
Darwin Tulips Include All Colors of Spectrum

Because of this delightful quality, tulips are usually well named; and the christener of Gloria Swanson, expressed in its name the dramatic beauty which it possesses. They bring to the garden flowers as large and colors even more brilliant than the Darwins, at a time when every bit of garden color is precious.

For its size, bright color and rare fragrance, General DeWet is a tulip which no garden should be without. There is no other orange variety which equals it in brilliance. It is 10 inches tall, with the largest flower of any early variety, and blossoms two weeks before the first Darwin. A huge scarlet flower with 6 inch petals, which opens to a black center bordered with yellow. It is the largest bright red tulip and the earliest to bloom, as it comes into flower even before the single early varieties. Known to botanists as Tulip Fosteriana, it is a species, or wild form of tulip. Most other tulips are garden forms, not to be found growing wild in the world today. They have been cultivated so long their origin is unknown. But Red Emperor, perhaps an ancestor of the cultivated forms, has never been surpassed by a product of men's breeding skill. No variety has ever been produced which excels it in size, earliness, and brilliance of coloring.

KEIZERSKROON

Most Popular Early Tulip

When carpet beds of early tulips were still the fashion in American front yards—back in the Eighties-Keizerskroon was the favorite variety and it still is most popular of its class. Its brilliant scarlet and gold blossoms stand out in the garden to gladden eyes eager for bright color in the drab landscape of early spring. Of all the new varieties introduced, relatively tew survive the test of garden culture and take their place among the acknowledged leaders. The peonies you plant may outlive you, so it is important to choose varieties for permanent planting which have demonstrated lasting merit. The four offered on this page are among the world's best, for display in the garden, or in the flower show. The flowers of each will last for days if cut in the bud stage and allowed to open in the house. Plant as soon as received in full sun, giving three feet in direction from other plants. Do not set the crown, from which the eyes grow, more than two inches below the soil surface.

GREAT SA PEONIES 4

BARONESS SCHROEDER (9.0) One of the finest peonies in existence. Immense flowers of great substance with high chalice-shaped center. Opens a delicate flesh-white, sometimes a soft baby pink, changing to creamy-white. One of our best cut-flower varieties and an excellent keeper. June rose fragrance, late. \$1.50.

In color range they include all the rainbow hues, in amazing variety. Yellow, which long was missing from the Darwins, is now represented by several fine varieties, and new varieties include splendid giant whites whites

Included in the variety lists on this and the follow-ing pages are many newly introduced varieties which show improvement in color, height, size or in some other important respect. But we retain the best of the old varieties, many of which may never be surpassed.

They are often sold that way, though among them there are several clans, cach having definite family resemblances, of which the Darwin, Darwin hybrids, Cottage and Breeder are most numerous.

All these bloom about the same time, and harmonize perfectly in garden plantings. They can be selected by color, height, and form for use in the garden border without regard to their ancestry. The distinction between these various clans tends to become less definite, as they are interbred by growers seeking improved varieties. We continue to list each tulip clan separately, however, to aid you in identifying favorite varietics, and also to give additional descriptive information. For an interesting planting, varieties of all types should be used.

Planning a tulip garden is made easy by the fact that you may count so surely upon cach flower blooming as planned. The height, color and flowering season are all so dependable, it is a pleasure to plan a color effect and sce it develop in the spring, just as planned.

Hyaeinths contribute to the spring garden fragrance as well as eolors which at that time no other flowers ean give so well. Indeed, it is doubtful whether at any time of the garden year lovelier true pinks and blues ean be found than those which hyacinths provide.

They serve to border paths, near all garden arehiteeture, including ornaments such as bird baths, pools and fountains, and groups of hyaeinths may well be worked into the border planting, where they will provide a needed eolor foil or accent.

For garden planting, it is not necessary to use the largest foreing sizes. Bulbs of third and bedding sizes will do well. Take especial eare to plant them in well drained soil, and if there is any doubt, elevate the bed a few inches to keep them above water. Plant bulbs six inches deep, and after the ground has frozen a light muleh to keep the frost in, will benefit.

Light, rich soil produces the best flowers. Place each bulb one inch deep, an inch and one-half from each other bulb or cdge of pot. Water well, and set away in a dark, eool eellar, or an outdoor pit which is well drained. If outside, eover with three or four inches of sand or ashes. Let them remain there for eight or ten weeks to root, then bring them into a warm room, but keep them in the dark (eover the pot with a paper bag, eloth, etc.). Then when the flower spike is three or four inches out of the bulb, they may be exposed to the light, and will open beautifully.

Hardy Lilies For Fall Planting

Lilies are hardy, thrifty flowers, eapable of surviving conditions which would overcome flowers much less beautiful. Grow them in the border in small groups, with background, where their beauty has a suitable setting for its display. They blossom, as a rule, in midsummer, when fine flowers are at a premium. With each order a leaflet giving instructions for growing them in the garden will be sent. They should be planted on receipt to enable the bulbs to begin root growth this fall.

Outdoor Culture—When planting lilies out-of-doors, see that they have a well drained position, and where they will be shaded from very hot sun. Such places can usually be found around the shruh borders, and in the hardy plant border. Never mix manure in the soil around lilies, but enrich with a standard eommercial plant food or with bone meal. Many varieties are termed "stemrooters." that is, they develop roots on the stem up to two or three inches from the ground. These roots are voracious feeders, and on them depend greatly the number and size of flowers. When they appear, the plant should receive a top-dressing of good rich soil on which they can leed freely. Spade over the ground thoroughly to a depth of 18 inches before planting lilies. Plant the bulbs 4 to 8 inches deep, depending on their size and the soil, deeper in light soil.



Daffodils are the first of the major garden flowers to blossom in the spring. This makes them doubly precious, as heralds of a season of joy, after the long winter

The daffodil tribe likes a cool root run and its flowers are at their best in the cooler days of spring. Therefore it is essential to dig the soil deeply and provide humus. Like the tulip, the daffodil will not thrive if there is fresh manure in the soil and commercial plant food should be used when the bulb is planted. It likes a moist soil but it must have excellent drainage. The plant food should be mixed in the soil below the hulb and if the soil is heavy, a cushion of sand is advisable.

Daffodils are particularly fine subjects to plant under the edge of bushes or among perennials in the hardy border as they seem to like to nestle among the roots of their neighbors.





When you sow seeds of annuals in Fall, you imitate Nature's method. Praetieally all hardy annuals will produce stronger, sturdier plants with earlier bloom by this method. Even when spring sowing is desirable, experienced gardeners also sow in fall because they then have a continuous season of bloom. Also, they ean sow at their leisure instead of trying to plant everything in a fcw short weeks. Do not be in too much of a hurry to sow.

The ideal time is just before the ground freezes for the winter. November 15th is early enough in normal seasons in the vicinity of Chieago and New York. If the ground has been prepared in advance, sowings ean also be made during winter thaws.

A fine seed bed is desirable, if the sides are protected with boards it will save the seed from washing away. A light eovering may be used if birds are troublesome. Plant at half the depth used when sowing seed in spring. Broadeast all small sced.

★Varieties preceded by star are especially recommended for sowing in the fall above your bulbs They will grow in the spring and blossom after the bulbs. Their shallow roots will not interfere with the bulbs maturing properly; their growth will conceal the bulb foliage after it grows yellow and unsightly.

As soon as iris plants are received, plant them in a sunny, well drained place. Each plant should have at least eighteen inches clear space from other irises, as it will grow in a circle and many varieties spread rapidly. The rhizome, or fleshy root stock from which the leaves and roots grow, should be barely covered with soil, with the roots properly spread below, and the soil well firmed about them. Until the plant is established, give it frequent attention, watering in dry spells. In the first winter, after the ground has frozen, a light mulch to prevent thawing and heaving will be beneficial.





The first two months of spring, when garden beauty is most welcome, yet most rare, hardy bulbs supply the dominant flowers. And of all flowers, they offer the easiest, surest success.

Spring flowering bulbs prolong the garden season for a month at least; and in most sections they bloom at a time when all their surroundings are fresh and beautiful; when moisture is ample, weeds have not yet grown, and few if any insects bother them.

The greatest enemy of fall bulbs is poor drainage; they must be planted in locations where water drains away quickly, and if there is any doubt about this, beds should be raised above the surrounding surface sufficiently to insure it



METHOD OF FORCING BULBS IN FIBRE. Moisten Vaughan's Prepared Bulb Fibre to saturation, fill the bowl with wet fibre, and plant the bulbs allowing their necks to emerge from the fibre, but without pressing the fibre too firmly around them. Keep the fibre moist, since if it dries out the flower buds may go blind But water sparingly until good roots have formed. When strong top growth has been made in the dark, take the bowl to a sunny window, where it will have fresh air, all the sunlight possible especially in the morning, and preferably a temperature not less than 55 nor more than 70 degrees.

Bulbs will grow well in any reasonably good garden soil, but it should be well prepared to a depth of at least twelve inches. The depth of planting varies with the kind of bulb, but the depths shown on the accompanying planting chart are minimums, with deeper planting advisable in many cases.

When tulips are to be left for several years without lifting, bulbs should be placed 10 to 12 inches deep, where they will be cooler, will produce fewer "splits" and continue to maintain blooming size for long periods. Use no manure on bulbs unless it has been thoroughly rotted and can be spaded into the ground several weeks previous to planting. Å balanced plant food applied to the soil at the rate of 5 lbs. to 100 square feet and spaded into the soil will bencfit the bulbs.

The earlier bulbs blossom in the spring, the more important it is to plant them early in the fall, so they will have time to make root growth in their new location. Daffodils and hyacinths especially benefit from early planting.

After the soil has been prepared, bulbs may be planted with a trowel, or by the use of a blunt-end dibber. Avoid using a pointed dibber, or any device which will permit the bulb to be caught by the sides of the hole with air beneath it. The bulb should rest on the bottom with soil packed firmly around it.

What is known as the Dutch method is sometimes followed in planting beds. Soil is thrown out to the proper planting depth, bulbs are then placed where they are wanted and the soil filled in above them. This is a convenient method where a formal pattern is followed in placing the bulbs.

In case of necessity, however, fall bulbs can be planted as late as the ground can be worked. It is a good rule to plant all bulbs as soon as you receive them and you are willing to disturb established beds. Tulips should go in when the leaves fall. When late planting is necessary, cover the bed with a mulch of leaves after the ground has frozen. This will prevent winter thaws, and consequent frost heaving.

After bulbous plants have flowered, their leaves should not be cut or disturbed until they turn yellow, which indicates that the bulbs have ripened.
