It is said that Sir John Lawrence and his colleagues wish to keep the Government in Calcutta, because they think that the time has come for extending the influence and the power of the English inhabitants of the great cities. We can but trust that there is good foundation for this rumoured change in the policy of the Indian Government. The unoffi-cial Anglo-Indians in India have been deliberately and systematically written down by the practised pens of Civil Servants both in this country and at home; and a prejudice has been excited against them such as Englishmen are always ready against them such as Englishmen are always ready to conceive against any of their countrymen who are represented as the oppressors of a subject race. No men have ever been more shamefully calumniated. The English merchants and professional men in India are the only Englishmen who habitually meet the natives on equal terms; and whatever of self-respect, independence, and public spirit now exists among the natives of the large towns of India owes its origin not to the patronage of the Civil Service, but to the example of the interlopers. Yet these English merchants, who do more to maintain the prosperity of the empire and to make the people of the country familiar with English ways and habits of thought, than all the youthful Proconsuls who pride themselves on governing dis-tricts as large as several English counties, have till lately been refused even the powers that are freely entrusted to the inhabitants of every petty borough in England. We are glad to believe that Sir John Lawrence sees

the wisdom of securing the sympathies and sup-port of such men instead of alienating them from the State by a policy of favouritism and exclusiveness.

"U. B.," I hope, will forgive me for saying that this Calcutta rule is one-sided, to favour the famliy of a deceased friend, if he has one. It is subversive of all sound principle and jus-tice, our motto being "You cannot win if you cannot lose;" and it is a singular proof that a rule which may be tolerated in small racing community could not exist if applied to a national scale. "U. B.," upposes the case of a nominator of ten horses in the Derby, two of which turn out well. # HEADS OF INTELLIGENCE.

(From the Home News, April 11.)

Her Majesty held a Court on the 9th of April. Mr. Stansfeld has resigned his appointment as Junior Lord of the Admiralty. The office has been offered to Mr. Chichester Fortescue.

All the Powers who signed the treaty of 1852 have agreed to the Conference on Danish affairs, without armistice or basis. The Holstein Estates have protested against any decision imparing the rights of the Ipuchies. The Conference is to meet in London on April 20.

The Danish pelnipotentiaries have already arrived.

The Prusspans have bombarded the town of Sonderborg swithout warning, killed many of the innabitants, and destroyed a large amount of property. This outrage has been severely con-demned in both Houses of the English Parliament.

Garibaldi made his public entry into London this day April 11, accompnied by a vast procession. He takes up his residence with the Duke of Sutherland, who has invited an assembly of the heads of all political parties to meet him in a few nights.

The Court of Common Council has resolved to. present the freedom of the city of London to Garibaldi. Similar honours will be conferred upon him in Manchester, Birmingham, and other large towns. He has had long interviews with Mazzini and Karl Blind.

The Earl of Clarendon has been nominated on a private mission to Paris.

The bombardment has been continued with great violence. Garibldi has visited Lord Palmerston, Earl Russell, and many other persons, and been everywhere received with enthusiasm. He has

accepted an invitation to a dejeuner at the Reform The Federal Diet have resolved to send a

plenipotentiary to the Conference, and appointed Baron von Beust their representative.

The preliminary meeting of the members of the Conference will take place in London, on April 20. France and England have agreed to propose an armistice.

The Danish plenipotentaries are instructed to refuse assent to a union of the two Duchies.

Austria is opposed to an appeal to universal suffrage in the Duchies. Prussia is willing to accept the decision of the Estates.

A reception by the Queen, that was to have taken place at Buckingham palace, has been postponed, in consequence of her Majesty's indisposition.

The 18th Hussars are under orders for India. A motion by Lord R. Cecil condemning the mutilation of the reports of the Inspectors of Schools by the Committee of Council has been carried against Government by a majority of 101 against 93. In consequence of this vote, Mr. Lowe has resigned.

Mr. Chichester Fortescue has resigned the Under-Secretaryship of the Colonies, and is expected to succeed Mr. Lowe.

Lord Dufferin and Lord Wodehouse are spoken of for the vacant Under-Secretaryship of the Colonies.

The office of Junior Lord of the Admiralty has been declined by Mr. Baxter, and accepted by Mr. Childers, member for Pontefract.

The Federal House of Representatives have adopted a resolution against recognising 8 monarchy in Mexico.

Colonel Sykes has been elected chairman of the East India Company for the ensuing year. An immense quantity of cotton has arrived at Liverpool from India and China.

Mr. Horsman has given notice of a motion that no new engagement should be entered into, at the approaching Conference without being previously made known to Parliament.

Mr. Fenwick, Liberal, has been elected for Lancaster.

The Confederate General Forrest has made a successful raid into Kentucky. General Grant is expected to reappoint M'Clellan to a command. President Lincoln has issued a proclamation of amnesty with limitations.

Mr. Locke King's Bill for reducing the County Franchise to £10 has been thrown out in the Commons.

A public meeting has been held in London to thank Sir Moses Montefiore for his efforts to enfranchise the Jews in Morocco.

A motion for postponing the reduction of the sugar duties till the reduction of the malt duty

The Confederates are constructing strong fortifications at the Orange and Alexandria Railway crossing of the Rapidan.

The Federals at Somerville, Tennessee, were defeated by the Confederates under M'Cullough on March 30, and lost three officers and 75 men killed and wounded.

Memphis despatches to the 2nd April report that Forrest had returned to Jackson, Tennessee. St. Louis telegrams of the 5th state that the Confederates in Mississippi are re-occupying their old lines on Big Black and Yazoo Rivers.

Mr. Seward has sent to the Congressional Committee on Immigration the outline of a bill which provides for the advance of passage money to emigrants to America as a loan, to be afterwards repaid by their labour. The bill authorises the naturalisation of foreigners after one year's residence.

The House of Representatives on the 4th of April unanimously adopted a resolution by Mr. Winter Davis declaring that the United States would never recognise or tolerate a monarchy in Mexico.

## THE POLISH INSURRECTION.

An imperial decree was published at Warsaw yesterday ordering the issue by the Credit Institution of Landed Proprietors of duplicates of the bonds which have been purloined from the public treasury in Warsaw. An imperial ukase had also been issued withdrawing the administration of the diocess at Warsaw from Monsignore Felinski.

It is asserted that the Russian government is making preparations for the secularisation of the convents, and intends taking measures against the Catholic clergy.

LETTER OF THE FRENCH EMPEROR TO M. FOULD.

# Paris, April 18.

The emperor has addressed the following letter, dated the 15th April, to the Minister of Finance :-

The happy solution of the Mexican affair creates in me a desire to see the country profit by the first repayment of the expenses of the war by diminishing the taxes on landed property. Be good enough therefore to see if it be not possible to effect the immediate suppression of the second decime registration fee, only preserving of the general law prepared by the Council of State those arrangements which may be strictly necessary for balancing the Budget. This measure, together with the hopes of peace which every day become more certain, will contribute, I trust, to the development of public prosperity.

# LATEST INTELLIGENCE.

THE SCHLESWIG-HOSTEIN QUESTION .-THE WAR IN SCHLESWIG.

The bombardment of Duppel and of the Danish positions on the Island of Alsen was resumed with increased vigour on the night of April 14, and continued up to daybreak. Several farms were set fire to on the Island. On the following night the bombardment was renewed, but with less effect; and on the 16th the Prussians took possession of some of the Danish rifle pits.

The formation of new insurrectionary Polish bands, and more sangunary conflicts with the Russians, have been announced. Two ladies of rank have been arrested in Cracow for forming societies to nurse the sick and wounded.

Venetia has been placed in a state of siege. Warlike preparations are going forward both in Austria and Italy.

The election of the first chamber of the Danish Parliament has taken place. A majority of the members are favourable to the maintenance of the integrity of the kingdom.

Austria and Prussia, it is said, will demand at the Conference the union of the Duchies with Germany.

M. Drouyn de Lhuys has circulated a despatch explaining that France suggests an appeal to the opinions of the people of the Duchies, only in the event of the treaty being abandoned by the Conference.

The Confederates are said to be re-arming Fort Sumter. Beauregard has been appointed commander of the army of the South-West. The Confederates are preparing to invade Kentucky. The Federals have occupied Alexandria, upon the Red River. Gold was at 688 in New York.

The Archduke Maximilian formally accepted the Mexican Crown on the 10th of April.

The Dalmatian Diet has been dissolved on account of party intrigues.

A correspondent of the 'Times' of this morning, who signs himself "Cavalier," puts very clearly the case of the officers of the Indian army, who Sir Charles Wood declared on Tuesday last were better treated in the matter of the reduced regiments than those of the English army would have been in a like case, for that the latter would have been put on half-pay, whereas the former had had their pay and promotion up to the rank of general continued to them :---

An officer, says "Cavalier," put upon half-pay can live where he pleases, and he does not lose the value of his commission. But the officer of an Indian reduced regiment, to have " his pay and promotion up to general continued," must live in India, and live there an idle man, a penance in that country well nigh insupportable. His regiment being non-existent, the £2000 or£3000 which as a captain or a major his commission was always worth to him, is utterly lost. What many of these officers say is this :-- " Our former regiments have vanished, there are no others to appoint us to. We know that this is an unavoidable state of affairs; we don't blame Government for it, but here we are, turned adrift, of no use to anybody, and obliged to remain in India. Dissolve this unprofitable connection. Give the value of our commissions that we have sustained, pension us off, or put us on half-pay, and let us go.'

The writer suggests that if Sir Charles Wood would give unemployed and useless officers the option of retiring, he would not only do an act of justice, but save the State some money. The burden on the revenue of the number of unemployed officers is heavier than any body in England has an idea of.

## AMERICA.

Intelligence from New York to April 6 has been received. The military news is devoid of all interest. Heavy rains had interfered with military operations in Virginia, and no movement of importance had taken place in the South

West. General Sheridan has been ordered to the command of the cavalry of the army of the Potomac,

we learn from Gravenstein, by a the ram dated on the evening of yesterday, April 17, that two Prussian officers effected a landing with 16 men on the Island of Alsen in the course of the forenoon. They drove away some Danish soldiers, and spiked the two guns of a Danish battery. Large masses of Danes being then observed issuing from the adjoining wood, the Prussians withdrew to their positions without loss, carrying away with them all the war material and ammunition.

A letter from Copenhagen in the 'National Gazette' of Berlin states that the Danish infantry is to be again increased by 6500 men from the enrolment of those whom the drawings had exempted in 1857 and 1858. Those men, all of whom are from 30 to 35 years of age, are to join their corps as soon as possible. In consequence of this resolution four new schools of drill have been formed one at Copenhagen for 3,000 men; another at Odensee, for 1200; a third at Nyborg, for 700; and a fourth at the Castle of Kronborg, near Elsinore, for the same number. The Danebrog iron-clad is to accompany the

line-of-battle ship Frederic VI. into the German Ocean. These two vessels are intended to combat the Austrian squadron which left Lisbon about a fornight since. The Frederic VI. carries 84 guns and sails remarkably well, but she is not iron-clad. The Danebrog is the most formidable vessel in the Danish navy; she carries two 140pounder Armstrong guns and 10 60-pounder rifled cannon.

### THE CONFERENCE.

'La France' states that France and England are agreed upon the principal points of the Conference, and that the two Powers will propose an armistice at the opening of the sittings. 'La Presse' says :-

It is asserted that the interview between the emperor and Lord Clarendon was of an essentially reassuring character for the peace of Europe, and that it is not impossible that considerable reductions may be made in the naval estimates of the Budgets of both countries. The debate on the Budget in the Corps Legislatif has been postponed to the 25th April, it having been supposed that an event might happen which would enable M. Fould to modify his financial plans.

The Vienna 'Abend Post,' an official journal. observes :--

The two great German Powers consider substantial and permanent guarantees as an indispensable condition for the welfare of the Duchies. and as the basis of any resolutions to be taken by the Conference. The leading points of these guarantees can only be-"The inseparability of the Duchies, their occupying towards Germany the position of protected States, and finally their administrative and political independence. The representatives of the German Powers will not, deviate from these points."

Baron von Beust had a long conference on April 16 with the deputation from the Holstein Estates, which had arrived at Dresden. The deputation was composed of Herr Reinke, merchant, Herren Probst and Versmann, and Professor Behn. "Baron von Beust was expected to leave Dresdon for London to-day, March 18. He will pass through Frankfort.
