Swearing in of Newly Elected Senators: The following 33 Senators, elected in November 1960 for the term expiring in 1967, were sworn in: Senators Allott, Anderson, Bartlett, Boggs, Bridges, Case (New Jersey), Cooper, Curtis, Douglas, Dworshak, Eastland, Ellender, Humphrey, Johnson (Texas), Jordan, Kefauver, Kerr, Long (Missouri), McClellan, McNamara, Metcalf, Miller, Mundt, Neuberger, Pell, Randolph, Robertson, Russell, Saltonstall, Schoeppel, Smith (Maine), Sparkman, and Thurmond.

In addition, Senators Smith (Massachusetts) and Blakley were sworn in to fill vacancies created by the resignations, respectively, of Senators Kennedy and Johnson (Texas), and Senator Hickey was sworn in to fill vacancy created by the death of Senator-elect Thomson.

Hour of meeting: S. Res. 3, setting the hour of 12 o'clock meridian as the hour of daily meeting of the Senate unless otherwise ordered.

Senate Rules: The following three resolutions, providing for amendments to the Senate rules, were submitted, but their consideration was prevented by objections, and the resolutions were then ordered to lie over for 1 day under the rule:

S. Res. 4, to amend rule XXII of the Standing Rules of Senate by permitting cloture on vote of three-fifths (rather than two-thirds) of Senators present and voting (submitted by Senator Anderson);

S. Res. 5, to amend rule XXII of the Standing Rules of Senate by providing that cloture motion signed by the required number of Senators shall be at once stated by presiding officer, 1 hour after Senate meets on 15th calendar day thereafter (as alternative to 1 hour after Senate meets on the following day but one) (submitted by Senator Humphrey); and

S. Res. 6, to amend rule XIX of the Standing Rules of Senate, so that during consideration of matter that has been pending for 7 days or more it shall be in order to offer motion that Senate proceed with consideration of amendments, which motion shall be privileged and decided with not more than 1 hour of debate; if determined in affirmative, then further debate on any amendment thereafter received, and all debate under pending business, shall be germane to subject matter, and all questions as to germaneness shall be determined without debate (submitted by Senator Case of South Dakota).

Election of Speaker: By a vote of 258 to 172, Sam Rayburn, of Texas, was elected Speaker of the House of Representatives over Charles A. Halleck, of Indiana. The Speaker was escorted to the Chair by Representatives Halleck and McCormack.

Representative Vinson administered the oath of office to the Speaker, who subsequently administered the oath to 430 Members-elect en bloc. Representatives-elect Chambers, of the Fifth Congressional District of Indiana; Wickersham, of the Sixth Congressional District of Oklahoma; and Moulder, of the Eleventh Congressional District of Missouri, were requested to stand aside during the en bloc oath administration when objection was raised to their being sworn in.

The House by a record vote of 252 yeas to 166 nays ordered the previous question on H. Res. 1, denying a seat in the House of Representatives to either J. Edward Roush or George O. Chambers from the Fifth Congressional District of Indiana, pending investigation and report by the Committee on House Administration; after which the resolution was adopted by a division vote of 205 yeas to 95 nays.

Subsequently the House adopted H. Res. 2 and 3, which authorized the administration of the oath of office to Representatives-elect Moulder and Wickersham, respectively.
