12 VF launched with 9 VT from VC-88 as direct support group in III Phib. Corps some of action on Okinawa. VF and VT separated by CASCU and VF directed to attack targets of opportunity from target area 8693 north to coastline.

This came area had been thoroughly covered and attacked many times before during the proceeding five days and there was a great dearth of targets. The planes flow low over the ground, just above tree top level, and made an almost minute inspection of the area but still were unable to locate any real targets except the usual caves, some small buts with grass roofs, and a few small buildings. The whole area was thoroughly covered with rocket hits and strafing. Many caves were destroyed and the buildings were burned.

Lieut. ZAREL and his division flow low over the roads to the north and east looking for targets. Lt. ZAREL saw a tank or truck moving along the road on the west side of the Ishikawa Isthmus but before they could strafe it the tank or truck disappeared into a large cave just off the road. The planes strafed into the cave opening but no results were observed.




