zy Britten, Hollanders of Vreemdelingen, die thans op dit Eiland residenten, worden verzocht om een Rapport in te zenden van hunne Namen, Geboorteplaats, Beroep, plaats van Residentie &c. ingevolge het hierna volgende Model.

Model van het Rapport,

Table with 6 columns: Naam, Vaderland of Geboorteplaats, Datum van hunne arrivement in dit eiland, Woon plaats, Op welke autoriteit zij op dit Eiland residenten, Tegenwoordig beroep, Aanmerkingen.

2.—Een gelyk Rapport moet ook ingezonden worden door de afstammelingen van Europeanen, het zy dat zy in dit Land geboren zyn, of dat zy daarin thans residenten.

3.—Personen, die in Militaire Dienst zyn, zyn van de voldoening aan deze order uitgezonderd.

4.—De bovengenoemde Rapporten moeten in de westelyke Divisie van het Eiland, (Cheribon daar onder begrepen) aan het Kantoor van den Secretaris van het Gouvernement worden ingezonden, op of voor den 20ste dezer,—in de Samarangsche Divisie, (Solo en Djocjocarta daar onder begrepen,) aan de Resident te Samarang, en in de Sourabaysche Divisie aan de Resident te Sourabaya.—Deze Officieren zullen daar van een Lyst inzenden aan het Gouvernement, op of voor den 1ste December aanstaande.

5.—Alle personen, die zich zelveu niet gerapporteerd hebben invoegen voormeld binnen de bepaalde tyd, zullen zich blootstellen om onder personeel arrest gesteld te worden.

6.—Europeanen en afstammelingen van Europeanen, die te Batavia arriveren, moeten hun arrivement het zy in persoon of in schriftte rapporteren op het Kantoor van den Secretaris van het Gouvernement, binnen 24 uren na hun arrivement, by gebrake van welke zy door de Dienaren der Policie zullen geapprehendeerd worden, hun vertrek moet ingelykervoege bekend gemaakt worden.—Deze bepaling zal egter niet behoeven te worden nagekomen door zodanige personen, die in de Ommelanden van Batavia residenten, die by gelogtheit in de Stadt komen en weder naar hunne Landeryen retourneren.—Dezelve is egter geextendeerd tot alle Personen die verder als de Stadt en Ommelanden van Batavia gaan of komen.

7.—Officieren van het Gouvernement, die uithoofde van publieke betrekkingen te Batavia komen, moeten van hun arrivement en vertrek rapport doen.—De Civile Dienaren moeten zulks ten Kantore van den Secretaris rapporteren, en de Militaire Officieren zullen continueren met zulks in den plaats Major te rapporteren, ingevolge Generale Orders van den 6de Maart 1813.

8.—Inzelvevroege zullen alle Personen, onder het 6de artikel begrepen, die op cenige plaats van het Eiland arriveren, hunne aankomst en vertrek aan de locale Civile Chef rapporteren, en het zal de byzondere pligt van de Resident zyn om zulks by de eerst volgend Post aan het Gouvernement te rapporteren; zo dat een accurate Register ten Kantore van den Secretaris kan gehouden worden, van alle Personen die op het Eiland residenten of present zyn.

9.—De Residenten, Magistraten, en andere locale Chefs, worden wyders gelast en aanbevolen, om deze Orders te laten publiceren en bekend maken aan alle Personen, die thans zyn of hierna onder hunne respectieve jurisdiction mogen komen; en toezien dat dezelve behoorlyk worden geexecuteerd.

The Honorable the Lieutenant Governor in Council is pleased to direct, that on the arrival of any Ship or Vessel, commanded by a European, the Master or Commander of such Ship or Vessel shall, within 24 hours after his arrival, transmit for the information of Government a list of the Ship's Crew, and of the Passengers arrived therein.

This report is, at Batavia, to be made at the Office of the Secretary to Government, and at any other Port to the Resident of the District respectively.

On the departure of the Ship or Vessel, a further report is required, stating any alterations that may have occurred during the interval, in the list before delivered, together with the list of Passengers about to embark. A Port Clearance will not be granted until these reports are duly received.

It is further to be understood, that this regulation will not have effect with regard to colonial vessels trading from one Port of the Island to another; it will, in this case, be sufficient, that the list of the Crew be furnished at the Port from whence the Ship or Vessel first sailed, and again upon her clearing out for any distant or foreign Port. A list of Passengers however, is invariably to be furnished as above stated, at whatever port she may arrive.

Extracts of the Act of Parliament of the 33d year of GEORGE III. Cap. 52.

81. PROVIDED also, and be it further enacted, that during the continuance of the said exclusive trade in the said Company subject as aforesaid, it shall and may be lawful for any of his Majesty's subjects, resident in Great Britain, or in any other part of his Majesty's European dominions, to export on their own proper risk and account, in the ships of the said Company, or in ships freighted by them from the port of London, to any of the ports or places usually visited by the ships of the said Company, or the several coasts of Malabar, Coromandel, or in the Bay of Bengal in the East Indies, or in the Island of Sumatra, any goods, wares, or merchandizes, of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the said dominions, save and except as is hereinafter otherwise specially provided; and that in like manner, it shall and may be lawful to and for any of his Majesty's subjects in the civil service of the said Company in India, or being by leave or licence of the said Company, or under their protection, as merchants resident in India respectively, to consign and put on board the ships of the said Company, or in ships freighted by them, bound to Great Britain, any goods, wares, or merchandize, save and except, also as is by this Act otherwise specially provided, in order to the same being imported on the risk and account of the owners thereof at the port of London, under the regulation hereinafter specified and contained.

87. And inasmuch as the ensuring to private merchants and manufacturers, the certain and ample means of exporting their merchandize to the East Indies, and importing the returns for the same, and other goods, wares, and merchandizes allowed by this Act

at reasonable rates of freight, may essentially conduce to the advancement of the trade and navigation of these kingdoms; be it further enacted, that the said Company shall, in the proper season of every year, provide and appropriate three thousand tons of shipping at the least for the specific purposes of carrying to the East Indies, such goods, wares, and merchandize, as may be lawfully exported thither, by individuals, and for bringing back from thence as well the return of the same, as likewise the goods of other persons entitled to import the same into this kingdom, by virtue of this act, and if the said quantity of tonnage shall be found insufficient, or shall be found to be more than shall be sufficient for the carriage of the said private trade, export or import, the said Company shall from time to time, find and provide such an additional quantity of tonnage or lessen the quantity of tonnage to be provided for the carriage of the private trade, as the Board of Commissioners for the Affairs of India shall, upon any representation made to them from time to time, order and direct.

89. Provided also, and be it further enacted, that the said Company shall be entitled to charge and recover from the owners of goods, imported or exported in private trade, such rates of freight for the carriage thereof, as are hereinafter specified, and not any higher rate or rates, any law or usage to the contrary notwithstanding, (that is to say) for the carriage of any goods from Great Britain to any port or place in the East Indies, in time of peace, after the rate of five pounds per ton; and for the carriage of any goods from any part of the East Indies to Great Britain, after the rate of fifteen pounds per ton, computing such tonnage in the same manner as the tonnage of goods, shipped by the said Company on their own account; and that in times of war, or in preparations for war between Great Britain, or any other European Power or State, or when any circumstances incidental to war, or preparations for war shall happen, whereby an increase in the rates of freight payable by the said Company shall become unavoidable, then, or as long as such war, or other circumstance shall continue, the said Company shall be entitled to charge and recover for the carriage of the said private trade, additional rates of freight, after a due proportion to the additional rates of tonnage which shall be paid by the said Company for the hire of ships for their own trade, and at or after no higher rate of proportion.

93. Provided also, and be it further enacted, that all persons intending to export any goods from any port or place in the East Indies to Great Britain, shall signify the same by notice in writing to the Chief Secretary of the Presidency in India, wherein the same are to be shipped or to such person as shall be specially authorized to receive the same by the said respective governments abroad, within a reasonable and convenient time, to be limited by the said respective governments for that purpose; in which notice shall be specified, the sorts and quantities of goods intended to be shipped, the quantity of tonnage required, and the period when the goods will be ready to be put on board; and that every person giving such notice, shall make deposit at the Treasury of such Presidency or Settlement respectively, of the whole amount of the freight upon the quantity of tonnages specified in the said notice, or otherwise give such reasonable security for the payment thereof in Great Britain, and the due performance of his engagements in that behalf as the said respective governments shall require; and if any of the persons giving such notice shall not provide his or their goods to be shipped within the time or times therein specified for that purpose, their deposits made, or securities given for the freight, shall be forfeited to the said Company.

94. Provided also, and be it further enacted, that if any vacant tonnage shall remain, not engaged by individuals, either in Great Britain, or the East Indies, after the times limited for giving such notices respectively, the said tonnage, together with any other vacant tonnage occasioned by the failure or default of any person or persons in the delivery of their goods within the period specified in their notices for that purpose, shall and may be occupied by the goods of the said Company, without any allowance to the person making such default, in respect thereof; and that if the whole quantity of tonnage required by private trade in any year, either in Great Britain, or the East Indies, shall exceed the whole quantity to be provided for private trade, according to the true intent and meaning of this Act, in such year respectively, in that case the whole of the tonnage provided shall be impartially distributed amongst parties requiring the same, in the proportion to the quantities specified in their respective notices; and that on every such occasion, the said distribution shall be made with all convenient dispatch, and the quantity of tonnage appertaining to each of the persons entitled thereto, shall be notified to them respectively by the said Secretary, or other proper Officer, in writing, seven clear days, at the least, antecedent to the day appointed for making the deposit, or giving security for the said freight in the manner before directed.

103. Provided also, and be it further enacted, that previous to the shipping of any goods under the authority of this Act, by

private merchants or manufacturers, the same shall be duly registered in a book kept by the said Company for registering private trade goods, in which registry shall be described, the marks and numbers of each bale or package of goods so shipped, and the amount of tonnage of all the goods shipped by each merchant or manufacturer, and an order or licence in writing shall be given, under the hand of the proper officer of the said Company for the shipping of such goods, and all goods which shall be shipped either in London, or the East Indies, without being so registered, shall be considered as goods illicitly shipped, and the said goods shall be subject to such seizure and forfeiture, and the owners, shippers, and agents concerned therein, to such forfeitures and penalties as any persons shall be subject to by law, for carrying on trade to or from the East Indies, without the said Company's licence.

IN conformity to the 93d Section above recited of the Act of Parliament of the 33d year of GEORGE III, Chapter 52, and to the 1st Article of the Resolutions of the Honorable the Court of Directors, published in the Calcutta Gazette Extraordinary, dated the 10th of November 1802, all persons intending to export Goods from Java to Great Britain, in the Season of 1813-14, are hereby required to notify the same, in writing to the Secretary to Government on or before the 1st December next.

The notice must specify the sorts and quantities of the Goods intended to be shipped, the Tonnage they will respectively occupy, also the time or times at which the Goods will be ready to be shipped, and in what proportions. Any time (being some specific day or days, and not generally some period between one date and another) may be named to the 1st of July next. After that date no Goods will be received. Should any person not have his Goods ready to be shipped at the time or times specified in the notices, the freight will, agreeably to the 93d Section of the Act, be forfeited to the Company.

As soon as may be convenient after the expiration of the period for the receipt of the notices, the Goods for which Tonnage may have been required, will be assorted into cargoes for the ships, which may be appointed for the conveyance of the private trade to England, in as fair and equitable a manner as possible, and with the greatest practicable convenience to the proprietors.

Upon the Goods being allotted to the ships, the parties will be advised thereof, and on the requisition of the Warehouse Keeper, the Goods must be sent to the Warehouse to be shipped. The Goods when sent to the Warehouse, must be accompanied by manifests in duplicate, signed by the shippers, with a certificate of the Collector of the Government Customs subjoined to each manifest, stating that the duties have been duly paid.

Information of the rate of freight to be paid by Individuals will be published as soon as advice thereof shall be received from the Honorable the Court of Directors.

Individuals may either deposit the freight of Goods in Java, or give security for the payment of it in Great Britain, and the notices must specify which mode of payment they prefer; such persons as may chuse to pay the freight in Great Britain, must with their notices send in a declaration from the person tendered as security, signifying his assent to be security.

The freight is to be understood only as a consideration for the carriage of the Goods from the place where the ships may be lying at the time of the Goods being put on board. The expence of transportation to the ships must also be defrayed by the shippers (in Java) as usual.

It is hereby declared, that any notice which may not contain the several particulars required by the Act, or may not be made in the mode so required, will be liable to rejection.

The resolution of the Governor General in Council under date the 26th September 1796, respecting persons failing to ship goods, for which tonnage may have been granted to them, and the orders of the Honorable the Court of Directors, dated the 31st of August 1804, and 17th August 1809, regarding the package and tare of goods shipped on law tonnage, are republished for general information.

Resolution of the Governor General in Council, dated 26th September, 1796.

As the relinquishment of the forfeiture under any circumstances is entirely a matter of favor, and as the Company may hereafter sustain considerable loss from individuals omitting to occupy the tonnage for which they apply, added to the inconvenience and trouble resulting from it in loading the ship; it is his determination to enforce invariably the payment of the freight of short shipped tonnage in all cases in which the most satisfactory reason shall not be assigned for its not being filled up.

EXTRACT of a General Letter from the Honorable the Court of Directors, dated 31st August, 1804.

PAR. 92. The owners of several of the extra ships which were taken up for the purpose of bringing home the goods of individuals from India, having expressed great dissatisfaction at the hardship to which they have been exposed in consequence of the bad package of the bales of privileged goods imported on their respective ships; We directed our Warehouse Keepers to report for our information, whether the goods in question occupied a greater space than the generality of consignments on the Company's account, and as it appears by their reply to our application that the owners of the above ships have been considerable sufferers from the preceding circumstance, we feel it necessary from motives of justice, both to the Company and the owners of the above class of extra ships, to direct, that immediately on the receipt of this letter, you give public notice, that the shippers of privileged goods will be required to pack their consignments equally well as those of a similar description imported on the Company's account, and that in the event of their neglecting to comply with these instructions, the freight will be calculated according to the actual measurement of the Goods and not as has hitherto been customary, according to the number of species.

93. And with a view the more effectually to enforce these instructions, it is our farther directions, that the Export Warehouse Keeper be directed to insert in the account tonnage the exact measurement of those bales which may appear to him, on a general inspection, to be negligently packed, in order that they may be charged with freight according to the plan above described.

EXTRACT of a General Letter from the Honorable the Court of Directors, dated the 17th of August, 1809.

PARA. 11. It is with considerable regret we have noticed that the privilege traders have in a variety of recent instances exported privileged goods from India in Packages of a much larger weight and bulk than was necessary for their protection, and the owners of some of our ships having represented the great loss they sustained by the deduction of those large tares (which have in some instances amounted to the amazing proportion of nearly 70 per cent.) the justice of their claims has induced us to come to the resolution not in any case to permit the tare of goods to exceed in amount the tares enumerated in the margin (provided the true tare shall amount to so much or more) which upon due consideration, we have deemed a reasonable allowance to the merchants for the protection of their goods. This regulation, which justice to the owners of our ships has prompted us to adopt, has, however, subjected the Company to the loss of the difference between the larger tare deducted in the accounts with the Agents to

The length of time which has elapsed since the arrival of any vessels direct from Europe or India, and the consequent deficiency of late political intelligence, have produced a temporary want of subject matter, which we fear has rendered our columns less interesting to our Readers than we could wish to make them—we trust, however, to their candour in admitting this to be less a fault than a misfortune, and a misfortune to which we are as sensible as themselves.

We are however led to hope that the present void of recent information on political topics will ere long be supplied by the arrival of one of the ships that were expected to leave England soon after the departure of the Lord Eldon and William Pitt, for supposing the first of these ships did not sail from England till the commencement of May, and that she remained a month at the Cape, as was expected, the period usually employed in the voyage will expire in the course of the present month, so that we may with reason look daily for the arrival of some recent news from the Theatre of Politics—which we shall lose no time in laying before our Readers.

In the mean while, we are obliged to limit ourselves to extracting from the stock of papers already received, such particulars as may appear most interesting, and a judicious selection of which is at present the only object we have in view, till the receipt of further intelligence may enable us to supply our Paper with communications of more recent interest.

We understand the Honorable the Lieutenant Governor will touch at Cheribon on his voyage to Samarang, and take a short trip into the interior of that and the neighbouring Districts in the Western Division of the Island.

Great progress is said to be making in the Gold and Silver Coinage in the Mint at Sourabaya, nearly 3,000 New Rupees on an average, being now struck off and finished daily.

EUROPEAN EXTRACTS.
BELL'S WEEKLY MESSENGER,
January 31.

All the accounts from the French coast concur in representing the general feeling of the French people upon the event of the late campaign,—an event, which by the destruction of nearly three hundred thousand young men, has filled almost every house in France with mourning. Since the destructive wars of Louis the XIVth, nothing has been known which can be brought even into a momentary comparison with it, and even the ambition of that monarch falls short of his Imperial successor. France, says an eminent historian, has not recovered to this-day her loss both in population and national means, which were brought upon her by the wars of the Grand Monarque. He invested his throne with the splendour of conquest at the expence of the dearest interests of the nation, and he has given a lesson to future kings, which they would do well to remember, that the very hand of heaven is opposed to conquerors, and that in the modern world they have never succeeded. There has always been a very wide interval between the commencement and the conclusion of their fortune.

Charles XII. of Sweden is another eminent instance of both of these important truths—namely, that the exhaustion produced by long wars, and particularly by the loss of whole armies at once, is never recovered; and secondly, that the very curse of Heaven follows, as a retributive justice, in some part of the life of the Conqueror. Sweden has not recovered, to the present moment, the losses which were brought upon her by the destructive ambition of that splendid madman; and her present comparative insignificance, not to say servitude, are consequences of his successes and failures. And the fact of Charles is an equally strong example of the visitation of Providence. He died in a ditch, before one of the most obscure fortresses of Europe, and so much did Sweden gain by his death, that it is a matter of doubt, to this day, whether he did not fall by the hands of his own officers—being secretly shot by one of them in order to release his country from his ruinous vanity.

The ambition of the Emperor Napoleon is so much the more destructive, inasmuch as it is on a larger scale than that of either of those modern European Conquerors. Louis the XIVth could never assemble a greater army than about 80,000. Such armies as those of France were never heard of till the French Revolution pushed the resources of the nation to their extreme. So much the greater, therefore, is the amount of the exhaustion, which may be naturally expected from the ruin of such a mass.

The total amount of the French Cavalry, in the whole of their military establishment, is about 80,000, of which it is upon indubitable record (their own confession) that 40,000 perished. Now the lives of horses are as difficult to raise as those of men, and whence is France to supply this sweeping destruction?

The French Gendarmerie is stated in a Daily Paper to be 60 squadrons, and the ordinary amount of a squadron is 250 men, so that France (according to this account) has still a kind of Police, and Militia Cavalry of 15,000. But it is evident that this cavalry cannot be spared from the home defence. The other part of the remaining French cavalry is in Spain, and may amount to about 25,000. But still less can this be spared from the necessities of the Spanish War. So that, in this main arm of War, we do not see any effectual means by which France can sufficiently

repair her shattered squadrons, so as in a condition to resume the Russian Campaign in spring. Austria and Prussia we have argued, will probably not gether desert from the French cause, on the other hand, they will certainly be so warm in it as to undergo those treme efforts of supplying these losses their own blood.
