LIGHT HOUSES.

Hon. Peter Mitchell, Minister of Marine and Fisheries. G. Washington Smith, Manager.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain White Light, elevated about eighty feet above high water mark, and may be seen on approaching the island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Bleach Rock*, lies about 2½ miles S. by W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof—a plain white light.

Digby Gut Light.—The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia, is placed on the West side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold, and not indented; the light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin—a white light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands, on Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a light of the Fourth order, Heliophotal system—fixed white light 45 seconds, eclipse 5½ flash 4½, eclipse 5½. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

Bearings and Distances by Compass from the Gannet Rock Light House.
This Light bears from the Light House on Brier Island, N. N. W. 4 W. 23 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor, E. 1 S. distance 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, W. and by N., $\frac{1}{2}$ N., 12 miles.

NOTE.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extends Westward from the Light House about four miles from this range, farther Westward, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker, called the Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the E. W. end of Grand Maan, open.

From Biler Island Light to the Old Proprietor, N. and by W., $\frac{1}{2}$ W., 18 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

The Blonde Rock from the Southernmost point of the Cape Sable Seal Islands S. and by W., $\frac{3}{4}$ miles distant.

Machias Seal Island Lights.—There are two fixed white lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast (British or American.) Both the buildings are painted white. The following are the bearings from them, viz:

- To the Southernmost Murr Ledge (St. Murr's) E. S. E. easterly
- Gannet Rock Light, E. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., 13 miles.
- Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N., N. by N. distant
- Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.
- N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.
- Little River Head, N. by W.
- Libby Island Light House (American), N. W. by W.

Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these lights in one, as they will not then be more than three-fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the Lights.

[It is recommended that the Ships' Compasses should be well compared and adjusted particularly in new ships, before they leave Partridge Island, as serious errors have frequently occurred from want of attention on this point; and as the variation in the Bay of Fundy is seventeen degrees Westward (of 1/2 points), it will be found by the latest published Admiralty Charts, that the course from Partridge Island down the Bay, South Channel, between the Old Proprietor and N. W. Ledge, is S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S.; but the course to be steered must depend on the direction of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order, after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campobello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed white light. The building is painted white, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Proux Lights.—Upon this projecting head land, two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant 28 feet. Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed, and white. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Island Light.—This Light at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed white light.

and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes. The Steam Whistle on this Island is sounded ten seconds in every minute during foggy or thick weather.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or Bar, which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed *white* light. The house is white and black, in stripes vertically.

Quaco.—A revolving *white* light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red, in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the Point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. A plain *white* light. The house is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide mark.

East Quoddy Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the St Croix by Lubec and Eastport.

Cape Forchu Light.—On Cape Forchu, on the Western side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova Scotia), in lat. 43° 39', N. long. 66° 8' W. It exhibits a plain, revolving light—visible one minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white, and is elevated 235 feet above the level of the sea.

Grindstone Island Light.—An Octagonal Tower, 60 feet above the level of high water on Grindstone Island, in Chignecto Bay, in lat. 45° 43' 13" N. Long. 64° 37' 25" W. The Tower is painted white, as is also the Keeper's House, one story, situate about 50 feet to the Eastward of the Tower.

Bearings and distances of several places from the above Light House are as follows:

Cape Enrage Light, by compass, S. 61½ W., 10 1-7 miles.

Highest Point of St. Mary's Ledge, by compass, N. 40 W., 6-10 mile.

The point of low water off the Light House, by compass, S. 78 W., 2-10 mile.

Jones' Ledge, N. 10 W., 3-10 mile—it dries at low springs, and has about 2½ fathoms on it at half tide.

A Sand Bank, S. 15 W., 6-10 mile; it has 1½ fathoms on its shoalest part at low water springs.

Grand Manan.—There is a Light House and Keeper's house at the "Swallow Tail," on the North Eastern part of the Island of Grand Manan, in the Bay of Fundy. The Light is 45 feet from Base to Deck; the point on which it stands is 108 feet above high water, making 148 feet elevation. This is a conspicuous mark in the South Channel between Briar Island and Grand Manan. Both houses are painted white.

Richibucto Head Light.—This is a fixed White Light, situated on Richibucto Head, Northumberland Strait, in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence. The light is placed at an elevation of 70 feet above high water, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 14 miles. The illuminating

apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the fourth order. The tower is square, about 50 feet high from base to vane, painted white, and stands in lat. $46^{\circ} 39' 40''$ N., long. $64^{\circ} 43' 30''$ W. of Greenwich.

Point Escuminac Light.—This Light House is situated in Miramichi Bay, north latitude $47^{\circ} 4' 30''$; west longitude, $64^{\circ} 50' 30''$. It is a fixed bright light, elevated seventy feet above high water.

Miscou Island Light.—This Light House is situated on Birch Point, north latitude $48^{\circ} 1' 00''$; west longitude, $64^{\circ} 30' 00''$. It is a fixed red light, elevated seventy-nine feet above high water.

Shediac Light.—On Point DuChene Wharf, in the summer, north latitude $46^{\circ} 14' 6''$; west longitude $64^{\circ} 31' 5''$. It is a fixed light.

RATES OF PILOTAGE.

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of St. John—passed 3d August, 1848.

One dollar per foot for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her in a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the wharves; and One dollar per foot for removing or taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of vessels, under and by virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such vessels, the sum of Two Dollars per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British Scamboats or British Vessels, drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing vessels from any mooring ground to any wharf, or from one wharf to another wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding one hundred tons, One dollar and Fifty cents; for vessels over one hundred, and not exceeding two hundred tons, Two Dollars; for vessels over two hundred, and not exceeding three hundred tons, Three Dollars; and for all vessels over three hundred, and not exceeding four hundred tons, the sum of Four Dollars; and twenty-five cents additional for every fifty tons each Vessel may measure over four hundred tons.

First Distance.—From Partridge Island to Musquash Cove Head, bearing North West, One dollar per foot.

Second Distance.—From Musquash Head to Point Le Preau, bearing North West, One dollar and Twenty-five cents per foot.

Third Distance.—From Point Le Preau to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West, or North Channel, bearing South East, One dollar and Fifty cents per foot.

Fourth Distance.—From the North Head of Grand Manan, or North Channel, as aforesaid, to Machias Seal Island, bearing South, or Brier Island, bearing South South East, One dollar and Seventy-five cents per foot.

Fifth Distance.—Any where outside the aforesaid distance, Two dollars per foot.

HARBOUR MASTER'S FEES.

On vessels of 30 and under 50 tons, 2s. 6d.; vessels of 50 and under 75 tons, 3s. 9d.; 75 and under 100 tons, 5s.; 100 and under 150 tons, 6s. 3d.; 150, and under 200 tons, 7s. 6d.; 200, and under 300 tons, 10s.; 300, and under 400 tons, 12s. 6d.; 400 tons and upwards, 15s.; decked vessels under 100 tons, owned and registered at Saint John, and all British vessels under that tonnage, trading within the Bay of Fundy, or arriving from ports to the Northward of Cape Cod, or the Westward of Cape Canso, or from any port in Nova Scotia, to pay annually, as follows: Under 30 tons, 3s. 9d.; over 30, and under 50 tons, 5s.; over 50, and under 75 tons, 6s.; over 75, and under 80 tons, 10s.

The Ferry is leased from the Corporation for the space of ten years from July 10th, 1866, by Mr. John McSweeney. One boat runs at a time, and returns at night to the Eastern side. The boat runs from Ferry Landing, foot of Princess Street, on the east side, to Rodney Slip, Carleton, except at low water, spring tides, when the passengers are landed at Sand Point.

For loading, carrying, and housing any goods, or any other article on any Hand Cart, from the Market Slip, in King's and Queen's Wards, or from any other place within the limits of the first district, to any other place within the said several five districts, the rates of prices are as follow: For the first district, 5c.; second district, 6c.; third district, 6c.; fourth district, 7c.; fifth district, 9c.

FEBRUARY. — It is generally known that Numa Pompilius altered the Roman calendar, by adding two months (January and February) to the year, and also that he assigned twenty-nine days to the latter. Julius Caesar did not make any alteration in the calendar of Numa, but Augustus Caesar subtracted one day from February and added it to his own month of August. Every fourth year an additional or twenty-ninth day was intercalated between the twenty-third and twenty-fourth day of this month, and was uncolled; but how the intercalated day occurs every fourth or leap year, and is placed after the twenty-eighth; it is therefore the twenty-ninth or last day of February. Every leap-year is readily discovered by dividing the year by four; and if there is no remainder, then February contains 29 days, but if there is a remainder, the month only contains twenty-eight days.

MARCH.—This month was named by Romulus, in honor of his supposed father—Mars, the heathen God of War. Until January and February were added to the calendar, the Romans made it the first month of the year, and it was not even reckoned as the third month by the English until 1752. "The Saxons," says Verstegan, "called the month *Rhede Retho-Monath*, to denote its general boisterousness of character, *Rhede* signifying, in their interpretation, *rough* or *rugged*. Many antiquaries contend that, the month having been dedicated to the idol *Rheda* before the conversion of the Saxons to Christianity, the etymology of it thus given is more correct."

APRIL.—Since the time of Numa Pompilius, this month has retained the same place in the calendar that it does now. Romulus assigned thirty days to the month, but Numa reduced it to twenty-nine. Julius Cæsar, however, restored it to its original length, which has not been altered since. The name of the month is derived from the Latin word *Aperto* (to open), and was no doubt bestowed in allusion to the season for the earth opens her bosom, and sends forth her riches, and the young buds open under the influence of April showers.

MAY is the third month of Romulus's year; but the fifth month as reformed by Numa and Julius Cæsar. Romulus assigned thirty-one days to this month; Numa reduced the number to thirty; and Julius Cæsar restored it to its original length, which it now retains. There is some doubt about the origin of the name of this month; because, although the Romans offered sacrifices to Maia, the mother of Mercury, upon the first day of this month, yet it appears very evident that the name was fixed long before the time of Romulus. Among our British and Saxon ancestors this month was hailed as the genial harbinger of approaching summer, and celebrated sometimes with religious observances, and at others amid general festivity.

JUNE.—Divers opinions exist as to the origin of the name of this month. Some derive it from Junius Brutus, who expelled the Tarquins from Rome on the first of this month, and settled the government upon the people; others assert that it is derived from the latin word *juniores*, because it is considered as the month for young persons. The most probable and more generally received opinion is, that it derives its name from the goddess Juno, in honor of whom a festival was celebrated at the commencement of the month. In 1474, on the 30th of this month, the first book printed in England was completed, by Caxton, and was called, "The Game and Play of the Chesse."

JULY.—In the ancient calendar of the Romans, this month was called *Quintilis*, to denote its numerical position—being, in fact, the fifth month of the old Latin year, whereas now it is our seventh. It was sacred to Jupiter, and consisted of thirty-six days, which Romulus reduced to thirty-one, and Numa Pompilius to thirty, but Julius Cæsar restored the day which Numa had taken away from it. In consequence of the alterations made in the calendar by Numa, July became the seventh month in the year, but retained the name of *Quintilis*, until Marc Antony changed its name to Julius, as a compliment to Julius Cæsar, who had done so much to improve the calendar.

August is said to have derived its name from the Roman Emperor, Augustus Cæsar, to whom it was dedicated, in honour of his being created Consul in this month, and having triumphed three times in Rome, subjected Egypt to the Roman power, and put an end to civil wars. It was called *Sextilis*, or the sixth month, in the Alban calendar, in which it had only twenty-eight days assigned to it. Romulus added two days, and Augustus Cæsar a third, which number it has since retained; and from the time that Numa Pompilius revised the calendar, it has continued as the eighth month of the year.

There are said to be two thousand and sixteen millions of pores in the human body.

SEPTEMBER is literally the seventh month of the year, according to the ancient Roman calendar, as established by Romulus, but the ninth of Numa's years. Domitian called it Germanicus. It was also named Antoninus, in honor of Antoninus Plus; and Commodus called it Herculeus; but the name of September, though improper if we consider its place in the number of months, has outlived every other appellation. Originally the month had only sixteen days assigned to it in the old Alban calendar, but they were increased to thirty by Romulus, and to thirty one by Julius Cæsar, while Augustus reduced the number of days to thirty, as they exist at the present time.

OCTOBER was the eighth month of Romulus's year, as the name implies, being derived from *Octo*, eight, and *tember* a shower of rain; but in the calendar of Numa, and Julius Cæsar, it was classed as the tenth month of the calendar, as at the present time. The Senate of Rome gave this month the name of *Faustinus*, in compliment to *Faustina*, the wife of the Emperor Antoninus; and *Domitian* called it after himself; but, in spite of all attempts to alter the name, it has continued to preserve the one originally given by the old Romans. The number of its days, in the time of Romulus, was the same as at present.

As the ninth month, it was derived from the Latin words *novem*, nine, and *imber*, a shower.

Our Saxon ancestors called this month *Blot* Month, or slaughter month, because, as food for the cattle was scarce during the winter season, it was customary for them to kill and salt most of their winter meat during this month. The name is derived from the Saxon word *Blotan* to kill or slay.

DECEMBER. According to the calendar of Romulus, this was the tenth month, as the word implies; but by the Julian calendar it was made the twelfth. Among the Romans this month was devoted to various festivals. On the 5th they kept the Faunalia; on the 17th the Saturnalia; on the 22d the Lararia; and on the last the Juveniles Ludi. The peasants also kept the feast of the goddess Vacuna, after having got in the fruits and sown the corn. During this time all orders of the community were devoted to mirth and festivity. Masters and slaves were all on an equal footing. Friends sent presents to one another, and feasted together at the same table.

Time for going Through the Falls.

The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the flood, and about two and a half on the ebb, so that they are passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

POSTAGE.

All Letters sent to any part of the Dominion and P. E. Island, are liable to a uniform rate of three cents per half ounce, according to the following scale, if prepaid:—

A Letter not exceeding half ounce in weight	\$0 3
A Letter exceeding half ounce, and not exceeding one ounce	6
A Letter exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding one ounce and a half ...	9
A Letter exceeding one ounce and a half, and not exceeding two ounces ...	12
A Letter exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding two ounces and a half ...	15

And so on, adding three cents extra for every additional half ounce. If unpaid, such Letters will be liable to a rate of five cents per half ounce. The same scale of reckoning by half ounces is applicable to Letters to and from the United States, but the rate on such Letters is six cents per half ounce.

On Packet Letters to and from the United Kingdom, the scale of rates is as follows:—

A Letter not exceeding half ounce in weight	\$0 12½
A Letter exceeding half ounce, and not exceeding one ounce	25

And so on—adding 12½ cents for every additional half ounce. In all cases where a Letter is not specially directed to be sent by any particular route, the rate of Postage first mentioned is chargeable. It must also be understood that the rates given in the above Table for places to which the route is through the United Kingdom, are rates "via Halifax," by which route all such correspondence will be sent, if not specially addressed "via United States," or "via New York;" in which case an additional rate of 2½ cents is to be added to the amount given in the Table. Letters from England, via Quebec, are sent every week, when so addressed—the postage being 12½ cents. Letters for British Columbia and Vancouver 10 cents; Red River, 6 cents; in all cases to be prepaid.

It is advisable that all Letters should be prepaid, and by Postage Stamps.

Printed Books and Pamphlets, under 43 ounces in weight, can be forwarded by Post in New Brunswick, at the rate of one cent per ounce; Periodicals, one cent per four ounces.

Transient Newspapers require to be prepaid—two cents each. Newspapers for subscribers do not require to be prepaid, the charge being one cent on delivery; prepayment can be made either at the Office where mailed, or by the subscriber at the Office where delivered, at the following rates: For a paper issued once per week, five cents per quarter; twice, 10 cents; and so on.

Pamphlets, Periodicals, and Books, to pass at the above rates, must be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides or ends.

No words or marks (except the name and address of the person to whom sent), shall be written on any Newspaper, Pamphlet, Book, Periodical, Parliamentary or Government paper.

Any violation of these Regulations will subject such Newspapers, Pamphlets, Periodicals, or Books, &c., to be treated in every respect as Letters.

England, under 4 ounces, 7 cents; 4 ounces and under 8 ounces, 12½ cents; 8 ounces and under 1 lb., 25 cents; 1 lb. and under 1½ lb., 37½ cents; 1½ lb. to 2 lb., 50 cents.

To Newfoundland, same as England.

REGISTRATION.—The system of registration is applicable to all description of letters without distinction, whether they contain articles of value or not. It also applies to parcels. The charge in addition to postage is 2 cents; to England, 5 cents.

PARCELS.—Parcels closed at the ends and sides can be sent by mail throughout the Dominion, at a rate of 12½ cent per half lb. The weight of each parcel is not to exceed 8 lbs., nor the size to exceed 2 feet in length or breadth, and 1 foot in thickness. The parcel must not contain any glass, liquid, or any substance liable to do injury to the mail, under the penalty of a forfeiture of the parcel if discovered. The parcel is not to contain any writing. Registration fee 5 cents. Parcels must be pre-paid by stamps. The sender, by writing his name on the outside, can have the parcel returned in case of failure to reach the person addressed.

POSTAGE STAMPS.—Postage stamps are provided at the respective values of ½, 1, 2, 3, 6, 12½, and 15 cents: all bearing as a device the effigy of Her Majesty.

Patterns and samples are transmitted between the Dominion and the United Kingdom at the same rate as per-book post. The pattern or sample must be open at the end or side, except in case of seeds, drugs, &c.; which can be sent in closed transparent bags.

All Money Orders shall be drawn upon Printed Forms supplied by the Post Office Department; and no Order will be valid or payable unless given upon the regular Printed Forms.

The Commission to be charged upon Money Orders shall be as follows:—
