HR. HDDY Stated that, because of the public relations angle, increased pressure from the Congress, and the possibility that Secretary Marshall's position in Moscov may have to be modified, Mr.eson felt that an interim report should be prepared by the <u>ad hoc</u> Committee in about two weeks. He further stated that there appeared to be two basic questions to be received before approaching this subject:

(1) Countries and areas to be covered (2) establishment of ground rules and the establishment of working parties to prepare the initial studies.

GENERAL LINCOLN stated that he had talked with the Army Nember, SWHGG, who felt that the directive in SWH-5231 was too marrow in scope and that the problem should be considered from both a short and long term point of view. He suggested deletion of the words "within the next few months" in paragraph 2a of Enclosure "A" of SWH-5231.

COLONEL REDY stated that he felt that the directive should not be altered but should be interpreted to mean that an interim report should be submitted on those countries which require U.S. assistance in the next few months to be followed by a final overall report. He further stated that there was a question in his mind as whether the report should cover assistance to be recommended to Congress for the present fiscal year or from long-range point of view. He also stated that there was some question whether the report should include studies and recommendations with respect to occupied areas and dependent areas.

ADMIRAL WOOLDRIDGE stated that an initial determination should be made of our commitments and available resources, particularly our food supply.

GREERAL LINCOLN stated that he believed that the problem relating to Greece and Turkey in the last sentence of paragraph 1 of Enclosure "A" should be referred to the SENCC Subcommittee for the Near and Middle Hast for preparation of the study invisiged therein.

GENERAL LINCOLN suggested that the following countries be considered in the study: All of Burope, Turkey, Korea, Japan, China, Philippines, Iran and Palestine. MR. MDDY stated that he believed that the State Repartment would be opposed to including Rastern Suropean countries, Scandinavian countries and Switzerland.

After considerable discussion as to whether or not to establish working parties directly under the <u>ad hos</u> Committee or whether to call upon the SWHCC Subcommittees for the necessary studies, the <u>ad hos</u> Committee agreed:

- A. That each member would obtain the views of their respective departments as to what countries would be considered as requiring immediate assistance and present them at a meeting to be held at 10: a.m. on 19 March 1947.
- b. That these countries would be discussed at the next meeting with a view to setting a priority list after which a directive would be drafted directing the working parties to prepare comprehensive studies for these areas.
- 2. That General Lincoln would prepare a draft of the objectives of the study for submittal to the md hoc Committee at its next meeting.
- d. That the directive to the ad hog Committee should not be altered except with the omission of the second sentence in paragraph 1, but should be interpreted by the ad hog Committee in light of the above and future discussions.
- 2. That tri-departmental working groups would have to be established to obtain the studies on food, finances, arms and military assistance as well as the geographic studies. The first two under a State Department steering Nember and the last two under a War Department steering member.
- 4. That the SINGS Subcommittee for the Near Hast be requested to undertake the studios with respect to Greece and Turkey as outlined in the second sentence in paragraph 1 of the Committee's directive.
