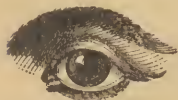

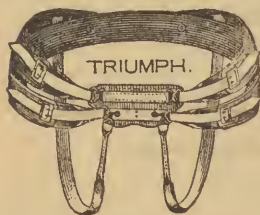

Read at the Commencement Exercises, Hershey Music Hall, Feb. 22, '77.

MR. PRESIDENT:

In making the seventeenth Annual Report of the Hahnemann Medical College and Hospital, I have the honor and the pleasure to submit the following facts: The Winter term of instruction, which closed yesterday, has been in all respects the most successful and satisfactory that has ever been given in this institution. For the first time in years the members of the Faculty have been in entire accord among themselves, and in sympathy with the best interests of the College and the Class. Only three lecture appointments have been missed during the session. For the first time in the history of the College, and without exception, the *clinics* have always been held at the stated hours. The clinical material has been more abundant, the quality of the instruction more thorough and practical, and the number of surgical cases treated, and of operations performed in the hospital amphitheatre much greater than ever before. 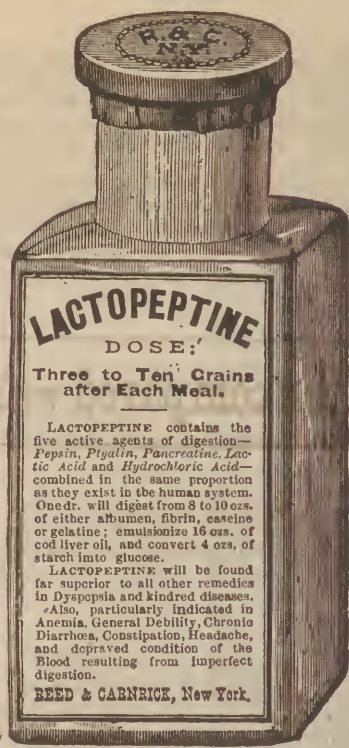

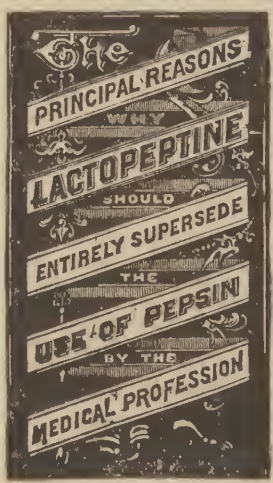
