New York, July 24.—Sixty-four of the ninety released Boer prisoners who ar-rived from Bermuda on July 14th have-sailed for Capetown and Mossel Bay, 1 South Africa. Cairo, Egypt, July 25.—Thê total num-ber of cases of cholera at Cairo and at Moucha, near Assioot, since July 13th is 307, of which 277 proved fatal.

Philippi, W. Va., July 24.-Two negroes, whose names are unknown, were lynched at Womelsdorf, near here, last night, by an angry mob numbering several hundred. 'The first victim was shot and killed in the station house; the second was taken to the park, where he was hanged and then riddled with bullets and cut to pieces. Moth whites and negroes are enraged and in arms. The trouble grew out of yesterday's murder of Chief of Police Wilmouth, of Elkins. Several other arrests have been made and lynching seemed imminent. The dead blacks were caught near Bei-fingtor and were locked up there, off-icers fearing lynching if they were taken to Elkins. Negroes are leaving on every train. The lynched men were hoeribly mutil.



A PERILOUS VOYAGE. The United States revenue cutter Theils, Capt. Michael Heaty, reached Nome on the 13th, after her 30-day cruise among the ice floes of Behring Straits and the Arctic ocean in search of the imperilled steamers Portland and Jeanie. The Theiis undertook this hazurdon's voyage, leaving Nome June 15th, following the heavy ice-line along the western coast until June 25th, when Cape Prince of Wales was reached. This polar current carried them north by northeast without finding anything but a vast, unbroken expanse of grind-ing ice until Point Hope was sighted. At this time sufficient open water was found to change the course of the vessel to the westward and by a zig zag course, made with the hopes of being able to find the Arctic prisoners, the cutter reached Cape Serge, Siberia, on June 30th. Receiving no information at this point, the brave officers and erew again put to sea and recrossed the Strails to Point Hope. Leaving the Zhraiks of sea, they sighted and spoke a whaler and cladly received the news of the safety of the ships and their return to Nome. Tahiti.

LIVELY SALT WAR,

LIVELY SALT WAR. A dispatch from San Francisco states that ocean freight ratics between Europe and Portland are responsible for the liveliest sait war that has ever been witnessed on the Pacific coast. One ship, the Sierra Estrella, is discharging a cargo of sait at Portland docks, and four more are now en route for Portland from Europe with sait cargoes for Port-land firms. The amount of salt includ-ed in this fleet of vessels is approxi-mately 9,000 tons. For several years the salt business of the Pederal Salt Company, known as the "salt trust," and the price reached \$28 per ton. About the time the Sierra Es-trella was due, last month, the Federal Salt Company announced a reduction of \$3 per ton in the price of salt. Today the Federal of \$6 per ton would be made to-morrow, making a reduction of \$14
