1. The chh. in this land is responsible for the continuance of slavery - she holds the key of abolition if she would use it.
2. Colonization virtually forces men away.  
e.g. Would it not amount to force today to one of us, you may have freedom on condition of going to Botany Bay
3. Slavery trammels all our benevolent institutions - Bible - Foreign Miss - Home - Sabb. Sch. - Tract - Preaching - Press
4. Objections to Colonization as propounded & answered by Dr Hewitt at New Haven, at the meeting of the State Coloniz. Socy May 1834. (over)

(1) Its origin was with slaveholders - no so but with himself, Mills &c

(2) It is a violation of the natural rights of the Africans, which are born in this country to remove them to a land wh is not theirs - so because they go with the own consent.

(3) It is cruel & barbarous to exile them from the native land - Not so, bcc. it is for their interests to go

(4) There is a better way, (in immediate emancipation) of promoting the good of t African & Col. stands in its way - not so, for the Col. Socy is but a handful of men, & every Colonizationist is an abolitionist; & (3) Dr. Fiske slaveholders who were so from principle, in 1816-17 &c opposed it.

Arguments in favor of Colonization  
urged at the same meeting by Gerritt & others.

(1) The old Colonization Society of wh.  
 Moses was the President. (Gerritt)

(2) This scheme a great help to the  
 pilgrims by leaving England  
 Missionary Enterprise (Webster) & colonizing  
 this country confer a great blessing on America, & we were now  
 spreading the light of liberty over Eng<sup>d</sup>, so it will be in this case (Bacon)


(3) The only Scheme that can put a stop

 acts on the defensive (Fiske)


(7) Abolitionists were the Ultra men -


