Lieutenant R.H. BENSON, division leader and executive officer of Fighting Squadron TWELVE, intercepted a ZEKE approaching Task Force 58 at a point approximately six miles northeast of Task Group 58.3. Flying at an altitude of 4000 feet he spotted the bogey approaching our forces at three o'clock level. Lt. BENSON closed and fired around to the six o'clock position, level. The Zeke burst into flames, went into a twenty-degree <sup>slide</sup> ~~dive~~, and continued into the water. It was carrying either a belly-tank or a bomb; inasmuch as no explosion occurred it is presumed that the object was a belly-tank.

This action took place while Task Force 58 was under a concerted attack by enemy aircraft.
