Take Power From Glendale **Industries To Keep Those** Of Los Angeles Running!

The California Fruit Growers' exchange and the California Walnut Growers' association join in publishing a large advertisement in a Los Angeles newspaper relative to the alleged shortage of electrical power. In the advertisement appears this: "The Southern California Edison company, which

supplies most of the agriculture of Southern California, has a contract with the city of Los Angeles to supply any current that may be needed by the city in excess of that produced by its own municipal plants. Due to the shortage of current from the city plants, the Edison company is delivering extra current, not ordinarily required, to the city in an amount that equals or exceeds the 25 per cent cut that it has been compelled to make in the current that it is delivering

Now, if the statements in that advertisement are true, and we have no reason to believe the fruit and walnut growers' organizations would not present the truth, it appears that the Edison company is "robbing" territory outside of Los Angeles in order that Los Angeles might be lit up like a Christmas tree. For, the advertisement says that "DUE TO THE SHORTAGE OF CURRENT FROM THE CITY PLANTS, THE EDISON COMPANY IS DELIVERING EXTRA CURRENT, NOT ORDINAR-ILY REQUIRED, TO THE CITY IN AN AMOUNT THAT EQUALS OR EXCEEDS THE 25 PER CENT CUT THAT IT HAS BEEN COMPELLED TO MAKE IN THE CURRENT THAT IT IS DELIVERING TO AGRI-

As the Edison company has told Glendale it must cut its light and power more than 25 per cent, it would seem that this community has been put into the agricultural classification, its industries made to suffer and its business conditions harmed so that Los Angeles may have more

One Los Angeles newspaper of large circulation, in an editorial calling upon the public to use reasonable economy during the summer and there will be power enough,

The city officials should see to it that our industries—the payroll producers-should have necessary power. Glendale's industries are entitled to the same service as those of Los An-

Candidates' Backers Jockey In Race; Favorite Sons Being Eliminated

NEW YORK, June 30 .- The Democratic convention adjourned shortly before 4 o'clock this afternoon, after futilely trying to nominate a candidate for the presidency for nine successive ballots.

The general prediction of deadlock was easily borne out by oday's balloting.

McAdoo Holds Lead
William G. McAdoo maintained a commanding lead over the field for the entire nine ballots but he did not come within one hundred votes of a majority, much less the two-thirds neces-sary to nominate. Governor Smith increased his

strength steadily, from 241 on the first ballot to 278 on the ninth and his managers claimed to be able to run him considerably above this any time they gave

the word.

McAdoo's maximum strength was polled on the eighth and ninth ballots, on both of which he had 444.6 as compared with a strength on the first ballot of 431 1-2.

Favorite Sons Quit Three favorite sons went out of the running during the nine ballots—the first, Governor William E. Sweet of Colorado, on the third ballot; Senator John B. Kendrick of Wyoming, on the fifth, and the third, Senator Woodbridge Ferris of Michigan, on the eighth.

The votes of these states were split between McAdoo, Smith, Underwood and John W. Davis, with the New York governor faring better in the distribution than his rivals.

Still another favorite son was ready to drop when the adjournment until 8 o'clock tonight came -the Kansas delegation deciding to go to McAdoo, as has been generally expected. Unit Rule Stands

Several efforts were made during the balloting to break the unit rule of the McAdoo delegations, principally in Missouri and the Panama canal zone, but each time Senator Thomas J. One of the problems that a great many cities have to deal with is the street that is not properly constructed and durable, and Glendale has more than her share of such roads. A poorly built street is a constant source of irritation to the property holders on the street, to the city council, and to all who have to use the road; and it is a mighty poor advertisement for the city, especially if it is a thoroughfare. As a usual thing shrewd salesmen for road-building-material manufacturers are responsible for these unserviceable streets, but the people in the assessment district and the city council are not without their share of blame.

In the past eleven years it has occurred more than once that as soon as the first steps had been taken in the proceedings to improve some street, the property owners in the assessment district were visited by a representative of a paving-material concern and his smooth talk and his shrewd arguments convinced them of the superiority of his product and the economy that could be effected by its use; and they signed a request for that kind of paving.

When the time came for the letting of the contract and the grade of paving was being considered by the city council an attorney representing this same manufacturer appeared before the council and informed the members that the majority of the

frontage were demanding this type of paving. In a way, the City Council is helpless, for the people are paying for the street, and they are asking for a certain kind of paving. It seems arbitrary for the council to refuse what they ask, and if the council does favor some other grade of paving or some other composition which they think will be more satisfactory and lasting there is a cry of graft.

City Council and property owners should find out what is serviceable and lasting in the way of paving, and even if it is higher priced select something that is standard and reliable. They should not depend upon a glib stranger with an oily tongue who has something to sell.

Brand Boulevard has been paved for about ten years, and other than the mutilation it has undergone in the laying of gas and water pipes it is in as good condition as it ever was. When the paving of Brand was under consideration, Ed Lynch, then Glendale's city engineer, told the people he would give them something satisfactory and permanent. When the work was being done it was thought by some that the matter of inspection, of taking samples and making tests was being carried to extremes, but time has justified Mr. Lynch and the City Council in the way they handled that job.

· Colorado boulevard, which was paved before Brand, was never a satisfactory job. It has been resurfaced and repaired again and again, and now, when the last assessments are being paid for the old paving, there is a new assessment for a new street, and it is whispered that the new paving is a delusion and a snare. And the continuation of this street, Colorado street in Eagle Rock, was never satisfactory; it has been constantly in process of patching and repair for ten years.

The City Council that will stand firm, against the property owners in an assessment district, in their decision against any material or any method of paving that time has not proved to be permanent will win lasting glory in the end. No matter how short the street, cheap paving is never satisfactory or economi-

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



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
