

Park Street, Bristol, Nov<sup>r</sup> 18 - 1846.

My dear Mr<sup>r</sup> Chapman,

At the risk of wearying you with my letters I address you once more to enclose the few names I promised you respecting the Bristol contributors. They are as you will perceive strictly heads collected to save you any further reference; you will of course make use of any or not just as is most suitable when drawing up the account of the Fair. Only it struck me that if your <sup>limits</sup> ~~limits~~ were to pay a passing compliment to the things of most worth to you, such as I presume the ones specified, are likely to prove, it may be a hint to future donors to substitute them for trumpery. In case you sh<sup>d</sup> only have room to enter a few names, I will underline those most deserving of notice as far as I can recollect them. Enclosed a little notice of Mr. Garrison's departure, & any farther inserted in the Bristol papers, & you will also receive an Inquirer in wh<sup>ch</sup> you will see it copied with an editorial article. We sent a number of copies of this little paragraph to be enclosed in the letter box & also a few of the article on American Slavery extracted from the Christian Examiner; but from an application for the address we have received long subsequently, I fear that collection will not reach you by the present steamer. Mr. Bishop speaks of it as a "chest"; & says the things have attracted much notice & interest in the Town, I hope they will reach you in time for the Fair. There is also enclosed in that box a set of astronomical diagrams wh<sup>ch</sup> were out of print when we were disposing of our money donations, but wh<sup>ch</sup> have just been republished; I tried in vain to procure them before, & gladly laid out 2/ of our remaining<sup>ly</sup> on them, for they will be sure to sell from their intrinsic merits besides having probably the charm of novelty. I fear you must have been put to considerable inconvenience even by not receiving the letter wh<sup>ch</sup> I sent to Mr. Garrison, (under the impression that he wd suit Oct. 19.) at the same time, as the box, but are now preserved you have in possession of all the communications from wh<sup>ch</sup> he kindly took charge of, we have been enjoying much in the thought of his being now safely stored to his attached family & friends. I cannot describe to you how all our hearts felt at his departure, but <sup>myself</sup> ~~with~~ you a few lines out of a reply of my <sup>correl.</sup> ~~correl.~~ to a letter from Mr. Wigham of Cambridge, who alluded feelingly to the saying that they who were absent from Liverpool on the occasion of his departure, were present in spirit.
