Progress is Made Toward Ending Big British Coal Strike

Premier Lloyd George, Mine Owners and Strikers Had Discussion To-day; Another Conference May Be Held Next Monday.

London, April 22.—By invitation of Premier Lloyd George, the British coal mine owners and the leaders of the Miners' Federation met with him this afternoon and discussed the coal situation. The conference was adjourned at about 6 p.m., but it was stated sufficient progress had been made to justify another meeting, which probably will be held Monday.

Before the meeting it was stated that the conference of deleates of the striking miners which was to have been held to-day had been adjourned until to-morrow.

The eastern abutment rests on bed rock, and its base is under water even at low tide. Divers built the lower part of the giant support. The whole weight of the eastern extremity of the bridge will rest on this mass of cement.

The bridge will not be fastened The bridge will not be fastened tightly to the abutment, as it is necessary to make allowance for the contraction and expansion of the steel with the changing of temperature. The bridge will expand and contract about one inch over its entire length during the transition from a cold night to a warm day. French Army Ready As New Moves of Germany Discussed

Washington's Refusal of Berlin's Reparations Request Lends New Interest to British and French Premiers' Conference.

London, April 22 .- Dramatic efforts on the part of the German Government to induce the United States Government to arbitrate the reparations question between Berlin and the Entente Govern-ments and the refusal of the Washington Government to sit in judgment on the merits of the vexing problem have lent new interest to the conference on Sunday between Premier Lloyd George and Premier Briand of France. The expressed desire of the United States Government that there be an immediate resumption of negotiations has brought into the situation a new element, as it has been popularly supposed the two Premiers would merely consider plans for further occupation of German territory and not a renewal of exchanges between London and Paris and Berlin.

The new factors entering into the situation have given rise to considerable speculation as to whether Mr. Lloyd George and M. Briand will deem it advisable to make some sort of answer to the implication in the United States note to Berlin that further negotiations should be commenced.

CONFERENCE IS CARVELL'S PLAN

Says Railwaymen's Wages Should Be Reduced

Saskatoon, April 22.—Referring to criticisms of the last award of the Railway Commission offered by Sen-ator Robertson, Minister of Labor, in

Railway Commission offered by Seinator Robertson, Minister of Labor, in the Senate recently, Hon. F. B. Carvell, chairman of the Commission, addressing the Saskatoon Canadian Club at dinner last evening, blamed manipulation of working conditions by the big railway unions, for the present railway problem.

"The big unions have so manipulated working conditions," he said, "that they have got the railway companies in their grip. They can not do a thing. If the people of Canada are willing to stand for this kind of thing then they should pay for it."

As for a remedy, he suggested a round-table conference of business men with the railway officials, a reduction of wages, not a niggardly reduction, and an anjustment of the scale of working conditions. Supporting his claim, he quoted a series of figures showing wages and overtime paid various railway servants.

Burden.

"Senator Robertson's gures are all light," he said. "He guoted the rates."

"Senator Robertson's f.gures are all right," he said. "He quoted the rates of pay by the hour and the day. They are not excessive, but combined with the working conditions, they place an unheard-of burden on the railways for operation expenses. The Canadian National Railways are helpless under present conditions. I don't say that all the people are getting these wages; that is just indicative of a class."

"If the burden were on my shoulders to remedy this conditions I would
make an awful stab at it," he said,
"but I hold this opinion; I think that
Canada is big enough to run its own
business, with no dictation from the
States. I suggest that the businessmen should get together and talk it
over-talk business. I don't want to
go back to 1914 wages. The men
could not exist on them. I don't
want to be niggardly, but would
like to see some sort of a reasonable
scale of wages arranged."

APPLE CROP IS THIS YEAR IMMUNE FROM THRIP PEST

Prospects Excellent in Saan ich For Record Breaking Tree Fruit Crop

Apple growers of the Saanich peninsula are in high spirits over prospects of one of the largest apple crops of the history of the industry, and are at the same time delighted to find that the infestation by Calieria pear thrip, which has been prevalent for some years past, is negligible this year. Whether this absence of thirp is due to the peristent spraying campaigns which have been conducted or is attributable to the wet Winter season is not satisfactorily decided, but the absence of the insects is so marked that the early spraying has been universally abandoned as an unnecessary expense.

Even the Gane and Jonathan varieties of apples, which are particularly susceptible to the attacks of the thrip, are but little affected, according to H. E. Tanner of Keating, the trees being now in such an advanced stage of bud that the thrips can call the damage, in his opinion.

A close examination of the orchards shows that there are a number of thrip everywhere, but the buds are now well formed, and it is believed that the application of the usual preblossoming lime sulphur spray, with the addition of a little micotine and arsenate of lead, will put an end to all possibility of damage this seaon.

Inspection of extremely susceptible arieties of apples shows that some either by the thrip or rost, and it is suggested that in such cases early and severe thinning of the fruit set will result in a concentration of all the strength of the trees upon the remaining fruit and will assure a normal crop.

Chamber of Commerce Hears of Beneficial Legislation

"Ninety-five per cent. of men reach ing the age of sixty years are dependent on their daily earnings, or on some other person for support, and not one man in twenty who retires with a competency is able to retain it to the close of his life," said Civil Service Commissioner W. H. Mac-Inness in addressing the members' forum of the Chamber of Commerce last night on the subject of the Government's superannuation scheme.

"Victoria, as in the case of every other municipality, is to-day carrying a good deal of expense in the way of a good deal of expense in the way of providing for men who, from humanitarian reasons, are kept in the service, though their efficiency is on the wane," he said.
"Employees in every walk of life," said Mr MacInnes, "are daily inquiring as to the working of the Act, and asking that they be brought under its operation.

Now in Infancy.

"Though the Act is in its infancy in so far as the working stage is coneern," he continued, "it will be nurtured and improved with experience, and the future generations and the peoples of other parts of the world will look upon the deeds of this Province in looking after its aged as one of the greatest steps in the progress of the human race."

As far as the Provincial Government is concerned, ninety-five per cent. of the employees have accepted the scheme. Only fourteen have asked for exemption from the Act. Mr. Maclines. "For every person wanting exemption, there are five who wish to increase their salary deductions to provide for the scheme. The great mass of the employees have accepted it as part of the daily routine."

Mr. Maclines referred to the remarks of some critics to the effect that the cost of the Civil Service should be reduced by millions. "As the total salary roll at present is less than \$2,500,000, it is nonsense to talk of reducing it by millions," he said.

The Details. Under the Act the employee and employer each contribute four per cent. of the salaries paid; these are paid into the superannuation fund by

the Government, which allows five per cent, interest thereon. The Provincial annuities were double those of the Dominion Government annuities.

On retiring, there were a number of options which the employee might choose: First there was the single life plan under which the retiring allowance would be paid as long as the beneficiary lived and would terminate with his death; the second, an allowance as long as he lived or for a term of years and should he die before that term expires the allowance would be paid to his dependents for the remainder of the term; thirdly, an allowance to the person as long as he lived and to the wife or other dependent survivor for the term of the latter's life.

Should a beneficiary not reach the retiring age either through death or resignation his estate or himself, as the case might be, would be entitled to have his own contribution paid back to him plus interest. The benefit of the employers' contribution would be secured only if the employee retired on account of age.

All By Agreement.

The operation of the Superannuation Act is brought into effect by agreement by both employer and employee. The Act does not fix any age at which a man must retire, he explained. This age is fixed by the regulations of the service in which he is engaged. The Act does fix, however, a minimum, and provides that whenever a man is retired after that minimum age is reached, the allowance must be paid to him.

There are three great risks to which a man is exposed and for which he can reasonably expect to make such provision as is possible, namely, disability, death leaving persons dependent on him, and the risk of old age.

The Workmen's Compensation Act and the Mothers' Pension Act covered a very substantial portion of the community and this legislation was the first step in taking care of the risks to which the people of, this Province are subject. J. Pelletier, of Ottawa, Confers With Island Commissioners

A conference was held this morning between A. J. Pelletier, of the Dominon, Bureau of Statistics, and Messra, W. G. Gaunce, Victoria; Mr. Price, Nanaimo; E. H. Hicks-Beach, Comox and Moody, Alberni, when these four ensus commissioners were given final netructions regarding the taking of he census in their respective districts.

The Commissioners will now prepare to appoint their enumerators, interpreters where needed, attend to the distribution of the necessary supplies and give the enumerators final instructions respecting their work.

Emphasis was again laid on the fact that the present census 1: not to be used in any way in connection with taxation or assessments. People need not be afraid to answer the questions put to them because the census will be used only for compiling totals. These records are not even accessible for war purposes; they are strictly confidential and no one has any access to them for any purpose whatsoever, Mr. Pelletier announced. This phase of the matter is provided for by law.

Some of the aldermen probably will be willing to approve this lower amount, but Alderman Sangster claims that the proposed increase in police salaries is absolutely unjustified at the present time when living costs are not increasing.

Tokio, April 22. — The United States Shipping Board steamship Wenatchee, which sailed April 10 from Victoria, B.C., for Yokohama, has developed engine trouble, according to a wireless message received here to-day. The high pressure starboard turbine of the vessel has been damaged, and the Wenatchee is running on low pressure, making only twelve knots an hour, the message stated. The steamship is due here late to-morrow night, two days behind her schedule.


