 - SVIDETEL'STVO O ROZEDENII LA No. 415734 was issued to Ca Subject on 17 December 1946 according to the Item # 8 entry. A comparative Birth Certificate shows the letter prefix and serial number to be plausible for issuance in Riga in December 1946.
- 20 Validity:

Subject document issued in 1953 and the previous PASPORT issued in 1948 listed under Itom # 8 are both valid for 5 years. A five-year FASFORT would normally be issued during these years to a Soviet citizen born in 1919;

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The issuance of a five-year PASPURT to a Latvian citizen is not unusual in 1948, particularly in a city the size of Riga.

c. The issuance of a Birth Certificate in 1946 to a Letvian citizen born in 1919 is not unusual. Many Baltic sources report the issuance of Russian-Latvian type SVIDETEL'STVO O ROZHDENII on the basis of old Latvian, Estonian, and Lithuanian METRIKI or church records, for the purpose of establishing identity following the war. Subject may have obtained this document to serve as a basis of issue of temporary identity focumentation preceding the issue of his 1948 FASPORT.

6. Language indicator:

- a. "78" is correct for the latvian language.
- b. No examplers of 1952 printings of the Latvian PASFORT are evailable for comparison regarding the placement of these numbers. Examplers of the 1949 edition do not show any language indicators. Examplers of the 1941 edition issued after the war reveal variations. Some do not have any indicators while others show the indicator on the first page of the second language. Because of these variations found in previous editions, the indicator pattern on Subject document cannot be evaluated.

7. Militis Validating Cachet:

Lenguages, emblem, and general design of subject cachet are similar to other Latvian MBB exemplars in our files. The validating office is indicated on the cachet as the "3rd <u>Otdelenive Militsiin</u>". This agrees with the issuing authority cited in Item # 7. No exemplars of MB type validating cachets issued by this office in Riga are available for exact text or format comparison.

8. Propision:

a. No exemplars of <u>propises</u> cachets issued by the 3rd O.M. in Rigs for 1953 are available. An exemplar from this office issued in 1948 has a different text arrangement and is more square than subject cachet. <u>Propises</u> cachets issued prior to 1952 in Liepzys are also squarer and have

text errangements similar to the 1948 enemplar. The more oblong shape and text layout similar to that found in the <u>propisan</u> eachet in subject document may be found on a <u>propisan</u> vramence eachet issued by the lat 0.M. in Riga in July 1953, indicating a possible change to this shape <u>propishs</u> eachet for the city.

9. Frinting data:

Document is a 1.952 edition. No comparative exemplara of this edition are available for comment.

10. Technical inspection:

Technical inspection of the photographs of subject document revealed no significant irregularities.

1. No comparative examplars of these documents are available for comment.

2. Technical inspection of the photographs of these documents revealed no evidence of unusual characteristics indicating that they are other than authentic documents.

COMMENTS:

1. There is no evidence to indicate that the documents of APSITIS are other than authentic.

2. Comparison of information taken from the documents with available biographic data presented no significant conflicts with the exception of the following:

a. The documents indicate that APSITIS is a Latvian citizen in good standing with the authorities. This is indicated by the issue of the Boat Registration (SUDOVOY BILET) permitting Subject to operate a motor boat on the Gulf of Riga. It may be assumed that these permits are given only to citizens considered reliable due to the wide access to the open sea that exists at the mouth of the gulf.

b. The issuance of a privilege document of this type to a man of APSITIS's stated background must be considered unusual. His father was a Minister of Justice in the former Latvian government, as purged by the Soviets.

APSITIS fought against the Soviets as a member of the Latvian Legion during the war and was imprisoned in the Far East for this crime.

c. It is known that the Russian Intelligence Service recruits some of their agents from former anti-Soviet partizens, prisoners of war, and other persons in trouble with the regime. The RIS uses threats of imprisonment for those persons not in prison at the time of recruitment, and offers of release for those persons recruited during their confinement as inducements to service. APSITIS was released in 1946 for a crime which resulted in 10 year sentences for many of those Latvians convicted.

We have no evidence from other sources indicating that travel in the forbidden some areas of the Baltics and the Ukraine is possible without a PROFUSK Subject implies that this travel is possible, although illogal. Specific locations where this type of illegal travel is easily performed would be of interest to AURIOT if mentioned.

Subject's answers regarding access to the beaches in the vicinity of Riga are probably correct. Other Latvian sources report that the shores of the Gulf of Rige are not patrolled or considered as a <u>samethaxa sona</u>. Security is provided by sea patrols at the mouth of the gulf.

2. Release of troops from service:

We have no reports of the retention of troops on active duty that are "due" for release this year.

- 3. In his debriefing Subject stated that he was released from prison "sometime in 1947". Item # 8 of his PASPORT reveals that he was issued SVIDETEL'STVO O ROMHDENII LANO. 15724 on 17 December 1946. This appears to be the only inconsistency between the admitted biography and information taken from the photographs of his documents.
- 4. Regarding your recommendations contained in paragraph $5, \Box \neg$ has informed up that Subject has been dispatched and that we will be informed when and if communications are established. He has no document information prepared by Subject in answer to your requirements described in paragraph 6.

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TILBURY's Debriefing of TILBURY/1

REFSIC 2 473

- 1. The enclosed debriefings (Enclosures A and B) of TILENRY/1 (Iden A of C _ 446) were conducted by TILBURY at the request of KUBARK and mesunably without the knowledge of the fildARS. A cony of the questions prepared by the Station and submitted to TILEURI is transmitted as enclosure C.
- 2. The questions were originally designed for use as a preliminary debriefing that could be used as a basis for a more dotailed interrogation either through TILEVEN or by a NUBARK interrogator, if access to TILEVEN/1 could be obtained. The change of plans reported in L -I 482 make it impossible to follow up the leads turned up in the enclosed debriefing, unless the operation aborts and TILBURY/1 returns to Sweden. To date we have received no indications from either TILBURY or the TIBBARS that the TIBBARS attempted to carry out a similar OE debriefing to establish the bona fides of TILBURY/1 and the organization.

Enclosure A represents FILBURY's first effort to fulfill the requirements of the questionnairs. It is not a debriefing in the strist sense, because TILBURY has interlarded his own comments on the organization. The answers contained in Enclosure & were accompanied by a note from TILBURY in which he explained that the clandostine erganization who sant TILBURIAL was based on the policy of score ey of identities and that he, TILBURY, had always respected this policy and had never asked for names. In addition, he reported that TLEURY/1 had been sworn to secrety not to reveal names of contacts. powever, after the reacipt of 2500 ropes support TILEMAY informed is that he had been able to persuade TILEMAY to provide the requested. citails, by explaining to him that if his task was to attompt to get support from the AIS vie TILBURY, he must provide TILBURY with ensugh fasts about the organization and the exfilitration to enable TILBURY

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to make a convincing case when he attempted to interast the AIS. THEURY states that the organization does not know that he clready is in contact with AIS. Although THEURY does not specifically any so it must be assumed that THEURY/I knows that some group other than the THEBARS is involved. This point will be clarified. According to THEURY, THEORY/I bought the argument and the answers in Enclosure B were the result. It is suspected that the 2500 roses also played their part.

- 4. The inconsistencies and peculiar statements in the debriefing increase tremeniously - simpet to the point of confirmation - the suspicion that that TIEBAE assets in LATVIA (centered around the w/t station VALDEMAR) are RIS controlled on some level. (This suspicion also exists in relation to the TIEBAE assets in Estonic.) The following are some of the facts and inconsistencies that seem to indicate a RGB operation:
 - a. TILSUNT/1 has been unable to hold a present job because then his past (membership in the Latvian Legion and presentably his father's anti-constant record) comes to light he must move to another job. A low financial status is also indicated by the facts that he is corrently unemployed. Despite his financial status he owns a Mercedes automobile. According to our knowledge of Soviet reality, private concreting of any automobile is not the rule, let alone a Mercedes.
 - b. TILETRI/I is a member of the NVD scontored Dynamo sports glub.
 - c. The primary aim of his exfilitration was to contact the ANS and obtain its support. In return the cludestine organization voluntarily offers support and shelter for AIS agents in Latvia, as well as the collection of intelligence.
 - d. Details of the exfiltration leave many usanswered questions. For example, if Ventspils is in a restricted some Headquarters can confirm this TILEURI/1 had no restricted area permits in his <u>manort</u>. Why was it necessary for him to meet a cutout in Ventspils instead of travelling direct to Hoja and contacting KLAVIAPA directly. The rubber boat was issued to him by his contact in Riga, instead of being provided by the fisherman. If the ilEGARS are able to recover the boat, we will attempt to obtain it for KURIOT examination.
 - e. The casual way in which he requested readminsion into the clandestine organization in 1947.

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- 5. The above are but a few of the questions raised by THLENAT/1's answers. Unfortunately, they will not be answered by him, barring his return to Sweden. However, there would appear to be enough information to enable Meadquarters to analyze this operation in light of known KGB operations of this type that have been doubled in other parts of the world. Therefore, Headquarters' support is requested in trying to determine the statue of this operation. Specifically the following support is requested.
 - a. <u>Complete name transs of all percondities mentioned by</u> TILBURY/1, including information from _____ and ____ ____ Flease note that we have promised TILBURY that personality information will be given strict courity protection.
 - b. Hars a comporative analysis of the information in the [debriefing in light of known RGS operations, including $\Box \rightarrow If$ further specific information is needed, it can perhaps be obtained from TILBURY.
 - a. Analyze the information in this debriefing in rolation to known Soviet reality.
 - d. Inform the C I Station of the factual basis for suspicions of VALDENAR that have already been moleced by Headquarters.
- 6. It is believed that the Hasdquarters support requested above is justified because the entire TIRBAR/TILBURY, C _ complex inside the Baltic States is currently producing very little as positive intelligence operation in relation to the case officer time involved. However, the operation cannot get off the present dead center without the support requested from Readquarters. The indications are that it is an AIS operation. However, the C = Station does not have sufficient information on proven DA sporations to take a qualified conclusion, If in the opinion of a qualified ICIMPROVE expert the operation is RIS, it should be run as an agreesive LCIMFREVE case. (The s/w link to TILMURY/L can be used as the initial opening.) In its present indeterminate state the aperation is too slady to use for KUALRE operational support or for positive intelligence. Of even more importance is the relationship to lisison. According to their own admission the filleans depend on their Bultic operations for early warning of bostile Seviet action. However, judging from what is known of thair hasdling of TILTURY/1, the TIEBARS have ande Little effort to establish the bons fides of TILDURY/1 or of the organization that he represents. Furthermore, they could not do a therough GE job without KUBARK experience and assistance. If the KUBARK analysis of

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the operation justifies the conclusion that the TIEBAR Latvien — ______ and TILBURY/1 should be run as double agents, ways of presenting this conclusion to TIEBARS (without hurting TILBURY) will be explored.

1. Organization which your friend represents:

A. Its name,

The organization has no name; when someone speaks of it the designation "FULKVEDIS" can be employed (FULKVEDIS in Latvian means Colonel).

All and a second se

B. Mamber of active members.

The number of active members is approximately 150.

C. Specific Locality (town names) in which the organisation is active.

RIGA, LIEPAJA, VENTSPILS, LIMBAZI, SIGULDA and out in the country in the provinces, VIDZEME and KURZEME.

D. What are the specific sims of the organization and how is it attempting to accomplish these sims?

The organization is not engaged in sabetage or propaganda activities because at this time this would serve no purpose and is too dangerous. The aim of the organization is to prepare for the liberation of Latvia by supporting, observing and registering possible future members who would be drawn into an active organization in the future. The organization also cellects various data and information regarding current conditions in Latvia, economic conditions and military as well as political occurrences. It also attempts to continue and further contact with abroad.

E. When and how was it organized?

The organization is a nucleus of that organization which had originally been created in 1943 and which had been considerably reduced (the number of members and activities) in 1951 to its present structure. The reason for this reduction and curtailment of activities was the fast that an extensive organization served no purpose and became dangerous, it was also not possible to support it any longer financially (the program incorporating the farms KOLKHOZES; inadequate aid from abroad).

F. Names of the persons in the organization with whom your friend is in contact. Give details including their addresses, occupations, how active they are, and what are their tasks for the organization.

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- F. (cont'd) I [Tilbury/was present when the organization was founded in 1943 and was acquainted with most of the leading personalities at that time. The organization recruited persons of various professional backgrounds and from various walks of life - professors, former officers, government officials, landowners, college students and workers. The persons regruited were considered completely reliable and had been under observation for a number of years. At the time of the aforementioned re-organisation, I was here An Sweden as the representative of this organization and as a result do not know who the leading personalities are. I have remained true to the basic principles of the organisation and have consequently not attempted to collect the names of members because that is too dangerous and at present completely unnecessary. Identification can be effected by verious signals and passwords. CCOLINS Tedelves his assignments in most cases anonymously FULAVEDIS) and does not know his superiors. Moreover, he is also sworn not to reveal to anyons - no matter who it may be - anything regarding members of the organization. In case it became absolutely necessary to know who the members of the organization ere; it has been planned that this information be transmitted by the organisation.
- G. Name as many as you can of the individuals you have heard are connected with the organization, especially the names and details about the leaders.

H. What specific task was your friend sent out to accomplish for the organization?

No one in the organization has any definite and particular assignments. Everyone is utilized as best as can be possible by taking advantage of all existing conditions. OZOLINS has been utilized in observation, transportation, collection of information, and presently as a courier.

I. Why and how was he chosen by the organization?

OZOLINS has been a member of the organization ever since its creation and was in active status during the period of his captivity as a Soviet POW in SOVJETSKJA GAVANJ (1945-46).

- 2. Biography of your friend. (TIL Bury /1)
 - A. Name, birthdate, birthplace, father and mother, brothers and sisters.

Peters OZOLINS (alias) born 2 April 1919 in Higg. Father - Hermans OZOLINS (alias). Mother - Milda. He was an only child.

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B. Education: where, what dates, subjects he studied.

Completed high school in Riga. Studied electrical engineering at the University of Riga.

C. Military service, branch of service, to what units was he attached, was he a prisoner of war?

Served in the Latvian Army (obligatory military service) 1939-40, branch of service artillery. In 1944-45 he served in the Latvian Legion and foughtingainst the Communists. In May 1945 he was captured by the Russians and held as a FOW for 1 1/2 years in SOVJETSKJA GAVANJ. He was then released and permitted to return to Riga.

Has he ever or does he now travel? Inside or outside his country? D. Where? When?

NA.

E. Work history since 1940.

1. Jobs held, where, when, reason for changing,

He worked as a farm hand on farms in VIDZEME because he could get no other job during the Communist occupation of Latvia as he is a son of a high government official.

2. Present job. What is his salary? Name and address of his superior and the chief of the cadre section.

He has worked in various jebs and had always been forced to . leave his job when his past family history became known. At present he is unemployed.

3. Future prospects.

He has no definite future prospects but he is certain that at least for some limited period of time he will find some sort of a job. He is still studying electrical engineering.

F. Has he or any of his relatives been deported? When, where, why?

His father was deported in 1940. There is no information as to where he had been sent. The reason for having been deported is not known but it is assumed that it was because of his previous nationalistic activities and tendencies.

He balonged to no political parties. He is a member of the Union of Farm Workers, Belongs to the sport club "Dynamo".

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1. Organization which your friend represents:

F. Names of the persons in the organization with whom your friend is in contact. Give details including their addresses, occupations, how active they are, and what are their tasks for the organization.

The people with whom 0. works together, whom he knows, and who assigned him his mission, and who will accept the report of what was carried out by him.

NH B OSSA-3;

a. Dr. Harrijs BERGMANIS A surgeon in II Municipal Hospital in Riga. The one from whom he most often receives instructions. He also made arrangements with him for the trip here and made preliminary preparations for the trip. O. does not know with whom H.B. is in contact on his side.

b. Bookkeeper Izolde VITOLS, lives in Riga, Dzirnavu iela 27.

c. Construction engineer (Bautekniker) <u>Hermans BERG</u>-residence in a new row house (blockhaus) on the park of the year 1905 (formerly Grizinkalus) (165) has not noticed the number of the house, because he knows it too well to confuse it with another house.

d. Electrician (Elekto-Feinmechaniker) Tugolfs ZILE - lives in Riga, Amatu street 7.

O has significantly less to do with these three latter than with H.B., who is his principal task giver. O. knows all these people personally and is summoned by them in writing or orally to meet. The word "Pulkvedis" is used as a sign that it deals with business of the organization. O. does not know exactly what other sort of tasks these people have. He knows only that on their side they have contacts with other members of the organization and that they themselves also carry out missions. In general they are assigned to various tasks, usually such as they are able to do the easiest on account of their positions, and other circumstances, acquaintanceships, etc. Thus my friend O. is often used to gather information on the condition of roads and bridges, because he owns a Mercedes (TILBURY originally wrote Moskvich, but crossed it out) and makes rather frequent drives and the like.

G. Name as many as you can of the individuals you have heard are connected with the organization, especially the names and details about the leaders.

Among the people that he has heard or found out that belong to the organization, O. can name the following:

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- a. <u>DINVIETIS</u> for DINVICTIS fnu, who is employed in the Artel "Somdaris" and whose mother should now be in the USA.
- b. Dentist Ofkars XLEIMANIS, whose address he does not know.
- c. Dr. Med. Alfreds VITOLS (no relation of the above named Izolde VITOLS), who, in O's opinion is in a position of leadership. He works in the Peoples Health Department in Riga. I can confirm the latter. Dr. A. VITOLS was a fellow student of mine /i.e. TILBURY. When I was still in Latvia he had a leading position in the organization. It is therefore certain that he now still has it. It is also certain that the professor of law at the University of Latvia, Ed. SCHIRONS, is still active as a leader in the organization. It filloury/ cannot assert with certainty whether any of the other persons are actively engaged.
- 1. I. Why and how was he chosen by the organization?

0. became a member of the organization in 1943 when he was recruited by an active member, <u>J. CERINS (CERINS disappeared</u> in <u>1945 without a trace.</u>) 0. was then used particularly for contact with the Latvian Legion, in which he had served.

- 3. Your friend's position in the organization.
 - A. What does he do for the organization?

The tasks vary, but mostly they deal with the collection of information, observation, and the purchase of necessary objects, either directly or through his acquaintances (who naturally are not allowed to know for whom and for what purpose the objects were needed.)

B. From whom does he receive instructions?

From the four persons named above, but mostly from H. BERGMANIS. L

C. How does he receive instructions?

He is ordered by one of these persons to a meeting, where he receives the assignment orally from them.

D. How does he report to his superiors?

With the completion of the task, he makes an appointment for a meeting with the person - at a different place - where he then reports erally on the completion of the task. (The person who assigned tasks sometimes takes notes on loose leafs.) The small objects are delivered and it is agreed where the larger ones shall be handed over.

F. Give a summary of his past activities for the organization.
After his work as the organization's contact man with the Legion, which by 1945 was no longer practical there was an interruption, when he was imprisoned by the Russians in 1945 and interned in the labor camp SOVETSKAYA GAVAN. When he was released at the end of 1946 and was allowed to return to Riga, he could not immediately resume the connection on account of general enfeeblement and because he had to be sure of recovery. He had met Dr. H. EERGMANIS, However, neither of them is marriage /16 Jan 1947/did 0. begin to make inquiries again to Dr. H.B. about the organization. When he learned that it was still in existence, he offered his cooperation, which was accepted after a short time. Then began his activity as it is sketched above.

G. What are his specific instructions for reporting to the organization on his return?

The courier was sent on my /TILBURY's/suggestion which was made a year and a half ago. The purpose was to learn the details about the conditions and the state of mind in Latvia, to orient the organization about the situation in the world, to bring into conformity the prospect for suitable tactics and the setting of the next objectives of the organization, etc. After O's arrival it became apparent that the organization is, moreover, very interested in establishing closer contact with the Intelligence organization of the USA; partwly, because in general it considers a contact with the USA to be very important and partly it hopes to get better financial support (and principally regular support) for its work. On its side the organization could, besides collecting intelligence, promise all possible help and shelter for possible American agents there. But for practical reasons the hitherto existing contact with Sweden must be maintained undiminished. I would very much like to hear your views on the possibility of such an arrangement, in connection with which the technical details could be discussed.

As it now stands, O's return trip will very probably be postponed for about 10 days, or at least one week, because the original project cannot be carried out immediately. According to the original project, O. is to be picked up by the fisherman KLAVLAPA, who was to sail his boat about 45 nautical miles toward Gotland in the Baltic where he was to expect 0. O. will be taken there by a customs sutter, while two two-engined fighters /Zertorer von der Luft/ direct the rendezvous. It cannot be carried out because at the moment KLAVLAPA is not in a position to go to sea according to a radiogram that was received here yesterday./Il or 12 June 55/ The preparations are now made to enable O. to sail through the Kolka Straits into the Gulf of Riga in a specially built motor boat. The boat is very low and develops a speed of 27 knots, (cruising speed, 22 knots) and is powered by a rather soundless Ford motor.

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The boat is ready to start, but navigational instruction for 0. is still needed. (He has had 8 years of sailing experience and an acquaintance with motors.) A trail run is also still necessary. This will take several days to get the results. O. himself is interested in this project and thinks that while the delay will make it more difficult to explain his absence at home, it will not be impossible by any means. But thereby we will have more time here and that makes it possible to think through the above sketched suggestion quietly and with no undue haste shown.

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Concerning the question of currency, my friend 0., who is extremely graterul for the 2500 rubles already received, believes that he has very secure possibilities in Riga to sell foreign currency - dellars or pounds at a very advantageous rate to people known to him, who would like nothing better than to invest their savings in foreign currencies. He would therefore very much like to take back dollars or pounds (in larger denominations) in place of rubles. If you have the possibility and the aim to support the organization to a further extent, he would love to have dollar and pound notes.

4. Details of your friend's trip.

A. write a detailed chronological description of the recent trip from the moment he left his home until he arrived here. This should include:

1. A map giving the exact route he followed.

See sketch No. 1.

2. Hours of the day that he passed through various towns enroute.

The trip from Riga took place in midweek on 25 May at about 1500 hours by means of a truck from the fishing kolkhoz "Sarkana Baka" in Ventspils. O. made an agreement with the driver to drive him to Ventspils for 400 rubles. At about 1800 they passed through Saldus, 1930 through Kuldiga, and arrived in Ventspils at about 2100. In Ventspils he met his contact man between 2100 and 2200 in the municipal park at the Statue of the Maiden of Physical Culture as had been previously agreed on. After he had identified the contact man from a description given by his task assigner, he spoke to him with the agreed upon recognition phrase. He did not know the contact-man personally, knowing only that he is a harbor employee in Ventspils, a man of middle age, and that he was to be addressed by the name ANSIS. This man took him to Roja via Kolka on his motorcycle, arriving in Roja at about Ol00 hours on 26 May. Here he had to wait in the woods for a time, while ANSIS looked for the fisherman KLAVLAPA, and brought him back to O. KLAVALAPA took O. immediately to his boat, which was lying completely unguarded in the harbor, and O. had to wait in the cabin for further instructions.

4. A. (cont'd)

3. The times of departure and arrival of any busses, trains, etc. that he used in travelling.

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Neither railroad nor bus were used.

4. How was the trip arranged? When was it first planned at home? By whom? How many people knew about the trip? Give their names.

First the organization's orders to travel to Sweden as a courier were delivered to him in January 1955 by J. BERGMANIS. He agreed in principle, but his work situation at that time did not permit him an inconspicuous disappearance. When he quit his job in April and was permitted a couple of weeks' absence from his technical studies, he informed H.B. and his departure was arranged by the organization. Beforehand, he knew only the way that he was to go, otherwise no details. He did not get to know the fisherman KLAVLAPA until the departure at Roja. On the morning of 25 May he was made aware of the date of departure, and the contact man "ANSIS", as well as being informed the password. He had to organize the trip to Ventspils himself. Whereupon he hired the truck of the fishing konkhoz (he made the agreement with the driver.) Later he got from H.B. travel money, a rubber boat, and a tin can that was soldered shut. He was to give the can to me /TILBURY/here. (This he did. The can contained a report on Latvia, which had suffered somewhat from the water and which you will get from me after it has been deciphered. It also contained a number of blanks and forms, which I had to give to the /TIEBARS 7.)

5. Give the full names of the captain and crew of the boat.

The captain of the boat is Eduards KLAVLAPA (born 1909) and besides him was his somewhat younger brother, whose name 0. did not know. Usually four men are on this boat, but this trip was to Ventspils for repair, which was to take about a week and not a fishing trip on which there was only a two man crew. This condition had caused the suddeness of the departure.

6. Draw a map of the port where the trip boat was tied up.

O. cannot draw a plan of the harbor, because he travelled in the darkness of the boat and had never earlier been in Roja. He knows only that he had to walk over several boats in order to get to K's boat. The fishing harbor and the boats in Roja were completely unguarded.

4. A. (cont'd)

7. Describe how and when your friend went on board the boat.

About an hour after his arrival he was led onto the boat and remained in the cabin there until the time of departure.

8. Where was he hidden? Draw a sketch of the boat.

From the beginning he was not at all hidden, but sat openly in the cabin. The sketch of the boat is in attachment 2.

9. How long was he on board before the boat left?

The boat put to sea at 0500.

10. Was there an inspection of the boat? Describe.

No inspection of the boat took place in Roja.

11. How did he get from the boat to here?

At the point marked on sketch No. 1 the boat was stopped by three Soviet patrol boats that ordered them to anchor. There were two "S" boats and one larger ship. K. immediately hid O. under an empty case in the cargo hold and put a large pile of nets over this. O. himself was not able to observe the search, but K. later told him that the search had been quite throrough, and that the searchers had poked in the heap of nets several times. But 0. himself did not hear that the case under which he was lying was struck by the probing instrument. The search lasted about a half hour, but 0. was let out much later (It seemed to him that it was after a couple of hours.) They then sailed to a point off Ovizi where they headed for Gotland. By evening they were off the island, but the high seas did not permit a trip with the rubber boat that had been brought along, for which reason they turned back out to sea and anchored. On Friday 27 May they tried again, had motor trouble, which took a very long time, and in the evening saw a light which they took for Gotland. But this was false and he does not know yet what sort of light this really was. After that at about 12 o'clock he got into the rubber boat and rowed to the island. At 9 o'clock in the morning (of 28 May) the sea was again high and the boat filled up with water. At 10:30 he notified the ship HERNODIA on a course north and hailed it. He was taken on the ship, where the rubber boat remained. (The Swedish ship HERNODIA was steaming to Helsinki. The Swedish authorities have asked for the rubber boat back from the ship, but have not yet received it.) On the ship O. passed

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11. (Cont'd) himself off as a refugee Klaipeda, Lithuania and kept his name secret. HERNODIA called the Swedish authorities on Gotland, and O. was picked up by a customs cruiser off Slite and handed over to the Landfiskal of Slite B. BONDE, <u>/Tom Paul Berthil BONDE</u>, born 1903/who took him to his cottage in the woods. His arrival went rather unnoticed on Gotland. On the evening of the same day I and a friend <u>/TIEBAR</u> picked him up and we flew on a scheduled flight to Stockholm on 29 May.

B. What reasons did he give to his wife and friends and fellow workers to explain his absence?

His wife knew nothing about the trip and blieves that he got temporary work in Latvia outside of Riga. He wrote several letters to hiw wife, which he gave to H.B., who will have them sent to his wife at certain intervals of time. Such absences have been frequent in the past. He is convinced that his wife does not suspect anything. Since he is now out of a job, there is nothing that needs to be done to protect him at his work place.

C. How will he explain any purchases he made here upon his return?

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Objects of foreign origin - clothing, watches, and in general everything from abroad - are no longer dangerous, for they come into the country in large quantities by a variety of ways. Partly they are available from time to time in the shops, but for the greater part they are imported as contraband by sailors and are sent to individual persons by relatives who are located abroad. In Liepaja there are even shops that deal secretly in contraband articles. Foreign articles are now openly carried about and no one asks where they came from. O. recently saw a woman on the streets in Riga wearing a kerchief on which the USA flag was minted. No one cares about it. So now it is possible to take everything to Latvia and sell it there without running any risk.

1. In accordance with the suggestion in reference A, TILBURY was instructed to give TILBURI/1 briefing in the use of the scorch method of development and a set of control indicators. A copy of the instructions are transmitted as an enclosure to this dispatch. The control indicators were devised by C - whose help on this case was very much I Station. As soon as an English translation apprecisted by the C of the Latvian instructions are received from $\subset \neg$ they will be transmitted to Headquarters.

2. (TILEURY/1 provided the following addresses for receiving letters in Latvia

BUMBIERS is about 65 years old, a farmer and has an elementary school education. Although he does not belong to the resistance organization which TILEURY/1 represents, he is considered to be absolutely reliable by TILBURY/1.

BRIEDIS is about 60 years old and is a widow. She has an elementary school education and now is amployed as a part time worker as a charwanan, doing knitting, and receives pay for standing in queues for other people who do not want to take the time.

Both of these persons were chosen because they are rather aged. According to TILEURY/1 only old people can receive mail from abroad without fear of reprisel. Because of this it should be possible to mail letters from outaide the USSR to both of these addresses. There are no traces in the Stockholm Station files on either of these persons.

- 3. Both TILBURY and TILBURY/1 were very enthusiastic about setting up an independent s/w channel. However, they stated that if the system was one that the Soviet censorship could develop merely by warming it would be too dangerous to use and that they would prefer to have no s/w at all. TILBURY was not informed that it would be possible to instruct TILBURY/1 in a more secure system in the first scorch letter mailed from inside the USSR. TILBURY had expected to receive the s/w material before TILBURY/1's departure. He therefore believes that it is no longer possible to set up the s/w commo. TILBURY explained to TILBURY/1 that he could get the ingredients for the s/w ink from a local friend who is a chemist.
- 4. The following procedure for establishing the s/w link is suggested:
 - e. The first letter containing s/w that can be developed by the scorch method should be mailed from inside the USSR. This letter should contain instructions for a s/w writing and development system chosen by Headquarters. It is suggested that something like white carbon would be most easily learned.
 - b. In the first letter TILBURY/I should be instructed to write a test message (possibly containing details of his infiltration and return home) to one of the addresses provided by TILBURY. These addresses will be sent to Headquarters as soon as obtained from TILBURY.
 - c. As soon as it is demonstrated that the s/w link is working, the operation will be run either as ICIMPROVE or as a positive operation depending on Headquarters' comments on the TILBURY/1 debriefing transmitted in reference B.
- 5. Since TILBURY/1 at present does not believe that the s/w link will be set up, it is imperative that the initial letter be sent as seen as possible before he forgets his s/w briefing. Therefore, Headquarters' comments, suggestions in regard to s/w material, and name traces, are requested as soon as possible.

- 1. Transmitted herewith are pertinent portions of the Station's working file on the TILMAX/1 operation. It consists of rough translations of TILBURY's reports in German and copies of our instructions to him with the exception of those already transmitted in the references.
- 2. On the profit side of the operation we obtained considerably more date on the — _ _ complex than we have had heretofore. In addition to the GE debriefing transmitted with reference A, we have received four lengthy positive reports from TILBURY with more to come. The first four were transmitted in CSSA-3805, 11 July 1955. TILBURY/1 was given a briefing that should enable us to set up a s/w link with him. Perhaps not least of all TILBURY has been indectrinated to a cortain extent in what is wanted in the way of GE and operational debriefing. Throughout the whole operation TILBURY did everything that was asked of him but did not show any initiative in establishing TILBURY/1's bone fides.

On the debit side we were not able to determine the bons fides of TILEURY/1 or of the resistance organization which he represented, because TILBURN's ON debriefing, which was done at our instigation, was received and translated too late to pormit follow-up questioning. In retrospect the situation could probably have been improved by pushing TILETRY factor from the beginning. However, at the time it was decided to concentrate on obtaining TIRBAR cooperation, while taking into account the difficulties of TILHURY's position in serving two masters, the TIEBARS and KUBARE. As us now reconstruct it, once C - returned to work the TIRBARS did not out us into the operation to the extent haved for and by the time this was clear the infiltration was about to stort. At one point we considered attempting to put In contact with TILBURY/1 via TILBURY without the Γ

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knowledge of the TIEBARS, but this idea was abandoned when the TIEBARS informed us that the operation was being postponed until fall. The reasoning here was that we would have sufficient time to continue the CE debricking either through TILSURY or the TIEDARS, or that KUBARK would be given TILBURY/1 for interrogation and future utilisation. It is an interesting sidelight that TILEURI's positive reports, were received in corbon copy, the original going to the TIEBARS, while the GE debriefing was shout a single original. The details of the linison relationship during this operation will be filled by in a later dispatch.

4. In his 22 June report TILBURY speaks of the possibility of another aulicher courier coming out next year. In proparation for such an eventuality it is considered highly desirable that the enalysis requested in reference A be used as a basis for deciding what sort of support should be given to IILBURI for the TIEBAR /TILBURY complex incide Latvia. As in the case of support for E I discussed in OSRA-3795, 7 July 55, we will inform TILBURY that his assets inside Latvia are boing examined in the GE light and will solicit his halp in the task.

Misterious Refugee in the Baltic Sea (Claims to have escaped from Latvia but has disappeared in Sweden without leaving a trace.

London

" On Saturday of the Whitesunday (Vasarsvetki - in Latv.; i.e. on 28 May -Transl.) I from a small rubber boat and five hours leter the Swedish autorities took him over but afterwards I did hear mothing about his fate ", asserted a captain of a Scandinavian steamer, interviewed by the correspondent of <u>Laiks</u> in London, thus presenting a riddle which up to now has get no answer.

The docks of the harbor of London are wide. Here is the meeting place for ships from the world. Here are also seamen from all the corners of the world. Look, one of them, a captain of a Scandinavian ship, who is known also to the Latvian seamen. And here is his story: " It occured on Saturday of the Whitesunday. It was ten minutes past ten o'clock in the morning. The air was clear, the sea sunny, only the white tons of waves and the the barometer were announcing that a storm is approaching. The matz-on-duty ran into my cabin and reported that somebody out in the sea is shouting for help... My vessel, having a course to the scuth, was in the vicinity of the Swedish coast and, when stepping out to the deck, I discovered by the binoculars e rather small rubber boat in the waves and a man in it who shouted and waved to us. I ordered the steersman to reduce speed and to sporeach the boat. Actually it was not a boat but a rubber raft of the kind which was used in wartime by the xixx airmen and instead of the life-boatc. The raft was filled with water up to its edge and the man was sitting up to his woist in water.

The rescued was a man of about 35 years, had oblong, energetic face, Was of mixix medium height. He had a grey homespun suit, working boots and a cap with a peak. He spoke fluently German and was in command of some English too. He told that he is coming from Letvia, from Akmensrags (5650 2103 on Latvian Army Map 1: 200.000 - Transl.). Told that he had set off for the ses in the rubber toot two days ago. Really, he was unshaved, had a beard of about two days. He told that he had been threatened by danger, arrest or deportations. But here I caucht doubts because when I offered him a meal, he refused and accented only a cup of coffee. He had an identity card (mersenas apliecība - in Latv.), issued by the Soviet autorities, in his pocket."

When asked by the corresponent of <u>Laiks</u> about the name of the escapee, the captain repliers that he has forgotten it but there was a definite feeling that he does not want to mention this name since it is known that the ship's log book contains all happenings, thus $x \lambda x x$ this reception of the refugee on the ship too, and the log book thus should contain also this name all the same whether it is a true one or assumed. The captain continued:

"The refugee had not rough hands, and he had the appearance of a technician, mechanician or auto mechanician. He had no weapons and he told that he had wanted to escape from Latvia and now he has accomplished it. Swedish The radio operator of the ship meanwhile got in contact with the frontier guards, we stopped at the harbor and in the afternoon of the same day we handed over the escapee to the Swedish autorities. I have heard motiving about him since then. I have found nothing about the escapee either in the Swedish or Europeen pewspapers. Maybe the Latvian newspapers have some by chance any information about this man ?" asked the captain. " No ? ", he repeated my answer and continued then: " Well, this matter is not so

simple as you might believe. After having rescued him we gave him dry clothes. These clothes I received recently back in a parcel which was **xxmittax** mailed from the post office in Stockholm. A person with a Swedish surname was given as the sender there and it was addressed to my shipping company. If he were only a refugee then the Swedish police, after the lanse of the quarantine time, would let him go free by **grapting** in the rights of a political refugee or expell him but nobody of us do knows what happened to **xitx** this man. He seemed to be intelligent, was talkative and he had something important.

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3.

What was this " something important", the captain did not want to reveal. Why? It is understandable that the captain asked not to mention his and his ship's name, because the steamer is sometimes sailing to harbors behind the Iron Curtain, Danzig and Gdynia and Stettin, but what was that which prohibited the captain to mention the name of the resued and this "something important".

Stockholm/AE./.- In these days Gotland was reached by a young Latvian man, who crossed the Baltic Sea in a small boat. The name of the escapee is not known yet. Respective Swedish Authorities have interned the lad and do not disclose anything about this person.

Judging by some circumstances of escape, there is a possibility that the escapee could be a Soviet sent agent with a special task. Although, untill the end of the investigation the contrary might be proved.

As it is well known, only 21 persons have succeeded to escape from Baltic States in the postwar years, 8 of them from Latvia. However from Russia itself 989 persons have reached the the freedom in the last 6 months of 1954. From Bulgaria - 141 persons, from Czechoslovakia - 1231, from Hungary - 721, from Poland -842, from Roumania - 245, to say nothing about the hundreds of thousands od escapees from Eastern Germany. These are figures which show the fact in what oppression the

During the Geneva Conference special leaflets reached Latvia and the other Baltic States, to remind the Latvians in their homeland that they are not abandoned. Similar action took place already before to strengthen the moral. Of course, the reading of leaflets is as dangerous as listening to the Voice of America broadcasts.

In the same newspaper "LATVIJA" on August 6th,1955 (page 2) is an article"MISTERIOUS ESCAPEE FROM LATVIA" that quotes the newpaper "LAIKS" (July 27th,1955)article with the same title.(See File COMMO.Doc.22) Only the lead-in is different - It states that the escapee is put ashore in Gotland Sweden. It further states that as far as it is known the Latvian escapee whom we mentioned before should not be considered as a communist agent. He is still 'isolated by Swedish authorities, which might XXXXXXK have

reasonable motived, remembering the KEKEFYKAY hugg uproar which aroused the press and public in the previous years

regarding Latvians who escaped from Soviet Latvia. At the end of the article it states: However the usual time of quarantine has expired, the escapee is still in the hands of Swedish authorities. Either they should grant him the rights of asylum,or if the authorities should consider him as undesirable, they should expell him and return him to Latvia.

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

- c. Issued letter-drops for operational correspondence.
- d. Issued a KUBARK signal-plan and crystals for W/T communications.
- e. Issued one-time pads for encipherment and decipherment.
- f. Provided with operational funds.
- g. Principals of trade-craft will be reviewed and they will be briefed on general reporting requirements.

3. A Latvian-speaking case officer will be made available from Headquarters in order to implement the action in the foregoing paragraph.

4. Inasmuch as TILBURY/1's mother has indicated TILBURY/1's visit is to be a short one, the period during which MUBARK can gain access to him will probably be quite limited. It is therefore considered important that Headquarters be notified of TILBURY/1's arrival as soon as possible. Although TILBURY could normally be expected to notify the Station of such an event, it could be possible that he may be unable or unwilling to do so on this occasion. It would be preferable, in any case, to keep him out of the picture insofar as is possible and not make him witting to any greater degree than he now already is.

5. Judging from the pattern of TILBURY/1's 1955 visit, he will almost certainly be permitted to contact his mother. She is aware of her son's desire to establish contact with $\Box \neg \Box$ and is apparently anxious to assist in any way. It is therefore considered desirable that she be provided with a means for reporting her son's arrival to KUBARK quickly and securely. For this purpose enclosure A and B are attached together with translations of $\Box \neg \Box$ handwritten texts. As can be seen from the translation of enclosure A, TILBURY/1's mother is directed to send an innocuous text cablegram to a KUBARK drop thus indicating TILBURY/1's arrival. Enclosure B directs her to call a name and number (to be filled in by $\Box \neg \Box$) so that she can elert $\Box \neg \Box$ directly. It is felt that $\Box \neg \Box$ may not prefer to use the latter variant because of possible compromise of the installation, therefore, the two choices.

6. It is requested that one or the other of the enclosures be delivered to TILBURY/1's mother and that Headquarters be notified by cable when this is accomplished and which enclosure was utilized. TILBURY/1's mother reportedly knows only broken German and practically no Swedish.

ACTION REQUIRED: Feedquarters evaluation of report as requested in para 2a.

- 1. Meeting: Subject was seen by prearrangement upon his return from leave. at the VACABOND safehouse from 1430 to 1600 on 26 September. The next meeting is scheduled to take place at the same location on 16 October at 1330.
- Overational: The following items of operational significance were 2. covered :
 - The two Latvians who landed on Gotland in July via rubber boat a. were discussed and it developed that Subject has not yet been in direct contact with either one of this pair. TILBURY was able to elaborate slightly on their arrival in that he is now definite on the fact that the Swedes consider them to have been sent to Sweden by the RIS and further, that they did not arrive simultaneously. As Enclosure 1 to this report is a copy of an information report which the Swedes turned over to TILBURY for translation from the Latvian. This report is submitted untranslated and we would appreciate a Headquarters evaluation of same at such time as it becomes available.
 - b. The above mentioned report originates with the individual who appears to be the more dominant of the two Latvians, Viktor MIKELSSON. TILBURY knows nothing more than has already been reported about (fmu) KIMKANS. TILEURY states that a second report should soon be forthcoming from Mikelsson which will be taken from a diary covering a trip which Mikelsson took on the Volga. Mikelsson claims to be a member of a Latvian resistance group which sent him to Sweden in order to make contact with a certain ZARINS in London. It was the intention of Mikelsson's resistance organization to have Mikelsson remain in London as Zarins' assistant (assuming that the Swedes are correct in their

evaluation of Mikelsson as an RIS agent, this scheme would certainly afford the RIS a maximum penetration of Latvian emigration activity abroad.) Mikelsson is reported to have brought a formal protocol along with him as evidence of his bona fides. He reports that there are currently five or six resistance groups in Latvia, one of which is known as the MAKSIS (the group to which Mikelsson belongs). Another group is maned the IMANTA. According to THEURY, SHOTH advised the Swedes that they were certain that the MAKSIS group in Latvia is under control and that they (SMOTH) were certain that Mikelsson and Kimkans were on an RIS mission. We are awaiting Headquarters traces on Mikelsson and Kimkans. We have no Stockholm traces.

- d. In response to ______ inquiry concerning GRINEERG whom you will recall had been closely associated with the now-convicted Soviet spy, Anatole ERICSSON, TILEURY reported that Grinberg was a neighbor and fairly close acquaintance of Ericsson's but that no one with whom he has spoken has intimated that there is anything definite with regard to Grinberg's having helped Ericsson in his work with the Soviets. Subject will continue to keep an ear to the ground for Grinberg's activities.
- e. During a discussion about recent tourist visits to Sweden, steered the conversation around to the group of which was a member. TILEURY reports that, to his knowledge, this group did not return to Latvia by boat but rather by airplane. Subject repeated his impression that all of the normative Latvian members of this group were very much in favor of Soviet reprisals for any

unvarranted action they might take during their stay in Stockholm. As far as Subject has been able to determine, all of the Latvian members of this group were considered to be honest, straightforward and in Sweden without a Soviet mission. Subject described their principal trait as a strong desire to buy up commodities on the local market at lower prices. TILBURY states that he has spoken with "many people" about the \subset \Box group.

- f. TILEURY is certain that no Latvian boat operation will be laid on for the balance of this year. There has been a minimum of radio contact for the last few months and he described the Swedish attitude as extremely cautious and desirous of waiting for some time.
- In connection with the conversation about boat operations, g. 7 brought up the subject of TILEURY/1. TILEURY responded to mimerous questions on subject but stated that he was cortain that TILBURY/1 was not under control during his last visit and when asked why, simply replied that he, TILBURY, spent two solid weeks with TILBURY/1 last year and that TILBURI/1 could not have been under control at that time. As a by-product of this conversation bearing on TILEURY/1's cleanliness, Subject stated that the Suedes had sent money to some of their Latvian agents in the spring of 1953 via SMOTH assets. The SMOTH assets buried the money in Latvia and the Svedish agents were than told where the money was located. TILBURI speculated that if these funds were made available to Swedish agents in Latvia through such a realstance organization despite this speculation, TILSURI along to his belief throughout 7 that TILBURI/I has not been doubled by the RIS.
- h. The subject of RIS activity within the Latvian emigres in Stockholm For was taken up once again in detail and TILBURI has promised to a good prospect carefully. He has no candidates to offer as possibilities at present.
- 3. <u>Fermonal</u>: Subject reported that he had spent part of his leave in Italy attending a Latvian organization conference and that the remainder of his leave had been spent in the Stockholm area.

a. Please note that line A, photograph 8 does not have the bearers signature entered. Does MKTOPAZ possess similar examplars or have any information regarding the usual procedure encountered when this document is issued?

b. The passport photo in photograph 7 is black and white single weight glossy without any cachet on the reverse and was supplied by bearer himself by means of his home laboratory. Bearer stated he was not aware of any requirement for a special post i.e. left or right profile, one or two ears showing. Is the photographic paper and the pose consistent with known Soviet document procedures?

c. Is the passport serial number consistent with date and place of issue?

d. Note photograph 11 bears a single "PIERAKSTITS" residence cachet which has been bearers residence since 1948 and appeared in his previous passport. Is it the usual Soviet procedure to enter this cachet into a new passport using the same date of registration (1948) as in the previous passport? Note also that by 1953 the street had been renamed; however, the cachet bears the 1948 version.







- 1. In accordance with Reference, for Frankfurt on 7 November. Attached to this dispatch are notes from which phase, debriefing, recruitment and briefing of TILBURY/1 between 17 October and 5 November 1956. It is requested that the attached notes be held for pending his return.
- The Station would like to commend \square \neg for the manner in which he 2. has cooperated in the handling of this case. We are all aware that TILBURY/1 can hardly be considered completely without RIS taint, principally by virtue of his associations inside and the peculiar success of his 1955 infiltration and 1956 exfiltration; on the other side of the ledger, however, we must consider C J favorable assessment of TILBURY/1, TILBURY/1's obvious inclination to speak openly and with no apparent reluctance or reservation on any subject on which he is knowledgeable, and TILBURY's assessment as offsetting to a considerable degree the evidence which condemns Subject as an RIS agent. We feel that $\Box \supset did all he could to either expose$ TILBURY/1 and get an admittance of his RIS complicity or to establish his bona fides. Unfortunately, no clear-cut case can be made at either extreme.
- 3. If we accept that the best possible situation with which KUBARK comes away from the TILBURY/1 encounter is one whereby we have recruited a double agent under our control for a singleton positive intelligence mission, we would like to call to Headquarters attention what we consider to be at least one very significant reason for TILBURY/1 to remain under our control to the extent that he accomplishes his mission within physical and security limitations - i.e. TILBURY/1's mother. Even if we had had our choice, it would have been difficult for us to provide a more effective means of giving us some assurance that TILBURY/1 will accomplish his mission in our behalf despite his RIS involvement.

C → has agreed to furnish ⊂ → with his complete operational report of this case; ⊂ ¬ has also indicated to ⊂ ¬ that, if the TILBURY contact is to continue to yield results and remain within security requirements, and if the other AEMARSH or AECOB operations of this Station are to continue to bear fruit, it is essential that Stockholm be completely aware of all information which Headquarters collects from sources outside of Sweden which bears in any way on the conduct of Baltic operations with which this Station is directly or indirectly concerned. It is considered manifestly insecure for Headquarters not to observe this principle.
- 5. We would like to convey our thanks to Headquarters for the prompt handling our requests received in this case and repeat our awareness of \Box \supset personal efforts throughout.

- On 17 December 1956, a communication was received from TILBURY which 1. apprised us of TILBURY/1's safe arrival and Reference was dispatched. c - anticipates having one meeting with TILBURY prior to Christmas and any amplifying information in re TILBURY/1's dispatch and arrival will be transmitted. Reference notes that paragraph 5 of OSSA-5374 of 30 November should be corrected; by this we meant that TILBURY/1's dispatch date is shown in paragraph 5 as 21 November and his arrival date in the communication received today is 20 November. We assume that TILBURY was misinformed on the original date by the TIEBARS but will check.
- The message concerning TILBURY/1's arrival also contained the positive 2. information herewith forwarded as Enclosure 1 to this dispatch. This information supplements that forwarded via OSSA-5374 and TILBURY states in his covering note that this is all of it. Once again, we would appreciate Headquarters' overall evaluation of this information at such time as it becomes available as well as C 7 assessment of how this information compares with that he extracted from TILBURY/1 through his own debriefing.

You will note that the only copy of this information which we received 3. on this occasion, and on the occasion of OSSA-5374, is a carbon copy. Our assumption is that the original is given to the TIEBARS. Would it be possible for KURIOT to analyze the carbon copy which we received in this case (forwarded herewith as the Chief, SR copy) and that of OSSA-5374 to determine if this copy has also had a carbon under it in order to make

Airfields in the Riga Area (251) Summer 1955 - October 1956 C 2

During the year, aircraft activity in the Rige area has been heavy and steady without specially noticeable peaks. Single and twin-engine jet planes have been observed almost exclusively. Because of the danger of collision with civilian planes, military aircraft are prohibited from flying over the city of Riga itself.

It continues to happen quite often that jet planes crash or have other accidents. Such occurrences are never mentioned in the press. Nor is it published when catastrophe strikes civilian planes either. For example last year a jet plane ran into a two-storey house in Liepaja; both the pilot and some of the occupants of the house burned to the ground. Despite the fact that the accident was witnessed by many people, it was not mentioned in the local press. Most of the accidents have taken place on landing.

The military portion (northeastern) of Spilva airfield still is being used by jets, although this happens only occasionally. There are no indications that it is intended to close down the military part of the airfield. Brand new planes have been observed on the field a number of times. Most recently, in July 1956, three new planes covered with tarpaulins were observed. All openings on the planes were covered with painted wooden covers. They were of the MIG-17 type. There is no assembly plant for aircraft on or in the vicinity of Spilva airfield.

The airfield at the "Kvadrats" factory, on both sides of the Riga-Ogre highway, is about $4\frac{1}{2}$ kilometers in length and its greatest width is about 1 kilometer. Work has commenced, however, to widen the field to the shore of Daugava. The actual airfield is situated west of the highway. On the easterly side are the officers' quarters, the club, a radio station, a cement factory which provides material for the continued expansion of the field, fuel cisterns, and a number of new structures. This year they have begun to erect an approximately 2 meter high board fence around the airfield. About 3 kilometers of the fence is finished. At present the runway which goes parallel with the highway is being widened. Its width heretofore was 40 to 50 meters; the length is about 3,000 meters. It is a concrete runway. The fuel supply has been enlarged considerably this year too. A series of 2 and 3 storey structures have also been erected on both sides of the road. New construction is continuing. There are no hangars on the field nor is there any airplane repair shop. It is possible that the plane motors are repaired in an automobile shop which is located near the barracks in the northwest portion of the field. The planes sit in the open along/the runway. The number of planes never is below fifty; they are of the MIG-17 type. There were no twin-engine jets on the field at the beginning of October of this year. During darkness the field is kept lighted with neon lights and searchlights. No orientation lights have been observed in the vicinity of the field. The field is used solely by army air units. A sketch of the field is appended.

The airfield at Kalnciems belongs to the navy. It is about 4 kilometers long and 3 kilometers wide. Expansion is in progress. During this year a double barbed wire fence has been erected around the area. The buildings which belong to the actual airfield are situated within the woods. Only some work shops and officers quarters are visible at the edge of the woods. The construction of housing and installation of fuel cisterns on the east side of the Riga-Kalnciems road has been commenced

recently. Both single and twin-engine planes use the field. The single engine planes are of the MIG-17 type and the twin-engines are of the YAK-25 type. A few I1-28's have been observed also this summer. Last winter they kept the permanent runways clear of snow by means of modern blower units.

The Sleperi airfield which is located north of Kalnciems we used to be used occasionally. For about a year now it has been completely closed down.

The Tukums airfield is 6 to 7 kilometers long. The width is up to about 4 kilometers. The area is not enclosed. Single-engine jet planes are stationed at the field. Types and number not established. Detailed observation of the field has not been possible.

The airfield south of Cesis continues to be used but only to a small extent and by civilian planes. A number of ambulance planes are statined on the field, which also has radar installations.

Since the seaplane station at Kisezers in Riga was closed down in 1954, no seaplanes have been observed in the Riga area.

A new airfield is being constructed northeast of Cesis in the Startu area. According to the inhabitants of the area a number of arms are to be evacuated shortly. Excavating machinery was already at work in certain parts of the area in the spring of 1956. In June a number of carloads of runway plates arrived at the Cesis railway station. The plates were perforated and were about 1.5 meters in length and 0.5 meter wide. Civilian vehicles also were used to transport the plates to the Startu area. In October the local inhabitants observed radar antennas in the area. Aircraft have not yet been observed.

Air Training Institutions in Riga (651) October 1956 C 2

The K. E. Voroshilov Military Air School is housed in the former 5th Latvian Infantry Regiment barracks at Lomonosova iela (street) No. 1 (formerly Samarina iela) in Riga. There are two old planes standing on the barracks grounds, probably for demonstration purposes. The barracks grounds, probably for demonstration purposes. The barracks grounds almost daily by personnel from a building on Gorskiy Street (formerly Valdemar Street No. 7). An air staff is likely housed in this building. (Two photos of radar on the air school are appended).

A civilian air training institute is located in some buildings in the Transduna sector of the city between Nometan Slokas and Dartas Streets (photo appended).

Civilian aircraft have a special air route to and from the city of Riga. It follows the railroad from Riga to Incukalns, at which the planes veer onto the course desired. Planes coming in for landing also fly via Incukalns.

The USSR is now making a plane similar to the Storch type. A number of these are being used in ambulance service. This type plane was first observed in Riga during spring 1956.

There are now airfields for civilian traffic in all rayon capitals in Latvia.

Helicopter Unit in Lithuania (3404) October 1956 C 3

A fairly large air unit is stationed on one of the airfields near Kaunas in Lithuania. The unit is said to have been transferred to Lithuania early in 1955. It has not been possible to determine the size of the unit. It is equipped exclusively with helicopters of the MI-A type.

Radio and antenna installation in the Riga area (261,343) October 1956 C 2

The wire radio network is now well developed in Riga. Loudspeakers are set up on most of the streets. The entire program of theRiga transmitter is carried. The broadcasts are also carried to factories and other places where there are large numbers of listeners. Recently, private subscription to the wire radio system has been permitted; in such cases a loudspeaker is installed in the residence. Most of the subscribers are Russians.

A new radio transmitter has recently been completed north of Riga on the northwest shore of Baltezers. According to rumors the transmitter will serve primarily for direct contact with Moscow.

In Pleskodale, in the northwestern outskirts of Riga, there is a radio station consisting of several high masts grouped around a building (photo of the installation is appended).

The large radar installation on Spilve airfield has been dismantled since this summer. From summer to October 1956, only one large radar installation has been observed. It is situated on Zolitudes iela in the western outskirts of Riga (photo of the installation appended).

Small antenna installation have been observed at a number of places. Whether these are for radar, navigational or ultra shortwave stations, it has not been possible to judge. Sketches of the four different types of antennas observed have been appended.


A number of these small installations are placed around Spilve airfield. Most of them, five or six, are situated along the north shore of Hapaka Gravis.

The same kind of antennas are placed around the airfield at the "Kvadrats" factory on the road to Ogre and at the Kalrciems airfield.

In the Moscow suburb of Riga, formerly the Lettgallic suburb, a couple of blocks are now blocked off by a high wooden fence. The blocked off area is bounded by the streets, Odzienas, Paides, Strautu, Sesku, and Rezeknes iela. The street which used to pass through the area, Piedrujas Street, is closed off. Several airplanes and antenna installations of the same kind as at the airfields outside of Riga have been observed inside the enclosure. Spur tracks lead into the area; it has not been used as an airfield. (Photo is appended).

Types of this smaller antenna have also been observed at an antiaircraft battery in the southern portion of Bolderaja, at another antiaircraft battery east of Velnezers and (only one) in Transduna on an open area bounded by Kandavas, Zolitudes, Sampetera, and Kalnciema Streets.

3. From the above account, we assume that C ____ misinterpreted _7 reference to "the man who was sent back" and thought the reference was meant to be TILBURY/1. Conjecture on how this report reached TFFEELING leads to two suppositions: either TILBURY gave or sold it directly to _____ 7 or he gave it to, say, his brother, who passed it on to TPFEELING. To have this report reach the station via three separate channels, all leading back to the same source, TILBURY, raises various questions, and confirms other suppositions. Unfortunately, we don't know precisely how the report reached TPFEELING. Given TILBURY's known channels to two services, KUBARK and TIEBARS, we can assume he would not hesitate to add the head of the Latvian emigration in Sweden as a third customer, even though the report could only have come

from a recent arrival from Latvia, and theoretically TILBURY is aware of the security problem of giving such a report to the emigration. Further and more detailed comments on this aspect of the problem will be forwarded after TILBURY/ \subset \Box meeting.

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4. J proposes to sound out TILBURY on just who did receive the TILBURY/1 reports. at his next meeting. J requests an early headquarters reply to the request contained in paragraph 3 of OSSA-5456 of 18 December, i.e. whether or not a worthwhile check can be made of the TILBURY copies of the TILBURY/1 reports to determine that more than one copy has been made.
