

cination does not take, the individual is immune. The opposite is popularly thought to be true. The vaccination may fail to take because improperly carried out, or because the vaccine was inert.

One of the things that is sometimes said against us is that we change our beliefs, therefore there is no "science" in medicine. The fact that we do change our beliefs when the advance of knowledge warrants it, shows that medicine is a science rather than not. Long superficial scratches about one-fourth of an inch apart are made and the seed virus is gently rubbed into these. The calves are now rigidly isolated in a special room, free from dust and screened. The animal now develops the eruption of this mild disease, cowpox or vaccinia. On the fifth day the animal is placed upon a special table and, after it is chloroformed to avoid area per gallon-saves material. pain, the site of the vaccination is given a very thorough scrub-Scientific physicians, as a class, lot of flushing with sterile water, a paint job. Now it is hermetically placed in capillary tubes or in small vials. An autopsy is performed upon the calf immediately after the vaccine is taken and if there are any lesions showing that the calf had developed any other disease than cowpox, the vaccine is destroyed.
