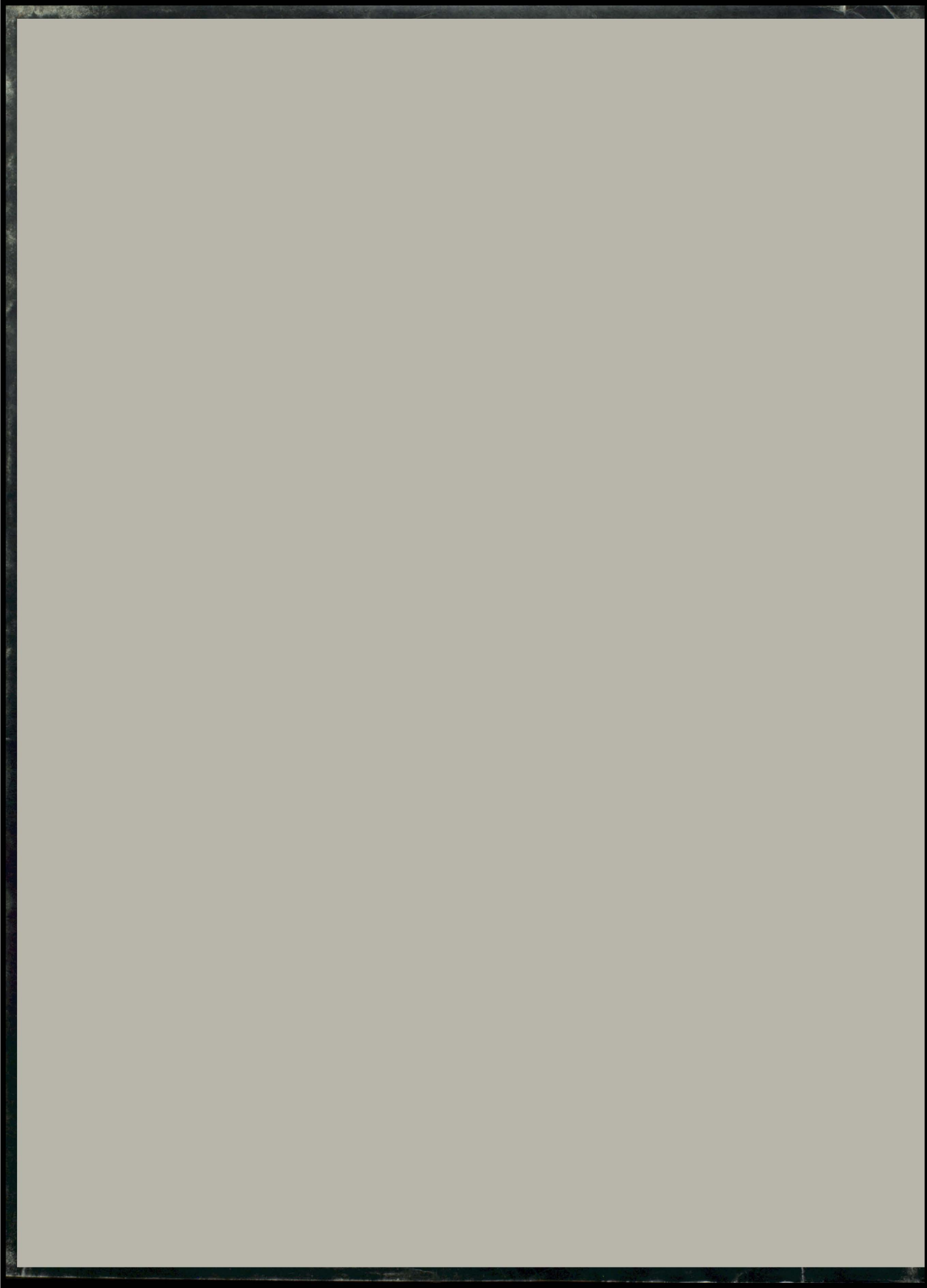
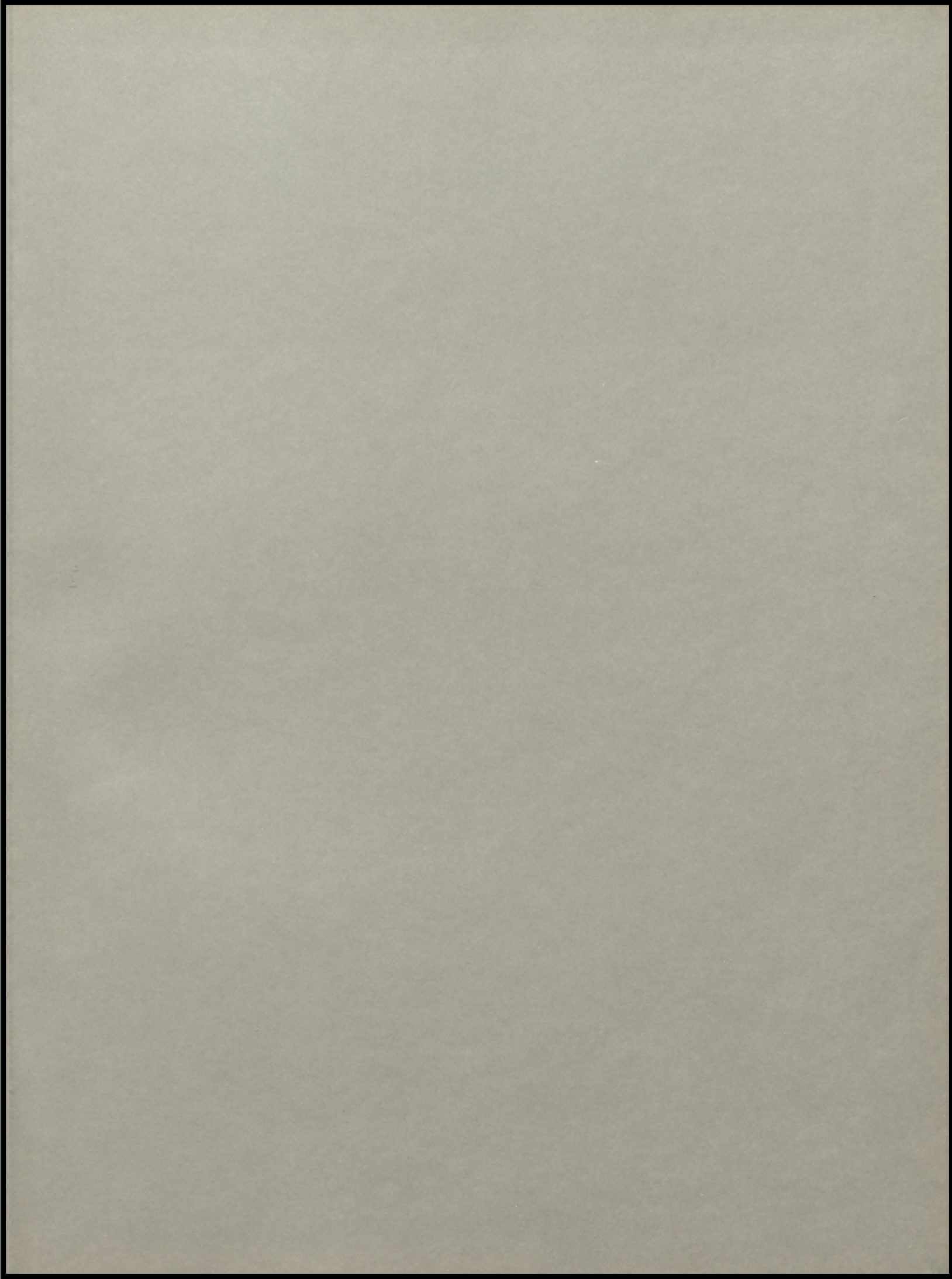
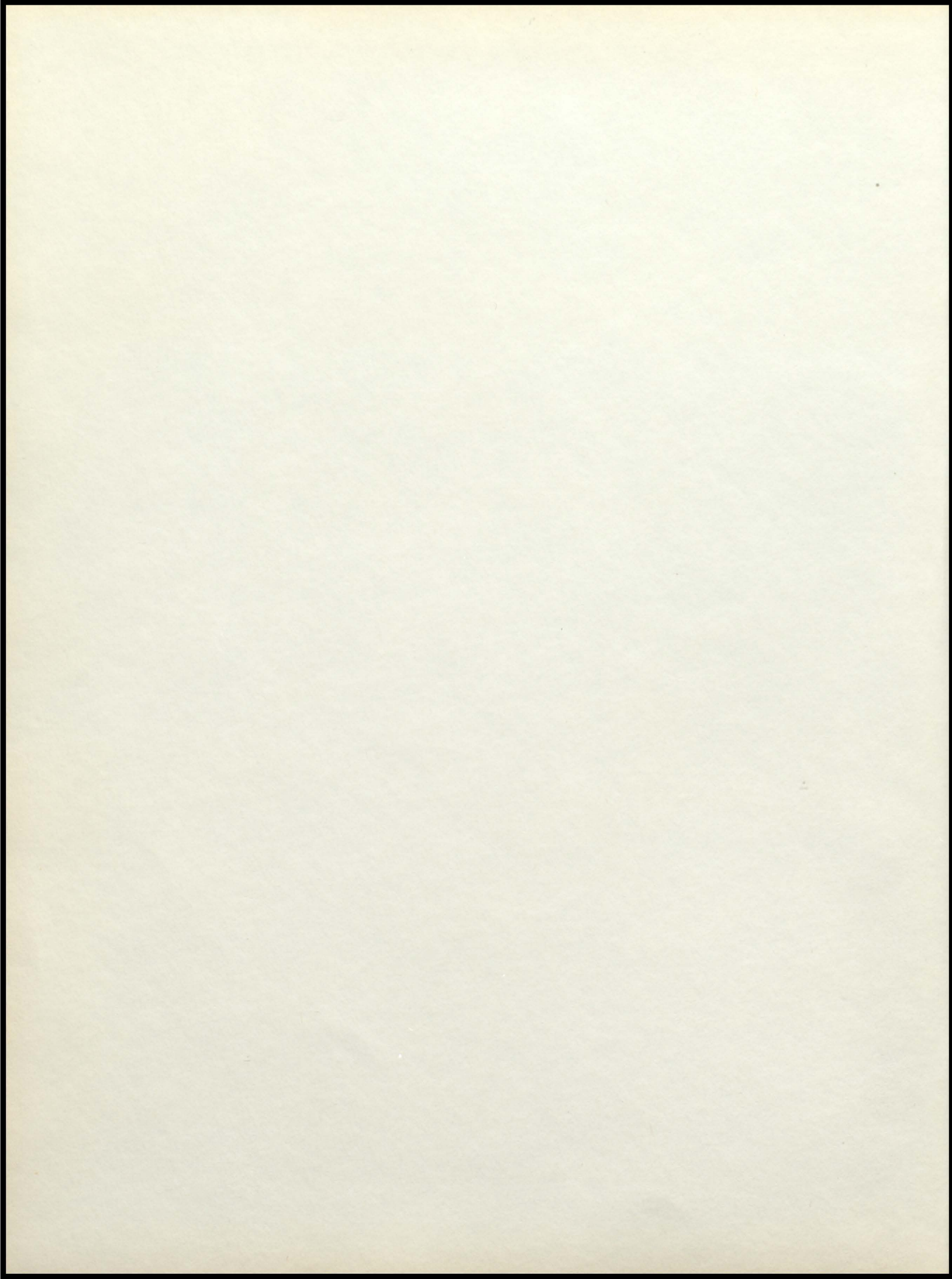

The purpose of this book is to spotlight those individual dramas, those exclusive plots, that make every student at Mooresville High School just a little unique.

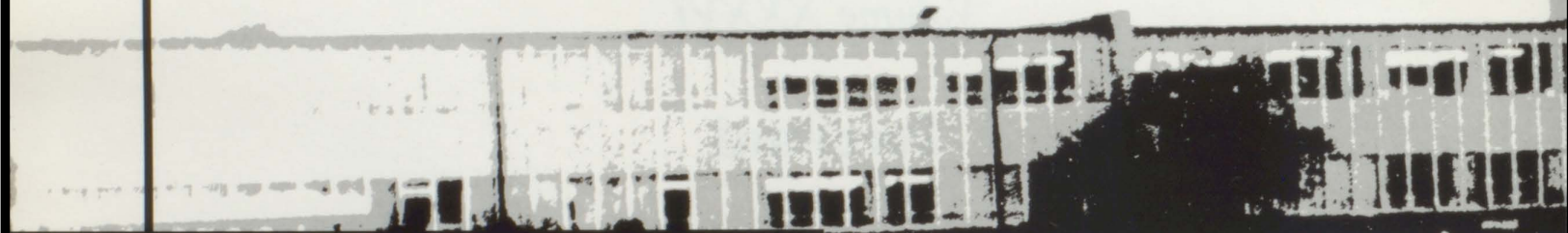
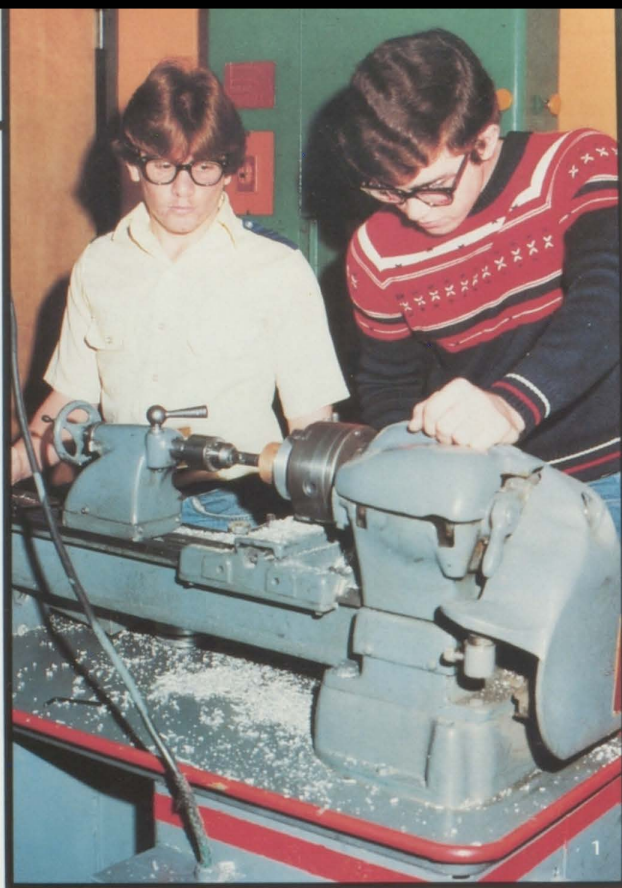

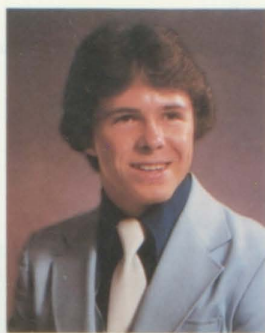

Student-teacher ratio at Mooresville High School in 1981 was sixteen students for every teacher. In the four years the students were here, they had to have accumulated thirty-six credits, of which some came from required courses: one year of math, four years of English, two semesters of physical education, health, civics, government, and a course in science.

The teachers responsible for these courses were the ones who made the students study, listen to lectures, and take final examinations. Besides all this, they offered the students a wide variety of counsel and assistance. Along with the teachers, the administrators had many responsibilities like maintaining the operation of the school, making it possible to have extracurricular and athletic events, scheduling of students into classes, and training the students for the future.

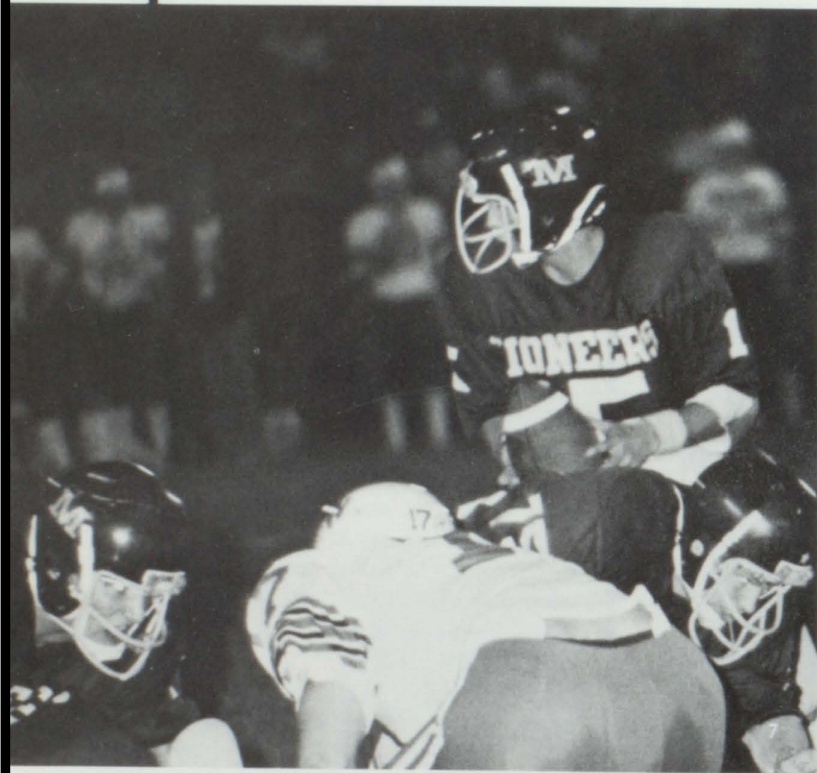

Varsity has 6-4 record wins Greenwood game

Dedicated football players left the beaches and the pools August 5 to begin practicing for the 1980 football season.

They began that successful season by defeating Avon 20-13 to end a two year losing streak to the Orioles.

The team chalked up a 6-4 record, and

they lost a 3-9 heartbreaker to Plainfield for the Mid-State Championship. They had many more successes to look back on.

"I enjoyed this season more than any other, because I respected every one of the guys on the team; and they all wanted to win more than years before," said Senior Ted McCoy. The team showed this winning spirit by placing second in Mid-State competition and coming from behind to win all six games.

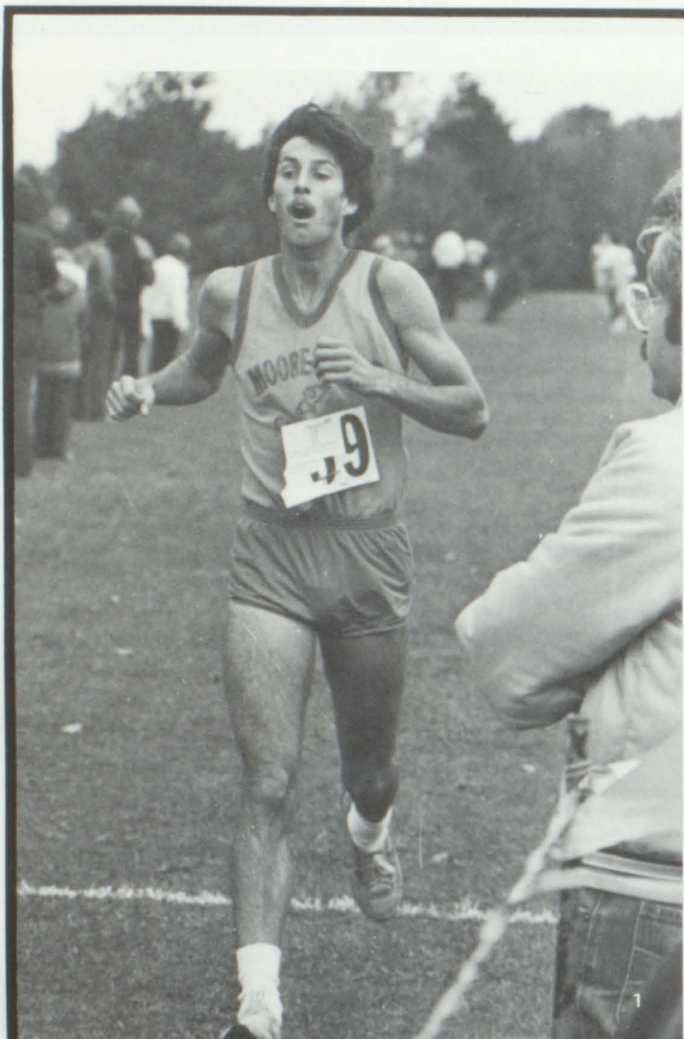

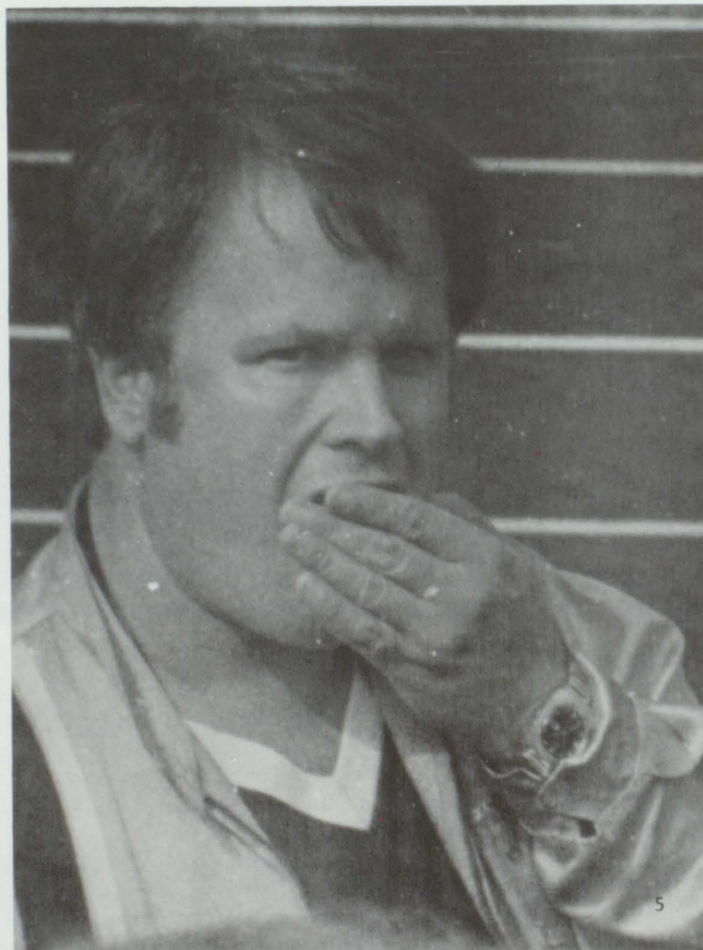

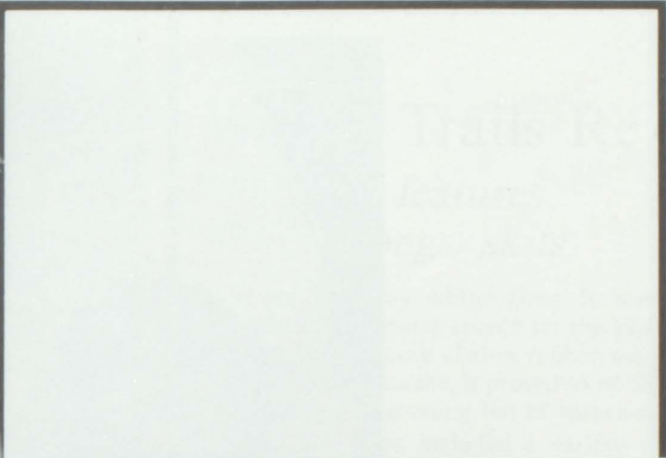

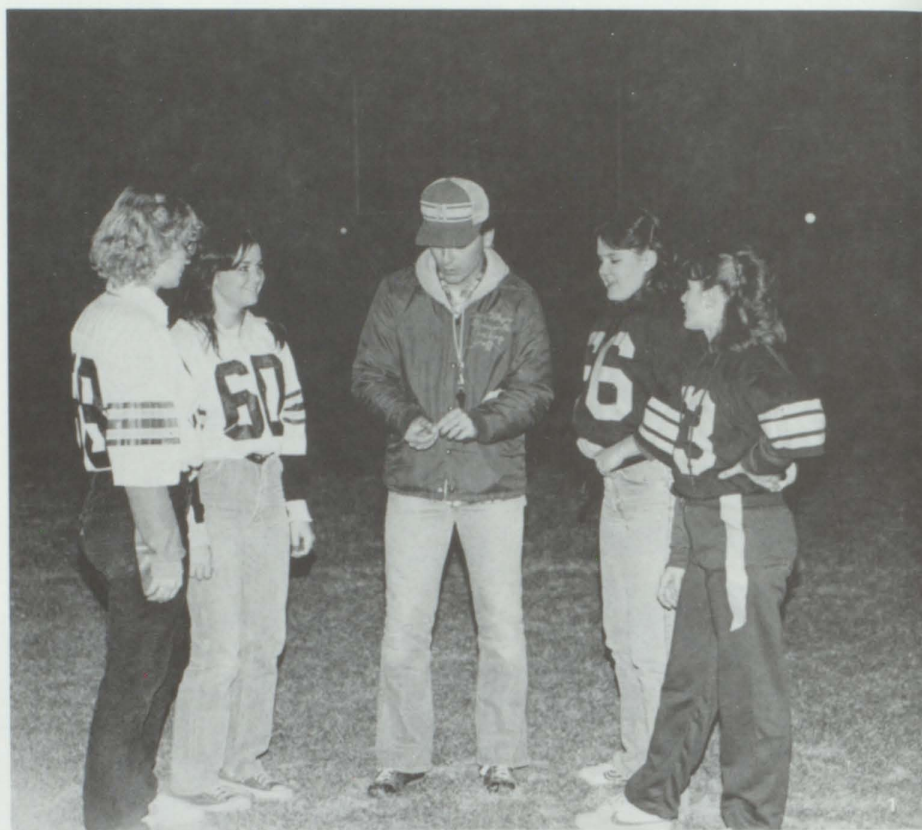

Also responsible for a great number of the year's convocations were the cheerleaders, who organized several pep sessions preceding athletic events.

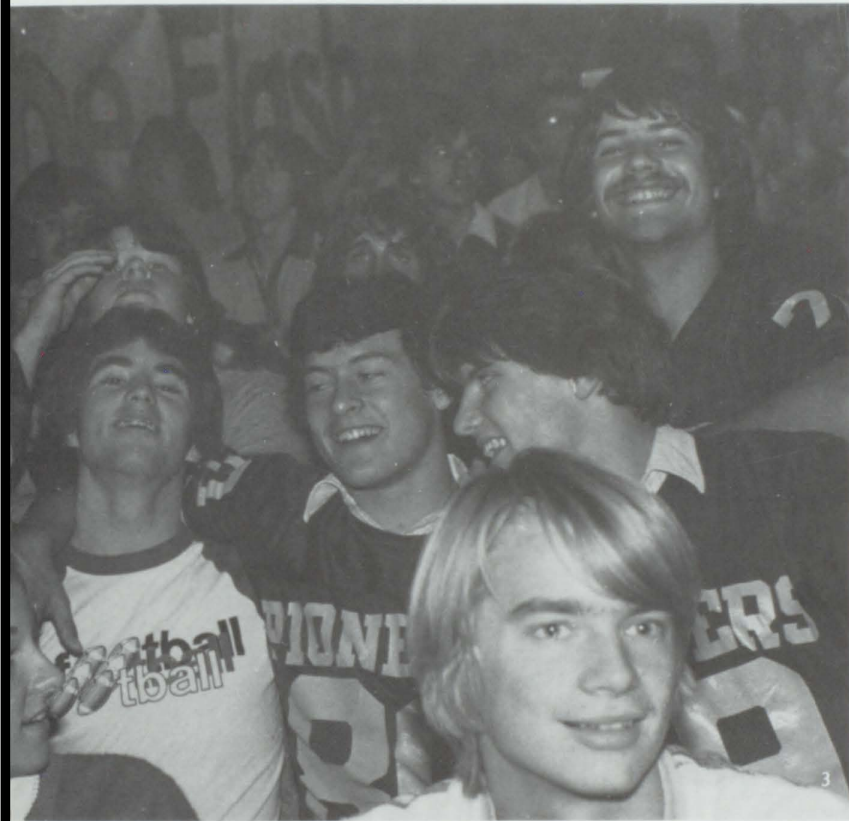

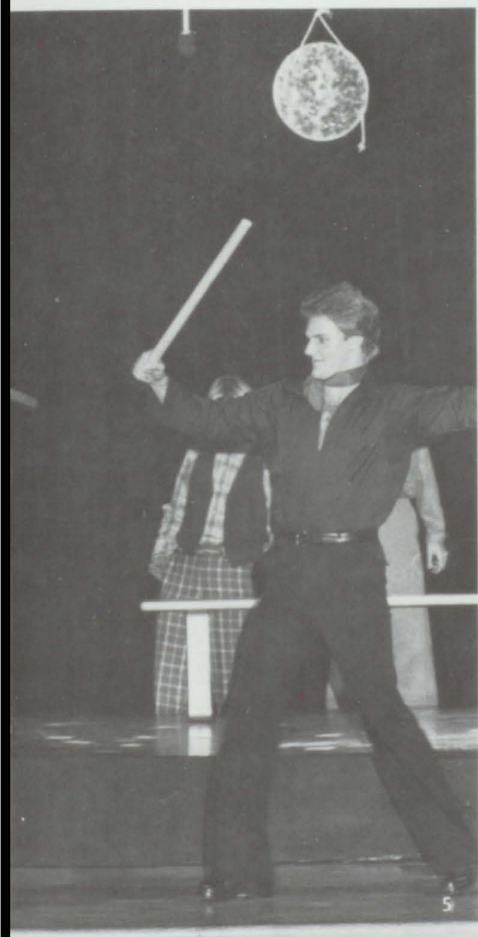

Ms. Bauman said, "The show was an artistic success, but a commercial failure. I wish more people could have seen the show. It was a good example of the Drama Department's talent."

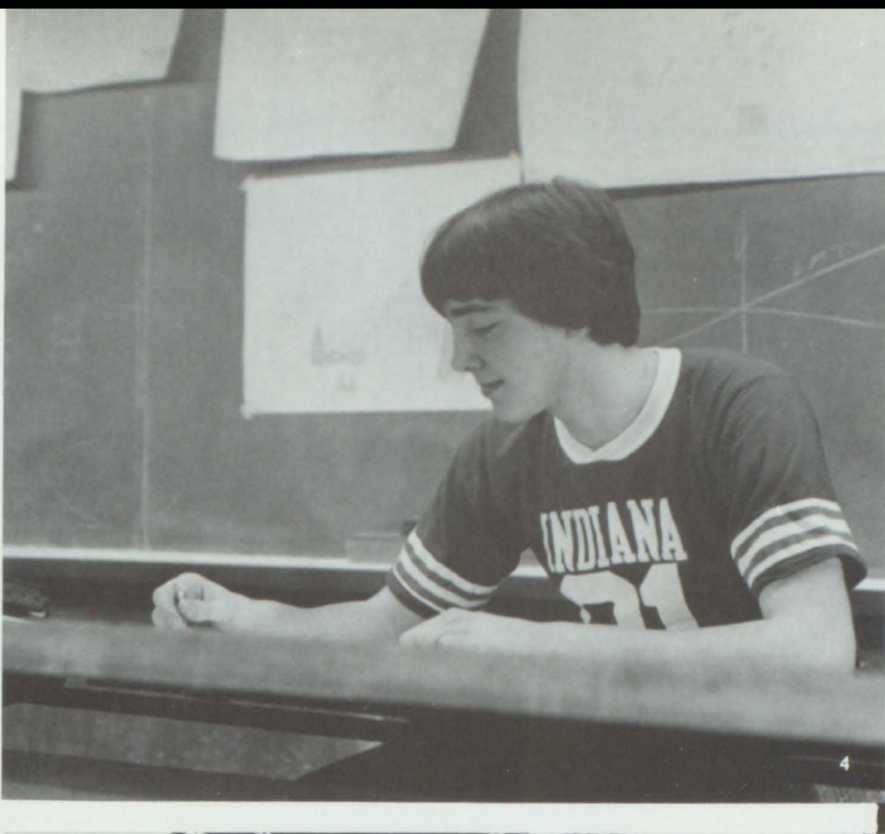
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1. Henry (Mike Aldrich) and Mortimer (Curt Cox) show the effects of the world on Matt (David Strohmeier).

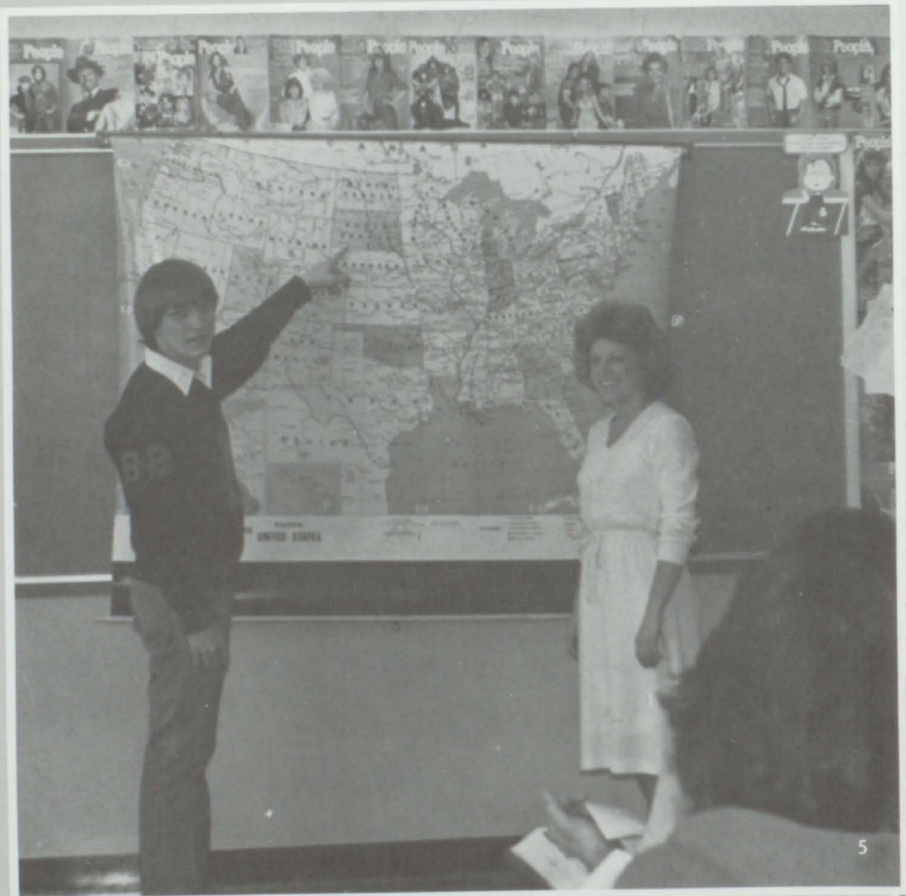

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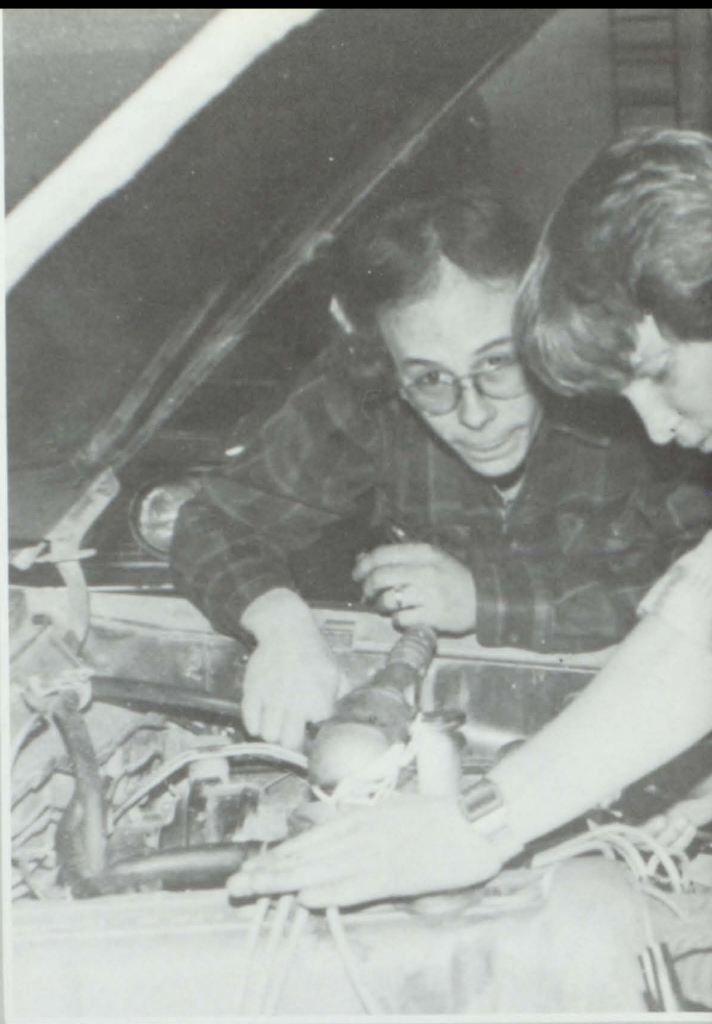

"We build the house from foundation to finishing and trimming," said junior Kenny Morgan, of his building trades experience.

This year was the fifth year of the Mooresville High School building trades program, headed by Mr. Bill Moon.

Projects completed by the building trades classes included bricking and roofing the storage house at Newby, and building houses to be put up for sale after completion.

ICE (Inter-disciplinary Cooperative Education) was a program which provided students with learning experience from on-the-job training.

Participants were selected from teacher recommendations, attendance, and grades. Applicants had to be willing to work a minimum of 15 hours a week.

Each student received three credits per semester.

"You have to prepare individuals for the world of work," said woods teacher, Mr. Randy Qualitza.

This certainly was true as industrial arts students completed many projects during the year.

The first year wood student's main project was the completion of a walnut, red oak, or cherry clock. They made these clocks from scratch to finish.

Mr. Qualitza stressed the use of hand tools for his beginning woods students, then moved to automatic machines for his advanced students.

The metals classes, taught by Mr. Kelly Maxfield, had a very busy year. Projects completed included decorative sheet metal and dust pans.

Metals students also learned the proper use of gas torches and lathes.

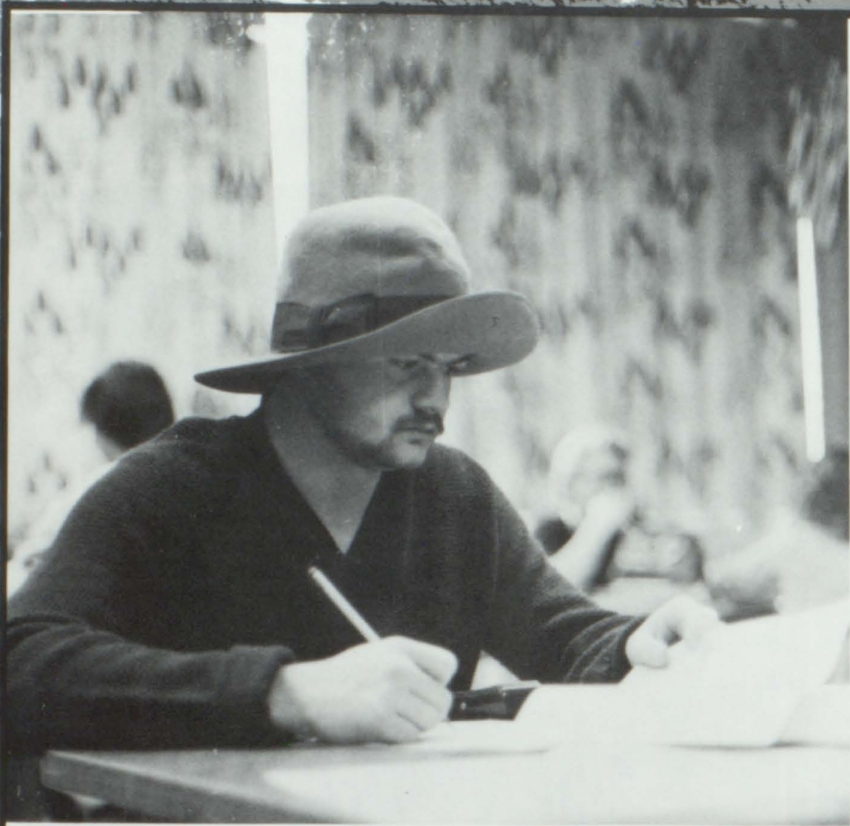

Young team wins first conference

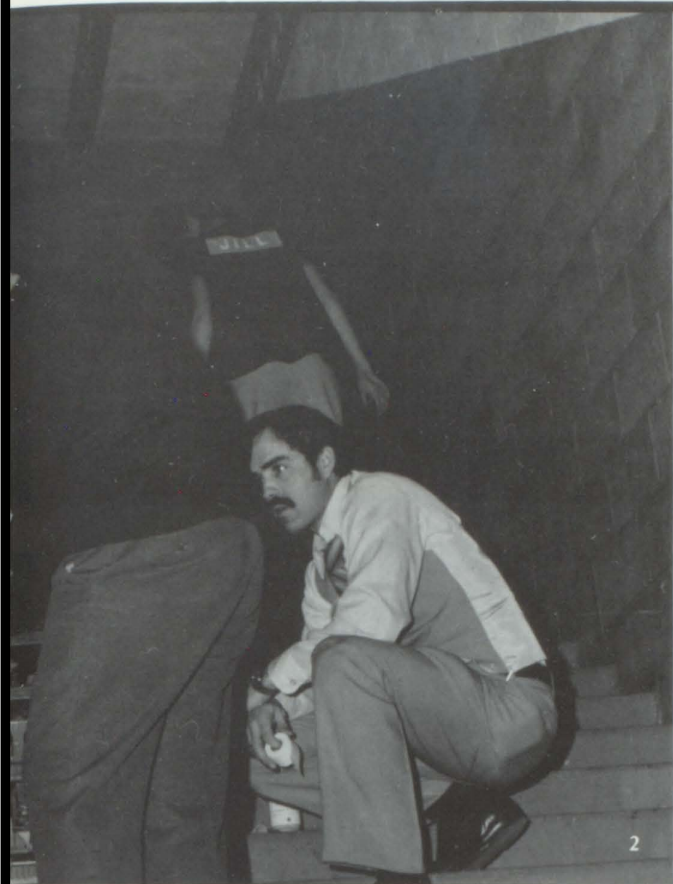
With their season record of 15 wins and 5 losses, the lady Pioneers stopped short of their goal to win at sectionals but won the conference for the first time. Coach Joe

Although ten wrestlers advanced to Regionals, only four were able to advance to Semi-State: Bobby Duke, and Randy Ca-

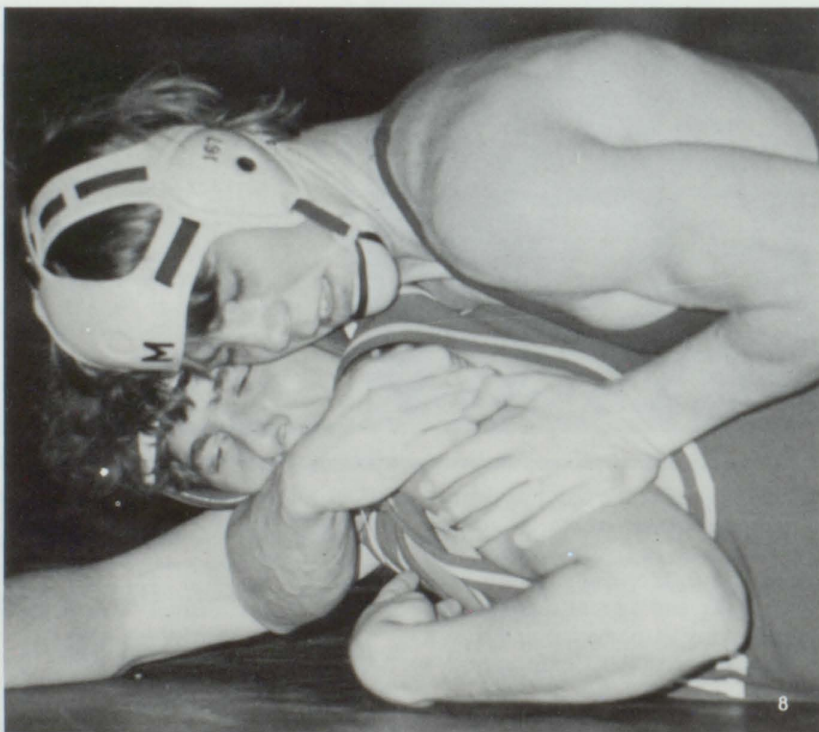

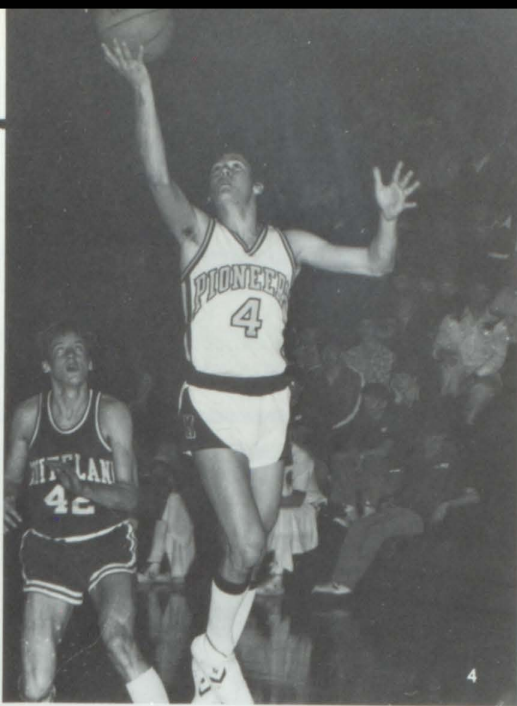
Senior co-captain Jack Craft said, "We didn't have as much ability as a lot of teams, but we played together as a team,

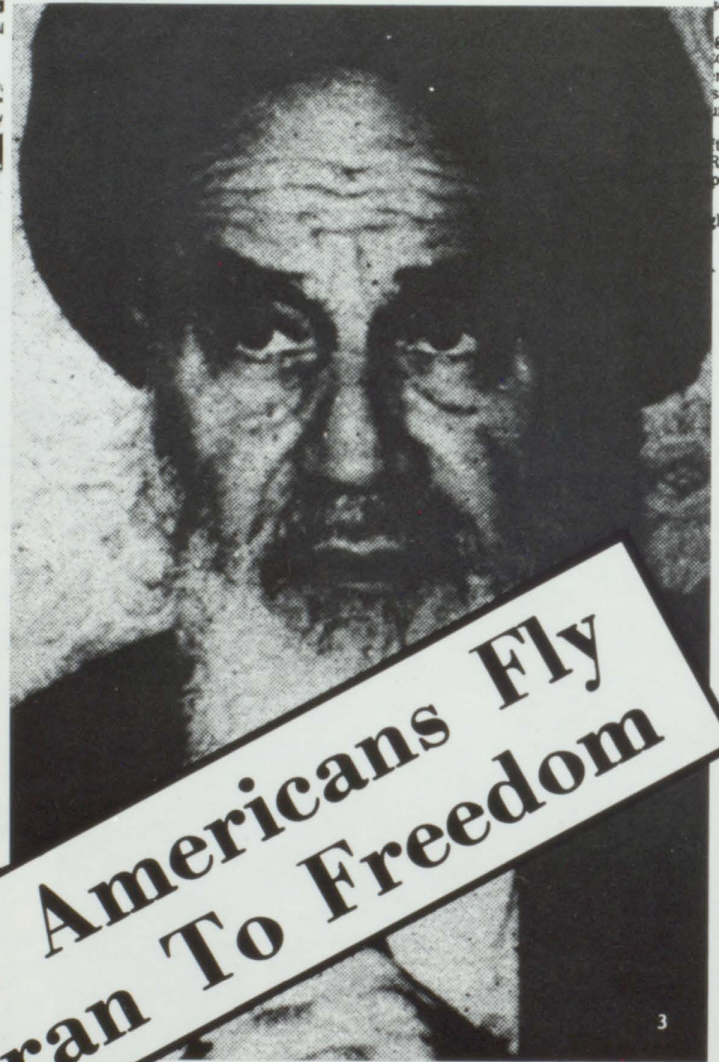
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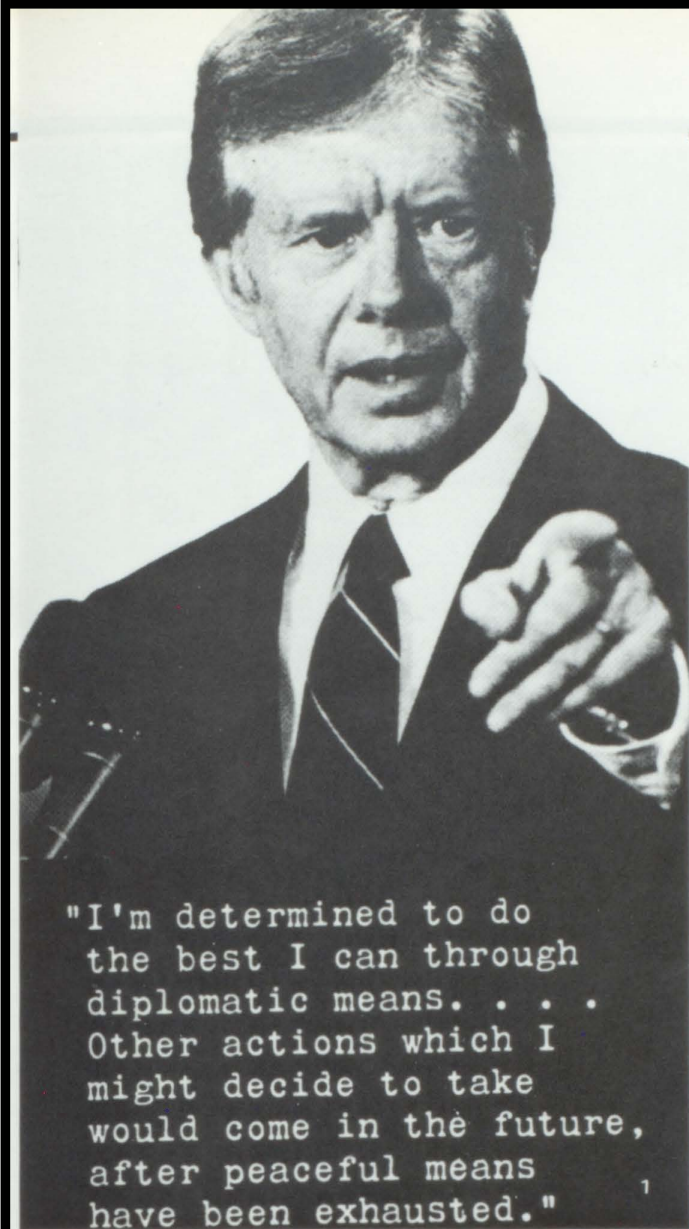
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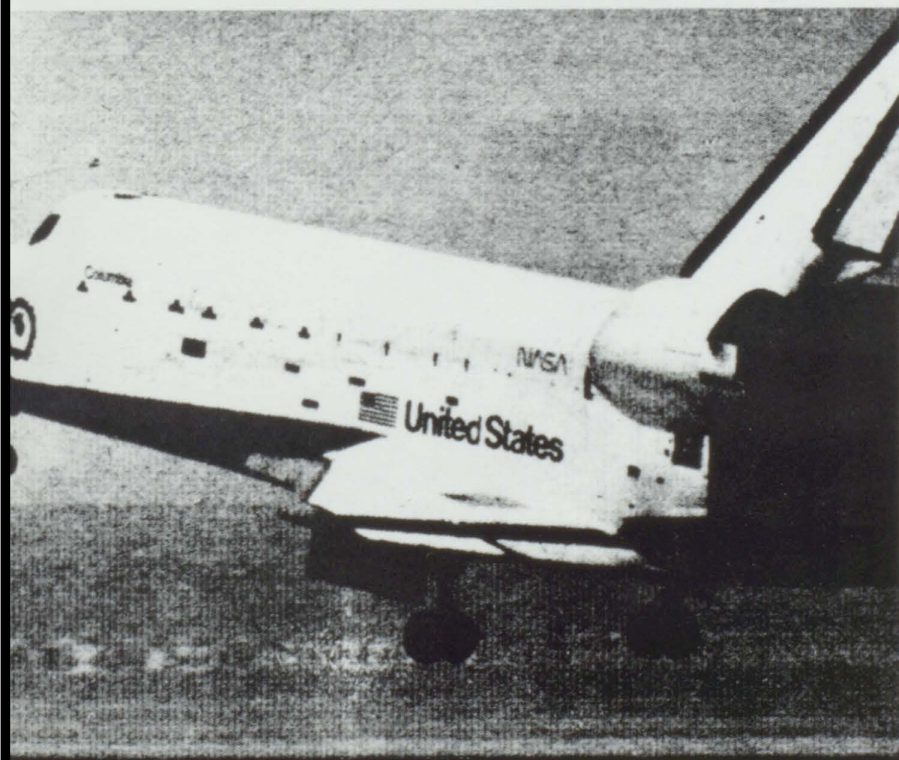

Year brings Reagan, freed hostages, shuttle

The world didn't exactly revolve around Mooresville High School during the 1980-81 school year. There were several noteworthy events that expired between August and May.

After 444 days, the long-awaited release of 52 American hostages in Iran became reality. In a seemingly endless sea of media coverage, the former captives were flown to West Germany for a short convalescing period and then to the States. They were immediately given a hero's welcome, and many received special honors from various institutions.

Whether by coincidence or not, the hostages were released January 20, the same day as the inauguration of the new President, Ronald Reagan-almost the exact time.

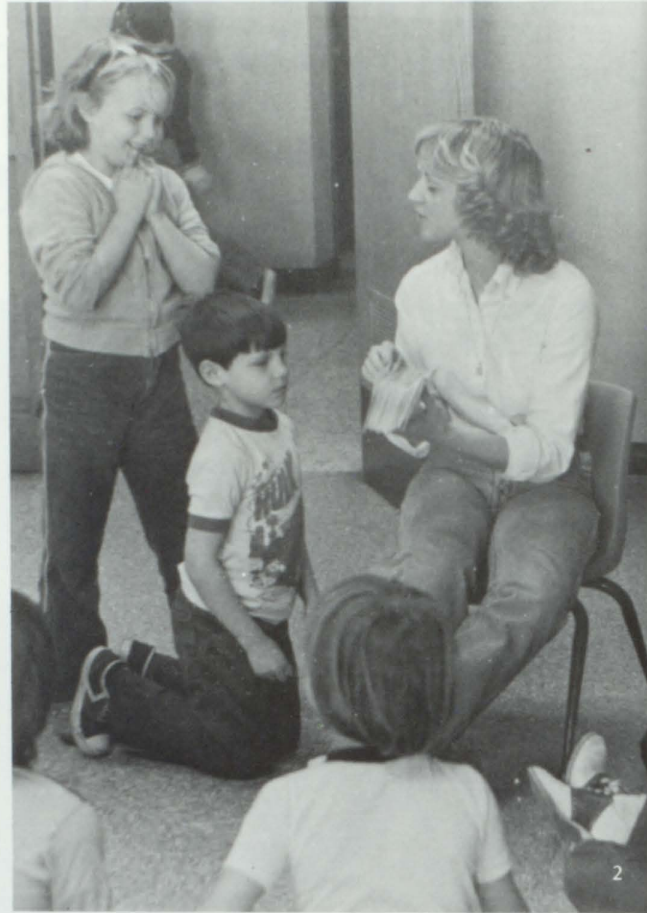
Reagan had won a sweeping victory over incumbent President, Jimmy Carter, in November and brought with him a "conservative tide" of newly-elected government representatives. Republicans wrestled control of the Senate from the long-dominating Democrats and also gained seats in the House.

Reagan's wide-spread popularity didn't prevent an assassination attempt on March 30 when he was leaving a Washington D.C. hotel following a speech. A lone gunman opened fire at him. Three others fell wounded, and the President, who had a bullet lodged in his left lung, was rushed to a Washington hospital.

A healthy man, despite his 70-plus years, Reagan recovered quickly and was soon able to return to the White House. From his own bed he was able to watch the successful launching of the space shuttle April 12.

The space shuttle, promising to revolutionize the U.S. space program, survived many mechanical setbacks and timely delays. The "Columbia" finally toured on her maiden voyage and made an airplane-like landing on a dry lake bed to begin a new era in space.

Experience gained comes in many forms. "I expected the kids to be more mature than they were," said Kathy Straley. "I learned you really can't kid a kid." Plunkett added, "You learn to talk plain and direct."

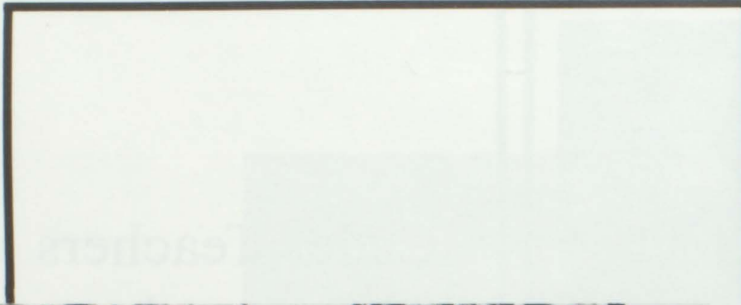
Becky Smith summed it up. "I would recommend cadet teaching because it teaches you a lot of patience," she said.

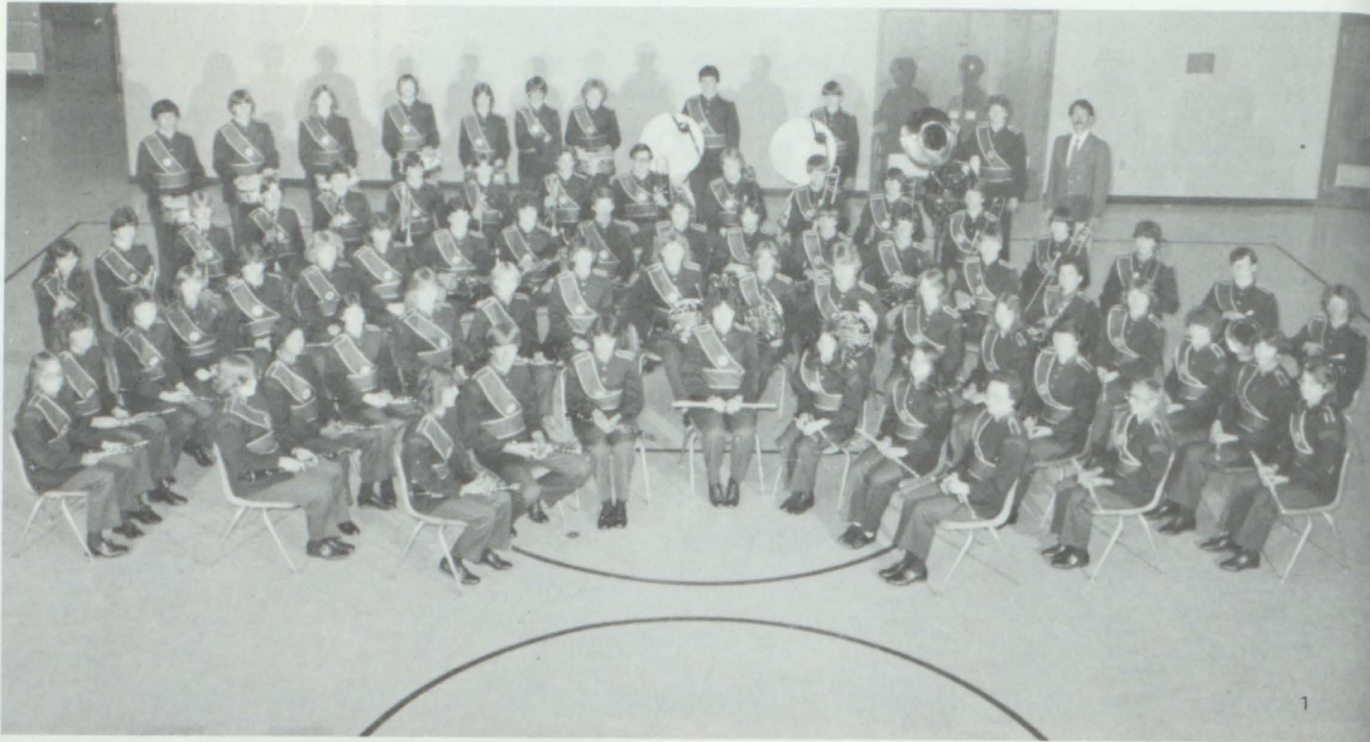

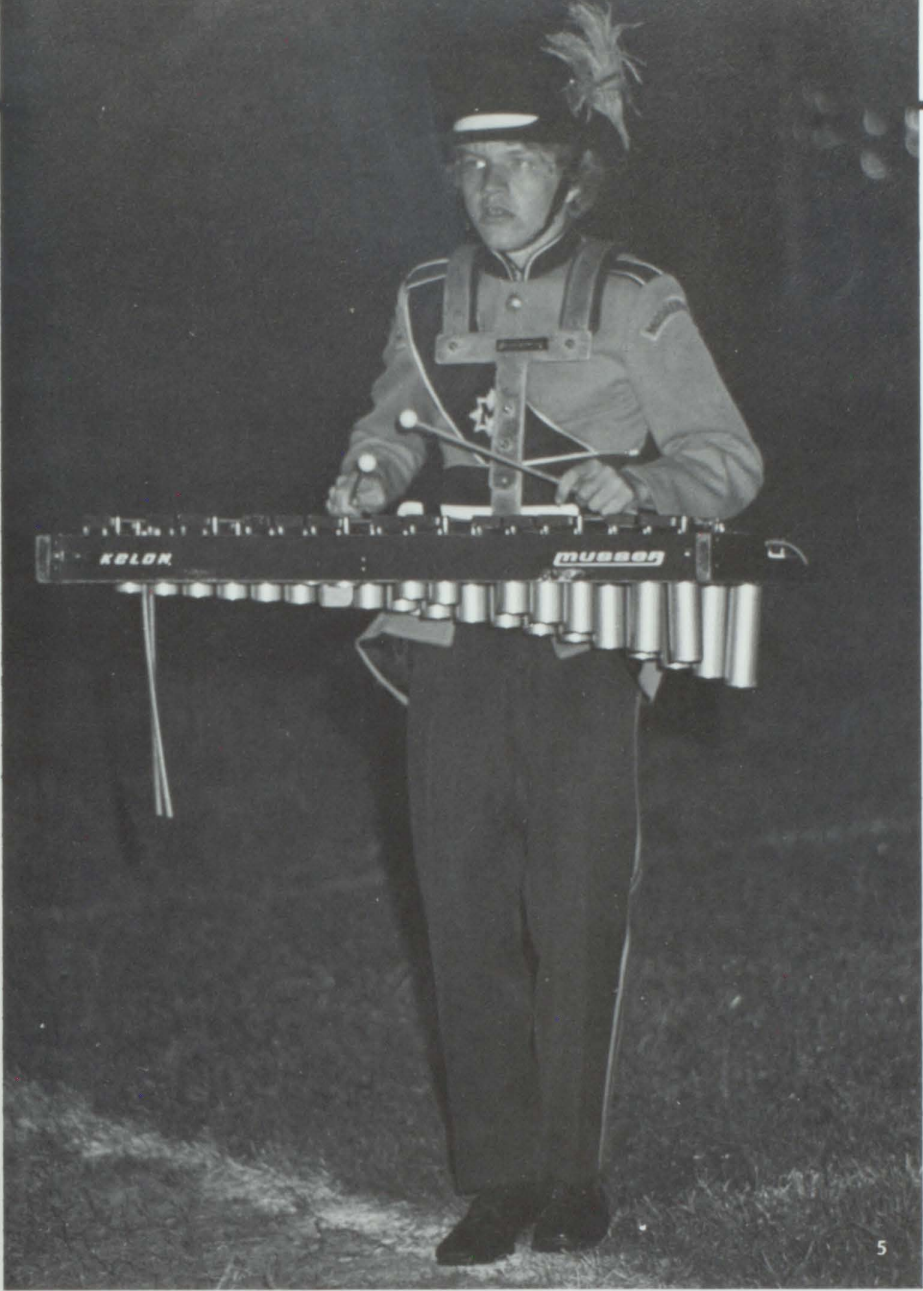
Cadet and Varsity choirs were also busy participating in Wagon Trails Revue, Christmas at the Circle, A Christmas concert, and a spring concert.

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Math, Science increase enrollment

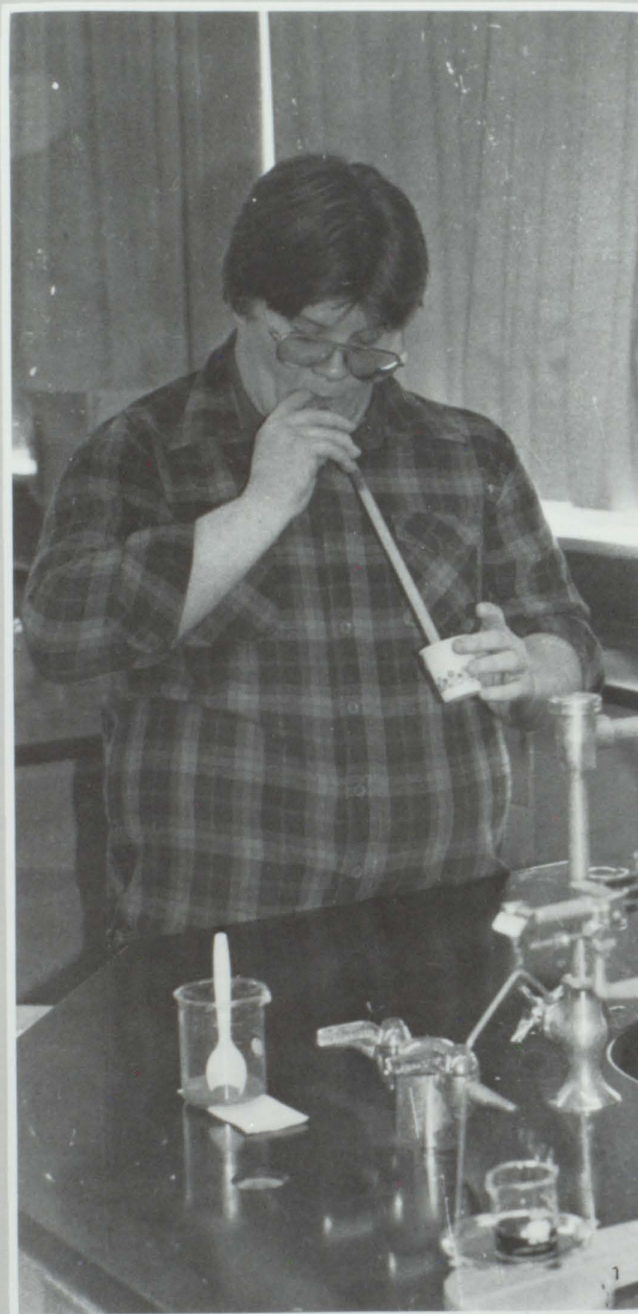

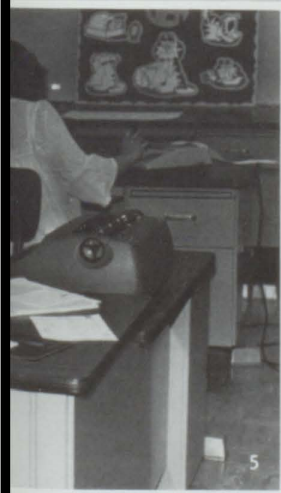

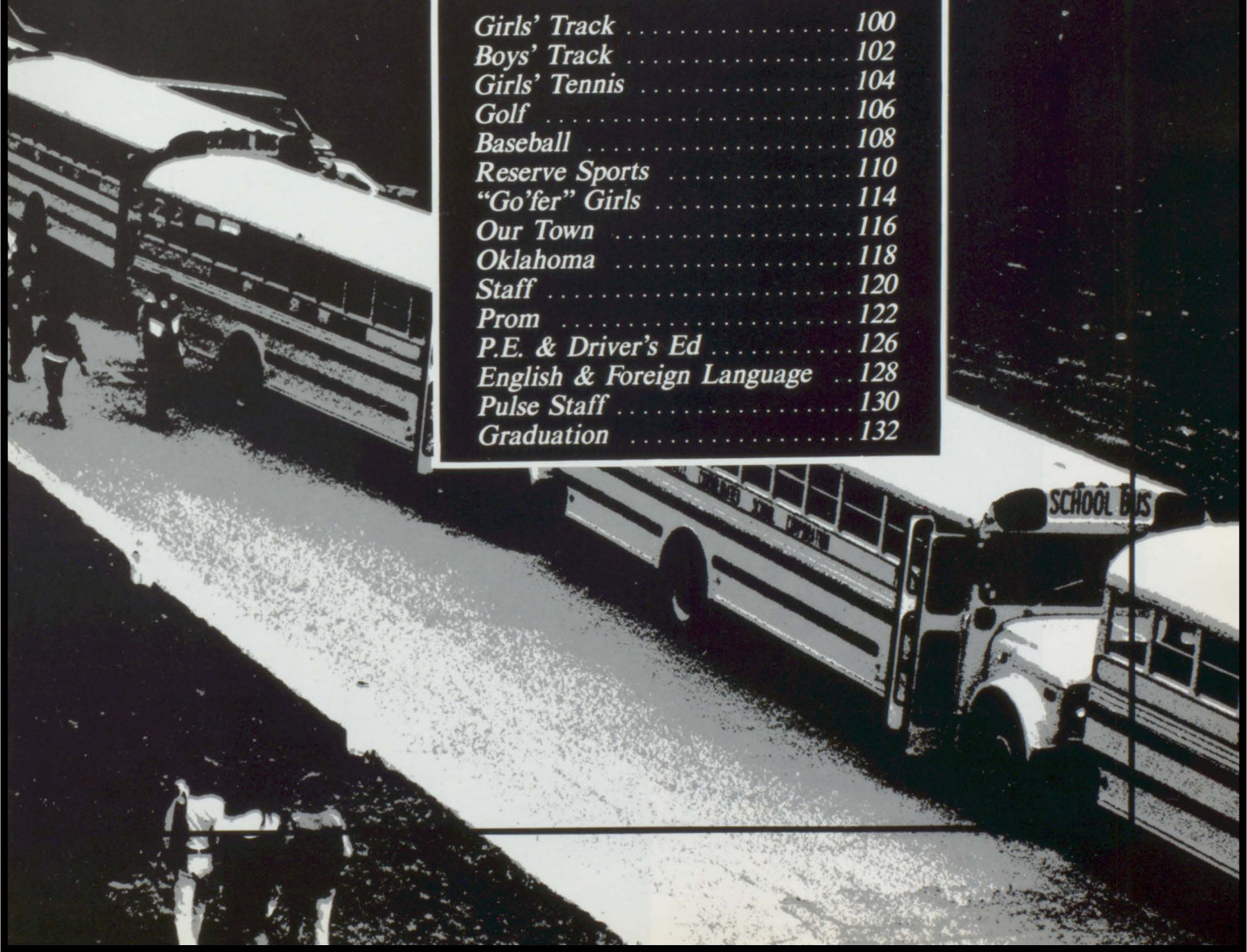

Other season accomplishments included a third place Mid-State Conference finish and a tenth place finish in sectionals, also the highest placings ever for an MHS girls' track team.

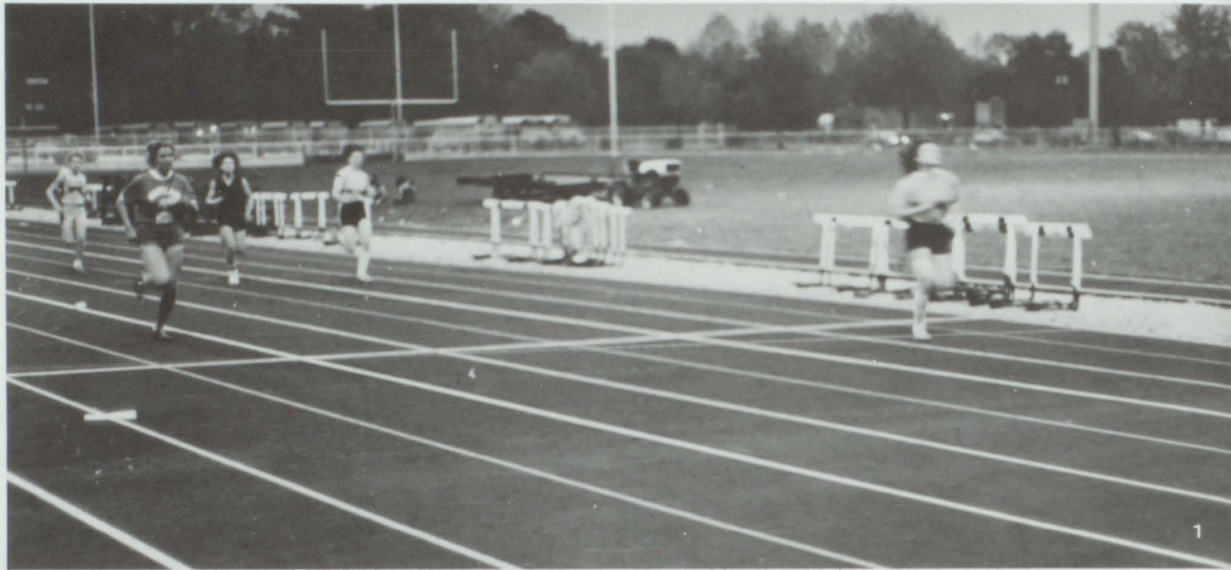

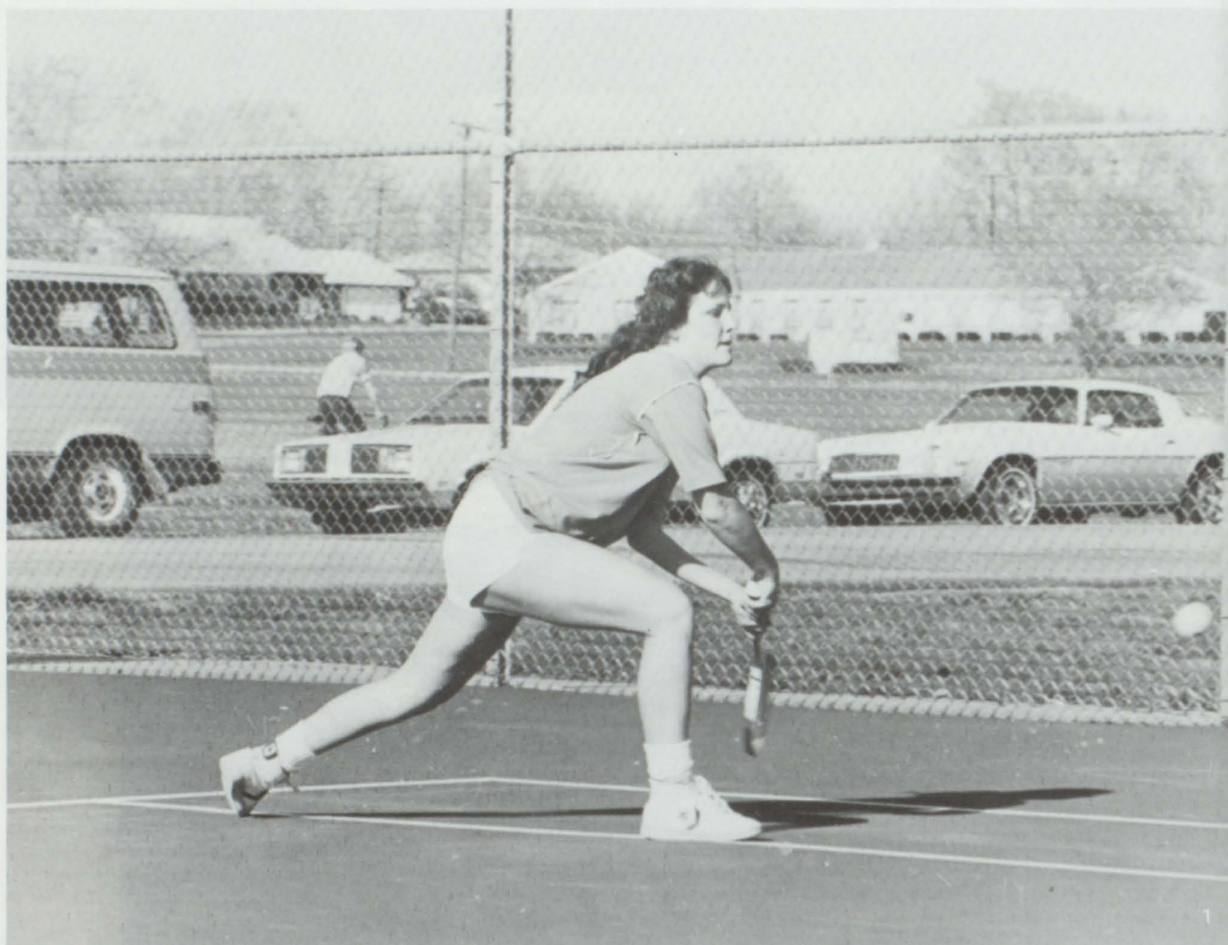
Despite the record of three wins and eight losses, Junior Andrea Davis and

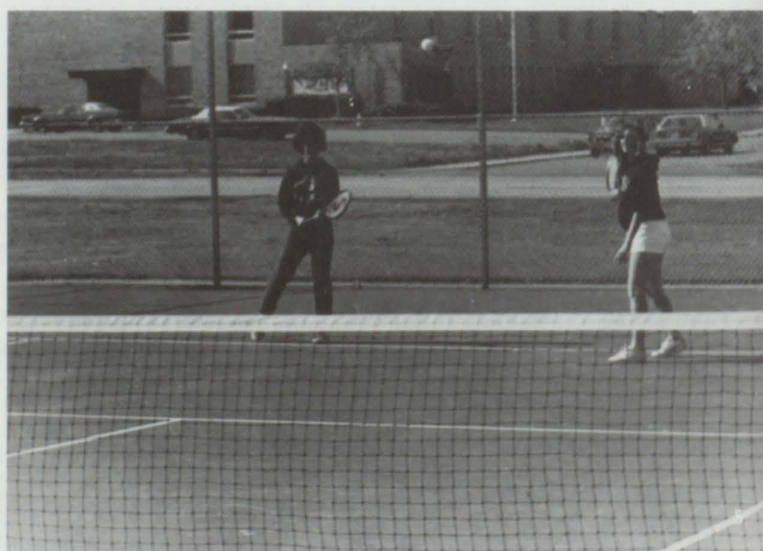
"Everyone was out there to have fun and be competitive," said Junior Kathy Fields, who played number three singles.

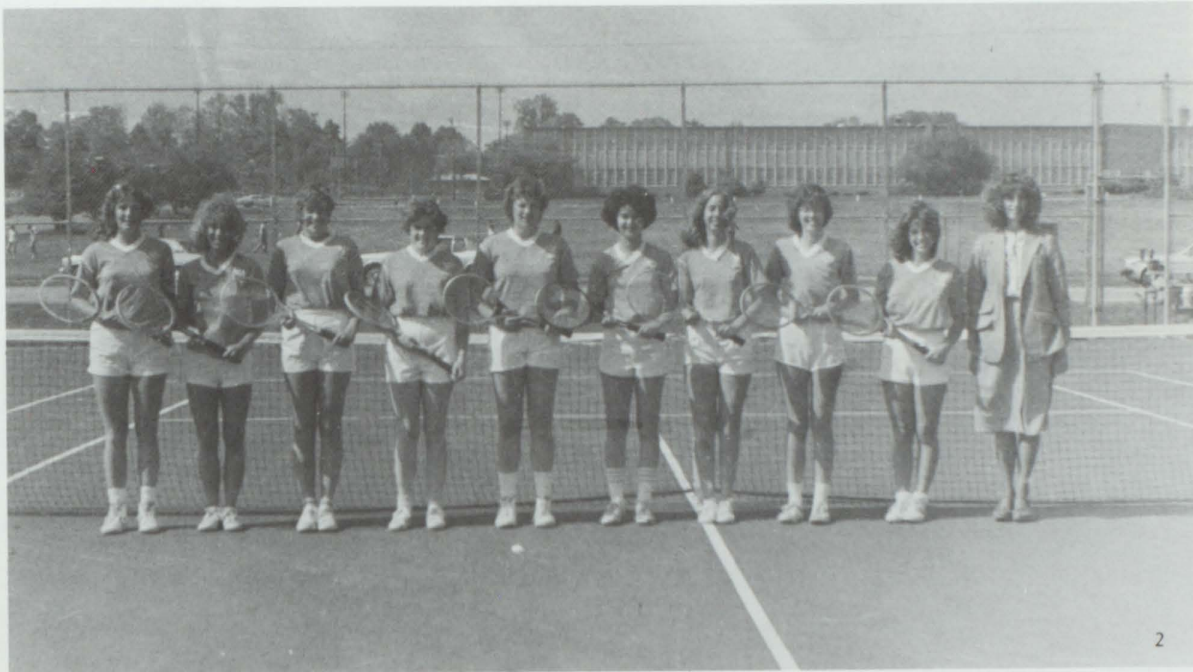

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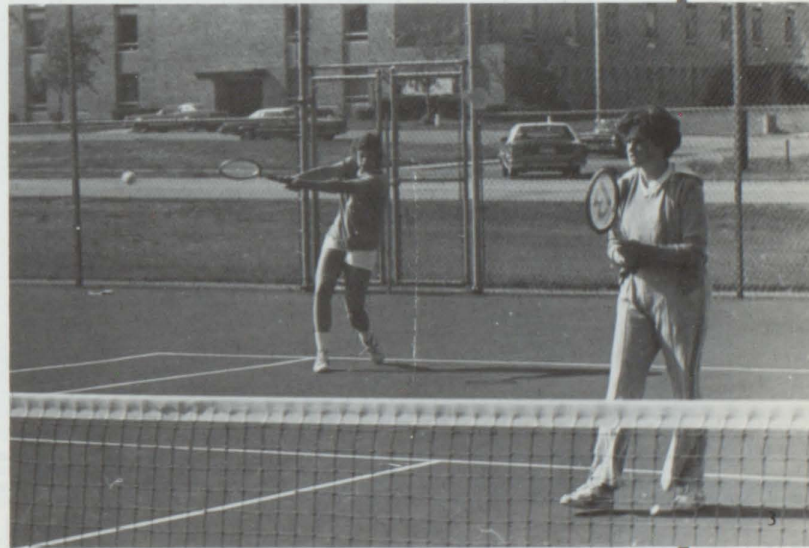

Hochstetler, a Sophomore, led the team

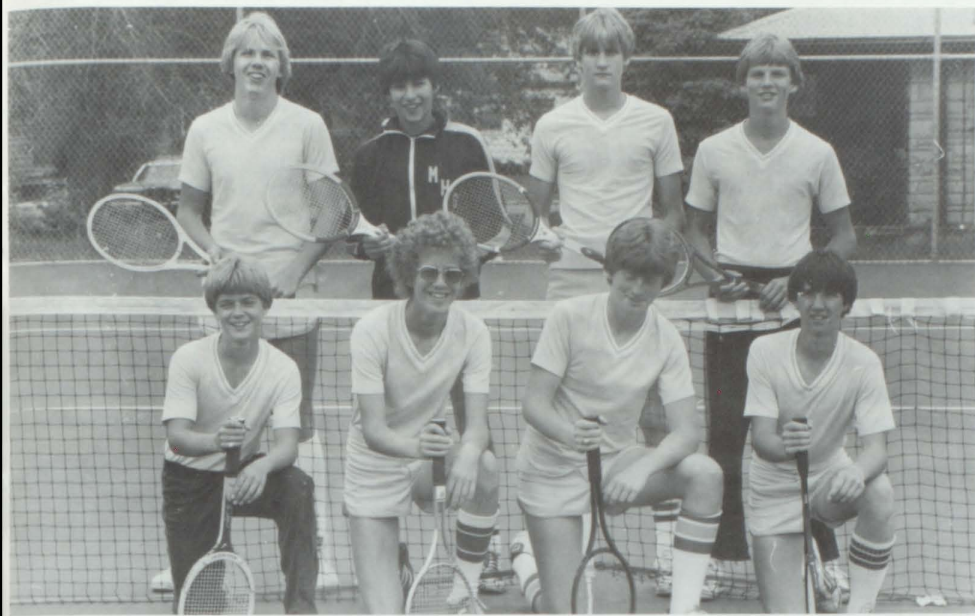

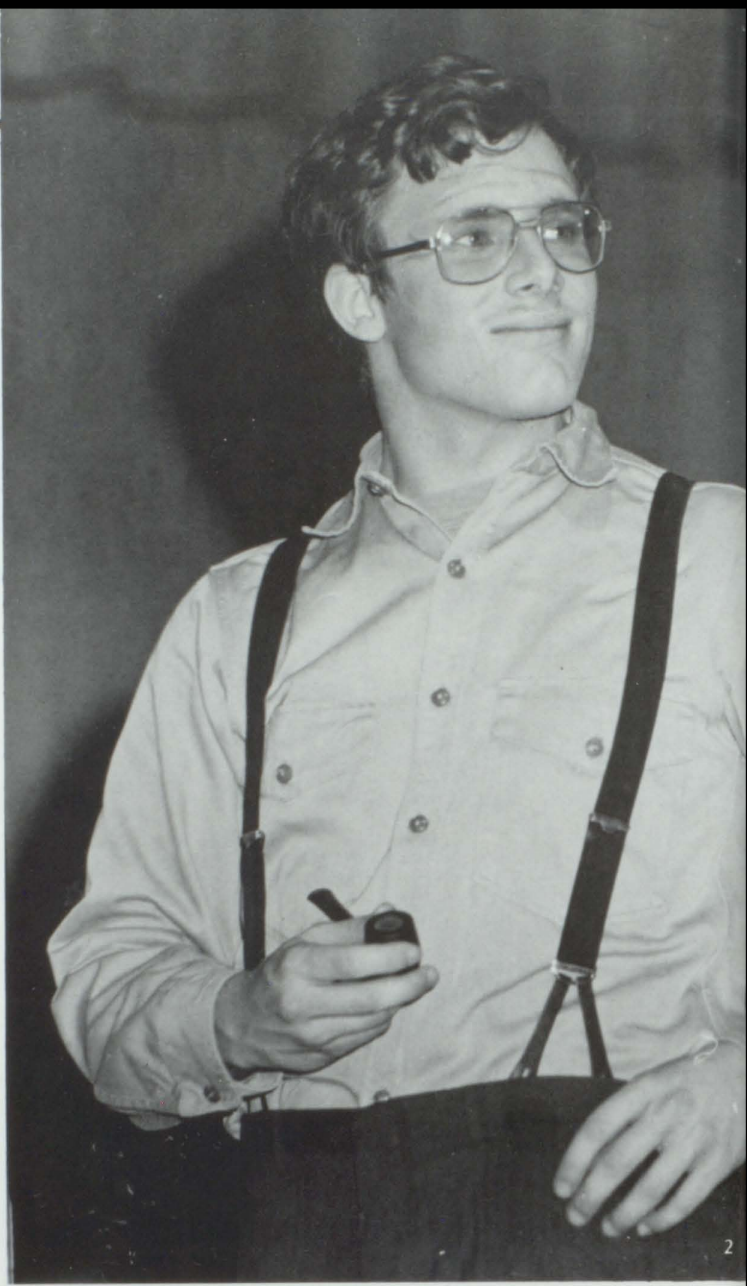
Much like the trackettes and matmaids the batgirls were very important to the baseball team.

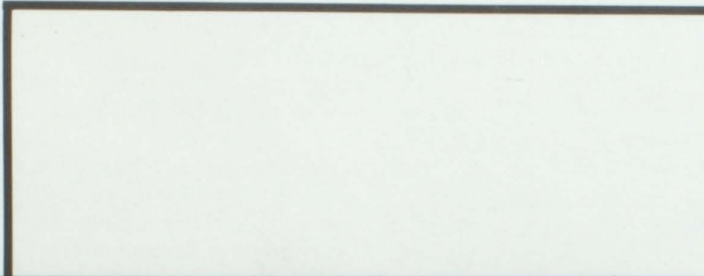
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Drama

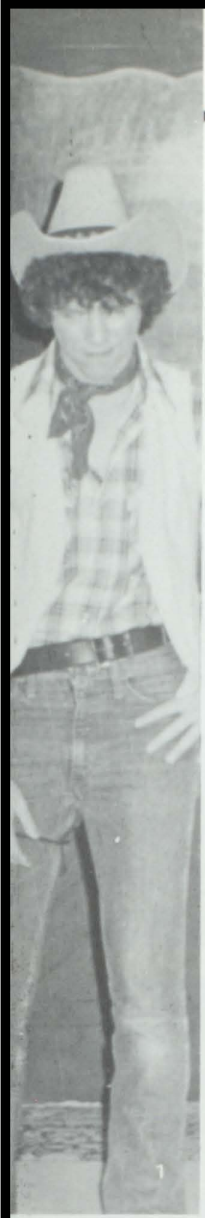
Summing up the musical, Mike Krueger said, “The memories of the musical will be something I’ll be able to take with me after I graduate.”

Classes provide break from daily routine

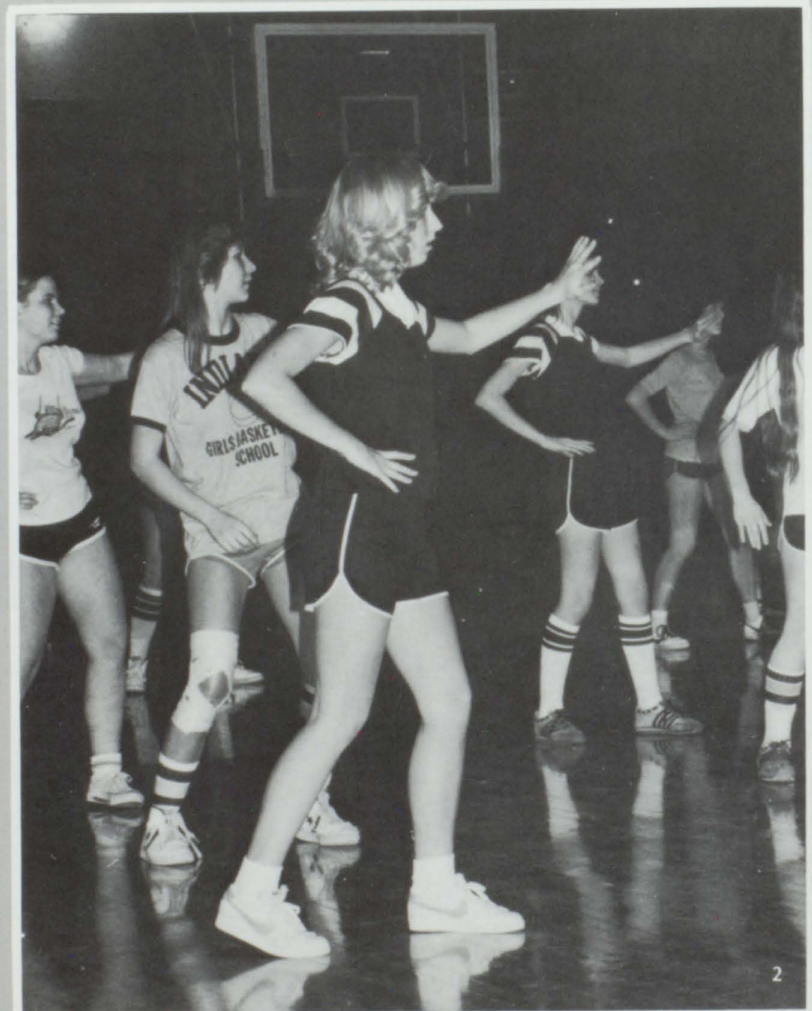
"A period of time to use oneself physically, mentally, and socially," is the importance of physical education class according to P.E. teacher Mr. Joe Stanley. "Students have to get along together, adjust to groups, and accept the discipline of the instructor," he said.

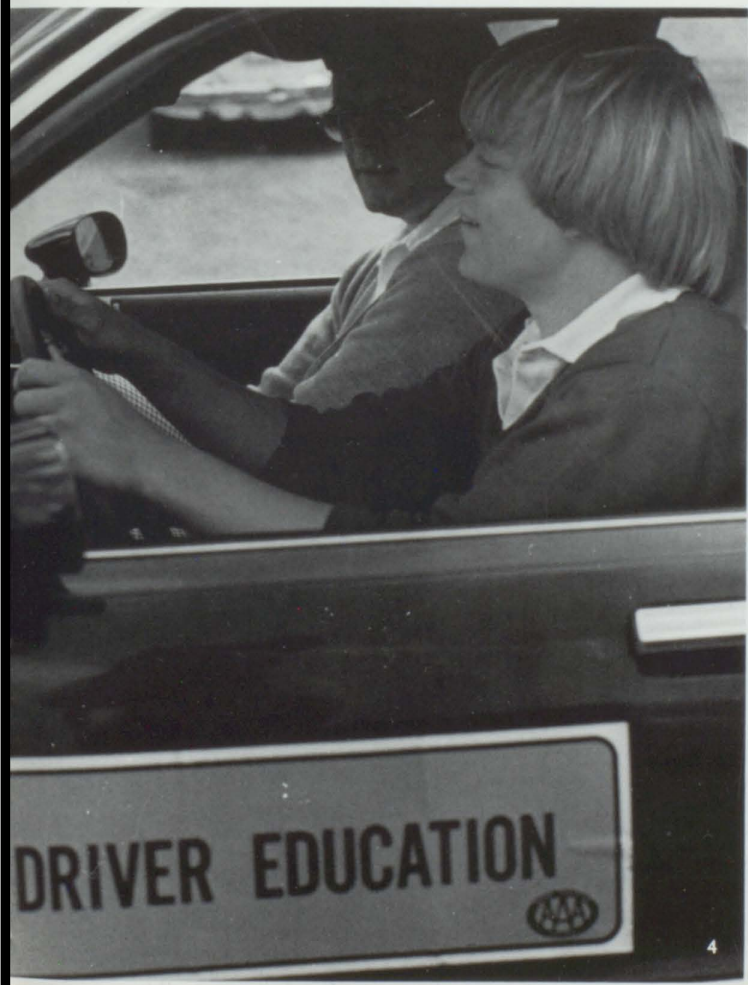
Physical education was a required course, but many students enjoyed it as a break from the daily routine of books, pencils, and paper. Some of the activities for the boys included volleyball, bowling and dodge ball. The girls participated in modern dance, gymnastics, and volleyball. During one six weeks of the semester course, the boys and girls participated in co-ed activities like softball and tennis.

One problem created by physical education was grading. In a gym class, a teacher had students with a wide variety of athletic skill levels. As Mr. Stanley put it, "To evaluate grades, adjustments must be made. A student should be graded on how hard he or she tries, not on his or her athletic skill level."

Another one semester course offered by Mooresville High School was driver education. The guidance office was stormed with requests to enroll in this course. Students were taught driving skills in rural, as well as urban conditions. Teachers tried to test the drivers in their skills in adverse driving conditions such as rain or snow. In addition to learning driving skills, students had classwork in which they learned Indiana driving laws to become safe, alert drivers. A former driver education student, Vince Hodshire, used his driving skills to achieve a third place in the American Veterans' Driver Education State Contest.

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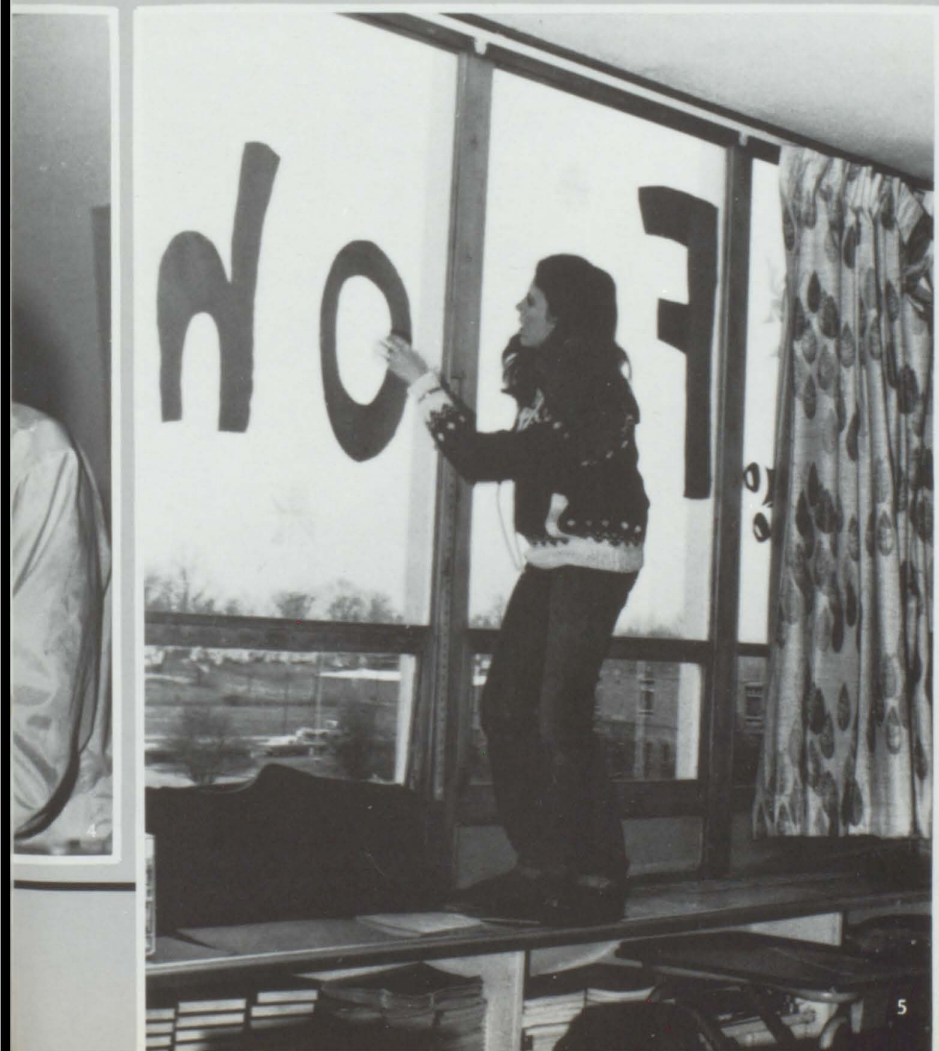
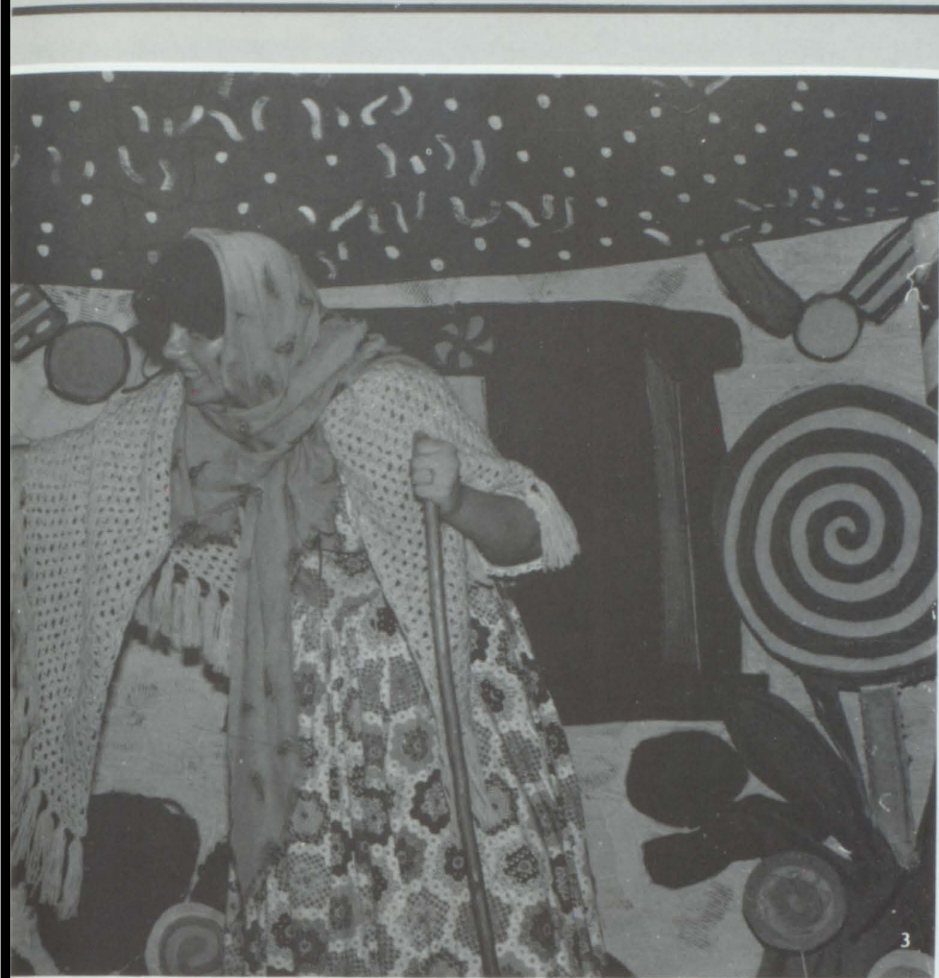

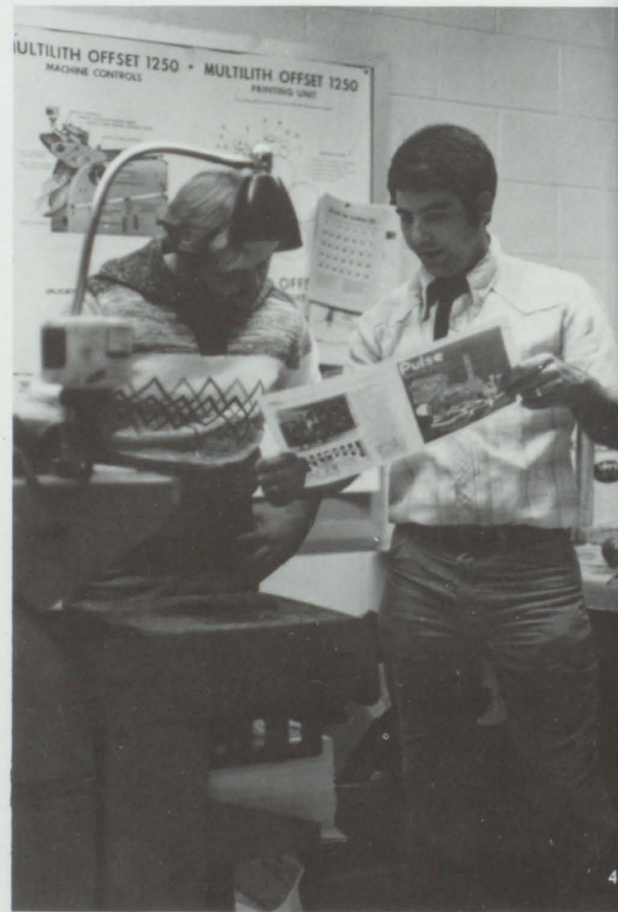

Carin described changes in the 1980-81 year. “It has been different. I remember last year having to type and retype, so we could set our copy. It has been easier this year with the use of the Mooresville TIMES’ computers. We have been able to put out a twelve page paper (last year’s was eight) in the same amount of time. By doing everything ourselves we’ve learned more about the actual processes than most other schools have a chance to learn. I feel very lucky to be a part of this staff. We are one of the few schools that do all their own work, and I feel we can be proud of what we do.”

There was a variety of special accomplishments for the staff to feel good about.

Co-editor Carin Neitzel accumulated three prestigious awards during the year including one at Indiana University’s Summer Journalism Institute for the best editorial written in the 80-member editors’ labs, a third place in the feature category at the Wabash Valley Press Conference for an in-depth feature about school discipline, and a third place at Indiana University’s Media Merit-thon in the feature writing contest.

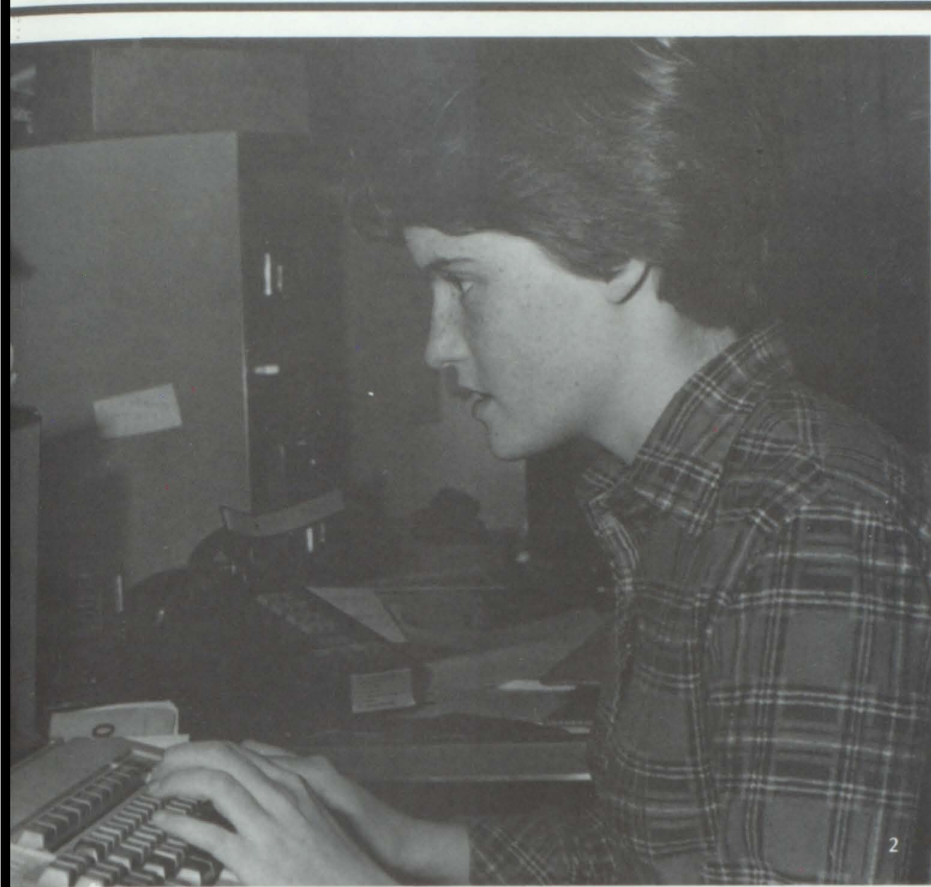
Tracy Sechman placed second at the Media Merit-thon in the double truck feature newspaper layout category.

Certainly, the night was one of both sadness and jubilation. There was a mixture of tears and cheers as the Senior realized they would be together as a class for the last time.

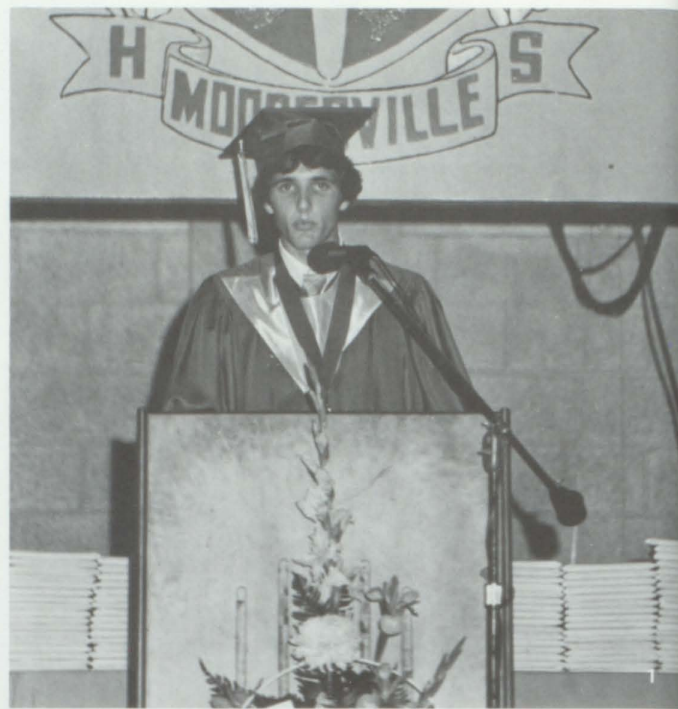
