Shorthand minutes of the 5th Budget Committee Meeting in the
House of Representatives, the 76th Session of the Imperial Diet

The Morning

Opened at 10:00 a.m., Thur., 26 (Sunday), the 16th year of
Showa (1941)

Committeeman SAKUDA: "The Education Minister's reply just now is
a little too hard to make out, so I will repeat my statement.

It is of course important to establish the wartime organization,
but the most important thing under the present critical situation
is that the whole nation should grasp the basic national idea,
namely, the spirit of the Empire Foundation so often referred to --
the idea of making the whole world one family. (TN: NAIKO ICCHU)
against this no one will make any objection. The question is what
is the best way to make the foregoing spirit permeate our people.

When seen externally, there is a question as to the trend
Japan's ideal foundation should assume in the Far Eastern Co-
prosperity sphere.

It is not necessary for me to dwell upon the fact that
China has 5,000 years history and its own racial customs and
manners.

Speaking of the so-called Far Eastern Co-prosperity sphere,
there are still many other countries to the South of China, which
differ in customs, manners, thought and all other respects from
each other. We must initiate them into the spirit of the Japanese
Imperial Way whose virtue will shine over and shelter the whole

Far Eastern Co-prosperity sphere.

We are day and night deeply moved and thankful from the bottom of our hearts to our soldiers who have been making strenuous efforts in China for these three and a half years. In order to make significant what our soldiers have achieved, we must by all means win the hearts of the 400 million Chinese people.

It is imperative that we win men's hearts. It has already been proved to-day that we cannot win the hearts of the 400 million Chinese populace by literally translating and enforcing Japanese laws and regulations and by such attempts as were criticised at the first stage in Manchuria.. However it is also clear that such a lofty phrase as 'making the whole world as one family' will be of no avail in itself. This is something we must consider. "Friendly neighbour" policy, common defence against Comintern and economic cooperation--- these may be favorable as means or results of emancipating the Oriental races from European oppression or creating a greater sphere of co-existence and prosperity, based on the moral principles by driving away European and American capitalism and communism. In addition to them, should we not draw up some guiding principle? I admit that words fail to express what I think,, but after all I think that we must have a spiritual fundamental philosophy in establishing the Far Eastern co-prosperity sphere. I should like to ask if you are ready to make some comment.

(The Foreign Minister will answer your question.)
State Minister MASUDA: I will answer your question.

I admit the truth of your statement that such matters as the fundamental principle of our national policy or 'making the whole world one family' should not end in empty words.

I believe that education must be reformed so as to practise 'making the whole world one family' and the fundamental principle of the national policy the realisation of those principles. I should think that the fundamental idea of including and guiding the oriental peoples cannot be found in any other way than that. I believe it does without saying that no one can lead the peoples whose phases of culture appear similar, but are, in fact, different, unless he is able to realise and practise the fundamental idea of 'making the whole world one family'. How to make the practice of it lies only in fostering righteousness within oneself that is shown also on the same occasion in the Imperial Rescript at the Empire foundation. It is not necessary for me to explain the fact that mere talking of 'making the whole world as one family' is of no practical avail if one does not cultivate righteousness within himself.

The reform of education is to enable one to practise righteousness which one fosters within oneself in the various spheres of activity. I believe that, if one can practise this, the spirit of 'making the whole world as one family' can be fulfilled in various fields. I am promoting educational reforms and development of science toward the fundamental principles of making one grasp in practise what the knowledge given in education has often left isolated from life.
