Mr. Ballaine, who constructed the Alaska Central Railroad, the fore-runner of the present Government line, presented his letter to the President as a supplement to previous charges that powerful interests are at work to hinder the development of Alaska.





PROVINCE'S HISTORY SUBJECT OF ADDRESS

Mr. Justice Murphy, of Vancouver, in his address last night on the history of British Columbia, from the earliest days of the white settlers, to the more modern story of the building of railways and the work among the Indians, gave a very concise and carefully prepared story to the public. He was heard by a large gathering, in the library of the Legislative Buildings, and his talk with the lantern slides accompanying it, was greatly enjoyed.

The speaker began his story of British Columbia with the telling of the times of the earliest white settlers' coming to the Coast. Perhaps these persons could not actually be

Ferhaps these persons could not actually be called settlers, for they came only to trade, or in the employ of European governments to explore and claim lands for their respective crowns. The days of the Spaniards, the coming of the British, and wars with the indians, and the ways and customs of these latter all tended to make His Lordship's address more interesting and inspiring. He forcibly pointed out the worth of the heritage left to the present-day inhabitants of British Columbia.

SENTENCED TO DEATH

Unique Case in France; He Killed Two Persons

Laon. France, Feb. 15.— Raoul Marchand, twenty, has just been convicted of murder and sentenced to death for the second time, a case which is believed to be unique in French justice.

He was condemned first in August last for the slaying of a young girl, While in prison awalting the result of his lawyer's efforts to obtain a respite from President Milerand, Marchand one day caught a prison attendant off guard and felled him with a chair in an attempt to escape. The attendant died the next-day. Marchand was again arraigned before a jury, found guilty and sentenced to death.
