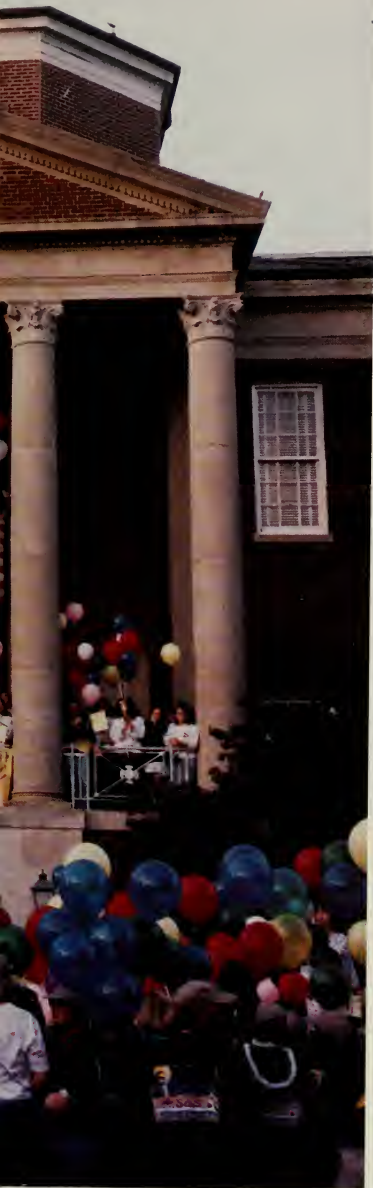

A Year Filled With Excitement



In order to unite students and faculty on campus during this busy week, convocations are held throughout the year to provide valuable information on a variety of topics for the Meredith Community. Professor of English, Eloise Grathwohl took charge of the 1994-1995 schedule of events and generated an abundance of interest and excitement by sending out letters about upcoming topics and a calendar of convocations.

August 29, 1995, marked the opening convocation held in Jones Auditorium which, was a time for the audience to spend "An Hour With the Faculty." The main purpose of the first convocation was to outline what obstacles the new year might bring and how to tackle each situation in a fast and positive way. The second convocation focused particularly on Meredith students as Susan Bordo, Professor of Philosophy at the University of Kentucky, spoke on her topic, "Minding the Body: Interpreting the Cult of Slenderness." Bordo examined the attitudes toward fat, eating and hunger in today's society, and the pressures on women to be thin. She also addressed eating disorders. The third convocation for the fall semester featured Professor James Johnson who spoke on stock and bond markets and saving plans.

The spring semester was filled with many interesting convocations including the Founder's Day Convocation presented by Edan Williams whose speech, "Honor/Great Riches and Precious Ointment," inspired everyone. Next the one women show presented by Miss Barbara Hird, celebrated the life of Queen Elizabeth I. The Association of Black Awareness sponsored Paula Larke who titled her convocation, "Palaver: In March, Quinn Howkesworth gave a dramatic production entitled, "Mistress of the Moors-Life of Charlotte Bronte," and finally the highlight of the year came when Dr. Arun Gandhi grandson of Mohandas Gandhi and Director of the M.K. Institute for the study of nonviolence, addressed the Meredith community. Gandhi spoke on the topic "Nonviolence or Nonexistence: Options for the 21st Century." Throughout his address, Gandhi quoted the wisdom of his grandfather, and also what he considered to be "The Sins," which were, "science without humanity, worship without sacrifice, politics without principles, commerce without morality, wealth without work and pleasure without confidence." Dr. Arun Gandhi made quite an impact on the audience and after the convocation, he answered questions for those who were interested in learning more about his life.

With the help of Dr. Grathwohl and an exciting schedule of events, convocation proved to be a great success!

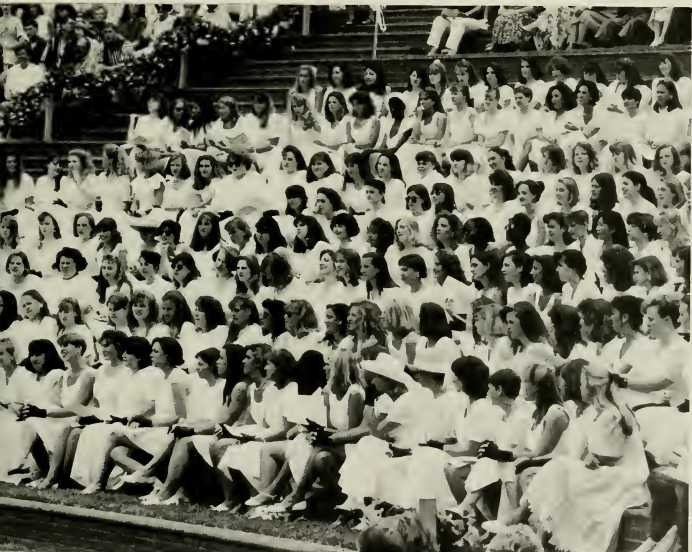

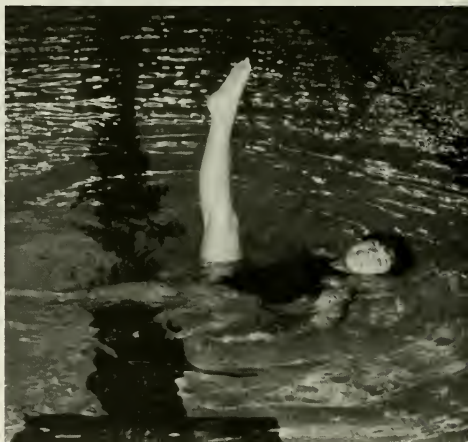

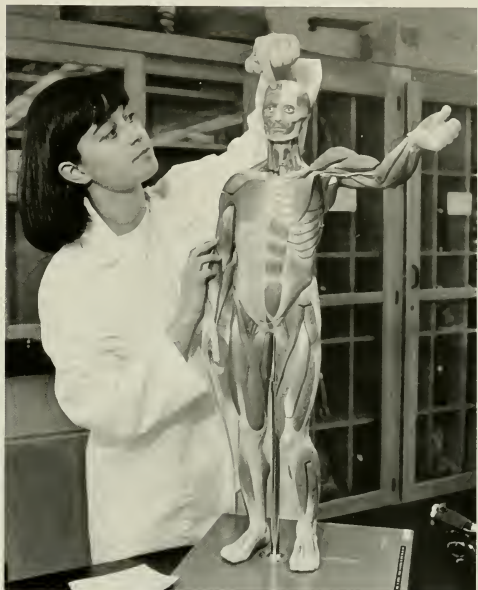

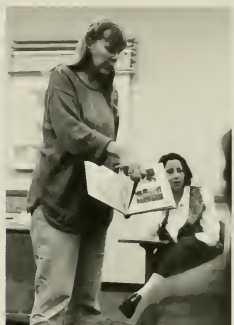

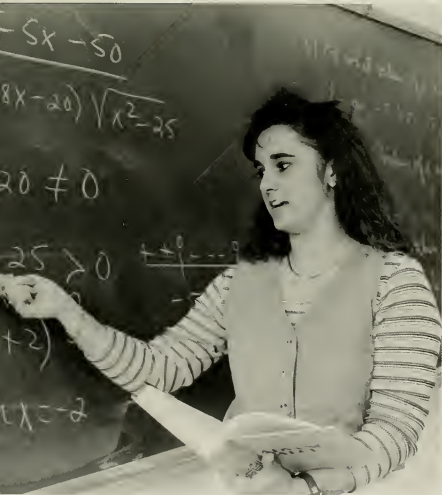

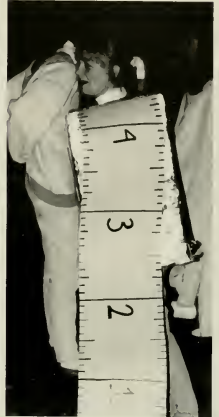

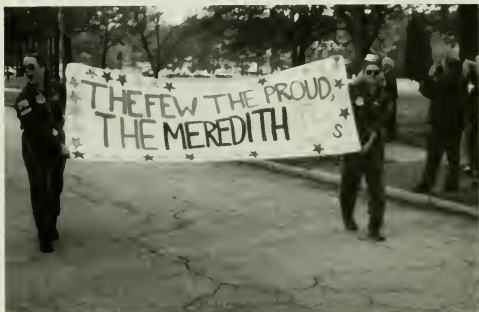

Because the only reason there is for being alive is to make the most of what you have-- your time, your ideas, your love. That's all you need-- you can make a difference.

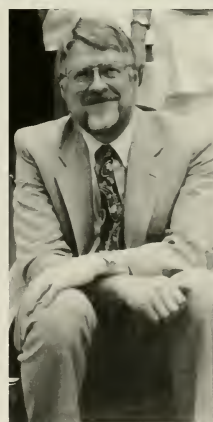
I know you will all go far in life.
