James L. Fox, director of Food Service, has been appointed Director of Residence Halls and Food Service, Vice President for Student Affairs Dr. Fred Smith announced this week.

Fox, who joined RIT in December, 1971, will be the first person at the Institute to hold both positions.

"Combining these two positions will enable us to accomplish some efficiencies of administration that will result in more effective service to students," Dr. Smith said.

"There is possibly some duplication of function which can be eliminated," Dr. Smith said.

"Students will find him straightforward and interested in their concerns, and he has a fundamental interest in the quality of student life."

Fox, 35, holds a degree in Hotel and Restaurant Management from Florida State University. He also trained at American University and is a former supervisor for Cleaves Food Service, Silver Springs, Md.;

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Eight Students In US Deaf Olympics

Eight RIT students, led by the record breaking effort of sophomore swimmer Gene Rusiecki have earned berths on the United States Deaf Olympic track and swimming teams.

Rusiecki shattered the 2:42.3 deaf standard with a 2:41.8 effort in the 200-meter backstroke during the trials, held

at the North Carolina School for the Deaf, Morgantown, N.C. recently. The Niagara Falls native was third in the 100-meter backstroke.

"That's pretty good for somebody that has only been swimming college one year," notes RIT swimming mentor John Buckholtz.

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Financial Aid Up 300% For '72-73

More than 600 RIT students will now receive financial aid, thanks to a 300 percent increase in money recently made available for the 1972-73 school year.

A 500 percent increase in federal funding, an additional \$69,400 in financial aid offered by RIT, and several scholarships from private sources have made more than \$1,379,800 available to RIT students.

"We are pleased with the increase in federal money," notes Douglas Hoover, director of financial aid at RIT.

Specifically, \$67,271 will be awarded through the Economic Opportunity Grant program; \$165,763 will be administered through College Work-Study Programs, and \$565,633 will be available through the National Defense Student Loans system.

RIT has provided \$69,400 for aid to incoming students.

New grants received for the coming year are from the Association of Publication Production Managers and Young Men's Printing Executives Club of Metropolitan New York.

The Gannett Newspaper Foundation will provide full tuition scholarships for five students, bringing to 20 the total number of students aided by the organization.

The Financial Aid office at RIT handles 144 scholarship accounts, administers the federal money, distributes money awarded through the New York State Regents Scholarship and Scholarship Incentive programs, certifies enrollment for all state guaranteed loans, and administers the Higher Education Opportunity Program.

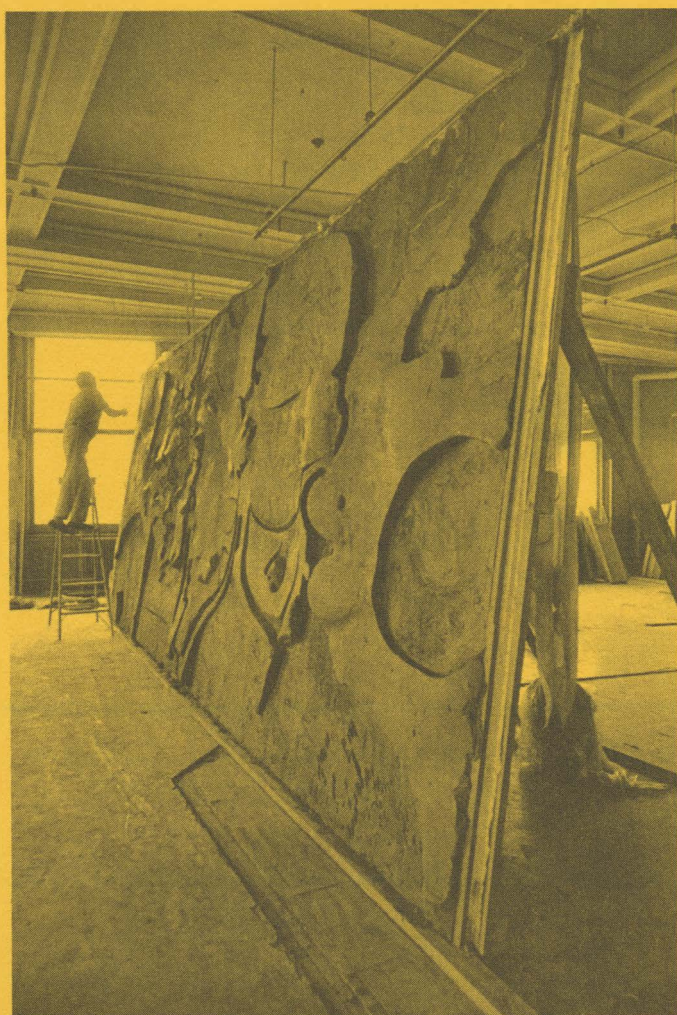
Francis Named Chairman

Dr. Ronald Francis, 33 Ivy Cottage Lane, Henrietta (N.Y.), has been appointed chairman of the Photographic Science and Instrumentation Division of RIT's School of Photographic Arts and Sciences.

The division he will head offers bachelor and master degrees in photographic science and instrumentation. Through advanced methods of photography, the program applies an engineering educational approach to solving scientific and engineering problems. The program also involves scientific and engineering research on various photographic processes and instrumentation.

"I really don't know all about making murals," smiles Frans Wildenhain. But there he is, on the otherwise empty seventh floor of RIT's Metropolitan Center, shaping the finishing touches into 6,000 pounds of clay that is to be "Allegory of a Landscape," a 25' by 10' clay mural. Within months, the mural will be cut into 250 pieces which will be fired, then transported and reassembled on the curved wall outside Ingle Auditorium.

Wildenhain, who was with RIT School of Fine and Applied Arts 20 years before he retired in 1970, has done murals in many other buildings including the National Library of Medicine in Bethesda, Md., and the Strassenburgh Pharmaceutical building on Jefferson Road.

Four of track coach Peter Todd's charges earned berths on the squad:

Freshman Dean Dunlavey won the 400-

meter intermediate hurdles, 110-meter high hurdles and placed third in the triple jump.

Albert Dial, a junior, placed second in the 400-meter intermediate hurdles.

Bob Green, a sophomore art and design major, pole vaulted 12-6, to earn a berth.

Bob Backofen, the 1971 RIT cross country captain, was second in the 10,000-meters and has a shot at the 5000-meters race.

The eight who have earned berths must now obtain financing for the trip to Melmo, Sweden, when the World Games for the Deaf will be held July, 1973.

All are enrolled at RIT through the National Technical Institute for the Deaf.
