SIZE OF PLANTS.

Dealers generally offer "divisions." Divisions are sections cut from an old plant having a piece of root with two to five eyes or buds. These divisions may be of good weight, a weight known as "standard" by the trade, or they may be very small and weak. A one year plant is a division which has been cultivated one year. It is readily seen that a heavy standard division may have more energy and value than a very small division which has been cultivated one year. So we list two sizes of plants. First Size. A well rooted one-year plant, grown from a standard division or strong division of super-standard size. These may bloom the first season, but it is not generally expected.

Second Size is a much heavier plant, usually a division which has been cultivated two or three years and shows two or more bloomstalks of the previous May or a very heavy division from an older plant with two or more bloom stalks and equal in energy to a strong two-year plant. While we do not guarantee these Second Size plants to bloom the first year, yet as a matter of fact they generally do and our customers express the greatest satisfaction over the quick results obtained from heavier plants.

ONE EYED PLANTS.

We now come to one of the curiosities of peony culture. There is a long list of super-fancy varieties listed at from \$6.00 to \$30.00 each, which generally have been tested only in the Eastern states. Most of them are wholly unproven in the great middle west and the problem of many growers is to unload these stocks of rainbow stuff. We have been for years advocating heavy divisions and plants as small divisions and weak plants have a hard pull for a year or two in our dry Middle West. If a peony starts off strong and joyfully the first season it is pretty sure to be a delight. But if it wavers at the start it is apt to become a sickly plant. One of these "one-eyed" dealers has either a conscience or he is trying to hedge against failures of "one-eyed" divisions. He says in his circular, "The roots are split lengthwise with a knife. No guaranty is given that they will grow. You must not expect mature plants under three years. Amateurs should leave them alone. They are for those who know the game. Only for fans." This man is fair and open and does not want to take money under false pretenses. These are some of the prices quoted for "one-eyed divisions." Cherry Hill \$10.00, Grace Loomis \$10.00, Le Cygne \$10.00, Mary Woodbury Shaylor \$15.00, Philippe Revoire \$9.00, Raoul Dessert \$6.00. These prices are, mind you, for "one-eyed divisions."

We do not sell one-eyed divisions.

EQUIPMENT.

If you are going to be a peony fan, be an intelligent one. The best thing to do is to join the American Peony Society so as to get not only their current bulletins but especially bulletins Nos. 259, 278 and 306 published as result of join labors of the Society and Cornell University. If you think you can't afford to join the society, at least get Bertrand H. Farr's "Hardy Plant Specialties," one of the best hand books of the peony and iris ever published.

Right here we want to lift our hat to Mr. Farr. After an experience with him in correspondence and as a customer for ten years we are inclined to give him a greater credit for the very high place that the peony and iris today hold in American Horti-

ticulture than to all other growers and dealers combined.

As soon as we got the three bulletins mentioned we considered them our Bible and Farr's "Hardy Plant Specialties" our Prayer Book. After studying the Bible to find out what we wanted then we would open the Prayer Book and pray that we might find money enough to buy what we most desired. And how modest were the prices in those days!

PEONY CLASSES.

Peonies are of different forms. Single, like a wild rose. Semi-double, several rows of petals mixed with stamens. Japanse, whether it came from Japan or not, wide guard petals like a single peony with stamens greatly enlarged and tipped yellow without pollen. Anemone has a row of petals outside with center filled with sharp narrow petals. Crown, when wide center petals form a Crown. Bomb when the center is a high round ball. Simi-rose, a loosely built flower of rose form, showing stamens and Rose, which is rose shaped but showing no stemens.

TERMS

Preferably cash with order. Reasonable credit, however, will be extended on application to persons owning their gardens and homes.

All plants, including collections, delivered free by parcel post.

10 per cent discount given on all sales aggregating \$10.00 or over, including iris purchases if order is accompanied by cash.

PLANTING.

If the soil is stiff clay or poor, work in some black surface earth, but don't put

any manure or fertilizer near the plant at time of planting.

Spade the ground wide and deep for each plant, and don't plant so that the eyes or buds will be more than two inches below the natural level of the soil. If planting a single row border, plant 2½ to 3 feet apart; in the garden not less than three feet each way. Plant any time from September to freezing weather.

CULTIVATION.

Cultivate as you would cultivate corn or a young tree.

We have made three rough divisions of peonies. The first list is limited largely to

that is, old well tested varieties suitable for this climate which are strong growers, free bloomers and of moderate prices. These are generally priced in both sizes.

Next comes a list mostly made up of

NEWER AND UNUSUAL SORTS.

This is a long list priced only in the first sizes.

FINALLY, THE 3RD LIST.

DESCRIBED ONLY IN THE BULLETINS.

This is a long list, named and priced for First Size only but for description reference is made to the above mentioned Bulletins, Nos. 259, 278 and 306, which most peony fans possess, where they are all fully described. Nearly all of the first and second lists are also described in the Bulletins and at least 95 per cent of all peonies so described in all the lists are recommended as good and worth while by the American Peony Society.
