## The New Climbing Rose, YELLOW RAMBLER (Aglaia).

The Only Hardy Yellow Climbing Rose Yet Introduced. A Worthy Companion to the Wonderful Crimson Rambler.

This rose, we are confident, is an even more valuable introduction than the Crimson Rambler. It was originated by the prominent German rose-grower, Mr. Peter Lambert, who has carefully tested it for some eight years, and first offered it to the public only this last season. Its production is a very great triumph in the art of hybridizing. Rosarians have for many years been crossing or hybridizing various roses with a view to obtaining a hardy yellow climbing rose, but the combination of climbing habit and yellow coloring with hardiness was one that it seemed impossible to obtain. Repeated efforts were made to secure it, and the Yellow Rambler represents the most complete success ever attained by any one.

It is perfectly hardy. It has been found to successfully withstand, without protection, a continued temperature of from zero to two degrees below.

It is similar to Crimson Rambler in foliage, habit of growth, and manner of blooming, and is undoubtedly of the same parentage. It is a vigorous grower, well established plants often making shoots from eight to ten feet in height in a single season. The flowers are borne in immense clusters after the same manner as Crimson Rambler, often as many as 150 blossoms in a bunch, and the trusses have the same landsome pyramidal shape as those of Crimson Rambler. The flowers also have the same lasting quality, remaining in bloom three to four weeks without fading, a large bush in full bloom forming one of the most beautiful sights invariable.

It differs from Crimson Rambler in color, the flowers of this variety being a clear, decided yellow. The blossoms, which are of moderate size, cup-shaped, and of very pretty form, are very sweetly secuted, making it superior to Crimson Rambler in this respect, the flowers of that variety not being fragrant. The plants do not bloom at quite so early an age as Crimson Rambler,

but make up for this as soon as well established by the magnificence of the flowers they produce.

#### ROSA MULTIFLORA JAPONICA.

This beautiful Japanese rose, while not new, is so rare as to be practically a novelty to the great flower-loving public. It is of peculiar beauty and interest, and an exquisite thing in every way. The individual flowers last a long time, the plants showing bloom for about a month, and are followed by bright red heps, or seed pods, exceedingly handsome, making the plant attractive after the flowers are gone. 









## CANNAS-NOVELTIES OF 1896.

Pierson's Premier (Little Billee).—This variety is one of our own seedlings raised from Queen Charlotte. It was first introduced by us to a limited extent and at a high price in 1896 under the name of Little Billee. It attracted our attention immediately among a number of other seedlings, showing its superior quality from the beginning, on account of its dwarfness and the quantity of flowers it produced. The original plant bloomed when only a foot high, and notwithstanding the diminutive size of the plant, the flowers were of the largest size, added to which the plant threw up an unusual number of flowering shoots, making it an exceptionally profuse and abundant bloomer. Our extensive tests of this variety in the open ground the past summer have demonstrated that it is one of the most valuable varieties sent out in years. We recommended it highly last year, being sure that it was very valuable, but it has even exceeded our anticipations, and those who buy it will be more than pleased with it. It is sure to become a favorite immediately, and will occupy a prominent place among our finest varieties for a long time to come, its general characteristics making it more nearly perfect, taking everything into consideration, than any other variety that has been raised up to this time.

It is the dwarfest-growing variety of all the Cannas, under ordinary circumstances growing only about three feet high when Bouvier would grow six feet. It is about two feet shorter than Florence Vaughan under the same conditions. On account of its dwarf habit and the freedom with which it blooms, it must become a very valuable bedding variety. The plants grow unusually compact, the heads of bloom being borne as evenly and compactly as the heads of a bed of Geraniums. The compactness of the plants is well shown in the above photograph. It holds its flowers longer than any other variety, and during the height of the season is a perfect mass of bloom, a single row showing more flowers than two rows of Florence Vaughan or any other variety grown alongside of it. In color, it is intermediate between Queen Charlotte and Souv. de Antoine Crozy, the center of the petals being much darker and richer in color than Queen Charlotte, with a narrow gilt-edged border. On account of its dwarf, compact habit and the freedom with which it blooms, no Canna in the list equals Pierson's Premier as a pot plant.

Papa.—M. Crozy claims this variety as his finest variety to date, and it certainly is a grand addition to the already gorgeous array of red Cannas. It grows about three feet high, and bears claim that it is one of the very finest, if not the finest red variety, but its claim to supremacy can only be determined by tuture tests. The new varieties that have been introduced lately are raising the standard very high.

Black Beauty. This variety is a seedling from Pres. Carnot, and is the darkest-foliaged variety of all the Cannas. Its leaves are blackish-maroon, much darker than Pres. Carnot or Egandale. It is not so free a blooming variety as Egandale, however. The flower is good size, cherry red, and similiar in color. It grows about five feet high,

Flamingo.—A grand variety. An American seedling; a dwarf, compact grower, never exceeding four feet in height under the highest cultivation. Petals large, round and recurved, overlapping each other and forming round, compact heads of bloom approaching the ideal type. Spikes are branched, side trusses coming into flower and replacing the central truss as soon as it shows signs of fading. Rain and wind have very little effect on it, it being a veritable element-resister. In color it is an intense glowing crimson without spots or shading, very similar to Columbia.

In color, it is an intense vivid scarlet bordered with a narrow band of the deepest golden yellow, the yellow border intensifying the brilliancy of the searlet. It is such a bright scarlet that Mme. Crozy alongside of it looks like a pale red. The effect of a group of these flowers in full bloom is dazzling. It is an exceedingly free bloomer. The heads of bloom are very large, and the flowers are retained upon the spike more than an ordinary length of time. It grows about six feet high; somewhat taller than Mme. Crozy, and about midway between the dwarf variety. Pierson's Premier, and Alphonse Bouvier. It seems like high praise to say that this variety is better than Mme. Crozy, but we think the facts warrant the statement, and we consider it for bedding purposes much superior. Our tests have proved conclusively that this is bound to be one of the leading varieties for a long time to come. Those who wish to have the best varieties of Cannas should certainly have this variety.

Chicago.—This is unquestionably one of the very finest varieties. It is an exceedingly free bloomer and a strong grower. It contests for supremacy with F. R. Pierson and Columbia as the best red variety for bedding. Some of the largest growers in the West claim that it is one of the very best all-round varieties in commerce to-day. Fred Kanst, Supt, of Washington Park, Chicago, states that if he were confined to one variety, he should plant Chicago in preference to any other one sort. It certainly has done magnificently in the West, where it has been very largely planted, and should be planted by eastern growers, as we shall be very much disappointed if it does not give splendld satisfaction. The value of this variety does not hie so much in the perfection of the individual flower as in the exceptional freedom with which it blooms, and the fact that the flowers stand a long time, not being easily marred by wind or storm.









We think this is a mistake. Asparagus can be as cheaply and easily grown as any of the vegetables on our list. A bed once made and properly cared for will last for years. Seed should be sown in April in drills one foot apart and about two aches deep. Soon as seedlings are large enough thin out to two or three inches apart in the rows, removing the weakest plants. Care should be taken to keep the plants free from weeds during the season. One year old plants can be transplanted to permanent beds thoroughly prepared beforehand by trenching two feet deep, mixing the soil thoroughly with plenty of manure, as no more can be applied after the beds are planted except by surface dressing; the soil can scarcely be made too rich. A plot of ground 20 x 50 feet, requiring 300 plants to plant the plot, will Asparagus is one of the earliest spring vegetables and possibly by surface dressing; the son can scarcely be made too lich. A plot of ground 20 x 55 feet, requiring 300 plants to plant the plot, will be large enough to supply a moderate-sized family. Plant in rows three feet apart, plants one foot apart in the rows. To plant the bed, open trenches six inches deep and the width of a spade, spread the roots out carefully in all directions, keeping the crown six inches from the surface. from the surface. Plant always in spring, as early as the ground can be worked. In autumn cut old stalks off, remove all weeds, and cover with a top dressing of manure, which should be forked in. in the spring, with a dressing of fine salt, about 2 or 3 pounds per square yard, or 200 pounds for a bed of the above size. A new bed should be left ment two years, cutting the third year.
