New York, Jan. 23.—The World to-dag-prints two interviews, giving both sides of the Quesnay de Beaurepaire feature of the Dreyfus affair. The item is as follows:

Paris, Jan. 23.—The decision of the court of cassation in the Dreyfus case, to be made known in a couple of weeks, is likely to produce a crisis, ending in a revolution. No event in the whole scandal has created a deeper impression than the resignation of Quesnay de Reaurepaire from the court of cassation. With the object by obtaining the views of the most prominent and active men on each side of Beaurepaire's conduct and the general outlook, the correspondent obtained signed statements from MM. Frances de Pressence and Lucien Milevoye. Pressence is one of the ablest and most respected of French publicists. He is the editor of the Temps, the leading japer, who was removed from the Legion of Honor for his fearless always of the Decrea case. He writes: The true reason for Beaurepaire's conduct is the most scandalous feature of the present deplorable crisis, and is due to his irritation against the government on account of the humiliation it subjected him to ten months ago, when at its instance, during the Panama business, he was brought before a meeting of the court of cassation.

Lucien Milevoye is the most energetic of the extreme anti-Dreyfus agitators. He writes: "Beaurepaire, though a patriot, resigned because he was indignant at seeing certain magistrates of the court of cassation making themselves instruments of an international and initianational compaign. His declarations has already produced a result by holding in suspense the decision of the criminal chamber.

"The resignation has protoundly moved public opinion. The partiality of the court is evident, and a judgment rendered under such conditions will not be ratified by public conscience. If this criminal chamber remits the case to a new court-martial France will wait that solution, but if it should dare to annul, without remitting, the agitation will assume grave preportions among the people and the army.

"France is a military democracy, passionately attached to her principles of liberty, but firmly resolved to defend her independence and her hanor. Every citizen is to-day a soldier; and the impause majority of them: preserve a respect for the flag.

Wattles, marine engineer, son of a San Francisco broker, and Frank Orr, of this city. Wattles ansappeared when the launch went down and his body has not been recovered. The launch when run down was in search of a boat containing two men supposed to have been drowned. They are William Seabury, son of Captain Seabury, of the Pacific Mall Steamship Company's steamer Ghina, and Edward J. Finn, who started out last Friday on a hunting expedition. Later in the day the boat in, which Seabury and Finn were hunting was found bottom up off Hed Rock, near the mouth of the Sacramento river, and it is believed both men have been drowned.

AN UNDERTAKING SHIP

Savannah, Ga., Jan. 23.—Lieut, F. W. Billinger, department of quartermaster, says the transport Rosmania will go to New York from Majanass at once, and on arrival there will be fatted out as an undertakers still. A supply of coffins, chemicals and a gumber of undertakers will be taken, and the transport will be at Santinga about a month, during which, time soldiers who were killed in battle or who died in the hospitals will be taken from the ground and placed in hermetically sealed coffins. They will then be taken to New York, and relatives or any one else interested may have the bodies after not claimed, they will be properly buried by the government in one of the mational cemercies.
