EL CLUB VESPERTINO ORGANIZED

El Club Vespertino, the new FCA advanced Spanish conversation club held its second meeting in Room 1345-E Wednesday evening, January 24. The club plans to meet twice a month in order to chat in Spanish, play and sing Spanish songs and to play phonograph records of Spanish songs and conversation.

It is the aim of El Club Vespertino to increase the vocabularies of its members and to perfect their conversational ability. Each time a member speaks English, a fine of five cents is imposed. If the club attains its goal, very few fines will enrich its treasury. The club will aid its members in furthering their knowledge of the language, literature, and life of Latin-Americans through the showing of motion pictures in Spanish. The officers of the club are:

Of interest to members of El Club Vespertino, and other friends of the Spanish language, should be a movie, "Asi' Se Quiere en Jalisco," at the Kimo Theater, 3319 Main Street, Tuesday and Wednesday, February 6 and 7, at 7 p.m. and 9 p.m. If sufficient interest is shown, there will be motion pictures in Spanish each week.

The Club now has seven members who are eligible because of their ability to converse in Spanish. Mrs. Bernice Gonzales, an American who has lived in South America a number of years, and Mrs. Maria Brady, a Mexican, have consented to be patronesses of the Club. Rules and regulations of the Club have been approved, and based on these regulations the by-laws, in Spanish, are being formulated.
