At 12:00 Noon you will be escorted from the East Room at the conclusion of your press conference back to the Portico outside your office.

Senators Hugh Scott, Richard Schweiker, Mr. Paul Kleiman, Chairman of PAL and Mr. John M. Elliott, Chairman of the Visit Committee, will greet you at the steps leading into the Rose Garden. You and your party will then descend into the Garden and you will greet and shake hands with approximately 125 students and eight policemen assembled there.

When you have met all the students, you and your party will return to a point at the middle of the line of students.

Mr. Kleiman will first present you with a life membership card to PAL and then two students will present you with scrolls containing 300,000 signatures of Philadelphia students from over 500 public and parochial schools participating in the PAL respect for law program.

WE, THE UNDERSIGNED, DO HEREBY AFFIRM OUR DEDICATION TO UPHOLDING LAW AND ORDER AND PROMISE TO FOLLOW THE PRECEPTS SET FORTH IN THE POLICE ATHLETIC LEAGUE PLEDGE, WHICH READS:

"I PLEDGE TO LEARN AND PRACTICE THE RULES OF FAIR PLAY, TO RESPECT THE RIGHTS OF OTHERS, TO OBEY THE LAWS OF OUR CITY, STATE AND COUNTRY, TO BE A CREDIT TO MY FAMILY, FRIENDS, AND MYSELF, TO BE A LEADER FOR THE GOOD THINGS OF LIFE AND THEREBY PREPARE MYSELF FOR THE TASK OF ADULTHOOD.

The dress is black tie with long dresses for the ladies.

After the photographs you will proceed to the carpet in the Grand Hall and pause facing the East Room. Ruffles and Flourishes will be played by the Marine Band and you and your party will be announced. As "Hail to the Chief" is played you will move into the East Room and to your right forming a receiving line in front of the prepositioned Color Guard with your back to the west wall.

# THE PRESIDENT:

Your guests will be presented to you by a social aide. When the receiving line is nearly completed, the social aides will begin to guide your guests out of the East Room and through the Green Room and Grand Hall to their places in the State Dining Room. THE PRESIDENT:

At 1:25 p.m. you will board your helicopter at Camp David and fly to Martinsburg, West Virginia, arriving at 1:42 p.m. There you will be joined by the First Lady. You will then transfer to Air Force I arriving at Norfolk Municipal Airport at 2:30 p.m.

You and Mrs. Nixon will depart the airport by motorcade arriving at the Azalea Gardens at approximately 2:35 p.m. The motorcade will stop first to allow Mrs. Nixon to be escorted to her place in the VIP section and then will proceed a short distance to a point behind the stage which will be hidden from public view. You will join Miss Tricia Nixon and her attendants at this time.

At approximately 2:45 p.m. Ruffles and Flourishes and "Hail to the Chief" will be played. This signals the entrance of the Queen and her Court. You will be to your daughter's left and her escort, Lt. Robert Nichol, USN, will be to her right.

You enter by climbing several steps and then proceed to the raised platform maintaining the same positions.

The National Anthem will be played and at its conclusion you will pause while the Color Guard takes up position behind you. An announcer will then announce that you will crown the Queen. At this point you should ask the crown bearer, Miss Dana Dawson, for the crown. She will be directly in front of you and will turn around to present you with it.

# THE PRESIDENT:

You will step back slightly and pause briefly with the crown suspended over Miss Nixon's head to provide a photographic opportunity. You will then crown your daughter.

After the crowning everyone remains standing while the Mayor of Norfolk, Roy B. Martin, presents your daughter with the city mace. He will then deliver brief remarks. Miss Nixon will speak next followed by you.

Suggested remarks have been prepared for your use.

There will be full press coverage.

### BACKGROUND:

- The International Azalea Festival is sponsored by the Norfolk Chamber of Commerce in cooperation with the City of Norfolk as a tribute to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.
- The Festival was conceived in 1954 and your daughter is Queen Azalea XVI
- --- Each year's Azalea Queen is chosen from the ranks of young women whose fathers are prominent government or military leaders, and her selection is a tribute to her charm, poise and personality. She is attended by 14 International Azalea Princesses similarly selected.

THE PRESIDENT:

At the conclusion of your remarks the music will start and you will take your daughter's arm and promenade to the right. Miss Nixon's escort remains behind. When you reach the end of the line of Princesses, you will be met by Colonel Coffey who will escort you to the VIP section where you will be seated with Mrs. Nixon for the balance of the ceremony. Your daughter remains behind on the stage.

A social aide will then present your after dinner guests to you as they are guided out of the Blue Room and into the East Room.
