# MANY KILLED AND INJURED

### VICTIMS OF FOURTH OF JULY CELEBRATIONS

Death Roll Continues to Grow Statistics -Fire Crackers Responsible for Number of Deaths

Philadelphia, Pa., July 5.-A recapitu-

of Independence Day in Philadelphia was made to-day, and showed that it 311,084 immigrants or over 100,000 greater than the Immediate previous as near an "old-fashioned Fourth" anyone would want it. It was the ottest Fourth of July in thirteen years, and there were eleven deaths from the heat and many prostrations. Twelve persons were drowned in the rivers and creeks in and about Philadelphia while bathing. There were two murders, several attempted murders and numerous brawls, and about 300 persons were treated at hospitals for injuries received in handling fireworks. Among the injured are some serious cases, but no deaths are expected unless totanus foilows.

Pittsburg's Casualties.

Pittsburg, Pa., July 5.—Three dead Killed While Pursuing Pickpocket, and forty-five injured, six of whom may Murderer and Fugitive Escape. die, is the casualty tist in connection with the Fourth of July celebration here. Of the dead two were children, who were burned in firecracker accidents, while T. M. Kennedy, aged 55, was struck in the head by a spent bullet and killed. There were three other accidents due to spent bullets. An undertified woman was struck by a stray bullet while in a summer care, and her condition is critical at a hospital. The fire loss is estimated at \$30,000.

Murphy's left foot was blown off and the cannon rammer pierced his left sing. Corrigan lost two fingers and sustained internal injuries.


CROWN ATTORNEY DEAD.

Cooler Weather Predicted for Middle Western States-More Deaths Reported

Washington, July 5.—Refreshing westerly breezes, sweeping along the Atlantic coast to-day, brought some relief to the hot wave in the eastern section of the country, though the government weather experts say there is no appreciable change in the registered temperatures. istered temperatures.

Cooler, weather to-morrow is pro-mised for Chicago and the Middle West region, although to-day started with the mercury even higher than it was at the same time yesterday. Breaks in the torrid spell are being

reported from the extreme northwest, having a change to considerably coeler weather with temperatures dropping below the seasonable average. The weather bureau predicts that the change to cooler weather will spread over the middle and poeth later see change to cooler weather will spread over the middle and north plains sec-tions and the upper Mississippi Valley within the next 36 or 48 hours, bring-ing material and much needed relief. 





This has the same form as that found in some of the very earliest churches in Rome, and in Sant'Apollinare in Classe in Ravenna. The confession and the nave have been decorated with marble and paintings of the cighth century, and several classic arophagi also came to light.
