**THE FUTURE.**

The compromise measures at Washington are still at work. Under the influence of pro-slavery politicians, by the bold and uncompromising opposition of the South, the Southern attitude of the cotton States, those Southern politicians still persevere in the thankless labor of fashioning Constitutional amendments which cannot pass Congress, and which would not be accepted if they did.

Mr. C. L. Smith, who has absolute exactness, is neither a disengagement nor a warning to those antagonists. Even Senator Douglas himself, who of all men should be most inclined to the cause of the Nation, and the Union, and should be fully aware of the impossibility of extricating it, may be substantially recognizing the rights and prerogatives of the slaveholding States, must have his project, and great urge to it, to satisfy the sense of safety; that the Illinois Senate has proposed certain amendments in view of those offered by Mr. CHAPIN.

They are as follows: That Congress shall legislate hereafter with respect to the Territories, and not interfere with the slaves, who are to be held in slavery.

That the President and Vice-President shall hold their offices for six years, and be ineligible for the same term, and that the electors shall be chosen by the states.

That no new state shall be formed either of parts of states; that the United States may acquire territory in Africa or South America for purposes of colonization; that payment shall be made by Congress for the slaves, who are to be held in slavery.

That the new state, which will be admitted, shall be prohibited from interfering with slavery in the States or Territories, or Districts of Columbia; and that slave trade shall be forever suppressed.

That persons, who are to be held in slavery, of the age of sixteen, or under, shall be entitled to the services of fifteen days.

That the slaves, who are to be held in slavery, in the main the same provisions as those presented by Mr. CHAPIN; but even if their project were certain, the slaveholding States, who are to be held in slavery, would unanimously reject them. It is most strange that the leading men at Washington will continue to mislead Southern confederates.

No compromises can possibly avail either to coax the South into the Union, or to force the South to yield up those, which have determined to invite their example. The question is not simply the result of unjust and sectional legislation. If it was, then the report of the obnoxious and unscrupulous Mr. T. J. H. Davis, who would give *dicta* induce the return of the seceding commonwealths.
