YOUR HEALTH

TO CURE CASE OF NEURITIS FIRST FIND CAUSE OF IT

Yesterday I told you what neuritis is and how it performs. It is a painful, persistent, exhausting ailment. While it does not impair or change the appearance of the part involved, unless it is very severe, yet it causes loss of sleep and may result in serious impairment of health.

Direct injury of the nerve is another cause for primary neuritis. A blow on a nerve, or the tearing of the nerve from its point of exit...

Pressure of a tumor or injury of the nerve from death of adjacent bony tissues, may cause inflammation of a nerve.

More common than primary neuritis, however, is a form secondary to some other ailment. Any disease which produces a poisoning in the body may set up inflammation in one or more of the nerves.

The more sensitive and delicate the organ or the tissue, the more liable it is to the effect of a toxin. It is no wonder, then, that the finely made and sensitive nerves are easily disturbed by the absorption of bodily toxins.

Most of the infectious or contagious diseases are capable of generating poisons that may cause inflammation of a nerve. After diphtheria, smallpox, scarlet fever or typhoid, there may be violent neuritis. Malaria and malaria tropica of this sort. Diabetes is another offender.

Abuse of alcohol is one of the most frequent causes of neuritis. This is particularly true of women who include their appetites. Their more delicate nerves do not resist the effects of alcohol.

Chronic arsenic poisoning, food poisoning and poisoning from other toxic agents may produce neuritis. I never see a case without asking about teeth, tonsils, nasal cavities and intestinal tract.

When Lee Yoo recovers sufficiently to be out of danger he will face trial in the city court for attempted suicide on his own life. A prison sentence is provided in cases where a conviction is recorded, but seldom is that the sentence is carried into effect.

DARES CRITICS TO PROVE TANGLE IN VOTE REVISION

People Who Think Statute Not Observed Can Go to Law About it, Says Premier

Declares Government Observes Letter of Constitution Act in Revising List

People who are charging that the Government has got the revision of the Provincial voters' list into a hopeless tangle are at liberty to go to the courts in an attempt to prove their contention. This challenge from the lips of Premier Oliver was the Government's answer to day to the assertion, contained in Vancouver newspapers recently, that it had failed to live up to the statutes in arranging for the Spring list revision.

"The revision is being carried out strictly in accordance with the statutes," the Premier asserted. "Anyone who doubts this had better go to law and attempt to prove his argument."

"There is absolutely no tangle with regard to the revision of the voters' lists except in the cobwebbed minds of those accustomed to getting excited over nothing."

The Premier pointed to amendments to the Constitution Act passed last December covering the revision of voters' lists as follows:

"For the purpose of the revision of the voters' lists under the Provincial Elections Act, subsequent to the passing of this Act, (the Act to Amend the Constitution Act), registrars of voters shall be appointed and lists of voters shall be revised for the electoral districts as named and described in the schedule to this act (in this section referred to as 'new electoral districts,' as distinguished from the existing electoral districts, which are in this section referred to as 'old electoral districts.')

"Subsection six of section four of the Act to Amend the Constitution Act provides that the lists of voters as last revised in conformity with this section shall be the lists of voters to be used at all elections held after the dissolution of the present Legislative Assembly, and in the taking of any of the elections under the Liquor Control and Plebiscite Act, being an act of the present session, taken after the completion and certification of the lists so revised."

BEER PLEBISCITE

Had these provisions not been made, said the Premier, it would have been impossible to hold a beer plebiscite until after dissolution of the Legislature.

Sections two and three of the amending bill do not come into effect until after dissolution of the Legislative Assembly.

Section two provides that the Legislative Assembly shall consist of forty-eight members, instead of forty-seven as at present.

Section three merely substitutes the new schedule of electoral districts as established under the redistribution Bill, for the old schedule.

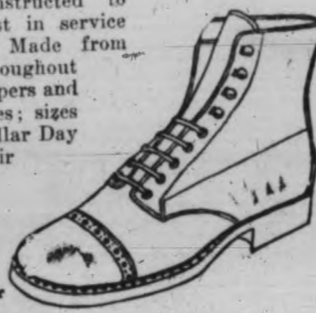

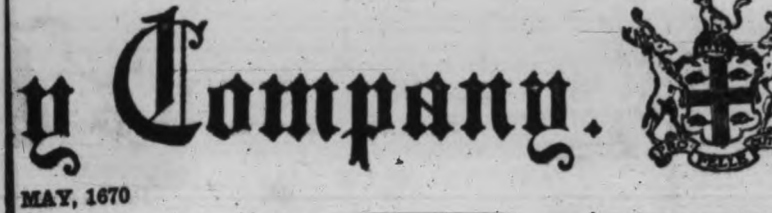

UNITED CHURCH TO BE CREEDLESS

(Continued from page 1.)

REV. D. CAMPBELL

"This is indeed a very serious matter," said Rev. Duncan Campbell, of Chilliwack, "in this issue was the question of the maintenance of the Presbyterian Church—to maintain it, or to blot it out. He said he was putting it exactly as the facts were. Turning to the draft measure before Parliament shortly, he said the effect would be to cause the present churches to cease. The Presbyterian churches had done wonders to give stability and high moral tone to the Dominion, and particularly to the development of the prairies and the Pacific Province.

The Presbyterian Church had not only been of strong religious and spiritual value to the Dominion, but the Presbyterian Church—the church of the Reformation—was foremost throughout the world. It had a record of martyrdom and sacrifice unsurpassed by any Christian people. "It needs our most serious thought to prevent it being blotted out," he asserted. If passed in the form of a great work, perhaps smaller but more efficient in the years to come, he stated.

DENOMINATIONALISM
Mr. Campbell declared himself in favor of denominationalism, because the system in the Protestant faith had produced the most aggressive evangelism. He did not expect to give the gospel to people under Heaven. He challenged any proof that Christ insisted on one denomination. "The sort of fetish of organic unity," the speaker contended, was the successor of the differences which had followed the early years of Christianity, from the days when the Bishop of Rome had reserved to himself the spiritual headship of the church. From the days of the split between the Eastern and the Western churches there had been schisms, and he believed they would continue to the end.

PIECE OF FICTION
Taking up the union arguments, he alluded to the statement during the war that when the men came back they would be zealous for union, and said it was all "a piece of fiction," because the men who went into the church on their return had become the most stringent followers of Presbyterianism.

There was the question that "West was solid for union." That he also declared absolutely erroneous. One-quarter of the vote at Port Arthur Assembly came from the West, and one-third of the opposition came from that section of Canada. Such facts demolished that contention, Mr. Campbell asserted.

CHURCH POLITY
Non-unionists were assured that elders would continue under union, that the church sessions would continue, yet no provision was made in the bill for elders, nor did the Methodists and Congregationalists have a voice. When the bill was read before the elders disappeared, the speaker stated.

Mr. Campbell turned to the issue of "calling" of ministers and preservation of the presbytery. He asserted that the church had fought just as much for its church polity as for its doctrine. In the way in which a church unity based on government by elders, including the minister, deacons, presbytery, and synod, was ordained to the purpose. "We have no laymen in the church courts," he stated, because the elder was an ordained man. Such would not be the case in the proposed united church. Without elders the presbytery could not be a true presbytery—nor would it have any right of ordination. The settlement committee would have the right of placing pastors without appeal.

Mr. Campbell analyzed the present management of the Methodist Church, saying that the much abused term "conference" had been carried into the new church meaning something entirely different from the original.

He pointed to the votes of 1911 and 1915 of the Presbyterian Church and said the 1915 vote was quite different from that now attributed to it. In four years an act of abdication of the Unionists gained 599, and the opponents gained 23,900.

term them friends—inside the church." He declared the organic union movement came not from the people, who were not enthusiastic, but from a limited number of church leaders, professors and others. In order to stimulate some enthusiasm the wise men from the East had come West, and he talked in favor of the scheme. The Union leaders did not want another vote taken, whereas he was satisfied that another vote would be an emphatic "No."

THEN AND NOW
Some of the Union leaders now denied the right of members to vote as having any constitutional value. If it had no value now, how could it effect the result if the Presbyterian Church was swept into Union by Act of Parliament. It would have been said in 1915, after the vote of 1915 to have entered into Union, and was it not more equally so with many new members in 1924 not to secure a fresh opinion, when the anti-union movement was growing.

"CREEDLESS CHURCH"
"If this new church into which we are being driven had something to offer, something equivalent to what we are asked to surrender," said Mr. Lister, "perhaps we might face the situation more confidently. Was it offering anything better? Rather it was getting away from Calvinism, from Presbyterianism. There was no definite doctrine in the Presbyterianism fought for a year, and then gave away—this united church is a creedless church.

If the doctrine of the new church was effective, they might make surrenderers, but such was not the case. The United Church had dressed up a dummy policeman, who would pass in all classes of creed and heresy. There would be no means of trying heresy. The new church will be a harbor of refuge for the heretics of Presbyterians for Unitarianism, Christian Science, Theosophy and other 'isms' which are so prevalent to-day," he stated.

Mr. Lister warned them against the growth of apostasy in the church. In the new church there would be nothing constant, nothing upon which to take a stand. What a contrast to the historic position of Presbyterianism.

DR. CLAY
Rev. Dr. Clay pointed out that there should be no bitterness with those who differed from them, as they went forward into the future. Organic union was not only one question, but a number of questions rolled into one. Many people favored organic union, and said so without giving the matter much thought. He was opposed to the basis upon which it was proposed to bring the churches into a common fold, and he emphasized the opinion that since the emphatic decision of the people had been given in the way it was given in 1911 his opinion against had crystallized finally in opposition.

The Assembly had declared with a minority of 599 against the Union, that the majority was too great—that they could not go on. He described the present plans to transfer church buildings and church trusts into a new church, without minority protection, as an improper course, and unjust to the minority.

THE SILENT
He pointed Dr. Gordon in favor of a modification of the measure, and for another vote on church union, although Dr. Gordon was a Unionist. He described the measure as "an unjust, tyrannous bill, this bill which does violence to private conscience and to church trusts." Dr. Clay examined the claim to count the 166,000 silent vote as in favor of union, and said another interpretation might be put on that silent vote. In 1905 the Assembly had said the consent of the entire membership was necessary. That policy had colored subsequent proceedings, and there was no right to count dissenting vote as affirmative to the organic union principle.

WHO ARE THE REBELS
The speaker turned to take up the question of "disloyalty" to the constituted courts of the church made by Rev. Dr. Chown, General Superintendent of the Methodist Church, and others. Dr. Clay said no regulation could be found to require the extinction of the Presbyterian Church as such in Canada. Examining the action of the General Assembly, he said it had been inconsistent. Asked if he was in rebellion against constituted Presbyterianism, how did such a charge compare with the various policies of the Assembly? Citing the different actions of the 1905, 1911, 1912, 1915 and 1917 assemblies, he said the Presbyterian Church Association was not in rebellion. The assemblies of 1916 and 1921, and again in 1923, however, had taken courses to which they were opposed, and for which they would be opposed to the end. (Hear, hear.)

faith, should remember the undertakings of 1905 and 1917, and the promise then given to the minority. Dr. Clay eloquently appealed against the majority leaders forcing a disruption, with the break-up of life-long efforts, and damage to Presbyterianism at home and abroad. There was still time to withdraw, and he appealed to avoid the inevitable chaos.

Dr. Clay then moved a resolution, which Thomas Humphries, secretary of the Presbyterian Church Association of Victoria, seconded.

Dr. Thomas Miller made an acceptable chairman. He stated that one church ignored the request publicity for the meeting. A pledge card would be distributed for adherents, the chairman said. He pointed out that funds were needed, if they were to sustain the fight.

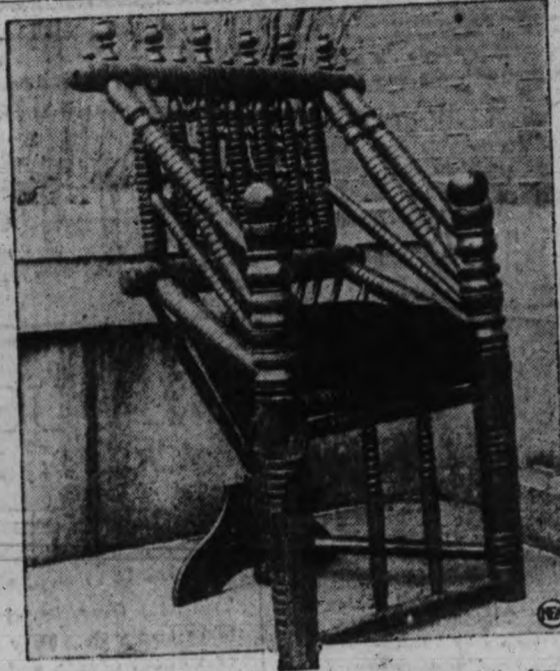

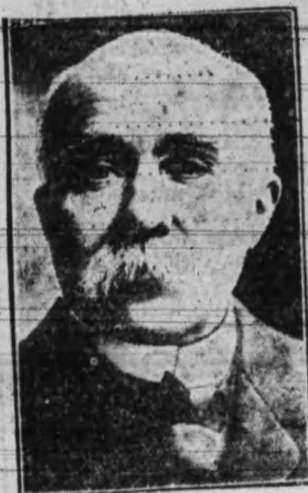
